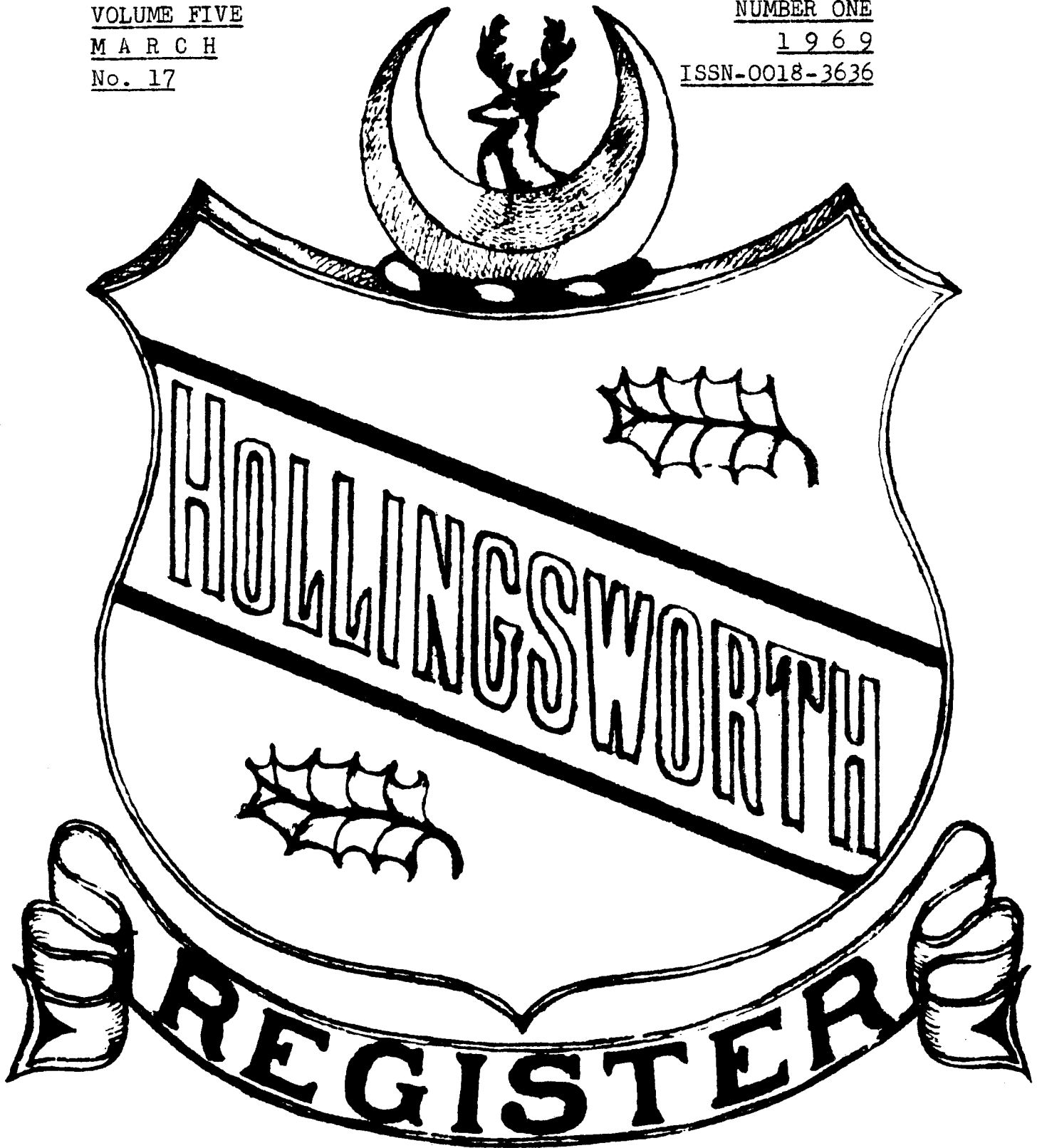


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HOLLINGSWORTH REGISTER
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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holecn (or Holyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London, and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

LURGAN RECORD BOOK AND HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH

Your editor sometimes has to "press the battle to the gate" in this war called genealogical research. Although the late Albert C. Myers, in his most excellent "Immigration of the Irish Quakers Into Pennsylvania" (1901), published much of Lurgan Quaker Record Book of County Armagh, Ireland, we felt that if the original could be examined, more might be forthcoming. Hiring a researcher at Belfast, where the books are located at the Public Record Office, May Street, to examine them, would be less than useful, but very costly. The phrase "a labour of love" fits a situation of this kind: It is just nigh impossible to expect a stranger to see in records what you are trained to look for only by the most intimate and lengthy research of your own. Therefore, over a year ago, we sought permission of the Ulster Meeting of the Friends, to allow a microfilm to be made in our behalf by the Deputy Keeper of the Record Office. Permission was granted, and the film delivered early in 1969.

Of course, we had already obtained photostats of Valentine Hollingsworth's own family record, which was published in HR Volume One, Number One. We will not repeat it here. The home in England of Valentine's father and mother, Henry and Katheran, is not indicated in the family record, nor, we are disappointed to say, in any of the other parts of the book. But some kind of vague clue might be given in the fact that so many of the families came from parts of Yorkshire in England, including the Calverts, Wrights, Robsons, Kirks, Moores, Chambers and Porters.

We take here, a number of these examples before moving on to the main point of our lead article.

On page 191 of Lurgan Friends Record Book, is the family record of Robert Hoope, "son of John Hoope of Moorsom (near Gisbrough) in Yorkshire in England, and of Isabell his wife, (who) was borne in Moorsom aforesaid the eighteenth day of the Eighth month (October-Ed.) Anno Dom: 1639. he came to Ireland Anno Dom: 1660..." (Etc.)

Page 193: "Roger Kirk and Elizabeth his wife dwelt in Neshag in v^e parish of Skelton and in v^e County of Yorke Came to ireland with his Wife and five Children in v^e veare 1658 (being a Couper by traide) since w^{ch} time he hath dwelt at Tollvgally nere Lurgan in v^e County of Ardmagh - "

Page 195: "ffrancis Robson son of John Robson of Facebee in Yorkeshire in England, and of Elizabeth his wife was borne in facebee aforesaid, about in v^e veare 1607 (was brought into Ireland being but young)"

Page 199: "Robart Chambers, son of Thomas Chambers, of mooresome nere wisbrough in Yorkeshire in England, and of Jane his wife, was borne in mooresome, afores^d, in y^e ninth month Anno Domini 1646, -- he Came to ireland Anno Domini 1661..."

