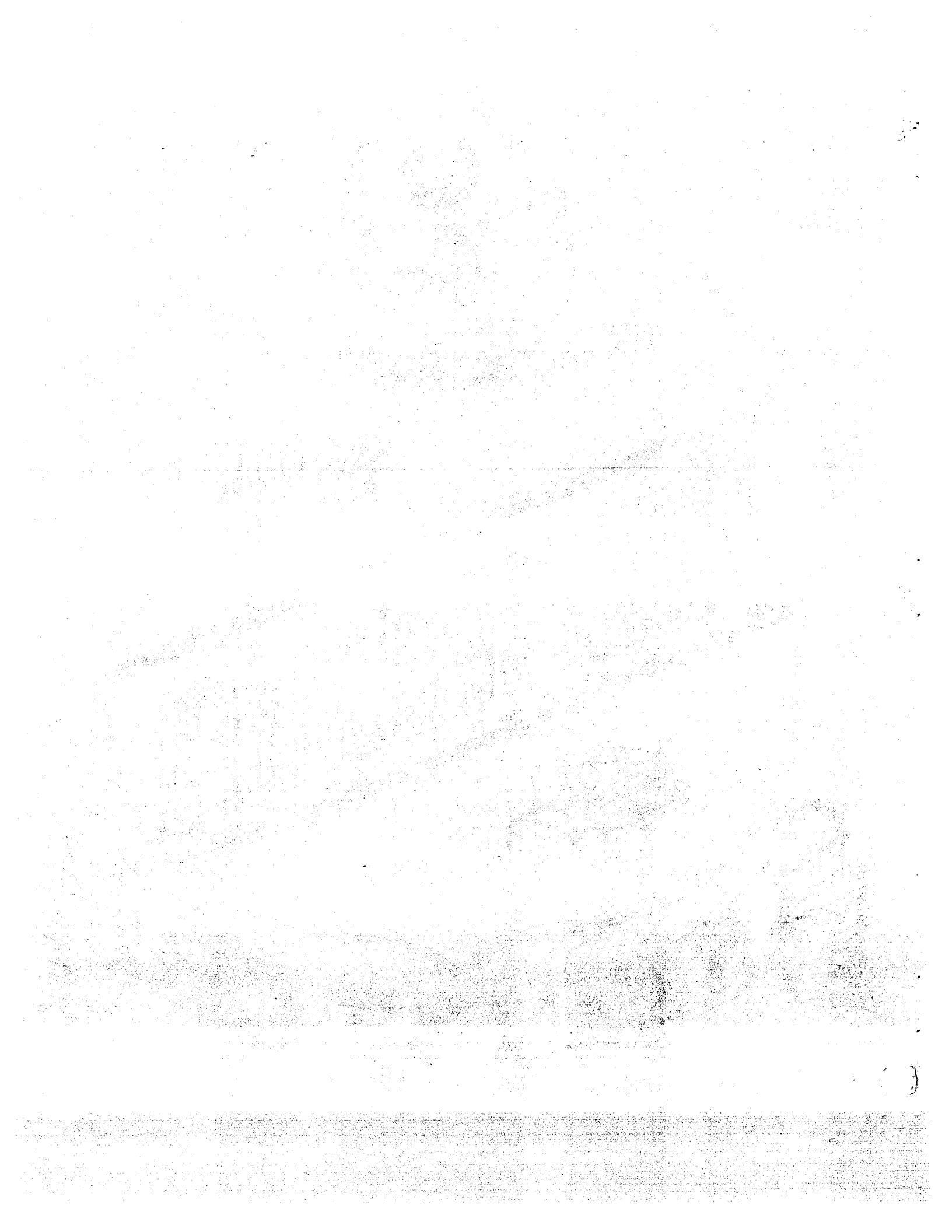

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MEANING OF THE NAME

The two Anglo-Saxon words, HOLEGN (or HOLYN, a holly bush or tree) and WORþ (or WURþE - pronounced like "worth" - meaning an enclosure or farmstead with a protective wall about it) are said to be the roots which formed the ancient placename HOLYNWORTHE, later HOLLINGWORTH. One or two such places are located north of Manchester, England, in Salford Hundred, another is a modern township in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, northeast Cheshire, just a few miles to the southeast of Manchester. HOLISURDE (i.e. Hollisworth) of Domesday for Cheshire (c1086) is probably the same place. From this particular place, it is believed that men first took up the name as a sire-name or surname. It is possible that more than one unrelated family took up the name from this place, or from the other places in Lancashire. The earliest documented appearance of the word used as a surname, as observed by us, is in a Charter of the Godley family of Cheshire, signed about the time of Magna Carta (c1215) wherein "TOMAS De HOLLINWURTH" was one of the witnesses. The man may have actually been one of the relatives of the Godleys (De Goddeleigh) then residing "in Holvnworth" and thus using that appellation in his name. It is difficult to say whether the Hollingsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinsworth and Hollinworth families were of Anglo-Saxon, Norman, or Welsh derivation. Their Given names seem to indicate they were Norman: Reignould, Lawrence, Cecily, Roberte; so also does the fact that Hugh Lupus, Earl of Chester, a fat Norman, was the landlord of Mottram! The late Capt. Robert De Hollingeworthe of Hollingworth Hall, claimed that an ancient pedigree of his family placed the family at Mottram in 1022 as holders of the Manor. This source has never been confirmed and is thought to be spurious. In the seventeenth century the spelling with medial s: Hollinesworth, began to be used. It seems to derive from a possessive or genitive idea: "Holling's Worth" or, "The Worth of Mr. Hollings". Contrary to popular ideas, Hollingworth is not "the English form" of this name. Both forms arose in England long before emigration to any other country.

HOLLINGSWORTH & HOLLINGSWORTH FAMILIES IN ENGLAND, IRELAND & AMERICA

(A BRIEF SUMMARY)

The oldest English sources yet examined, being early dated and undated deeds relating to the family of HOLLINGSWORTH (HOLLINGSWORTH), are to be found in Cheshire, Lancashire & Yorkshire. Examination of a map will show that these counties (shires) all join in a cluster, in the northern part of the country. From these first appearances (about A.D. 1250) until the late 1500's, no instance has yet been met of the 13-letter surname "HOLLINGSWORTH" (HOLLINGSWORTH.) The earliest appearances of this latter name are to be found in parish church records from LONDON, many miles to the south, in the middle 1600's. Shortly thereafter, it begins to appear in Yorkshire and Lancashire, and from that time onward, it steadily moves into the forefront.

In Ireland, the main settlements of the family were as follows: (1) In County Armagh, northern Ireland, before 1632, of whom came the American Quaker branch. (2) In Parish of Clonduff, County Down, near Armagh, before 1714, a family of dominantly Presbyterian faith, dwelt. Both of these families are ancient, and may have a common ancestor. (3) In counties Wexford and Wicklow, in the southeast part of Ireland, below Dublin, a family appeared about 1750. This family was dominantly Church of Ireland (Protestant Episcopal). Your Editor is a descendant of this clan. He feels that this family is an offshoot of the family of County Down. About 1610 - 1615, one William Brownlow, Esq., came to Ireland from England. He founded the city of Lurgan, Co., Armagh, which, in 1619, consisted of 42 English families. This, perhaps, was the source of the Hollingsworth family in Ireland. If so, it antedates the appearance of the family of the same name, in ENGLAND! Perhaps the addition of the letter "s" (if the families of Hollingsworth and Hollingsworth are the same) has something to do with the Ireland settlement. It is well known that the clan "MacFarlane," of Scotland, have a branch in Ireland, who began to spell their surname "McFarland," adding the letter "d", after arrival there!

