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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longendale, a few miles south of Manchester. (It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was a barren wasteland at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family surname. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), 'a holly bush,' and Worp (or Worde), meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the placename Hollingworth in Cheshire. More loosely, it signifies "A farm enclosed by holly bushes," or "Holly Farm." The earliest form of the surname was Hollingworth, in the old orthography, Hollyngworthe, but in later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, not much earlier than the early 1600s. Five generally used forms, Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth, are found in the indexes to births, marriages and deaths for England beginning in 1837, and in most of the telephone or city directories of the large cities in England and the United States of America.

I N T E N T O F T H I S Q U A R T E R L Y

To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present. Hollingsworth Register is now in its Thirteenth Year. Nearly every instance of the surname in the U.S. Census schedules, 1790-1870 has been published in this quarterly. About two million pages were searched to produce that result, not to mention searching all kinds of other records. We know of no other family magazine which has even attempted to do this.

Henry Hollinworth was a tenant farmer, a yeoman, a man-at-arms in time of rebellion. He was born about 1600, and possibly as late as 1610. The place of his birth, surely, was England. We have seen no record of him there. He was alive as late as 1631 and we have no further indication beyond that. The only direct record of Henry is in British Museum Additional Manuscript Number 4770, folio 29 - the Muster Roll of the Ulster Plantation, c1630, County Armagh, where he appears as "Henry Hollinworth" the 5th name in a list of 24 tenants on the 2,000 acre estate held by Mr. Richard Cope and Michael Obins. The land lay just east of the present town of Portadown, County Armagh. Included in the land held by Cope was the townland of Ballyvickcrannell, whose standardized spelling on modern Ordnance Survey maps is Ballymacrandal. This muster included "able-bodied men between the ages of 16 and 60 years. From such a rough format we are able to claim Henry's birth occurred between 1570 and 1614!

Shortly after ten years had passed from the date of the musters, the rebellion of Sir Phelim O'Neill occurred. It is better known as The Irish Rebellion of 23 October 1641. Many Protestant English and Scottish settlers in the area were massacred. Portadown was very hard hit. Thousands fled as refugees back to England; others were pressed into service to put down the rebellion. The fate of Henry Hollinworth is not known. Was he murdered? Did he leave for England, never to return? Did he join a troop only to be killed in battle?

Henry Hollinworth married (before 1631) KATHERAN _____. She was living as late as August 1632 and her name appears but once in any record we know of, the Birth and Death Record Book of Lurgan Quaker Monthly Meeting. There, the couple are called "Henry and Katheran Hollingsworth." Their abode as of the date of birth (August, 1632) of their only known son, Valentine, was Bellewickcrannell, (or, Ballyvickcrannell) Parish of Seagoe, County Armagh.

It is safe to make this statement: Henry and Katheran Hollin(gs)-worth could have dwelt there throughout the period of the rebellion, and of the Commonwealth and on into the Restoration in 1660. The situation with records in Ireland at this period is such that it is quite impossible to claim that they were, or were not, dwelling there. The Muster of 1630 is next followed by the 1664 Hearth Tax Roll (a copy) which shows "Valentine Hollinsworth" at Ballym^cCrannell taxed for one hearth at 2 shillings. Next, Seagoe Church of Ireland (Established Protestant) Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials begin in 1672 but do not contain records of Quakers. We had a search made in them and no Hollin(gs)worth appears. No record whatever for the parish of Seagoe exists, to our knowledge, for the period 1631-1663.

As for possible place of origin of Henry Hollinworth in England: The Parish Register of Mottram-in-Longdendale, Cheshire, from 1559, is in our possession on film. Part of it has been published here. No Henry appears anywhere from 1559 to 1838, the period covered by our film copy. "Henry" as a name used by families of this surname, hardly appears anywhere in Lancashire or Cheshire records!

As already noted in HR (Vol. 1, p. 147) another Valentine - Valentine Hollingworth - lived and died at Claypole, Lincolnshire, before 1630. A moderately wealthy man, he was kin to the Hollingworths of the city of Lincoln, linendrapers who originally came from Mottram in Cheshire. The date of their departure from Mottram is lost in remote antiquity - long before 1538, the year parish registers were first kept. Hollingworths were in Lincoln as early as 1530! This Lincoln family bore a coat of arms with black (sable) shield. But the name "Henry" was not found in their pedigree. An exhaustive survey of printed parish register series gave only the result that the Christian name Henry was used among Hollingworths in Derbyshire and Staffordshire.

An alternative possibility, that Henry Hollinworth was born in Ireland, still remains, but it is a very slim one. One William Hollingworth, a captain in the Irish army of Elizabeth I. c1580. His dastardly exploits in Ireland will be recounted in a future number of HR. It is presently not possible to tell if he had any children, let alone if he was Henry's father.