Page 200: "Thomas Calvart, son of John Calvart of Mooresome neere Gisbrough in Yorkshire in England, and of Grace, his wife, was borne at Lvgakory nere Lurgan in the County of Ardmagh in Ireland -- "

You of course recognize the name of Thomas Calvart, the father of Ann Calvart, who married Valentine Hollingsworth as his second wife. For the full record see H.R. Volume 1, page 9, noting spelling corrections as above.

Page 202: "Marke Wright, son of Rowland Wright of Sheep paster nere Gisbrough in Yorkeshire in England, and of Aylce (sic) his wife, was borne at Sheep paster, aforesaid about the Twenty fifth day of the second month (April - Ed.) Anno Domini 1619, and about the veare 1647, he tooke to wife Ann y^e daughter of Thomas Carlyle, and of (-- a blank left here --) his wife, of newton (nere Whittby) in England and Came into Ireland in the sixth month Anno Domini, 1654..."

Page 210: "William Porter sonn of William Porter of Topcliffe, in vorkshire in England and of Ann his wife, was borne in Topcliffe aforesaid about the two-and twentieth day of the fifth month (July - Ed.) Anno Dom. - 1641. Came into ireland y^e beginning of the third month Anno Dom. 1659, where he learned y^e traid of weaveing - "

There are some fabulous clues here! Not until every page has been thoroughly read over and indexed can the full value be realised. But we don't have space to cite all the examples here.

By some awkward and unpardonable circumstance, few of the parish registers of the neighbourhood of Cleveland, in North Riding, Yorkshire, date back near the time of birth of any of these people. (We must also say that, the record does not say if these now Quakers had been formerly of the Established Church, since they might have been of a Separatist group whose records would not appear in the registers. The Presbyterian registers seldom date back this early, either.) The first date in Skelton-in-Cleveland Register begins 1698! Guisborough registers, 1661; Whitby registers begin in 1608. These are abnormally early. Something about Thomas Carlyle might appear in them. Marske-in-Cleveland begin in 1570, and a careful search there may bring rewards with the Calverts. It is near Skelton.

Now to Henry Hollingsworth the son of Valentine and Ann (Ree) Hollingsworth.

It has often been asserted, in this journal, in many periodicals, and in family histories, that Henry Hollingsworth came first to America in 1683, only to return to Ireland about 1688 to claim his bride, Lydia Atkinson, after which both came to dwell permanently in the new world. Part of this information is still quite stable in fact. But here are excerpts from Lurgan Record Book which change the latter parts:-

Page 105- Marriage of William Gibson, Lygacory, Parish of Shankell, and Mary Caine, Drumgor, Parish of Sego, and County of Ardmagh, at the particular mens and womens meeting at John Robsons the two and twentieth day of the fifth month (July) 1685... cleared for marriage, and married the 7th day of the 8th month (October) 1685 at Marke Wright's. Witnesses include: HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH.

Page 107 - Marriage of Thomas Charman to Sarah Hoope, both of the parish of Shankell, 4th day of sixth month (August) 1686, witnessed and attended by HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH.

Page 111 - Marriage of HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH "of Pensylvania in v^e County of New Castle in America & Lydia Atkinson in v^e Parish of Sego and County of Ardmagh in Ireland 22nd 6th Month (Aug.) 1688."

Although the information is not given in this marriage, Lydia Atkinson was evidently a child of Stephen Atkinson of Ballanacor, (now called Ballynacor) and Issabell his wife. (This is supposed, by consulting page 196, the family record of John Robson and Sarah Atkinson his wife, which Sarah is Stephen's daughter. One of Henry & Lydia (Atkinson) Hollingsworth's sons was named Stephen.)

So Henry Hollingsworth was back in Ireland by October, 1685, almost three years prior to marriage with Lydia Atkinson. It would, in this light, seem that his acquaintance and courtship began after his return to Ireland.

Before his first voyage to America, Henry attended the marriage of John ffawsett and Judeth Thwavts, 19th of fifth (July) month 1682, with his father and step-mother. On 25th of the same month, Valentine Hollingsworth requested a certificate for him and his family for America. When they sailed is not known, but it is pretty certain they landed on 10th of 10th month (December) 1682 in Delaware River. The vessel was probably the Antelope, Edward Cooke, the master, from Belfast. But Henry was probably not with them. He came in the next year. The circumstances appear this way:

Although the Hollingsworths of Ballvickcrannell, Parish of Seago, County Armagh, were by no means paupers, some kind of financial problem forced Henry to indenture himself for his trip to America on his first voyage.* His term of service to his master, Robert Turner, of Dublin, a merchant, was two years, with fifty acres of land to be given him and termination of service 14th of 8th month (October) 1685. You will note that, by this date Henry was already back in Ireland! The trip was a good ninety days. It must be he paid off his services in a sum of money or was brought back to Ireland still in Turner's service. The voyage to America was in the "Lion of Liverpool" with John Crumpton the master, arriving at Philadelphia 14th 8th month 1683, ten months after his father had arrived. Another servant of Turner's was Lemuel Bradshaw, no doubt the same who appears on page 105 of Lurgan Book, as a son of James Bradshaw and Ann Patterson his wife, born at "Drumoneycally" (Drumnescally) 24th seventh month 1665. (James Bradshaw appears as owning one hearth at Drumnescally in the Hearthmoney Rolls of 1664, full copy for Seago Parish published in HR Vol. 1, pp. 101-104, his name on page 103 column 1, line 21.) Also Henry Furnace and members of the Furnace family were indented servants to Turner. Henry ffurnis of Tassan, Seago Parish, paid Hearth tax in 1664. (Ibid page 102 column 4 line 32. Incidentally, at Bellencorr, (Ballvneacor) Steeven and Edward At(t)kinson also paid tax, ibid page column 4 lines 23, 24.)*See Penna. Mag. Vol. 8, (1884) pp. 334, 335.

Upon page 208 the family of Thomas Turner, (son of Robert Turner of Turnerstone in Northumberland in England and of Deborah his wife) (who) was borne at Turnerstown aforesaid in the year, 1618, is detailed. It gives Thomas' wife as Ann, daughter of James Greer of Cumberland, and Mary his wife. Thomas and Ann came to Ireland between 1658 - 1660. Their son Robert Turner, was born "in England" about the 18th day of the 11th month (January) 1655. Possibly these Turners were relations of the merchant of 1683 who brought Henry Hollingsworth to America. The Turners lived first near Belfast in County Down, but by 1662 were at Drumniscally, already described, and the name of Thomas Turner appears in the 1664 Hearth Tax next below that of James Bradshaw. (HR Vol. 1, p. 103, column 1, line 22.) All very

strong circumstantial evidence, if not proof, of the assumptions we publish here!

Henry's mother died in Ireland. The writer found her burial record in Lurgan book, page 293, as follows:

"Ann Hollingsworth (wife to Valentine Hollingsworth) of Ballyvickarannell** deceased the first day of the second month ANNO DOM: 1671, and was buried in y^e burving place of y^e people of god at Monreauerty."