"Hollingsworth" families in Ireland were rare. A Captain Hollingsworth, officer in the forces of Queen Elizabeth I., but of English origin, earned himself a black name during his military ravages in Ireland about 1570. Ralph or Radulphus Hollingsworth, and son Anthony, clergymen in the English church, were serving in Ireland in the 1650-1670 period. Also, in Dublin, several "Hollingsworth" (Hollingsworth) families appear from time to time. The earliest appearance is when Raphael Hollingsworth, of Francis St., nailer, married Alice Bennett, 13 Dec., 1657. This, by the way, is the earliest record of the 13-letter name to be found in Ireland, with legal proof attending. In 1707, a Michael Hollingsworth married one Samuel Nelson. Benjamin Hollingsworth (Hollingsworth) and wife Ann, of Francis Street and later of Outpurse Row, Dublin, had four children baptized in the period 1714-1730: Thomas, later a merchant in New Row, who died childless in 1747; Margaret, married Henry Shea, a merchant in the same street, who left five children (Shea); and Elizabeth & Benjamin, Jr., nothing about whom is known. There is also a record of the intestate of one Alexander Hollingsworth, merchant, of Dublin, in 1723. There were similar records of Hollingsworth in Dublin in the early 1800's. Today, there are several families residing there, chiefly from the Wexford-Wicklow family to the south, who have moved to the city.

Several prominent traditions are affiliated with the several families in Ireland. The Hollingsworths of County Down tell two stories: (1) That the first of the name came with Alderman William Hawkins, founder of Bethfryland, about 1641, when Cromwell landed in Ireland; (2) That they came as soldiers in

the army of King William of Orange (later William III.) in A.D. 1690. According to the Quaker records of Lurgan Meeting, written in the 1660's, Valentine Hollingsworth was born in Ballymacrandall, Parish of Seago, Co. Armagh, in July, 1632. Thus, this information would tend to assert different origins for the two clans. The Wexford-Wicklow family tell us that their first settlement was made at Ballinckill, Parish of Ballycanew, Co. Wexford, in 1665. But others of the same family say that the first man came with Cromwell. So, take your pick. Time and much research may establish the veracity of one or another of these traditions.

In America, the first arrival was Richard Hollingsworth, from London, a Shipwright by trade. He came to Salem, Massachusetts, on the ship "BLESSING" in 1635, with wife Susan, and children William, Richard, Elizabeth and Susan. Although the family name persisted for some time, there were none in New England in 1790, according to the First United States Census - in fact, no "Hollingsworth" at all! The second immigrant was John Hollingsworth, who, with wife Sarah, arrived in 1638, in James City County, Virginia. They were transported by one Thomas Wallis, "Practitioner of Physicke." Nothing else is known of any supposed posterity. The third settlement was by John Hollingsworth, an indentured servant, in 1650, to Maryland. He was born in 1639 in England, and died in Kent Co., Md., in 1698. His sons were John, William & Thomas. From these men come living descendants in our times, bearing the surname. Thus, to this family belongs the distinction of the "First American Family of Hollingsworth," who are represented today. Then came Valentine Hollingsworth, from Co. Armagh, Ireland. He arrived on Delaware River about one month before William Penn, in 1682. (See the article by Joan Valentine Hollingsworth in this issue.) His large family spread throughout the South, and into Indiana, before 1800. The descendants of this man number in the many thousands and may be found in nearly every large city in America.

From 1682 onward, hundreds of other individuals bearing one or the other of the two surnames Hollingsworth and Hollingsworth, came to America. (See the article on Philadelphia Passenger Lists in this issue.) But due to lateness of arrival, in comparison to the above settlements, their offspring have not gained prominence. In Canada, individuals bearing the name were in evidence before 1775. In the 1830 period, several members of the Wicklow-Wexford clan took up lands in Leeds County, Ontario, and are still abundant there. Also, about 1841, Edward Hollingsworth, born in Co. Louth, Ireland, but of English parentage (he was son of Capt. in Richard Hollingsworth of Nottingham, England, and of Catherine Bull, his wife), came to Melrose, near Belleville, Ontario. His 10 children have left a large family in Canada and U.S.A. We hope to present details about all these families in future columns of The Hollingsworth Register.

THE CIVIL WAR SERVICE OF DAVID HOLLINGSWORTH

(Mr. Samuel W. Hollingsworth, Philadelphia, Penna., has done research on his family. He is now 82 years of age. In his honor, and with his kind permission, we reproduce his account of his father's service in the Union Army during the American Civil War, 1861-1865. David Hollingsworth, the 2nd child of Matthew & Isabella (Johnson) Hollingsworth, was born Nov. 12, 1839, in Philadelphia, and died there Jan. 26, 1916, at the age of 77. He is buried in Westminster cemetery, Eala Cynwyd, Penna. His father was born in 1813, in Ireland, as was his mother. They arrived in Philadelphia shortly before David's birth. It is believed, with good evidence, that Matthew was of the Rathfryland, County Down, family.) Here follow the words of Samuel Hollingsworth:

"MY FATHER'S RECORD IN THE CIVIL WAR 1861 to 1864 -

"On July 12th, 1861, David Hollingsworth enlisted in Company "E.", Colonel Baker's 1st California Regt. They were recruited at Philadelphia, Penna., and were later known as the 71st Penna. Volunteers. He enlisted for three years at the age of 21 years and 8 months. The regiment was sent south and remained at Fortress Monroe, Va., until the 1st battle of Bull Run; they were then ordered to the South Bank of the Potomac, opposite Washington, D.C. On Sept. 29th, 1861, they made a general advance on Munson's Hill. Early in October, 1861, they moved to Poolesville, Md., and were united with other regiments forming "Baker's Brigade," commanded by Colonel Baker in "General Stone's Division" and were assigned to duty guarding the fords of the Potomac from Point of Rocks to Edwards' Ferry.

"At the Battle of Balls Bluff, Col. Baker was killed. On Oct. 21, on orders from General Stone, eight companies under command of Lt. Col. Wistar marched to Conrad's Ferry; and were joined by portions of the 15th & 20th Massachusetts, and two companies of the 42nd New York. In November or December, 1861, they were changed to Company P., and went into winter quarters, where their thinned ranks were recruited.

"In the spring of 1862 they marched to Winchester, Virginia; were then ordered to Washington, D.C. and dispatched from there by transport to join the army under General McClellan at Yorktown. They were then sent by transport with the rest of the Corps to West Point on the York River.

"The battle of Fair Oaks opened on the afternoon of May 31, 1862. General Sedgwick to whose Division the 71st Penna. Volunteers were attached, reached the scene of the Battle of Fair Oaks. While the struggles at Beaver Dam Creek, Gaines Mills and the Bridges of the Chicanoning were in progress (during the seven day battles) the regiment held its ground, and on June 29, 1862, started to march to the James River, Savage Station and Antietam.