Now, before passing to the second generation, it may be again stated here, as it has been several times, that although Valentine Hollingsworth the Quaker is a known child, Henry and Katheran may have had a number of others. Henry Hollin(s)worth of King Hill, in County Down, a Gentleman, was married to Elizabeth Newell, daughter of John Newell, Gent., a Six-Clerk in the High Court of Chancery in Dublin. After Newell's death in 1693, Hollinsworth seems to have managed the affairs at King Hill. It is possible this Henry was a younger brother of Valentine's, born in late 1630s or 1640s, being, in 1693, in his fifties. In the musters of soldiers preserved in the manuscripts of the Marquis of Ormonde, John, Hugh and Francis Hollinworth were serving in the army at Dublin in 1644. John was at Kilmainham, Co Dublin, in 1664 (see p. 78), Francis at Rathowen-Edward, Co. Westmeath in 1659; and Hugh's later whereabouts are not known. These men might be older brothers of Valentine or brothers of his father ... or ... no relations at all.

Issue of Henry & Katheran Hollinworth:

1. VALENTINE, b. August 1632, Ballyvickcrannell. See further.

Valentine Hollingsworth, only known child of Henry and Katheran Hollinworth, was born in the Sixth Month (August - Old Style) of 1632 at Ballyvickcrannell, Seagoe Parish, Co. Armagh, in the north of Ireland. He was last known to be living in 1710* near Shellpot Creek in New Castle County, Pennsylvania (now Delaware) in America, at the age of about 78 years. He is said to be buried in the Friends' cemetery at Newark, Delaware, the land for which he had presented the meeting in 1687. No markers for himself or his second wife, Ann Calvert appeared there, though a modern memorial has been erected. The Quakers shunned engraved tombstones in those days. If any unmarked flags were ever laid down to mark the head and foot of his grave they were not known to living memory at the time an interest was taken in this fine family. (*On 13 Oct. 1710 he witnessed a marriage of a granddaughter. See page 94.)

He married (1) 7 June 1655, in County Armagh, ANN REE, a daughter of Nicholas and Ann Ree, of the town of Tandragee, Parish of Kilmore, County Armagh. (This spelling is rare in records outside of Lurgan Record Book of Quakers. REA is a better spelling, assuming it is the same family.) Ann Ree was born at Tandragee about 1628, and died 1 April 1671 at Ballyvickcrannell, aged about 43, and was buried in the Friends' Cemetery at Moyraverty, Co. Armagh. (See p. 4.) By her Valentine became father of four children, enumerated below.

He married (2) 12 June 1672, in Lurgan Quaker ceremonies, ANN CALVERT, daughter of Thomas and Jane Calvert, then of Drumgor, Parish of Seagoe. She was born in November 1650, at Kilwarling, Co. Down, Ireland, and died 17 October 1697, at Shellpot Creek and buried in Newark Friends' burial ground, aged about 47 years. Her grandfather, John Calvert, came from Moresome (Great Moorsholm) in the parish of Skelton-in-Cleveland, North Riding, Yorkshire, to Ireland, before 1620, a member of the Ulster Plantation. By Ann Calvert, Valentine Hollingsworth became the father of seven children, of whom we speak further below.

Valentine Hollingsworth embraced the Quaker religion in Ireland not many years after George Fox first visited there, sometime in the early 1660s, we assume. His non-attendance at the regular services of the Church of Ireland immediately brought him into trouble with His Majesty's government. Magistrates had the authority to tithe him in lieu of this by taking whatever stock or produce from his farm of equal value to the tithe they chose! (This disgusting system - the bane of the Church of England and the chief reason, we think, for objection to it - still persists in the system of placing the parish registers (designated in 1871 as "Public Records") under the control of the clergy who charge set fees for each year they search (a year may cover one page or twenty, and so it is a bad, bad idea) and 5 shillings for every certificate they issue. If they don't feel like doing it, even if a patron pays the devilish fee in advance, hell and high water cannot make them do it. The now disestablished Church of Ireland (Protestant) staunchly refuse to allow their registers (remember - they were called "public" in 1871 by Queen Victoria!) to be microfilmed or published for use in libraries. So they rot, locked up in dank vaults of apathetic clergymen of the most backward church under heaven!) One cannot blame Valentine for packing up and taking his family on the good ship Antelope to America where William Penn had made it impossible for "y^e Establisht Church" to hold power. Thank God! He landed in Delaware River on 10 December 1682.

Valentine was a member of the first Assembly of the Province of Pennsylvania, not long after he set foot in America. He served in that body several times thereafter, and was a Justice of the Peace in New Castle County, as also he served in the Grand Inquest of 1683 when Charles Pickering was charged with counterfeiting. He signed Penn's Great Charter.

Now we move forward and give our readers a detailed account of the vital statistics of the eleven children of Valentine Hollingsworth, and the places they settled, and the names of their children.

Issue by ANN REE: (All born at Ballyvickcrannell.)