**The spelling here is much closer to the true spelling Ballyvickcrannell, than in the family record on page 203 where it is given as Bellevickcrannell which Albert Cook Myers took for "Belleniskcrannell" and which was carried on by the late Joseph A. Stewart in his family history of 1925.

This is the first time we have seen where Ann (Ree) Hollingsworth was buried. "Monreauerty" is now called Moyraverty, about two miles northeast of the farm at Ballyvickcrannell. Most of the Friends of Seago Meeting were listed as buried there. (Inquiries will be made!) A tombstone would be a rarity, but a possibility which cannot be overlooked.

In August, 1688, the same month in which he was married, the lands of Henry's father were sold to Rev. Henry Jenney, Prebend of Mullaghbrack Parish (a clergyman of the Church of Ireland) as shown in the index to fines and recoveries. Thus Ballyvickcrannell went out of the Hollingsworth family. It is our opinion that Henry acted in his father's behalf, but Valentine may have returned to Ireland to conduct the proceedings. His name, however, does not appear upon the list of witnesses to Henry's marriage. (See further, page 27.)

The predominance of Yorkshire families among the Quakers of Seago Parish, being in close association with the Hollingsworths, may be a strong indication that Valentine Hollingsworth's own father, Henry, came from Yorkshire. In this issue we publish the entries we found in the registers of Calverly, Yorkshire. At Ballyvickcrannell, the only other Hearth-tax-payer with Valentine Hollingsworth in 1664, was "William Smurfit". Smurfit, Smurfoot, etc., is also a Yorkshire surname, though a rather unusual one taking a number of forms. (See HR Vol. 1, page 102, column 1, lines 28 & 29.)

Calverly, Yorkshire, Parish Registers

The sudden interest of your editor in Yorkshire stems from the recent discoveries of so many Yorkshire Quakers in Ulster near Valentine Hollingsworth, as told in our opening article of 1969. Calverly or Calverley, in West Riding of Yorkshire is a parish about five miles northwest of the city of Leeds and about twenty-five miles north of Mottram-in-Longdendale, Cheshire. The largest family of Hollingsworth in Yorkshire dwelt here from before the earliest date in the Calverley Registers, which is 1574, entries of their baptisms beginning almost simultaneously. Though the family of Valentine Hollingsworth seems

not to be reflected here, the writer at once saw the predominance of names which are so well known to the Hollinsworths of County Wexford, Ireland, to-wit: John, Thomas, William, Samuel, Abraham, Mary, Martha, Alice, Elizabeth, and Anne, and so on. Further on we will give some extracts of wills of people from this parish. Baptisms here begin in 1574; marriages and burials from 1596.

It is said that the ancestors of the beloved American poet, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, lived here.

William Hollingworth, Josias Booth and Robert Burnell, Defendants, in a Bill in Chancery against them by Walter Calverley, Esquire and Robert Garnet, miller, of Calverley, withdrawing their soke. (Soke being the local jurisdiction of laws within manors. See Old English Law.)
3. John Hollingworth, Church Warden, 1637-38.
4. Ditto in 1657-58.
5. Thomas Hollingworth, Church Warden, 1662 through 1665.
6. Register of Seats - 1628. Andrew Hollingworth, 4th South.
7. Ditto. The 4th. John Graunt, viccar, one roome which he hath yielded over to John Hollingworth.
8. Ditto. The 14th. Andrew Hollingworth, halfe of the seate paid, 6 shillings, 5 pence. 1633.

VITAL RECORDS AT SOMERSET HOUSE - PART ONE

This is the beginning of a series which we hope to carry from 1837, when the Registration of Births, Marriages and Deaths for England & Wales began, until about 1870. We will publish these out of context, some portions not in chronological order, for the sake of expediency. To order a certified copy of any of these, simply write to Registrar-General of Vital Statistics, Somerset House, Strand, London W.C.2, England, stipulating full particulars as we publish them here, asking costs of a certificate when search fee is unnecessary. The marriages are like the Irish marriages from 1845. They give the name and occupation of the father of the parties, never the name of the mother unless she happened to be a witness, but these are never identified. These are from the microfilms of the Index. The name, the Registrar's District, the volume and the page, as well as the year and the quarter of the year, are necessary to avoid costs of a search.

"Death on the Rail"

William Hollingsworth who resides at the corner of Third avenue and Thirteenth street, in this village (Lansingburgh, New York), received injuries Sunday morning (August 18, 1889) from which he died early Monday morning. Mr. Hollingsworth was 84 years old and very deaf. Sunday morning he was returning from the pasture where he had left his cows, and in crossing the Fitchburg railroad he was struck by a train that was running behind schedule time, and received injuries that resulted in his death. A widow, two sons and six daughters survive the deceased. The accident was probably due to Mr. Hollingsworth's deafness. The funeral took place from his late residence Wednesday afternoon, Rev. W. D. Martin, of Troy, conducting the services. The interment was in Trinity burial ground.

(Above from the Lansingburgh Courier, Sat. Aug. 24, 1889, by courtesy of Troy Public Library, Mrs. Isabelle Laughlin, Acting Librarian. Another more detailed account was published in the "Lansingburgh Times" of the same date, which follows:

"DEATH OF WM. HOLLINGSWORTH - SAD ENDING OF AN OLD RESIDENT'S LIFE.

"William Hollingsworth, aged 84 years, was struck by a Fitchburg passenger train about 9 o'clock Sunday morning and injured so badly that he died at 12:30 o'clock Monday. The train was scheduled to leave the Union depot for Boston at 5:30 a.m., but was delayed until 8:45 before starting. It was in charge of Conductor Sargent and Engineer Woodard. Mr. Hollingsworth kept some cows in a pasture near the railroad track, had driven them there and was recrossing "Long Hill" when the train came along. Having his back toward it, and being totally deaf, he could not heed the warning blasts from the locomotive whistle. The engineer slowed the train as quickly as possible, but it

struck Mr. Hollingsworth and threw him in the air. When he came down he struck on the pilot of the engine and was carried quite a distance before the train stopped. He was conveyed to the station and from there to his house. Drs. Magee and Lamb were summoned, and found the back of his head badly crushed and his left arm broken. He was rendered unconscious. Mr. Hollingsworth has a wife, who was almost prostrated when the news of his injury reached her, six daughters and two sons, and was a quiet and respected citizen. His funeral was held Wednesday afternoon and was very largely attended, the Rev. W. D. Martin of Troy officiating. The remains were buried in the old Trinity graveyard."