"On Oct. 24, 1862, David Hollingsworth was transferred to Co. I., 1st U.S. Artillery Regiment, for the balance of his term in service of one year, eight months and twenty days. While in the U.S. Artillery, he fought in the Battle of Fredericksburg, Cancellorsville, Gettysburg, Bristow Station, Cold Harbor, Trevillian Station and St. Mary's Church.

"On July 12th, 1864, he received an honorable discharge at Petersburg, Va., at the age of 24 years, 8 months."

(Many other Hollingsworths took part in the War, on both sides. We hope to receive articles like the above, which may appear from time to time, as space

THE QUAKER HOLLINGSWORTHS
POSTERITY OF VALENTINE

"Someone has said that the reason that the United States has become the greatest of all nations is that its early colonists came here seeking God while those to other countries went seeking gold. Thus it was that to this community came a little band of Friends hoping to find in a new country the right to worship in a way which had been denied to them in the lands they had left behind. Of this little band many had endured sufferings, persecutions and imprisonment because of their faith, and the marks of their hardships were plainly written in their gaunt frames and hollow cheeks. The country they found here was wild and uncivilized. Penn aptly named it "my Manor of Rocklands."

"The leader of this little group was Valentine Hollingsworth. Under his guidance a Friends' meeting was held at New Castle. Soon after, it moved to this place where a meeting house was erected on ground which he had donated. The meeting house was small and plain, built, it is said, of logs. It had nothing in common with the great cathedrals of Europe. More than two centuries ago it was moved to another location, and its founder passed to the great beyond, but each left behind an influence for good, which is still spreading in ever widening circles.

"It was here that Valentine Hollingsworth instilled in his family the principles of honest, upright living, which his descendants, now numbering many thousand, have carried to the remote places of our country. It was here that Newark Monthly Meeting, the first in Delaware, became the founder of many other meetings which are still teaching the simple truths of Quakerism, which have done so much for mankind.

"We are here not so much to commemorate a man long dead, nor a meeting house long abandoned, as we are to acknowledge that principle for which they labored are still a living force in our daily lives.

"THE HOLLINGSWORTHS

"Numerous legends and traditions have centered around the ancestry and early history of Valentine Hollingsworth, many of them contradictory. Early public and meeting house records prove some of them to be true; others are likely to remain forever in the realm of conjecture.

"Valentine Hollingsworth is said to have been born in Ireland, but it is claimed that his family was originally from the ancestral estate "Hollingsworth Manor" in Cheshire, England, and had removed to Ireland to escape persecution. This estate was held by an ancient Saxon family of the name as early as the year 1022. Red berried trees abound on the estate. The name comes from two words, "holly" and "worth", a farm. The old manor hall and church still stand. (See Editor's note following this article.) Both are emblazoned with the family coat of arms. It consists of three holly leaves. The crest is a stag & the Latin motto means "Learn to suffer what must be borne." The fact that many descendants of Valentine in America use the Hollingsworth arms add color to the belief that the two families were originally the same.

"Valentine Hollingsworth was not the first of his name to come to America

"As has often been stated, Hollingsworths are known to have been in New England, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia at much earlier dates. (Archives of Maryland, 1636-1677.) No evidence has been found as to their relationship to Valentine, or that they in any way influenced his coming."

NOTE: The above is part of an address given May 23, 1936, at the unveiling of the Hollingsworth Memorial at Newark Burial Ground, Brandywine Hundred, Delaware. Published in the Daughters of the American Revolution Magazine, Sept., and entitled VALENTINE HOLLINGSWORTH & NEWARK MONTHLY MEETING, and is being reproduced here with full permission of the copyright owner, Mr. Edward W. Cooch, Jr., Newark, Delaware.

As the above sketch shows, not too much is known of the ancestry of Valentine Hollingsworth. The earliest information that the writer has was given him by Mr. Henry Hollingsworth of Inglewood, California, in which he found that Valentine was assessed a Hearth tax in Seagoe Parish, County Armagh, Ireland, in 1664. There is no doubt that Valentine was an Irish Quaker, a weighty & prominent member of Lurgan Monthly Meeting. The minutes of that meeting begin about 1670, and Valentine's name is frequently mentioned. He served on committees, was a delegate to the Yearly Meeting held in Belfast, and was a witness to many marriages.

But you should know something of the Quakers, as many of the first families of the Hollingsworths were of that conviction, and some remain of that belief. As you know, the Quakers were one of several distant groups, who believed the Church of England had become corrupt and was a puppet to the Crown. It was about time a change should be made. The Friends believed that religion, and the worship of God, was a personal contract between themselves and His, and that there was no need for a middle man, or a church hierarchy. They thought that the state was using the church for political purposes and had become corrupt. The Friends were not the first of this belief; the times had brought on a religious reformation. Many of the other similar groups later joined with the Quakers.

The Quaker belief was simple. They believed there was a little of God in every man, and that the ability of God to reveal His will to his people was not diminished by the final draught of the Scriptures. So they set up certain standards of religious conduct, which they called a "Discipline." Not having paid pastors, Quakerism became a religion by committee, thus giving birth to those wonderful Quaker records that bring us, again and again, intimately into the past.

Valentine served on many of these committees, while in Ireland, and, after coming to America, was the leader of those early Quaker migrants. (If this REGISTER continues, the writer will present many extracts from the records.)

Quaker marriage records are unique. Inasmuch as the Friends had no paid pastors (some now do), after proper permission of the meeting, the couple marry themselves by appearing in a meeting for worship, and publicly make their vows before the congregation, for which a marriage certificate is made and signed by all who witness the ceremony. A revealing feature of these certificates is the fact that the signatures in the right-hand column, just under the signatures of the principles is reserved for their relatives - a valuable feature for family historians. (Later in this series, many early certificates will be published.)

In passing, for genealogical record, I list the marriages that our ancestors witnessed, taken from Lurgan Monthly Meeting (Ulster, Ireland) Marriage Book:

- worth, oldest son of Valentine.
- 5.9.1673 Robert Chambers and Jain Wright, signed by Valentine. The Wright family were probably the most important in Lurgan Meeting. Many of the meetings were held in the home of Jain's father, Mark Wright.
- 4.10.1674 William Mathews & Margery Harding, wit. Valentine Hollingsworth.
- 1.12.1675 James Greer & Eleanor Rea, wit. Ann Hollingsworth & Mary Rea. Mary Rea was the sister of Valentine's first wife, Ann Rea. Ann Calvert was the 2d wife of Valentine (who did not sign). This shows a friendship between the two families.
- 7.5.1676 Minion Slapson & Margaret Noble, wit. Valentine Hollingsworth.
- 3.7.1676 William Crooke & Mable Mason, wit. Ann & Valentine Hollingsworth.
- 3.17.1676 Timothy Kirke & Katherine Robinson, wit. Ann & Valentine Hollingsworth. (NOTE: This family later migrated to Delaware and became members of Newark Monthly Meeting.)
- 1.29.1676 John Robson & Sarah Atkinson. Sarah was a sister to Henry Hollingsworth's wife. Later, a fuller account will be given of Henry, oldest son of Valentine.
- 9.17.1678 George Harland & Elizabeth Duck, wit. Henry Hollingsworth. This couple came to America at the same time with Valentine. George's brother Michael Harland also came with Valentine. The Hollingsworths & Harlands intermarried many times.
- 4.28.1682 Thomas Comaway & Mary Hollingsworth, wit. Ann, Katherine, Valentine, Henry & Thomas Hollingsworth, also Elizabeth & Margaret Calvert. This was a family affair. Ann, the mother; Katherine, the sister; Valentine, the father; Henry & Thomas, brothers to the bride. There is an interesting historical story in the minutes of Newark Meeting that will later be told.
- 5.19.1682 John Fawcett & Judith Thwayts, wit., Valentine, Henry & Ann Hollingsworth. This later marriage happened about the time that Valentine and his family, except Henry, sailed for Penna.