1. MARY HOLLINGSWORTH, born 25 March 1656. Date of her death not known, but probably in verge of Goshen Meeting of Friends, Chester Co., Penn., after 1727 (as Mary Malin) where she had removed with her second husband.

She married (1) 28 June 1682 at Francis Robson's house at Tamnaficarbett (called TawneCarbett in the 1664 Hearth Tax and Tannifecarbit in Lurgan Record Book of Quakers), Parish of Seagoe, Co. Armagh, THOMAS CONWAY (later called CONOWAY) of the Parish of Lisburn, Co. Antrim, Ireland. The Conways did not come to Delaware with Valentine Hollingsworth. On 6 June 1683, Thomas signed as witness to the marriage of John Hancock and Deborah Webb, and in the minutes, 15th of the 7th Month (Sept.) 1686 ... "It is agreed and confirmed to by the meeting that THOMAS CONWAY and some other Friends who are intended to transport themselves into Pennsylvania have certificates given them in relation to their behaviour and clearness here according to previous knowledge of them." The voyage should have taken place not long after the certificates were made out. (Lurgan Record Book of Births, Deaths & Marriages, pp. 94 & 96, and Minute Books, latter courtesy of John V. Hollingsworth, Chadds Ford, Penn.)

Thomas Conway died 17 Sept. 1689 in America (less than three years after his arrival).

Mary married (2) in 1693, in America, RANDAL MALIN. He came from Great Barrow in the Parish of Barrow, Cheshire, about 1681, and had been previously married and had children by the first marriage. He was appointed a Minister by Friends in 1725 and went to Goshen Meeting in 1727. (Marriage approved 2 Mar. 1693.)

- (7) Katherine Malin, M. Mr. Titus.

2. HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH, born 7 April 1658. Died between 23 Feb. and 12 March 1721, at Elkton, Cecil County, Maryland, aged about 63. Came first time to Delaware as an indentured servant to Robert Turner on ship "Lvon" of Liverpool, 1683. Before end of his service time of two years, he was back in Ireland, remaining there until his marriage. He then came to Delaware, then settled in Chester County, Penn. In 1711 he purchased land in Cecil County where he soon settled. He was a part time surveyor. (See below.) In 1712 he was appointed County Surveyor of Cecil County.

He married, 22 August 1688, at the house of John Robson in Tamnaticarbet, Searoe Parish, Co. Armagh, LYDIA ATKINSON of Ballnacor, daughter of Stephen and Isabel Atkinson, and sister to John Robson's wife, Sarah Atkinson. She survived until at least 1739, referred to below. She also signed a deed 20 Apr. 1724 (See Vol. 4, p. 107.) (She may have lived in Orange Co., Va. See p. 100.)

Their son, Zebulon, at age of 43, in 1740, testified in the Boundary Dispute case, that his "Father sometimes followed the Business of a Blacksmith, sometimes building Houses, and at other times surveying Lands in both Provinces of Maryland and Pennsylvania." (Pennsylvania Archives, 2nd Series, Vol. 16, p. 720.) This is the best statement we can find about Henry's activities. He assisted Thomas Holme in laying out the plat of the city of Philadelphia. (The above testimony by Zebulon Hollingsworth was somewhat in relationship to this matter - being hearsay about an observation taken by an artist or mathematician previous to the actual laying out of the city.) Lydia Hollingsworth his widow, when sworn in the Boundary Case by one Andrew Barry, Magistrate, in Cecil County, Md., (she was deceased when Barry presented her written testimony, in 1740) spoke also about this "Artist taking an Observation" some 50 or 60 years before the time of her deposition, which was in the form of an Affirmation, which was used for Quakers. This seems to indicate that Lydia remained a Friend although her husband is believed to have reverted to the Established Church, the religion of his grandfather. His sons Stephen and Zebulon certainly were Episcopelians.

Henry Hollingsworth was Sheriff of Chester County, Penn. in 1695, and Coroner there and Clerk of the Court, 1700 to 1708. He represented New Castle County in the assembly of Penn. in 1695, with his father. The date of his will and the probate thereof are given above as time of his death.

He may probably be considered the most prominent of his father's children. He was, it is said, a vegetarian, and, though having adopted the Articles of the Protestant Episcopal Church, retained much of the pacific beliefs of his Quaker upbringing. He once believed it not right to kill even snakes, but after seeing a man dead from snakebite, changed his mind in their case. He kept a diary which was destroyed at Elkton, Md., in 1777 by the British.