Our own record collection provides the neglected genealogical facts about William Hollingsworth: Born at County Down, Ireland, about 1810 (according to the 1880 census) and was probably nearer 80 at time of death. Was married twice. His first wife was Anne, who bore him a family in Ireland, and came with him to New York between 1850-1860. They settled in Lansingburgh before 1860. Anne died 11 Feb. 1864, at the age of 51 years. Their home in Co. Down was the townland called Fofany, near Rathfriland, and they had a daughter Annabella, baptized Nov. 19, 1837, and another, Margaret, born April 2, 1840. A son, Robert Hollingsworth, served during the Civil War, Corp., the 125th Regiment of New York State Volunteers, and died Feb. 21, 1863 at the age of 18 years. Another, John Hollingsworth, died Nov. 11, 1854 at the age of 22 years. William received a pension in 1879 upon his son Robert's services. As soon as we obtain this file we will publish it here. William's parents are not known. The editor didn't know of his tragic death, but only learned about it upon sending for the obituary based upon the known date of death.

Above stone stands in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Glenbrien near Oulart, a few miles east of Enniscorthy in County Wexford, Ireland. It was sent to us by Reverend John Breen, Catholic Curate, by letter 11 July 1967. The ancestors of John were of the Protestant faith.

The official death record says "Joseph Hollingsworth, aged 10, Middletown, Oulart, died Nov. 23, 1888, a laborer's son." He was born June 19, 1878, at the same place, which proves the stone incorrect. (See HR Vol. 1, page 76.) The above couple were John and Mary (Scott) Hollingsworth. Their children included Nicholas (1866), Mary (1869), Joseph (1878) and Eliza (1882). Mrs. Elizabeth Cosgrave of Dublin, in her letter of 21 Aug. 1967, also speaks of John's brother Henry, who promised to keep in touch (when he emigrated) but did not!

Mrs. Anne T. Hollingsworth of 24 Rathear Road, Dublin, Ireland, in her letter of March 19, 1967, explained:

"My late husband Thomas Hollingsworth, did not talk much of his people, apart from his immediate living relatives. You may have already written to his brother (John) whose name has been in the telephone directory for years. (Note by editor: Yes, twice. No answer.) My husband's ancestors may be of the same family as yours; they came from Wexford, and his father's and grandfather's names was John. He had an uncle Nicholas, and aunts Mary & Elizabeth. My husband's grandfather was Protestant, in my husband's words "he married a Catholic lady" & their family were Catholic. His grandparents are buried in Glenbrien Churchyard (Co. Wexford) with a very imposing tombstone in white marble erected by the grandfather in memory of his wife (the Roman Catholic lady). They lived in a townland called Kilcott. The house is a ruins years ago. This place is in the Parish of Glenbrien, near a district known as The Ballagh, Co Wexford..." (Etc.)

This letter adds a son, John Hollingsworth, Jr., with a son Thomas and another John, to the family of John and Mary (Scott) Hollingsworth. Who John's (died 1922 aged 89) parents were remains a mystery! If you know who they were, don't wait forever to write.

Say Hello to HEIDI!

Heidi Lynn Hollingsworth is the name of the latest addition to the family of the descendants of Frederick Hollingsworth (1803-1869) and is a great-great-great-great-granddaughter, the first of that generation to bear the same surname. Heidi was born at 7:15 in the morning, Tuesday, February 25, 1969, in Centinela Community Hospital, 935 South Flower, Inglewood, California. Her mother's name is Cheryl Elaine Hollingsworth, residing in El Segundo, Calif., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Swihart. The father is Corporal Michael Dennis Hollingsworth, 1st Infantry Division, Headquarters Co., currently at Bien Hoa, Viet Nam.

Personal statistics of the brand new little girl are: Weight 5 Lbs., 4 oz, and height (length, if you please) 18 1/2 inches!

Samuel Hart Hollingsworth

Hollingsworth Register regretfully announces the death of our cousin, Samuel Hart Hollingsworth, Monday, Sept. 2, 1968, at Prince Edward County Memorial Hospital, Picton, Ontario, Canada, at the age of 79. He was a widely known and prominent resident of Picton. He had suffered a heart attack two weeks previously.

Born on October 18, 1888, at Picton, he was the sixth child and third son of William Samuel & Sarah Eliza (Webster) Hollingsworth. His father's parents were William and Eliza (Jones) Hollingsworth of Ballinakill, Ballycanew Parish, County Wexford, Ireland, who emigrated to Canada about 1852, settling first in Wellington, Ontario.

Mr. Hollingsworth was a member of the United Church and one of his generous contributions to the support of churches was through work which he did for them. He was also a member of Boulter Loyal Orange Lodge No. 488, and a 50-year member of Bay of Quinte Lodge, F.C.O.F. He served as a volunteer fireman for fifty years and, upon

retirement received a gold helmet as an expression of able and faithful service in this capacity.

He was interested in Municipal, Provincial and Federal Politics, and was a Deputy Returning Officer for the Town of Picton for 50 years and was active in other elections. He was nevertheless of a quiet and unassuming nature, finding joy and satisfaction in helping others, never seeking recognition for generous service to the community. He was an expert figure skater and skated until he was 78 when eye trouble necessitated an operation for cataracts. After returning home from this operation he suffered his fatal illness. He was an ardent fisherman too, and liked boating.

He was a sheet metal worker by trade, and expanded into the plumbing and heating trade, operating a store on Main Street in the family name. (His father was a tinsmith as was his oldest brother, William Dalton Hollingsworth.) He was well known for excellent workmanship and continued active in business until his last illness.

He was ever a booster for Prince Edward County, the U.E.L. traditions, and his ancestors' British connections. His two sons served in the armed forces. Surviving are sons Louis, of Trenton, Ontario, John (or, Jack) of the home address, grandchildren Hartt Watt, James Watt, Gaylord, Randall and Darvll Hollingsworth; two sisters, Mrs. Hanford (Daisy) Richards, of Glendale, California and Miss Ann Hollingsworth of Alhambra, California. Those who predeceased him were his wife the former Cecile Amanda Williams in July, 1940; daughter Grace Watt on Jan. 24, 1963, brothers William Dalton and John Jones Hollingsworth, and sisters Mrs. Frank (Clara) Rice and Molly and Rose Louise Hollingsworth. Mrs. Rice died in the Halifax Explosion during World War I.

Services were conducted at Hicks Funeral Home by Rev. R. Jones on Thursday, Sept. 5, 1968, interment following in Glenwood Cemetery, Picton, where his father and paternal grandparents are buried. Floral tributes were from the Loyal Orange Lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, Elks Lodge, Town of Picton Firemen and relatives and friends. There were also, on his request, donations to the Heart Fund. Among those attending were Clifford Gerow, Lawrence Burford, Jack Walters, Ray Hicks, Victor Wilcox and George Jones (pallbearers); William Watt, Mr. & Mrs. Jack Ringer, the Wilcoxes, all of Toronto, and others from Belleville, Trenton and Peterborough.