Valentine, being a devout & conscientious Quaker, is shown by a book written by William Stockdale, A GREAT CRY OF OPPRESSION, (a very rare book, only two copies known to exist.) Stockdale, a Scottish Quaker who migrated to Ireland, wrote of the sufferings of the Irish Quakers, caused by their testimony against tithing. I quote all the entries for historical records:

"1672 County Ardmagh. Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe, by Edmund O'Maghan, for the use of the aforesaid, twenty-six stocks of Wheat, three car-loads of Hay, twenty-six stocks of Oats, and twenty-six stocks of Barley, all worth two pounds, eighteen shillings.

"1673 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe by Edmund Maghan & Thomas Proctor, Corn & Hay worth two pounds. (Here, I insert another entry that does not apply to Valentine, but it does show more of the suffering the Quakers had to bear for their convictions.) Francis Hobson had taken from him for tithe, by the said persons, twenty-six stocks of Wheat, fifteen stocks of Barley & thirteen stocks of Oats, all worth four pounds. (And if this was not enough - The writer's per.) Being also sued in the Bishop's Court at Ardmagh for two pounds tithe of Milnes by the aforesaid George Walker, and by a warrant from two Justices of the Peace, upon a definitive senten-

- ce was taken by David Mulligan, Constable, the second day of the sixth month, and committed to the Gaol of Ardmagh, and was prisoner two years and four months, and about the thirtieth of the tenth month, 1675, died in said Gaol.
- "1674 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe for the use of the said Thomas Smith, seven loads of Hey, eleven stooks of Wheat, nine Stooks of Oats, eleven stooks and a half of Barley, all worth three pounds, four shillings.
- "1675 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe, by the said Daniel, for the said Thomas Smith, twenty stooks of Wheat & Rye, twenty-two stooks of Oats, eight stooks and a half of Barley, and seven car-loads of Hey, all worth four pounds, fourteen shillings.
- "1676 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe, by the said Cantelan, thirty-seven stooks of Wheat & Rye, forty stooks of Oats, eighteen stooks of Barley & nine loads of Hey, all worth two pounds, five shillings, eight pence.
(Valentine Hollingsworth had nothing taken in 1677 or 1678, although the list of those who had property taken was much larger than in previous years.)
- "1679 Valentine Hollingsworth, of the said Parish (Segoe) had taken from him for tithe, by William Gibson, five stooks of Barley, three stooks of Oats, and three loads of Hey, all worth six shillings, ten pence.
- "1680 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe, by Rory O'Danell & Arer O'Hell, for the use of the said Thomas Smith, thirty-three stooks of Wheat & Rye, fourteen stooks of Barley, thirty-three stooks of Oats, and some Hey, all worth two pounds, seven shillings, sixpence.
- "1681 Valentine Hollingsworth had taken from him for tithe, by Ever O'Hell & Rory O'Danell, for the said use, ten loads of Hey, thirty stooks of hard corn, twenty stooks of Oats, & twelve stooks of Barley, and by the said Ever & others, Apples worth one shilling; and by Elizabeth Fow, seven stooks and a half of Barley, one stook and a half of Oats, and two car-loads of Hey, all worth four pounds, five shillings."

Valentine now had enough. If a woman could start and seize his goods, what would happen next year? Anyway, William Penn had been in his area and had promised religious freedom to him and his in Pennsylvania. So, on the 25th day of the 5th month, 1682, Valentine Hollingsworth asked Lurgan Monthly Meeting, Ireland, for a certificate of removal for himself ' & also for y^e rest y^t go with him.' He probably sailed within a month. His son, Samuel Hollingsworth, in making a deposition before the Mayor of Philadelphia, said: "they came into Pennsylvania in the latter part of 1682, and were at Chester, Pennsylvania, the day that William Penn arrived." From this it appears that Valentine and all his family except Henry, probably arrived a month before the arrival of Penn.

The lineage of the writer: Valentine¹ Hollingsworth & Ann Calvert; their son, Valentine² Hollingsworth married Elizabeth Heald; their son James³ Hollingsworth married Mary Harvey; their son Abner⁴ Hollingsworth married Phoebe Hall; their son James⁵ Hollingsworth married Ann Hoopes; their son John⁶ Hollingsworth married Hannah Miller Pyle, and their son Ralph⁷ Hollingsworth married Lydia Hysore, parents of the writer, John Valentine⁸ Hollingsworth, who married Ruth Cox, Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The above quote from D.A.R. Magazine, dated 1936, does not bring us up to date. A communication from Mr. Robert W. Shinabarger, of Connecticut, descendant of Valentine¹ Hollingsworth through his son Thomas², advises he visited Mottram last summer, and "Unfortunately the Manchester Corp.

As an appendix to Mr. John V. Hollingsworth's excellent account, and, we believe, with his approval, we are reproducing here a copy of one of the pages of Lurgan Quaker Meeting, Co. Armagh, Ireland, Book of births & deaths, which is the clerk's account of the family record of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr.

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Vallantine Hollingsworth son of Henry Hollingsworth of Bellenickcranell, in the parish of Segoe and County of Armagh and of Katheran his wife, was borne at Bellenickcranell, aforesaid, about the sixth month in the yeare 1632, and upon the seaventh day of the fowerth month - Anno Domini, 1655, he tooke to wife Ann the daughter of Nicolass Rees of Tanragee in the County of Armagh aforesd. and of Ann his wife who was borne in Tanragee aforesaid about the yeare, 1628, and had by her children borne as followeth. - - - - -

Mary Hollingsworth first daughter of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell in the parish of Segoe and County of Armagh, the five and twentyeth Day of y^e first month Anno Domini, 1656 - - -

Henry Hollingsworth first son of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was born at Bellenickcranell aforesd y^e seaventh day of y^e 2/mth 1658 - - -

Thomas Hollingsworth second son of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell, aforesaid the beginning of the third month Anno Domini, 1661. - - - - -

Katheran Hollingsworth second daughter of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife, was borne at Bellenickcranell, aforesaid, in the fifth month, Anno Domini, 1663, - - - - - (Above all written in one hand.)