Issue of Henry & Lydia (Atkinson) Hollingsworth:

then in New Hanover County, North Carolina, but later in Duplin County. Married 18 Feb. 1716/17, at Emanuel Episcopal Church, New Castle Co., Delaware, ANN ROBINSON, daughter of JAMES ROBINSON. (He had been baptised into the Episcopal Church the day before.) He moved from Maryland first to Orange County, Virginia, where, in 1734, he obtained a grant of 472 acres on west side Shenandoah River, but in 1746 was in New Hanover Co., N.C. He is often confused with his first cousin, Rev. Stephen, (see further) who settled in 1735 on the Northwest Branch of Cape Fear, in what was then Bladen County. Our subject was the father of Lydia, (m. John Ross and William Jolliffe, Jr.) Henry, James, Zebulon, Valentine and Timothy Hollingsworth whose descendants peopled Sampson and Duplin Counties, as well as parts of Georgia, Alabama and Florida. (See The Hollingsworth Family of Screven County, Georgia, (1952) by Clyde Dixon Hollingsworth.)

- (3) Zebulon, born 1696; died 1763 in Cecil County, Md. M. (1) Ann Mauldin (2) Mary Jacobs. Issue: Elizabeth, Stephen, Jesse, Zebulon, Henry, Levi, Jacob, Lydia, Thomas, John, Catherine, m. William Dawson of Kent Co.** /vid, Samuel, /Peter. (Stewart p. 27 HR 4:109)
- (4) Catherine, m. William Dawson of Kent Co.** /vid, Samuel, /Peter. (Stewart p. 27 HR 4:109)
- (5) Abigail, married (1720) Richard Dobson.
- (6) Mary,** married Robert Withers.

**Mary and Catherine were unmarried on 21 March 1723/4 when they received a tract of 456 acres from Matthias Van Bahber. (See Vol. 4, p. 107, deed number 17.)

3. THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, born 1 May 1661; died 2 April 1727 in Christiana Hundred, New Castle County, Penn. (now Delaware), aged 66. He was buried in Center Friends' Burving Ground. (Kennett Record Book, pp. 6, 7. He was not "killed by a bison near North Mountain, Va. about 1733." (See Vol. 3, p. 109.))

He married (1) about 1684/5, MARGARET. She died 1 Oct. 1687.

He married (2) 31 March 1692, GRACE COOK, dau. of _____ and Elizabeth (Fox) Cook, by permission of Concord Monthly Meeting, in Concord Township, Chester Co., at the home of Nathaniel Park, who was her step-father. (See page 101 for full copy.) Thomas purchased land in Cecil Co., Md. in 1713 but never actually lived there. Grace Hollingsworth died after 2 May 1741.

Issue of Thomas Hollingsworth: (By Margaret.)

- (1) Abraham, b. 19 Mar. 1686; d. October 1748 in Frederick Co., Virginia where he had emigrated about 1732. M. Ann Robinson. Large family in Virginia. He obtained grants in Cecil Co., Md. along with several uncles, prior to removal to Virginia. Home in Virginia "Abraham's Delight" a historical landmark. Issue: George, Margt. Lydia, Isaac.

Issue by Grace Cook:

- (2) Isaac, b. 16 June 1693; d. 1699.
- (3) Elizabeth, b. 8 Jan. 1694/5. M. out of meeting in 1717, Thomas Strode. (Reinstated. See Vol. 3, p. 114.) Issue: Isaac, George, Thomas, Jacob, John & Abraham Strode.

- (4) Hannah, b. 17 March 1697; m. (by minute Kennett Quaker Meeting 1 March) 1717/18, William Dixon. She died betw. 6-18 Jan. 1777 N.C. Co. aged 80. (Will.)
- (5) Thomas Jr., b. 23 Feb. 1698/99; d. 1 Sept. 1753 at Pipe Creek, Maryland; where he died after departing on a trip as a Quaker Missionary to the Carolinas, aged 54. He was a minister 25 years. He m. Judith Lampley 28 Feb. 1722. Issue: Susanna, Grace, Thomas, Isaac, Nathaniel, Rachel, Amor, Christopher and Judith. From Amor came the line of founders of Hollingsworth & Whitney Paper Company, a division of Scott Paper Company.
- (6) Ann, b. 6 July 1701; Died in 1708 aged 7. (Stewart.)
- (7) Jacob, b. 4 March 1704; Died before 5 May 1766, New Castle Co. Delaware. M. 23 Nov. 1729, Kennett, Rachel Chandler. Issue: Elias, David, Ruth (m. John Way), Jacob, Zebedee, Jephtha and Rachel. (Elias went to Bush River, S.C. as did Jephtha. David went to Huntingdon Co., Penna. Jacob seems to have left his wife and went South. More of him later.)
- (8) Sarah, b. 7 Oct. 1706; m. (by Kennett Minute dated 5 Sept.) 1724, John Dixon. Issue: Sarah, M. David Pusey, 9m 7, 1756.
- (9) Joseph, b. 11 May 1709; d. about 1757, Anson County, North Carolina, aged 48. Married 23 April 1730, New Castle Co. Penna. (Kennett Meeting) Martha Houghton (daughter of John Houghton). She was last known to be alive 26 May 1770 on removal to Fredericksburgh Meeting, South Carolina. (See Vol. 2, p. 45.) Joseph and family left Delaware in 1741, for Hopewell Meeting, Frederick County, Virginia, but were in Anson County, N.C. when he obtained a grant of land in 1753. Issue (partly unproven and perhaps incomplete): Thomas, Jacob, Joseph, William, Abraham, Isaac, Martha (m. Benjamin Hawkins), Enoch. (These lived in North and South Carolina, some going to Ohio and Indiana. See Vol. 4 p. 149.)
- (10) Grace, Jr., b. 9 May 1712; Married Mr. Nugent before 1 Dec. 1739, out of Meeting. Disowned Aug. 1, 1741. No further record. (See HR Vol. 3 p. 115 Minute Number 18.)