Our spirit was there too. Deeply regretted.

Your letter received here to-day as I was paying my usual visit to my Mother I took it along with me to read it over to her & hear her comments. She says that you have made a mistake about her family. Her remarks: - Father, Samuel Hollingsworth & his wife was

Jane Kickenson. They had, as far as she knows, four children - Frances, born 10/10/69, Jane came next born 1870 (sic), both now dead, my Mother 15/3/74, her name is Marie Anne not Mary Ann, & Nicholas - this last she wasn't sure of as when both her parents died the family was scattered. She knows of no Ellen. The James you speak of in paragraph 4 of your letter she remembers well. He had a little shop in Main Street Arklow & owned a vessel of some sort. They eventually moved to Grevstones. My mother says it was Edward who lived at Big Rock not John. (See Editor's comments below.) She knew these people personally & says there were 8 children:—

Samuel - who joined the Queen's Life Guards. (HR Vol. 4 page 167.)
George - joined London police.
Edward - worked on the trains in Dublin.
Daniel - worked on the home farm - poor health.
Sarah - no comment)
Jane - no comment) Unmarried.
Elizabeth no comment)
Ellenor - Missionary. Proud, tall, married a Clergyman.

Jane Dickenson had four brothers — Charles, Joseph, James & Michael.

As you know I spend very little time ashore. One evening every two weeks, so you see it is very, very difficult to pursue this very mixed up family. My mother as you know is just 91 years old. I just can't force her brain to cope with too much at a time. I just have to let her tell me what she can at her own speed. I must confess I get a little balled up with who's who at times; however, what I propose to do now is to pass on your letters, which you have sent to me from time to time, to anyone I can find who is properly interested. In this way you may get more information to help with the good work.

Editor's Comments: On pp. 166-168 of our last volume, we published some of the material on this Arklow Hollingsworth family. The old lady 91 is Marie Anne Henderson, nee Hollingsworth. At the time we received the above letter, she still kept her own house and lived alone. Mr. Henderson worked on tankers between England and Dublin. His mother was living last we heard. His grandfather Samuel Hollingsworth, was a captain of a ship but was drowned at sea in the late 1870s not long after Marie was born. David was the first man to tell your editor about the fabulous "Spottiswoode Fortune". (HR Vol. 1, p. 48.) Births of Samuel's children were published in HR Vol. 1, on p. 10. They lived in the period from 1869 through 1878 at Reilly's Lane, in the town of Arklow. We possess a Xerox copy of a huge petition dated 1872 by the members of Arklow Parish asking their Minister, Rev. Ormsby, not to resign. It is signed by 704 persons. Among them were: James Hollingsworth & Mary Hollingsworth of Tinahask - being the vessel owner mentioned above; Edward Hollingsworth of Big Rock, and his wife Sarah, and their children John, Samuel, Jane, Mary, Bessie and George, spoken of by Mrs. Henderson; and, in Rilev's Lane, Samuel and Jane Hollingsworth with Charles, Ellen, Joseph, Jane, and

Joseph (Jr.) Dickenson. This petition is almost as good as a directory for the Parish, insofar as the Protestant population goes. The names of Kinch, Kearon, Hempenstall, Tyrrell, Needham and others, intermarried with the Hollingsworths, appear here. The mysterious Prestaves do, too; they being prime figures in the Spottiswoode legend, one of their number reportedly having burnt up the "marriage lines" (certificate) which could have turned the money loose!

Samuel Hollingsworth, the father of Mrs. Henderson, was a son of Nicholas Hollingsworth, by the latter's first wife, whose name has never been discovered. Nicholas, by this wife, had six children, or perhaps seven; and, by his second wife (Margaret Hempenstall), sixteen, or 22 children in all. Many died in infancy. ("Buried in a matchbox" was the term used.) Samuel married Jane Dickenson January 20, 1868 at Arklow Church. Jane was a daughter of Joseph Dickenson. (HR Vol. 1, page 14, line 2, marriage number 6.) Samuel's father was the son of John Hollingsworth (1778-1864) of Big Rock (i.e. Rock Big) Arklow.

At Clogga, (or, Clugga) a townland near Rock Big, we are informed, a place called "HOLLINGSWORTH'S GLEN" has recently been completely washed away by the sea! Last we heard, "HOLLINGSWORTH'S TURN," near Ballinakill in County Wexford, still was safe from the ravages of time and the Irish.

(1) First Rathfriland Presbyterian Church Registers, Addenda.

This search was completed by Dr. Patrick Smythe-Wood, Ballycastle, Co Antrim, mailed to us Jan. 5, 1966. We published the bulk of the records in HR Vol. 2 pp. 75-78; our only omission being the baptisms of children whose mothers were Hollingsworths. About 1841, the minister began to enter the full maiden surname of the mother in every entry of baptism. This avails us of the marriages and names of female Hollingsworths around the south of Co Down, Ireland, otherwise unobtainable. Not many other surnames are discovered, Hamilton, "Hear" (See comment), Stewart, Tufts & Watt. Four of these are doubtless of Scottish derivation, Tufts being the only doubtful one. "Hear" is apparently an error by our searcher, for "Weir". In the Freeholders' Lists and the House Books and Griffith's Valuations, no such name as "Hear" appears at any time. Weir, however, does, and they were under-tenants of the Hollingsworths in the townland of Cavan.

James Watt of Endale married Ann Hollingsworth of Cavan, spinster, daughter of John Hollingsworth, July 10, 1857 at First Rathfriland Presbyterian Church. (HR Vol. 2, p. 77.)

The following marriage appears in the old Marriage Register of 1st Presbyterian Church, never noticed before. (Register goes from 1782 to 1812 only.)

- (2) "Bollingsworth", Agnes, 1791. (From Index to names in Deputy Keeper's Report 1951-53, Groom not matched here. The "B" is obviously an error! It is, isn't it?)

THE AGAR RELATIONSHIP - ADDITIONAL

The major portion of this research was published on pages 48 through 50 of Volume Four of Hollingsworth Register. Later more information came to light. Here is a sketch of importance.

Dr. Samuel Hollingsworth Agar. He was the oldest son of John & Mary (Hollingsworth) Agar of Bagenalstown, County Carlow, Ireland, born 1 November 1829; died 14 February 1905 at Hurst House, Henly-in-Arden, Warwickshire, England, at the age of 75. He was buried at Beaudesert Parish Church. This man was a physician and surgeon, and a very responsible member of the community he served for about fifty years.

He married, June 29, 1853, at Drumree Par. Church, Co. Armagh, Ireland, ELIZA ANNE JOYCE, dau. of William Joyce, a Merchant. She was born about 1828, in Ireland; d. 23 Nov. 1893, Henley-in-Arden, bur. at Beaudesert. (The marriage was at Portadown near Valentine's home.)