And it came to pass that on the first Day of the second month Anno Domi. 1671, the aforesaid Ann (Wife to y^e said Vallantine Hollingsworth) Died, and upon the twelue day of the fowerth month, Anno Domi. 1672, he againe tooke to Wife Ann the Daughter of Thomas Calluart of Dromgorr in the parish of Segoe and County of Armagh aforesd. and of Jane his wife) Who was borne in Killuarling in y^e County of Down, about y^e ninth month Anno Domi. 1650 and had by her children borne as followeth - - - - -

Samuell Hollingsworth first sonn of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell, aforesd, the twenty seauenth Day of the first month Anno Domi. 1673 - - - - -

Enoch Hollingsworth second son of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell aforesd the seauenth Day of the sixth month Anno Dom. 1675 - - - - -

Vallantine Hollingsworth third son of Vallantine Hollingsworth, and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell aforesaid the twelue day of the eleuenth month Anno Dom. 1677 - - - - - (Above in one hand apparently at a single sitting, by same clerk, but at a later time than the section closing with "fifth month, Anno Domini, 1663," - - - - -)

Ann Hollingsworth first daughter of Vallantine Hollingsworth and of Ann his wife was borne at Bellenickcranell, aforesd y^e twentyeight Day of y^e tenth month, Anno Dom. 1680. - - - - - (This final entry appears possibly to have been written by a different clerk, although many similarities appear in the entries. This accounts for the eight children born in Ireland, four to the first, and four to the second wife. In America, yet three more children were born to Ann (Calvert) Hollingsworth by Vallentine, her husband. These were named John, Joseph & Enoch (2), who was born after the death of the first Enoch, above.) (a)

John V. Hollingsworth, Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, has been interested in Quaker research for a number of years. He also maintains that faith in his own life, perpetuating the belief of the founder of his line. Consequently, he has become familiar with the Quaker Meeting records. Your editor received a letter of recent date, from Mr. Hollingsworth, in which, we think, hitherto unexploited information has been brought to light. In a discussion about the Quaker records, he relates that, on page 200, of the same record book, the following appears: (We quote only in brief.)

Thomas Calvert, son of John Calvert, of Moresome, neere Gisbrough in Yorkshire, in England, and of Gwale his wife, was borne at Lygakow (now Lurgan) in the County of Ardmagh, in Ireland, in the year 1617 and about the 11th of y^e 2nd month, 1647 he took to wife Jane, daughter of Hugh Glassond and of Margaret his wife, of Stramallis (now Belfast) in the County of Antria, and had by her children borne as followeth, - - - - -

Ann Calvert first daughter of Thomas Calvert and Jane his wife was borne in Killwarlin (now Hillsborough) in the County of Down about the ninth month, Anno Domini, 1650. - - - - -

Four children are noted, Ann being second. Hillsborough is a town a few miles east of Lurgan, over the line in County Down. This Calvert family came first into Lurgan, and then moved to what is now Hillsborough, and then back to Lurgan. But the invaluable information is their original English Parish home. We know that all descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth will be pleased to take the ancestry back farther, even if it be on the "distaff" side!

"Moresome" neer Gisbrough is correctly called "Great Moresome," now often written "Great Moorholm." It lies within the Parish of Skelton-in-Cleveland, and is a township thereof, being six miles east by south, of the town of Guisborough, in North Riding of the County of York, England. (See: Samuel Lewis: Topographical Dictionary of England.)

From an examination of the records of Yorkshire Parish Register Society, there is little doubt that the Calverts did indeed, originate in Moorholm. Volume XIX., p. 28, of "Wills in the York Registry Office," covering years from the 1400's until the late 1600's, shows:

As far as we know, anyone may apply to York registry Office, York, England, and obtain photocopies. The numbers given to the right of the dates in the wills above, refer to Volume and page of original registry. No doubt one or more of the above persons are directly in the ancestry of Ann Calvert Hollingsworth. Good luck to you, trying to read 16th century English!

NOTE: The name of the townland where Valentine Hollingsworth resided is correctly spelt BallyMacRandall, but formerly (in his days) "BallemcCrannell." It is difficult to decipher in old writing. Thomas Calvert (Calluart) resided in a nearby townland now and then called "Drungor," called here "Drongorr."

HOLLINGSWORTHS IN RECORDS OF COUNTY WICKLOW, IRELAND

Most of the records presented here were copied by Mr. Robert Hollingsworth, Dublin, Ireland, at the Rathdrum Registry Office, County Wicklow, Ireland. The work was done in the last few weeks of the year 1964. We present the entire series here - Births, Deaths & Roman Catholic Marriages, 1864-1965. We supplement this with a partially complete list of the Protestant marriages which are in another department. These also were partly collected by Mr. Robert Hollingsworth. The rest were obtained in full certificates from the Custom House (Cifig an Ard Chlaraitheora), Dublin, where all of these records are also on file, and for all of Ireland. The Protestant Marriages begin in 1845. Since they require the name of the father of the bride, and of the groom, early records take us back into the first years of the 19th century. We supplement this Civil list by adding to it a few Church records, both Protestant and Catholic, which also pertain exclusively to County Wicklow HOLLINGSWORTH families.

The entire County Wicklow Hollingsworth family are probably descended from a single ancestor, who came into the area in the early part of the 18th century. Hence, these records detail for us much information about his descendants. This family is that of the editor of the REGISTER.

HOLLINGSWORTHS IN THE UNITED STATES AT THE FIRST CENSUS - 1790

The first United States Census of the entire country was taken in 1790. Many homelinks felt that it was a plot to aid in taxation schemes, and so the Marshals (Enumerators) had a difficult time obtaining the needed statistics! Of the sixteen (16) states then enumerated, we unfortunately lack the records for six. The schedules for Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, New Jersey, Tennessee & Virginia were either destroyed by the British when they burned the Capitol in 1812, or were lost in some other unknown way. A large collection of Tax Lists for the same period have been compiled in an attempt to replace these schedules. We have availed ourselves of them. We can, therefore, give a list of HOLLINGSWORTHS in Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, Tennessee & Virginia, who were, at least, taxpayers. The "Titheables," or "Rateables," of New Jersey are extant for most of that state in the period, but have not been published. There are partially published lists in the Genealogical Magazine of New Jersey now in continuous presentation. Your editor has examined those which are now available, being only those for the early years 1773-1774. No form of the name has been discovered there. These include Gloucester, Cape May, Hunterdon, and a few other counties.

Below, we present the total list of HOLLINGSWORTH (HOLLISWORTH) heads of families in the U.S. Census of 1790 for the 10 states which have complete schedules. These are now available in most large libraries, published and fully indexed by the U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1907, 1908. There then follows a list of the HOLLINGSWORTHS found in the secondary lists of Taxables for the five states whose 1790 Census Schedules are lost, omitting New Jersey, which is too obscure to be of value.

Before continuing, it is interesting to note that the U.S. Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C., in conjunction with its publication of the extant Census Schedules of 1790, published a Digest of the Statistics shown in the Census. This is titled "U.S. Bureau of the Census - A Century of Population Growth, 1790 - 1900." (Washington, U.S. Government Printing Office, 1909.) On page 246, under the heading "Nomenclature, Dealing with names represented by at least 100 white persons by States and Territories at the First Census, 1790 . . .," we find the following statistical information on our family:

After the names of Heads of Families there appear the statistics relating to the number of persons in the household. We reproduce them in full. Here is an explanation of them:

(Example: "VALENTINE HOLLINGSWORTH - 1 - 2 - 3 - 0 - 0")

The first figure represents "Free White Males of 16 years and upwards, including heads of families." The second figure represents "Free White Males under 16 years;" The third figure: "Free White Females (all ages) including Heads of Families;" The fourth column represents "all other Free Persons, except Indians, not taxed;" and the last figure (in this case a Zero) represents "Slaves."