Most of above material has been published in HR at different times. John V. Hollingsworth has contributed much original information making this expansion of Stewart's book (and correction of his many errors) possible. None of Stewart's dates agree with ours because he translated all the Old Style to New Style, causing a two-month difference in every case with dates before 1753.

4. CATHERINE HOLLINGSWORTH (called Katheran in some records), born July 1663; Died 29 August 1746 in her 83rd year, near Newark; Delaware. She was a zealous Quaker Minister. (See HR Vol. 3, p. 157.)

She married, 2 January 1688/9, GEORGE ROBINSON, who was born in the north of Ireland about 1656; died in America 8 Nov. 1738 in his 72nd year. He was called "Big George" Robinson, and was not born of Quaker parents. Friends had misgivings about allowing the marriage. (HR Vol. 1, p. 99.)

Issue: (See next page.)

- (1) Mary Robinson, b. 1689. M. 13 Oct. 1710, Thomas Jacobs. (He married, after Marv's death, as second wife, Anne Mankin, 27 Feb. 1733/34 at Center Meeting House.) It seems Valentine Hollingsworth was alive and signed the 1710 certificate, by which it is said, we have proof he lived until that day.
- (2) Ann Robinson, b. 1701. M. Jonathan Ogden, 1720.
- (3) Valentine Robinson, b. c1705; d. 1748; M. Elizabeth Booth 1740. She married (2) Samuel Wilmer, 1749. (Will dated 16 May pr. 10 Oct. 1748, Valentine names sons Charles Robinson (eldest) and Thomas, brother George and wife.)
- (4) George Robinson, b. probably 1691: alive 16 May 1748 age about 56. (Omitted by Hollingsworth genealogies.)
- (5) Catrin Robinson, b. prob. 1690s; alive 1 Dec. 1710 - named in will of James Middleton, New Castle Co. Book B-227.
- (6) Rebeckah Robinson, same information.

Issue of Valentine Hollingsworth by Ann Calvert:

5. SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, born 27 March 1673 at Ballyvickcrannell, died between 30 Aug.-1 Oct. 1748 (d. & pr. of will) in Birmingham twp., Chester Co., Penn. aged 75 years, 6 months.

He married (Kennett meeting minute 8 June) 1701, HANNAH HARLAND, (or, HARLAN) dau. George & Eliza Harland. She survived him. (See HR Vol. 3, p. 114.)

Samuel Hollingsworth was Justice of the Peace for Chester County in 1729 and again appointed in 1738, served the Provincial Assembly, from 1725 to 1728, and his name often appears on the old books of the courts in that period.

During the Penn. - Maryland Boundary case (which finally ended with Mason's and Dixon's famous line) he appeared in 1740, age 67, in lengthy testimony. He remembered an evening about 1683, when Col. George Talbot of Maryland visited the house of Samuel's father with 4 or 5 others saying, as Affirmant heard it, that he was going to run a line to divide the two colonies. The next evening he returned to Valentine's home, saying he had done it. Samuel further affirmed that he had known the Province of Penna. since 1682, resided in New Castle County until 1701 (note: the year of marriage) and then in Chester County where he remained. John Musgrave, one-time indentured servant to Valentine, affirmed the same. (Pa. Arch. 2nd Ser. Vol. XVI. pp. 525, 530, 531.)

Careful study shows that the Hollingsworths seem to have stayed first, with servant John Musgrave, at the house of Robert Wade, in the town of Chester. It probably was a Public House. (See p. 100.) Not long thereafter, the Hollingsworths had moved into their own house, taking Musgrave with them.

Issue of Samuel & Hannah (Harland) Hollingsworth:

- (1) Enoch, b. c1702; d. betw. 11 Aug. - 17 Sep. 1752 aged 50. (Date & Prob. of Will) M. (1) 23 Dec. 1725, (Kennett) Joanna Crowley; (2) Elizabeth Chads, widow of William Pyle. (Probably in 1748; disowned by minute 4 Mar. 1748/49.) Issue: (by Joanna) Hannah, Abigail, Jehu, Enoch, Jr.