Dr. Samuel Hollingsworth Agar studied at Royal College of Physicians & Surgeons, St. Stephen's Green, Dublin. After marriage the newlweds went to Warwickshire. During the cricket season 1858-1859, he played on the team and was the star player. In 1868 he acquired a mental asylum called Burman House; bought Hurst House in 1874 (which he made his residence) and built another called Gaendossill, completed in 1882.

The widow of a grandson, Mrs. Willoughby Agar, describes Dr. Sam Agar Sr. as "a very charming & good looking man & was very much loved in the Village (as then was) of course." His Last Will is in our possession, 21 pages in length. Most of it deals with the establishing of trusts for his children & grandchildren. Gross value of the estate was £ 37,287:15:6d. net value of personal estate £ 17,377:12:6d. In American funds of that time it probably equaled about \$185,000.

His son Dr. Samuel H. Agar, Jr., studied at Cambridge University and the London Royal College of Surgeons, and worked at Guy's Hospital. He became partner with his father in 1898. Both held positions as Justices of the Peace and the father was County Magistrate for Henley Petty Sessional Division. Samuel Jr. succeeded his father, and retired in 1920, leaving position of High Bailiff of the asylums to his nephew, Willoughby Agar, M.D. Samuel Jr. died leaving an estate valued at £ 32,661:0:0d.

One must immediately become aware of the good Doctor's pride in his maternal family name. It continues on into the generation of his grandchildren! But alas: No family record of the Wexford Hollingsworths was made under his supervision, as far as we know.

(NOTE: This may not be a complete list.)

The complete name of Dr. Agar was found only when we discovered the item published in our "More Hollingsworth Wills From Ireland" series on page 23, item 52. Until that time, we had maintained our feeling that the Doctor's grandfather on his mother's side was Samuel Hollingsworth of Ballinakill, gentleman farmer. Now we are sure that his mother, Marv, is the identical Marv Hollingsworth who was baptised on 14 July 1806 at Ballycanew Church by Rev. Arthur Colley, Curate, as "daughter of Samuel & Anne Hollingsworth of Ballnakill (sic)." See HR Vol. 4 pp. 87-93 for more details of her family.

Dr. Samuel's brother Frederick Agar (born 1833) is the only member of this family not traced.

Correction on Lee Marvin Article:

On page 154, HR Vol. 4, in our article "Actor Lee Marvin Joins the Clan", we stated that his father was dead and his mother living. Correction: The situation is opposite. His mother died in 1963, but his father, Lamont W. Marvin, retired, lives at Woodstock, New York.

T H E L A S T F A R E W E L L

We chose such a nostalgic headline only to draw your attention, Dear Readers, to this legal farewell of Valentine Hollingsworth the Quaker American settler, to his native land of Ireland. The following item was located by the editor among the sketchy notes of the late Tenison Groves, genealogist, housed at the Record Office, May Street, Belfast, Northern Ireland, via films at the L.D.S. Library. We then sent to the Four Courts, Dublin, to obtain the Xerox copy of the actual index item. (The documents perished.)

Judgment Office - Common Pleas Entry Book of Fines, 1685-1705, Ref. Number 1 A - 52 - 177. 7 August, 1688:

In this suit, Rev. Henry Jennv, Clerk, (Prebend of Mullaahbrack Parish, County Armagh) was the "querens" or complainant, while Valentine and his wife (Vxor or Uxor) were the Deforciant, or persons charged with unlawful possession of property. Valentine is called Generosus - i.e. Gentleman. The land (Terram) was at Ballyvickcrannell in Seacroe Parish. The date of this suit is just 15 days before Val's son Henry married Lydia, daughter of Stephen Atkinson (See page 1). There is no evidence Valentine came again to Ireland so we conclude that Henry must have represented his father at this court. Sorry that we can't help you learn just what it was all about, only to say that Rev. Henry Jennev had this property and leased it several times in the early 1700s. But before you begin to wonder negatively about Valentine's title to Ballyvickcrannell, read a quote from the Century Dictionary & Cyclopaedia, (1895) Volume III. page 2221:

"fine --- 3. In old Eng. law, a judicial proceeding, often fictitious, resorted to merely as a mode of conveyance of land. The persons concerned in the transfer were made parties to a fictitious action, in which the transferrer solemnly acknowledged the land to be the property of the transferee, thus by apparent compromise putting an end to the suit. Fines were a very ancient class of conveyances by matter of record, consisting of fictitious suits in the Court of Common Pleas, commenced and then compromised by leave of the Court. They were called fines because they put an end not only to the pretended suit, but also to all claims not made within a certain time.- Notes & Queries, 7th Ser. Vol. 1, p. 13."

Also see Hollingsworth Register, Volume 2, pp. 79-81, where we published the deed, dated 22 August 1664, from Michael Harrison of Magherleane (or Masherleve) Co. Antrim, Esq., to Valentine Hollingsworth, of Ballyvick-Crannill, Co. Armagh, Yeoman, for sum of Ten Pounds to said Hollingsworth, for ever, the "entire Townland...called Ballyvickcrannell, lying in Clanbrassell & in the Manor of Corabracke, 120 acres, more or less..." Enrolled 20 May 1665. (John Lodge Records, Genealogical Office; Records of the Rolls, Vol. VII. p. 164 No. 3.)

Miss Mary E. (Mamie) Hollingsworth, of Raymond, Mississippi, passed away on Tuesday, January 21, 1969, in the hospital at Jackson, after a confinement there which lasted six weeks. She was ninety. She was a child of the Rev. Salathiel Morris Hollingsworth, grandchild of William Smith Hollingsworth, and great-granddaughter of Isaac Hollingsworth (1780-1866) the first settler of that surname in the Territory of Mississippi. The old family home burned in 1952, since which time she made her home in Raymond, with her sister Maggie Hollingsworth, now the last member of the family, and niece Mrs. Jane Brent.

Funeral was conducted by Dr. Sherwood Riser, retired Baptist minister, from Adkins Protective Service Chapel, on Jan. 23, 1969 at 2:00 in the afternoon. Pallbearers were Claude Ainsworth, Warren and L.C. Hand, John T. and Charles S. Bridgers and Asa Luter. Burial in Bethesda Baptist Church Cemetery. She was a member of this church, and the family have lived here and worshipped at Bethesda for generations, back to the time the area was settled.

A friend and loved one such as Aunt Mamie Hollingsworth cannot be forgotten, for she had lived a life of service to her neighborhood and community. She leaves, beside Miss Maggie, and Mrs. Brent, five nieces, three nephews, and several grandnieces and grandnephews.

A GREAT DISCOVERY... WILL OF JACOB CHESNUTT, SR. OF
SAMPSON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA.