HOLLINGSWORTH & HOLLINGWORTH ARRIVALS, PORT OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA

We are indebted to Miss Lillie A. Ward, Starkville, Mississippi, who kindly transcribed the Index to the Philadelphia Passenger Lists, 1806 - 1906, abstracting the entries under "Hollingsworth" and "Hollingworth."

It must be remembered that this is an index. Not all the information from the original ship passenger lists is reproduced here. The original lists usually show the country of nativity of each passenger, the name, tonnage, master, and port of embarkation, besides the information given below. Although the index was originally in alphabetical order by first letter of Christian name, the editor has taken the liberty of re-arranging them into the original ship or family groups. As far as is known, these are all of the Hollingsworths and Hollingworths who entered Philadelphia port in the century between 1806 and 1906.

Our Kin in South Carolina

(Bush River Monthly Meeting of Friends, Newberry County)

The late William Wade Hinshaw left behind a living legacy of American Quaker information when he began the series "Encyclopedia of American Quaker Genealogy." The publication continues, and the collection now includes seven volumes, encompassing Monthly and Yearly Quaker Meetings from Pennsylvania, South and North Carolina, Virginia, Ohio and Indiana. Many of these old Meeting record books are now on microfilm, or in other forms available for search at Swarthmore College, Swarthmore, Pennsylvania. The "Encyclopedia" undertakes to arrange the entries under the surnames of the various families, and thence by chronology, from the earliest date of entry under the given surname to the last.

As most of us know, Valentine Hollingsworth espoused the teachings of George Fox, while still a young man, living at Ballynacrandall, Parish of Seagoe, in County Armaagh, Ireland. This conversion took place about the latter part of the 1650's or early in the 1660's. The Quakers kept excellent records. Even when they can be obviously called "incomplete," due to negligence of one of the clerks, they are far more complete than other records in the same class.

The Hollingsworths from Valentine went into North and South Carolina early in the 18th Century. There is evidence that some of them left the Quakers to join other religious bodies. Below, you will see evidence that some of them were within this Meeting's jurisdiction. A number of the entries in the Minute Books show members of the Hollingsworths who were disowned (excommunicated or disfellowshipped) by Friends for various offences. Although some were reinstated, perhaps others joined other churches. Maybe you will find in these records, your lost ancestor!

THE HOOSIER HOLLINGSWORTHS
(At the 1850 U. S. Census)

Now that we have treated the Quaker Hollingsworth families in the Newberry County, South Carolina, area, and also sketched for you the life of Valentine Hollingsworth, the founder of this line, in Ireland, we feel that we can place before you all the Hollingsworth families in the State of Indiana as of the Census enumeration year 1850. This valuable information comes to us through the cooperation of the Genealogy Dept., State Library, Indianapolis, Indiana, where a complete index to the 1820, 1830 and 1850 enumerations is on file. After receiving a copy of the index covering our surname, the editor has consulted the microfilm copies of the original census schedules in the reading room of the Rufus B. VonKlinesmidt Central Library, Fifth & Flower Streets, Los Angeles, California, U.S.A.

Many of these "Hoosier" Hollingsworths were born in South Carolina, as the schedules show. Some even came direct from the area covered by the Bush River Quaker Monthly Meeting just considered on previous pages. Others sojourned a while in the State of Ohio before pushing on to Indiana.

We will provide a full tabulation of all other statistics at the end of this article. But we must note one, in particular, here. Out of all the families, only one of the Hollingsworths was born outside of the United States! This was the Joseph Hollingsworth, age 28, Engineer, born in England, who is listed on page 24. The editor tried to find him again in the later census for Aurora, Indiana, but he was not found.

F R E D E R I C K H O L L I N G S W O R T H

(This man is the "Immigrant Ancestor" of the Editor. If any reader thinks he or she can shed more light upon this man or his immediate family in Ireland or America, a "Letter to the Editor" would be much appreciated!)

Frederick Hollingsworth was born at a tiny townland called Ballinakill, which contained about 96 acres according to the Townland Survey, a part of the Ordnance Survey of 1841 for Ireland. Nearly all of the property was under lease to the Hollingsworths. This townland is in the Protestant (Episcopal) Parish of Ballycaneu, in the Barony of Gorey, in north County Wexford, Ireland. The year of his birth was about 1802 or 1803, according to his age given in the U.S. Census enumerations of 1850 and 1860. The names of his parents are not presently known. (The Editor has been trying to get this information for over five years!) He died on Feb. 2, 1869, in Jasper County, Iowa. The location of his burial is not known. (The five year search also has included all Jasper County and surrounding county cemeteries, with no result.) He may be buried in the "Our Silent City" outside of Kellogg, in Jasper County, where his wife and one son and one grandchild are buried. But if he is laid to rest there, there are no markers or cemetery records to prove or disprove it.

He married, on April 17, 1836, in LaForte County, Indiana, Elizabeth Brown, the oldest child of Jacob Brown. She was born June 20, 1820, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and died Oct. 15, 1892, at Kellogg, Jasper County, Iowa, at the age of 72 years. She is buried in "Our Silent City," and has a headstone marked "Mother" (with the dates above) and there is a large Monument with the surname "HOLLINGSWORTH" upon it, and the emblem of the Order of Woodmen of the World. (This was erected after the death of her son Wallace in 1912, as a payment burial benefit of his membership in that Society.)

There were five sons born to this couple. (See below.)

The only clue to the residence of Frederick Hollingsworth before his arrival in U.S.A. was to be found in an old Dictionary. This was his own property, and it still is in the possession of a granddaughter. The Dictionary was published in New York in 1828. The fly-leaves in the front and back are inscribed with the "Hollingsworth Family Record" in lieu of a Family Bible. The aging leaves are stained heavily with the yellow and the dampness of time. The first owner wrote in a rich brown ink: "Hubbard C. Stearns's Book..." Who was this man? Frederick then signed next below as second owner: "Fred^k Hollingsworth's Book, F. 8th, 1835." This was in a weaker, grey-toned ink, but still quite legible. On the next fly-leaf his wife, Elizabeth, wrote in pencil many years later: "F. Hollingsworth." Below this, another has inscribed: "Wexford, Ireland." Thank God for that clue! Without it, the tracking of this man would have been hopeless! In the back of the book are carefully written the names and dates of birth of four of the five sons, Edward, Jacob, Samuel & John Hollingsworth, written in steadily improving handwriting, by Frederick himself. The inks differ sufficiently to prove that the entries were made about the time of each birth. This, incidentally, is the most reliable kind of family record, especially since the publication date and the date of acquisition of the volume antedate the first birth entry by a number of years. Why Frederick abandoned the use of the book to record the family events sometime between 1850 and 1858, is not known.

Another even more puzzling and heart-breaking enigma is: Why didn't Frederick enter his own date of birth and date of marriage to Elizabeth Brown? The answer to that may never be known. But his omission of this necessary information is the cause of the printing of this REGISTER. I explain that by saying that, had I had an easy path open to me, I never would have picked up the information on the other Hollingsworth families which makes this publication possible.