- (2) John, b. c1705; M. 29 March 1732, (Kennett Meeting) Marv Reed. (No further information.)
- (3) Samuel, b. c1707; d. between 2 Oct. - 11 Nov. 1751 aged about 44. M. 13 Nov. 1736 (Kennett Meeting) Barbara Shewin, who survived him and married (2) 9 May 1754 at Old Swedes Episcopal Church, Wilmington, Delaware, Phillip Phillips, for which she was disowned by Quakers 5 July 1759. Two sons, Jacob & Samuel Hollingsworth, went to Burke County, North Carolina before Revolutionary War, then to Franklin Co., Georgia. See our previous articles on this family.
- (4) George, b. c1710, died before his father. (This information from Stewart's book, p. 137 and the 1884 book, p. 111.)
- (5) Elizabeth (or Bettv), b. c1712; alive at time of father's will. Married, 1 January 1734/5, (Kennett) Henry Green, of Mill Creek Hundred, New Castle County. (Robert & Marv Green signed certificate as relatives.)

There seems to be no further record of John and Marv (Reed) Hollingsworth in Kennett Meeting Records. They may have had a family and become progenitors of a large (now "lost") branch of the clan. He was living 30 August 1748, date of his father's will.

6. ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH (1st), born 7 August 1675, Ballyvickcrannell; died 24 October 1687 in New Castle County, (Delaware) aged 12 years, 2 months, 17 days. Buried by Kennett Meeting, per records, page 6, at Newark Burial Ground.
7. VALENTINE HOLLINGSWORTH, Jr., born 12 January 1677 at Ballyvickcrannell; died before 25 March 1757 (date of probate of will), in Kennett township, Chester Co., Penna., aged about 80 years. Yeoman. Came to America with his parents in 1682.

Married, (Minute of Intentions & Consent dated 2 May 1713) ELIZABETH HEALD (Stewart, p. 2, says they married "in Ireland" which is a totally unbelievable mistake!) Our list of their children is given in the order of birth assigned by the 1884 & 1925 books, as it was in the case of Samuel Hollingsworth.

Issue of Valentine & Elizabeth (Heald) Hollingsworth:

- (1) James, b. c1714; d. between 2 Feb. - 5 March 1763, Kennett twp., Chester Co., Penna., aged about 49. Yeoman. M. 12 Feb. 1747 at Old Swedes P.E. Church, Wilmington (and disowned by Kennett Quakers, Minute dated 5 July 1747) Marv Harvey. Issue: Valentine, Abner, Bettv, Ann, Sarah, Susanna, Marv, Hannah & Rebecca. (NOTE: All of these are named in his will, all under age. Though James was disowned, his descendants adhered to the Quaker faith. John V. Hollingsworth of Chadds Ford, Pa., is a descendant of his second son, Abner.)
- (2) Rachel, b. c1716; Date of death not known to writer. M. 12 Feb. 1738 in Old Swedes Church (and disowned by Kennett Meeting 1 April 1738) ELIJAH BARNS. Before her father's death she married (2) Mr. HOPE. (Stewart reverses the order of these marriages.) Issue not searched.
- (3) Valentine III., born c1718; died before August Court, 1766, Orange Co., North Carolina, aged about 48. M. before 2 Apr.

1742/43, Elizabeth Harlan,*for which they were separately disowned - Valentine on 6 March, Elizabeth on 4 June 1743. After her settlement in Orange Co., N.C. Elizabeth sent a paper (minute 1 June 1754 N.S.) to Kennett Meeting acknowledging her fault and was subsequently reinstated. The same may be true of Valentine III. for he was called "one of the People called Quakers" as of Court 2 July 1754 in the probate of the estate of his wife's brother Samuel Harlan, whose will he had witnessed. (Will lost. Above from Minutes of Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions. North Carolinian Vol. 11 p. 1401. See also HR Vol. 3 pp. 115, 154.) She then married, as second husband, c1767, James Richeson. She died before May 26, 1768, and Richeson swore at court of his marriage to her. (State Records of N.C. Vol. 7, p. 781. No record of any issue of Valentine Hollingsworth III. *Dau. Aaron & Sarah Harlan.

- (4) Elizabeth, b. c1720; died in Orange County, N.C. after 1754. M. August, 1745, Old Swedes P.E. Church, Samuel Harlan, son of Aaron & Sarah, and brother to Elizabeth, wife of Valentine Hollingsworth III. (See above.) She was disowned by Kennett Meeting 1 Feb. 1745/6 but reinstated 6 Sept. 1746. They went to Orange Co., N.C. in 1753 (Stewart, p. 132) and Samuel Harlan was dead by 2 July 1754. (See above.) Elizabeth qualified as Executrix. Record of children not in our possession. (See History and Genealogy of the Harlan Family by Alpheus H. Harlan.) Had 2 - Betty & Aaron Harlan, as named in will of Valentine Hollingsworth Jr.
- (5) Sarah, b. c1722; died in North Carolina. Date unknown to us. M. March 1746 in Old Swedes Church, (disowned 6 June 1747) Aaron Harlan, son of Aaron and Sarah; brother of Samuel and Elizabeth. They all are said to have removed in 1753 for North Carolina. Issue not known to writer.