Our correspondent, Mrs. Leola (Hollingsworth) Cleveland, of Booneville, Mississippi, is responsible for this find. She has been working for some years on her ancestry. Until now, all we knew was that her ancestors, Henry and Jane (?) Hollingsworth came to Franklin County, Alabama before 1850. See HR Vol. 3, no. 2, page 76 lines 10-20 which shows Henry aged 80, and wife Jane, 72, both born in North Carolina, in household of their son Owen (census spelling Oran). The editor did some checking. It was found that Henry was in Robeson County, North Carolina, prior to removal to Alabama. Finally, deeds found in Sampson County, North Carolina proved that Jane Hollingsworth was an heir of Jacob Chesnutt, Senior. (These are lengthy and will be published later.) The Court Minutes were examined, and Mr. Marion Hargrove found an entry of the probate of the will of Jacob Chesnutt, Sr., to-wit:

"Sessions Nov. 11, 1805: Cannon Cason & Jacob Chesnutt, Jun^r two of the Executors of the Last Will & Testament of Jacob Chesnutt, Dec., produced to the Court the Last Will and Testament of said Deceased, which was admitted to probate by the oath of Jonathan Chesnutt & David Bunting, which was filed." Mrs. George Worley is to be thanked for the dusty job of locating the will. It seems it was never actually recorded in any will book. There it lay until Mrs. Worley, living in Clinton, North Carolina, found it. The original document is in a sad state, very faded, but, nonetheless legible enough for Mrs. Worley to send us a typed copy. Arrangements are being made to have it recorded before it is totally lost. But here is our full recording of it, which proves Jane Hollingsworth was Jacob Chesnutt's daughter, and

Elizabeth, another daughter, was married to Zebulon Hollingsworth, son of Henry⁴ Hollingsworth (of Stephen³, Henry², Valentine¹. See "Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr.," (1925) by Joseph Adger Stewart; pp. 148, 149.) Now to the text:-

"In the Name of God Amen, I JACOB CHESNUTT of Sampson County and State of North Carolina being of sound and perfect mind and Memory (blessed be God) do this thirtieth day of May in the Year of our Lord Christ one thousand eight hundred and five Make and publish this my last will and Testament in manner following that is to say - First I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife JANE CHESNUTT the plantation that I now live on, together with all the lands on the South side of the run of the Marsh branch and west side of the run of the Six Runs during her natural life, and after her death to be equally divided between three of my Sons namely WILLIAM CHESNUTT NEHEMIAH CHESNUTT and ALEXANDER CHESNUTT to them and their Heirs also I give and bequeath unto my said Wife Six Negroes and their increase Namely Naro Janny Celia Amy Tom and Latirah during her lifetime and after the decease of my wife to be equally divided between Eleven of my Children namely JOHN CHESNUTT JOSEPH CHESNUTT JACOB CHESNUTT MARY FAISON JANE HOLLINGSWORTH PEGGY CHESNUTT NEHEMIAH CHESNUTT & ALEXANDER CHESNUTT. likewise I give and bequeath unto my Wife all my stock of Cattle Hogs and Sheep all my household furniture and plantation tools during her Natural life - And then to be equally divided between nine of my Children namely JOHN CHESNUTT JOSEPH CHESNUTT JACOB CHESNUTT PEGGY CHESNUTT CHARITY CHESNUTT ASHA CHESNUTT WILLIAM CHESNUTT NEHEMIAH CHESNUTT & ALEXANDER CHESNUTT — Further I give and bequeath unto my sd wife all my stock of horses during her life & then to be equally divided between three of my youngest Sons namely WILLIAM CHESNUTT NEHEMIAH CHESNUTT & ALEXANDER CHESNUTT —

"Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved son JACOB CHESNUTT my Old place together with all the Lands between the run of the Reedv branch and Marsh branch and from the run of the Six Runs to Sikes's line — to him & his Heirs

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Six Sons namely JOHN CHESNUTT JOSEPH CHESNUTT JACOB CHESNUTT WILLIAM CHESNUTT NEHEMIAH CHESNUTT and ALEXANDER CHESNUTT three Negroes namly DICK LONDON and LUKE to be equally divided between them — I give and bequeath Daughter ELIZABETH HOLLINGSWORTH the sum of twenty shillings currency —

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Daughter MARY FAISON One Negroe woman named JUDY and her increase to her and her Heirs —

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Daughter JANE HOLLINGSWORTH one Negroe Girl named VENUS and her increase to her & her Heirs —

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Daughter PEGGY CHESNUTT One Negroe Girl named CANDIS & her increase to her & her Heirs —

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Daughter CHARITY CHESNUTT One Negroe Girl named SILVIA & her increase to her & her heirs — — —

"Item I give & bequeath unto my Daughter ASHA CHESNUTT One Negroe Girl named MARIAH & her increase to her & heirs (sic) — —

"Item I give & bequeath unto Six of my Daughter ELIZABETH HOLLINGSWORTH'S Children Namely EDA JANE MARY HENRY ANNE & JACOB — the Sum of thirty pounds currency to be equally divided between them

"Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter PEGGY CHESNUTT WILLIAM CHES-

Also a page from a now lost family bible containing copies of the dates of birth of the same five boys, and the marriages of Elizabeth and Frederick, (1836) and Edward and Rachel McFadden (1860).

The day of their tragic death, Mr. & Mrs. Sladek were returning home on a dangerous stretch of the highway five miles west of Grinnell Iowa, not a mile from her father's first farm. Mr. Sladek apparently suffered a stroke or heart attack, the car going out of control and across the center line. An eastbound car driven by Elsworth Marbach swerved to avoid the Sladek car, turning upside down in a ditch. Only one of the four Marbachs was injured seriously. The Sladek car also rolled over into the opposite ditch, killing them instantly. The mishap took place at about 4:30 in the afternoon. Funeral was conducted by the Roman Catholic Church represented by Edward Susic, the priest.

Ironically, Madge died on the same day (July 23) on which her dad had died in 1917.

Matt Sladek was a well liked man in Newton, Iowa. He was the operator of a machine shop there. Madge, too, was severely missed when life was so suddenly taken. She had sent us a number of letters with information now impossible to obtain, and as did Nelle, she cheerfully completed our questionnaires. The couple was fond of travel; the year before their deaths they had visited Las Vegas, Nevada which seemed to improve Madge's health. She suffered from heart trouble.

Latest News from the Millville Family, Ancestors of Lee Marvin.

In our December, 1968 issue, pp. 154, 155, we gave a brief sketch of the then known facts of the Hollingsworths of Millville, New Jersey. Since that time we have managed to confirm our hunches about the English born generations. Only two items have been secured, but they form legal proof of the record we supposed in our other article. Here they are:

(1) Death Certificate of JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, male, white, married, who died on May 2, 1923 at 193 - 46th Street, Corona, Borough of Queens, New York, aged 72. Buried in St. Johns Cemetery May 5, 1923. He died of pulmonary tuberculosis. His occupation a Glassblower; His father's full name: Nicholas Hollingsworth, (born England); his mother was Mary Murphy, (born Ireland); his own birthplace was England, and he had resided in the U.S.A. and in New York 45 years.