How many brothers or sisters - if any - did Frederick have? We don't know. If any - where did they live out their lives? We don't know that, either! The old-timers were all gone before the Editor started getting this family record together. One of the last, with whom the Editor had the pleasure of correspondence (who lived to be ninety-four), answered our enigma in part, perhaps, by stating that "the old folks didn't take much interest in the family, and didn't talk about it very much." The old folks he spoke of included Elizabeth Brown Hollingsworth herself. So - the information couldn't be gotten, even in 1885 - not even from the "horse's mouth!" So you will appreciate the trouble we went to to get what we have, at great expense and time - but most especially with great determination.

There is no record available from any Port of Entry into the United States, which contains Frederick Hollingsworth's name upon it. Hence we are led to believe that he entered America through a Canadian port, and, at a later date, crossed the border into the United States. In those "prairie days," no records of border-crossings were kept, nor were records of ship passenger lists for Canadian ports ever retained in any archival collections. To add to this distressing fact, the British shipping lists, which undoubtedly contained his name (and the names of thousands and thousands of English, Scottish and Irish Emigrants who left Belfast, Liverpool or other ports) prior to about 1895, were all deliberately put to the flames by a matter of necessity. If any survive, they are in the hands of the surviving shipping companies, and we don't know where they would be, if accessible at all.

After a search of the records in Ireland was carried out, one record became as priceless as the above Family Dictionary Record. This was a Marriage Settlement, bearing the date of June 4, 1823, and registered at Gorey, in County Wexford, Ireland. (Gorey is a small town about 4 miles north of Bollinckill, Frederick Hollingsworth's residence as of that date.) The name of the Commissioner who supervised the legal completion of the transaction was Richard Brownrigg, Esq., of Moneylawn, in the Parish of Leskinferre, Co. Wexford, which Parish adjoins Ballycanew to the west. In his own certification, Brownrigg says "... and I know the Deponent." (Frederick Hollingsworth.) Frederick was called upon to sign the document twice. Fortunately for us, his descendants, in Ireland, the original memorials of deeds, etc., are placed on file in the Registry of Deeds, Henrietta Street, Dublin. These were first so registered and filed in 1708, and are in lead-lined storage boxes in the basement vaults. Since a fire in the year 1922 during the Irish Civil War destroyed a great amount of records at the Four Courts Buildings, the Deeds now constitute a very valuable substitute depository of genealogical information, untouched or harmed by any such disaster. An index to these documents is now available to searchers, here in the United States, thanks to the thoughtfulness of the Genealogical Society of Salt Lake City, Utah, U.S.A., who have microfilmed the indexes of all Ireland, Lands and Names, from 1708 to 1904, inclusive.

Needless to say, the original signatures of "Fred^k Hollingsworth" made at Gorey in 1823 match those in his family record. This kind of work might

be considered more in the realm of the Scotland Yard sleuth, than in that of a genealogist. But it is, after all, the strongest legal proof available. It is, indeed, very seldom that a set of matching signatures can be obtained for this kind of proof. The two signatures made in 1823 are strikingly similar to the handwriting of Frederick in the last entry of his family record, made over a quarter of a century later, Sept. 28, 1850. (See Figures 1 - 3.)




Fig. 2. (Ditto - 1823.)





UNITED STATES

The document made in Ireland was a Marriage Settlement between two men named Hollingsworth. It is recorded at Volume 782 of Deeds, page 33, and bears the Registration Number 529168. The main parties (who unfortunately are not identified as to their relationship to the Principal Witness, Fredk. Hollingsworth) were "William Hollingsworth of Bracanna... & John Hollingsworth the Elder of Cranacrower... in the County of Wexford." Both these places are Townlands in the aforesaid Parish of Ballycanew. These men were completing marriage articles involving the settlement of "the lands of Clonard, in County Dublin," by William Hollingsworth the owner of the said lands, upon his new son-in-law, "John Hollingsworth the Younger, of Ballinakill..." John Hollingsworth had married William's daughter, Susannah Hollingsworth, undoubtedly a 1st or 2nd cousin, at Ballycanew Protestant Church in 1819. In the same year, William's son Joan had married John's daughter Esther, in the same church. But we found no marriage settlement in this case, John the Elder not having been blessed with the possession of fruitful lands. William Hollingsworth of Bracanna settled part of these same lands upon the families of two of his other daughters - Martha, who married George Kidd, and Jane, who married Richard Gainfort. (Incidentally, the Kidds subsequently emigrated to Cincinnati, Ohio, along with Susannah's son Edward Thomas Hollingsworth, who worked in the Pay Office of the "Enquirer" for fifty years!) While it is assured that our Frederick Hollingsworth was some relation to all of these people, the deed doesn't show it.

Frederick turned up in LaPorte County, Indiana, in early 1836, at the latest. (As you can see - it is possible that he emigrated any time between 1823 and 1835.) Jacob Brown, who had two marriages, was on his way West from Morgan County, Ohio. Elizabeth was his only child by his unknown first wife. He subsequently married Mary Ann Keith and was at that time the father of four sons. Eventually, he became father to eleven sons and three more daughters. Frederick Hollingsworth was at that time 34, and his bride was a "teenager" of fifteen! They took out their license at LaPorte Circuit Court on April 14th, but it was never returned by the Minister or Justice of the Peace who married them three days later.

Jacob Brown removed from LaPorte County, Indiana, and settled in Cherry Valley Township, Winnebago County (just outside of Rockford), Illinois, in August, 1836. Frederick and bride followed suit early in the next year.

They settled on Section 10, Township 43 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian, (now Cherry Valley, Illinois) of the U.S. Congressional Public Lands Division of Illinois, on May 28, 1837. This date is given in Frederick's application for legal rights to the land by the Pre-emption Act of 1838. He paid the minimum price of \$1.25 per acre, obtaining the whole 160 acre Quarter Section (South East Quarter of Section 10) for \$200.00. This he sold, in 1856, along with another small piece of adjoining property, for Four Thousand Dollars. In the meantime, he became father to the four sons whose birthdates are entered in the dictionary: Edward Earl, born June 26, 1838; Jacob, born June 5, 1842; Samuel, born October 12, 1845, and John, born Sept. 28, 1850.

Using the ready cash, Frederick then bought himself a farm of about 200 acres in New Milford township, Winnebago county, Illinois. This land lay on both sides of the little Kiskaukee River which is a tributary to the Rock River, after which the name "Rockford" is coined. This township designation has ceased. The city of Rockford limits are now far within the boundaries of the old farm township of Frederick's day. His son John Hollingsworth is the only member of the family who remained in Illinois. The child is buried on a small and shady green knoll in New Milford Cemetery. His fine monument headstone still is quite legible: "JOHN, son of F. & E. HOLLINGSWORTH, Died August 28, 1856, aged 5 yrs., 11 mos." This tragic event took place only four months after the family had settled on their new farm.