NOTE: Valentine Hollingsworth, Jr., left very small pittances to his children, Valentine, Elizabeth and Sarah. He may have disapproved of their conduct. The 1755 Tax of Orange Co., N.C. shows Valentine Hollingsworth, 2 polls, and Aaron Harlan (and others) 2 polls.

8. ANN HOLLINGSWORTH, born 28 December 1680, at Ballvickcrannell; died after 26 Oct. 1712. in Salem County, New Jersey. Came to America with parents in 1682.

She married, shortly after 30 Sept. 1700 (Date of Grant of permission by Salem Meeting to the husband) JAMES THOMPSON, at Newark Meeting. (Certificate not found.) He was the son of John and Jane (Humbles) Thompson of Salem County. John was born in 3rd Month 1635, at "Kinksenton" in Yorkshire, England (We cannot find such a place in the Gazzetteers - probably "Kirklington" or some such place) but went early with his parents, Thomas and Elizabeth Thompson, to Parish of Donard, County Wicklow, in Ireland, where they became Quakers. Jane Humbles, daughter of Thomas Humbles, was born in Co. Durham, England, but went to Ireland. James Thompson, husband of Ann Hollingsworth, was born at Donard, Co Wicklow, Ireland, October 1668; *died before 1 April 1712, Salem Co., N.J. aged about 44. He came to America from Dublin on "Mary" in 1677. (*Donard, and all of Talbotstown Barony, omitted in copy of 1669 Hearth Tax now extant.)

An exhaustive search of the will and administration abstracts published in New Jersey Archives has failed to establish anything positive about the later history of the five children of James and Ann (Hollingsworth) Thompson. Search in published sources for Salem County has likewise failed.

Issue of James & Ann (Hollingsworth) Thompson:

- (1) Jane Thompson, b. 28 November 1702, Elsinborough Precinct, Salem County, New Jersey. Alive May 23, 1720, mentioned in the will of Sarah Thompson of same place, widow of John, and step-mother of James.
- (2) Ann Thompson, b. 5 March 1704, ditto. Same information.
- (3) John Thompson, b. 18 October 1707, ditto. Same information.
- (4) Elizabeth Thompson, b. 3 Feb. 1709, do. Same information.
- (5) James Thompson, Jr. b. 26 Oct. 1712, posthumous child. Same information.

9. JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, born 19 April 1684 at Shellpot Creek, New Castle County, Pennsylvania; died August, 1722, in Chester Co., Penna., or Cecil County, Maryland (Administration in Chester Co. records - H.R. Vol. 2, p. 6) aged 38 years, 4 months. Place of burial probably at old Welsh Tract Baptist Meeting House, Pencader Hundred, New Castle County, the church he attended.

Married, (by minute of consent of Newark Meeting dated 1 Apr. and Salem Meeting dated 25 March) 1706, KATHERINE TYLER, daughter of William & Elizabeth Tyler of Alloways Creek, Salem Co., New Jersey. (Her father Wm. from Walton, Somersetshire, England came to West Jersey in 1688. Elizabeth was his second wife. See HR. Vol. 1, p. 184 et seq and Vol. 3 p. 14.) She was born 13 August 1690 in Salem County, New Jersey; died before October Court 1755 on North West Branch of Cape Fear River, Bladen County, North Carolina, aged about 65 years. She had married (2) after 1730, Robert Edwards, who had predeceased her leaving one son Robert Edwards, Jr.

After their marriage, this family lived in Salem County, West (now New) Jersey, where Katherine was converted at Cohansey, Salem County, to the religion of the Welsh Baptists. John joined her (or had preceded her) in this conversion. He obtained a patent 10 Sept. 1716 (surveyed for him 15 Sept. 1714) "Fair Hill" for 200 acres in Cecil County, Maryland; sold same 26 Sept. 1720 at which time he resided in Milford Hundred, Cecil County, Md. (See HR Vol. 4, pp. 106, 108.) His widow took all the children to North Carolina.

Issue of John & Katherine (Tyler) Hollingsworth:

- (1) Stephen, b. c1707, Salem County, New Jersey; d. before Feb. Court Term, 1779, Bladen County, North Carolina, aged 72. Buried on his farm in the Welsh Tract on N.W. Cape Fear River, northeast side, square acre of ground now lost by plowing. (Called incorrectly "Hopkin" Hollingsworth ... a corruption of "Stephin" or "Stephen" ... in the deed of sale. See H.R. Vol. 2, page 144 number k.) Became zealous Hard-Shell Baptist (Welsh Baptist) minister in North Carolina. Obtained grants of 640 and 250 acres at same time as his mother Catherine or Katherine Edwards, 1735.