This proves he was a brother of Thomas Hollingsworth, as shown in our other article, born in Ancoats District, Manchester, England, son of "James" Hollingsworth and Mary Murphy. The discrepancy of father's first name might be explained by supposing his full name was James

Nicholas, even as Thomas his son bore the full names Thomas Nicholas. It gives his entry date into the United States as 1878, or, ten years after his brother Thomas arrived.

***Thomas and John's ages fit exactly with the record of 1880 above, and establish beyond doubt the family in England. Also we now know that Marv Murphv was born in Ireland in 1820, had a sister Ann born there in 1833, and their mother seems to be Ann Glavin (probably remarried after death of Mr. Murphv) born there in 1805. The Census spelling "Hollingworth" doesn't match the birth record of 1847 "Hollingsworth", the latter being the more reliable, in most cases. It is still possible that James' father was from our Wexford family. Again, Warwickshire is indicated - the home of Dr. Samuel Hollingsworth Agar. Frederick Hollingsworth and

MARY VICTORIA HOLLINGSWORTH

Frederick (1803-1869) is in photo number one, taken about 1865; Elizabeth Brown (1820-1892) his wife (2) taken in 1887, Kellogg, Iowa; Three poses of their oldest son Edward Earl (1838-1902) (3) taken in Los Angeles in 1890; (4) & (5) in Waseca, Minnesota about 1885. Edward was the editor's great-grandfather. (6) Jacob Hollingsworth (1842-1917) taken about 1887 at Kellogg, Iowa; (7) Dr. John Samuel Hollingsworth, Veterinary Surgeon (1845-1917) taken in Green Bay, Wisconsin about 1895; and William Wallace Hollingsworth (1858-1912) (8) taken in Kellogg, Iowa about 1880, and (9) in San Diego, California, about 1911. Encore, Mystery Sam!

Mystery Sam Hollingsworth's spectre has risen again from the musty, dusty tomb of forgotten records to scare up our interest. Following are very pointed items which play more of his "eerie melody".

- (1) SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, 1st Lieutenant, Volunteer Troop of Horse, Franklin County, Georgia Regiment of Militia. Nov. 18, 1793.

This places a Samuel at Carnesville two years earlier than it was heretofore possible to prove. Jacob Hollingsworth, Sr., of Franklin County, did not sell his farm in Buncombe Co., North Carolina, until Apr. 20, 1796. (See HR Vol. 4, page 15, deed # 2.) Jacob himself registered the deed on July 13, 1796. However, he was in Franklin County, Georgia earlier, as shown by the following:

- (2) Pay roll of a Detachment of Militia Infantry and Spies under the command of Lt. John Collins, stationed at Fort Carnes, Woffords Station, in the service of the United States...from 1 Jan. to 25 July, 1796. Privates included JACOB HOLLINGSWORTH, Ben Wofford, Moses Terrell. (D.A.R. Magazine, Vol. 96, page 628 column 2.) His visit to North Carolina encroached upon his militia service, unless this is Jacob Hollingsworth (1775-1848) his son, who it probably is.

Historical Collections of the Georgia Chapters, D.A.R. (1926) Vol. 1, p. 261 lists Samuel Hillingsworth (sic) as foreman of a Jury on a case "James Greenlee vs. Charles McDowell," dated April 20, 1790. This date is suspicious. It is sandwiched between dates of 1796 and 1798, and James Greenlee appears on the same page in this book versus Samuel Hollingsworth, Nov. 24, 1797...debt due to Greenlee, "of County of Burk, State of North Carolina..." Due to these facts, alone, it is believed that the D.A.R. book commits a typographical error for '1796'.

We tried in vain to prove the above 1790 court record. There are no records of that date either at the county or state level, for Franklin County - a second reason for suspecting it. But the 1793 Militia record seems unimpeachable, and the following too:

(2) Volume "O" of Franklin County Deeds, page 1 (or page 174 - a damaged book?) Indenture 23 May 1798 by Barnabas T. Payne of Augusta, Ga., Thomas Smith of London, England, Esq., and others. It recites a land grant 8 Sept. 1796 of 1,000 acres to said Payne, and a survey as follows: "Surveyed 3d October 1793 for the said Barnabas T. Payne by Malachi Jones, County Surveyor and Certified by John Gorham, also County Surveyor for said state by Warrant dated 3 Sept. 1793, advertised the 5th of October 1793 and signed by the said Malachi Jones and SAML. HOLLINGSWORTH, C.C. and recorded in Book YYY No. 6, folio 427."

Once again, Samuel Hollingsworth "C.C." in Franklin County in the year 1793! This about a month before the date on the Militia muster in Item One, is a strong seconding of the point. Does "C.C." mean - as it seems to - "County Clerk"? Believe it or not, we cannot find out from either Atlanta Archives or the County authorities! It seems no "Civil List" so called, is extant from that period. But we are in correspondence with the office of Surveyor-General, Atlanta, and hope to know soon if such a survey and such a book "YYY-6" now exists.

Reminding the readers again that there were two Samuels in Franklin listed in the 1803 Tax Digests, to-wit: Samuel Hollingsworth deceased, and Samuel Hollingsworth, Senior, we then ask, which of the two was this soldier and County Clerk? The "deceased" was born about 1770: died about 1802, son of Jacob and Mary (Brooks) Hollingsworth. Was he in Franklin by 1790 or by 1793, and was he - a 23 year old - qualified to be a Lieutenant and a County Clerk? Or was it his uncle, brother of his father --- "Senior" --- who held the posts? In Heaven's Name - Folks: Who knows the answer? Did "Senior" have children? If he did - Were they the two Mississippi pioneers, Jacob & Isaac?

HOLLINGSWORTH PARRAKEET "Mr. CHIPS" DIES

"Mr. Chips", one of the oldest birds in this neighbourhood, died Thursday, February 6, 1969, at the home of your editor. He was a bright green specimen of the Opaline variety, with yellow feathers on his head and lavender cheek spots. The band on his right leg was dated 1955. As nearly as can be determined, he was 13 years, 5 months of age. He was always a healthy parrakeet until the onset of his fatal illness, which was diagnosed as a stroke, when it became necessary to help him feed and drink water until the end. His mate was a blue Opaline who died Sunday, June 23, 1963 at the age of 8 years, who came from the same aviary. She was named "Chips" and when the male was left alone, his name was the natural result. They were buried together.

Goodbye, Mr. Chips.