Leaving his married son Edward Earl Hollingsworth and his new grandchildren behind, Frederick and his wife and sons Jacob, Samuel & William Wallace Hollingsworth (the latter who was born Feb. 19, 1858 at New Milford), pushed on, on Nov. 3, 1864, to Jasper County, Iowa. Elizabeth had a farm of 160 acres in her own name in Independence Township. It is presumed that Fredk. died on this farm. In 1866, Edward and Rachel (McFadden) Hollingsworth joined the rest in Iowa. Edward later ran a saloon and grocery store at Kellogg, which was at that time a thriving Railhead community with two or three newspapers, and a steadily increasing population. After Frederick's death, Elizabeth disposed of her land in parcels to her several sons, who, in turn, sold it immediately to one Sarah Mendenhall of Marshall County, Iowa. During that time also, Elizabeth was joined in Iowa by several of her half-brothers - Benjamin, Zachary and Adna Wesley Brown. Adna was the only one who made permanent settlement, however, becoming the proprietor of the "Kellogg House" hotel and livery, until his death in 1911.

Of the four surviving sons: Edward Earl Hollingsworth removed to Waseca, Minnesota, in 1877, and finally to Los Angeles, California, in 1887. He died here Apr. 6, 1902 at the age of 63 and is buried in Rosedale Cemetery near his wife and several children. He was the father of nine. His eldest son, John Benjamin "Jack" Hollingsworth (1861-1933) was the Editor's grandfather, a pioneer of Inglewood, California. Jacob Hollingsworth, Edward's brother, lived out his life in Jasper County, Iowa, and became father to six. Samuel took his dead brother's name and was known as "Dr. John Samuel" (or just Dr. J.S.) Hollingsworth, a very well-known Veterinary Surgeon of Green Bay, Wisconsin, from 1872 until death in 1917. (Jacob died the same year in Iowa.) Wallace, the youngest, died in San Diego, California, in 1912. He was a very accomplished musician, singer and also owned and operated his own music stores in Kellogg and Newton, Iowa. He was the leader of the first Brass Band of Kellogg, Iowa, in his 20th year! His only child, Mrs. Gladys Smith, followed in her father's musical footsteps, and was the assistant Recitalist at the famed Spreckels Organ in Balboa Park, San Diego for several seasons. She now resides in New Hampshire.

The Editor had the privilege of visiting the last surviving daughter of Edward E. Hollingsworth, in February, 1960, just a year before her passing. Mrs. Anna E. Belden was 86 at the time of her death, (March 19, 1961), having been born at Kellogg, Iowa, on June 18, 1875, just before the family went to Minnesota. Her remarkable memory helped the Editor complete many unsolved parts of the record. Mrs. Smith also loaned the old dictionary, and some letters written by Mrs. Anna Belden a number of years before.

A story related by the letters - far from being in the realm of proven fact - is worth telling: It seems, according to this story, that both Fredk. and his father were in the British Army during the "Irish Rebellion," and the father, a "mounted officer", was killed. After this, Frederick emigrated. The Editor has never found a shred of proof for this tale, and he has found some facts which tend to refute it. Another story relates that little John Hollingsworth, (the Editor's grandfather) the eldest of Frederick's grandchildren to carry on the prized Hollingsworth surname, was given the pleasure of seeing his grandfather don his old British Army Cavalry uniform - blue with a blue cloak lined in red - and mount his best farm horse, with a shining sword buckled on his side, and charge down the farm road! We cannot at this time confirm or deny this story. But the Inventory of Frederick's Estate in Jasper County, Iowa, Record Books, shows that he owned a Team of horses! And with a period of 12 years from 1823 until 1835, blank as to the history of Frederick's life during his twenties, it is perfectly possible he served the British Empire in the Militia or Cavalry. Records of men of the ranks in that day are very difficult to search. This is the only excuse for our not being able to provide factual evidence for or against this story. The cost would be "prohibitive."

Jack Hollingsworth said (to his sister Anna Belden) that his grandfather had a "Scottish Burr in his speech." This, no doubt, was the "English-Irish" accent which, to a child (John was only 9 when his grandfather died) sounded like the familiar Scot.

There is in the possession of a great-grandchild, another family record, of a far more significant and tender nature. It is a simple piece of stationery, of fine quality, although weathered by the years. Upon this paper are fixed braided loops of hair out of the heads of each of the five Hollingsworth boys' heads. The hair looks as if it were just clipped from the locks, but we know that little Johnny died in 1856! Edward was a child in the early Eighteen-forties! Underneath each braid of hair are the names of each boy, followed finally by the words: "The Hollingsworth Boys, Sons of F. E. Hollingsworth." We have never seen another record like it.

At a later time, we hope to produce a hard-back book of the history of this particular family of Hollingsworth. And at a later time also, it will be our pleasure to add a few more of the details of the life of our mysterious ancestor from south Ireland (but an ingrained Englishman to the end) Frederick Hollingsworth.

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Did you know that at least five descendants of Daniel & Anne (Byrne) Hollingsworth, (late) of Wicklow, Ireland, were actively engaged in the famed Normandy Invasion of June 6th, 1944? Send in some facts from your own HOLLINGSWORTH records. Perhaps we may find room for them in later editions of the HOLLINGSWORTH REGISTER.

They have been spending the summer at their home in Houlgate, Normandy, and Mrs. Hollingsworth and her daughters have been in the French Hospital attending the wounded. Mr. Hollingsworth is a New Yorker who has made his home in France for fourteen years. The family will return to France in two weeks..."

(The Index to the N.Y. "Times" begins in 1913, and is available in most of the larger libraries. Our surname appears in many entries throughout.)

6515 WILLIAM HOLLINGSWORTH OF BELOIT, WISCONSIN, STAGE-COACH DRIVER.

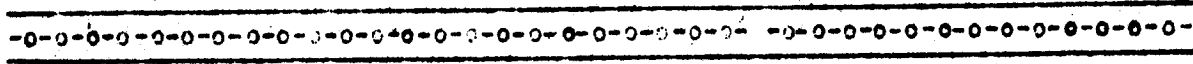

"THE SPOTTISWOODE FORTUNE"

Here is one for your "scrap-book!" We of the "Wexfords" have tossed this story around for well nigh a hundred years. So far, no solution to it has ever been found. This is a composite of two versions of the tale: It seems one JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, an adventurous lad (a mariner), when upon one of his travels, came eventually to Calcutta in India. (Another version has "America" in place of "India.") There, he came into the employ of a very, very wealthy Gentleman, Lord Spottiswoode. John became acquainted, and soon fell deeply in love with the old Gent's only child - Lady Ellenor Spottiswoode, and they decided to marry. But John was a commoner, and Lady Ellenor was of Gentler birth, and the old man forbade the union. But the Hollingsworths being what they are ... Johnny swept his love into the nearest boat and fled away and married the lass anyway! (This all happened over two hundred years ago.) So Lord Spottiswoode, not to be outwitted, cut his child out of his Legacy - his vast riches. He clausd his Will so that only the "seventh generation" after him could collect that pile of gold. So Johnny Hollingsworth settled down near Arklow, County Wicklow, in the south of Ireland, with his bride. They had two children - (guess what they named them!) - John Jr. and Ellenor Jr. Ellenor married a Mr. Prestage; and John Junior became father of 10 children - 9 of them boys. John Jr. is supposed to be the John who died in 1864 at Big Rock, Arklow, listed in the deaths on page 12 of this Issue, No. 2. If it were legally possible to prove this story, the Wicklow family would become rich overnight! The "seventh generation" is said to have come due for the legacy many years past, and solicitors' and all kinds of legal investigations in England and Ireland were made - all to no avail! The fire in Dublin and other destructions of records are said to be the fault. So the money still is waiting.