He married, (before 7 Oct. 1744) Mary---- She probably predeceased him, and possibly buried in same graveyard. Issue: John, of Cumberland County, N.C., Samuel, signer of the Cumberland Association at beginning of the Revolution (incorrectly placed by 1884 book and Stewart), Isaac, all these born before 22 May 1755 named in will of Katherine Edwards, Isaac believed to have settled in Twiggs Co., Georgia; and daughters of Stephen & Mary mentioned but not named as being buried in family plot.

- (2) Samuel, b. c. 1710; Salem Co., N.J.; died before 9 August 1754, Pee Dee River, (in Welsh Tract) Craven County (now part of Marlboro County) South Carolina, aged about 44. Presumed to be buried there. Left Bladen County, N.C. and settled there in 1747 obtaining several large grants. (See HR Vol. 3, pp. 61 et seq. and pp. 120 et seq.) Married MARY. Issue: Samuel (died unmarried); Elizabeth (died unm. Craven County, S.C. 1772); Mary, (m (1) David Harry; (2) Maj Tristram Thomas) Catherine, (m. David Evans) Sarah (a doubtful nomination - m. Mr. James). This family may have become extinct except in the Thomas line.
- (3) Valentine, b. c1712, Salem Co., N.J. d. 26 March 1760 or 6 Aug. 1778 (two death dates in Welsh Neck Primitive Baptist Church record book for men by this name.) Age about 48 or 66. No record of any marriage. He perhaps had a son William who died in October 1751.
- (4) Ann, b. c1714, Salem Co., N.J. or Cecil Co., Md., d. after 1755, in Craven Co., South Carolina, a widow. (Named in her mother's will.) Married, before 1730, in Joppa, (now) Harford County, Maryland (deed in Baltimore, 26 Nov. 1730) JEREMIAH SUTTON. He was dead before 15 April 1751 when her brother Samuel Hollingsworth deeded to her 145 acres in the Welsh Tract, Craven Co., S.C. as "Ann Sutton, Widow" per Book QQ, page 244, Archives, Columbia - Charleston Deeds. Issue: "Sons" mentioned in will of Cath. Edwards.
- ?(5) Mary, b. c1716; alive 26 Nov. 1730, Joppa, Baltimore Co., Md. receiving lot from Jeremiah & Ann Sutton. Called Spinster. No further data. (She might not be a child of John & Katherine Hollingsworth, but a niece.)

NOTE: The order of these births is purely speculative by the editor. Stephen was surely the eldest, and is named first by his mother. Valentine is next named, but as Samuel was deceased, it cannot be said whether he was the 2nd or 3rd son. Samuel may have been youngest of the boys as he had one child at time of petition before S.C. Council in 1747 for land. Plotting this family, not carried out by either the 1884 or 1925 books, has taken nearly five years.

10. JOSEPH HOLLINGSWORTH, born 10 July 1686, Shellnot Creek, New Castle County, Pennsylvania; died about 1732 or 1733, Opeckan, Frederick Co., Virginia, aged about 47 years. He was a cooper, or barrel maker, by trade. Estate administered in Orange Co., Virginia, 26 Apr. 1737 by Isaac Parkins.

He married, before 1730 (probably about 1708-10 but we have no record - Ed.) ELIZABETH---- (maiden surname not known to us). She was probably born c1690; died after 1733 location not known.

Before 13 Nov. 1733 Elizabeth had re-married one Mr. Rentfro or Renfro. For same, having married outside of Quaker jurisdiction, the committee of Hopewell Meeting was assigned to labor with her. (HR Vol. 2, p. 99) No record of her after that.

Joseph Hollingsworth's name is rare in records. He seems to have remained a faithful Friend, as there is no record of his getting into trouble with the Meetings. He appears first in records as an adult when he signs a deed dated 7 May 1711 at purchase of land in Cecil County, Md. by his half-brother Henry Hollingsworth. (HR Vol. 4, p. 105 item 1.) He again witnessed a deed of 7 Feb. 1720-21 when his nephew Abraham Hollingsworth sold land to Henry Hollingsworth. His last appearance in Cecil County, is in a deed of 17 Dec. 1721. He resided in that county as shown by the deed. (Ibid, pp. 106-7, items 9 & 14.) He probably accompanied his nephew Abraham and Isaac Parkins and other Friends to "Opeckan" in Virginia about 1729 or 1730.

Issue of Joseph and Elizabeth Hollingsworth is not known to us.

11. ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH (2nd), born c1688/89, Shelpot Creek, New Castle Co., Penna., died 26 November 1690, aged 1 or 2 years. (Kennett Birth & Death Record Book.) (See p. 103, item 4!!!)

Before closing this very lengthy and still incomplete treatise, a remark or two about some items related to the family in question seem in order.

(1) It is expounded in an 1824 letter by one of the Philadelphia descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, that Valentine's first wife was "Catherine Cornish, daughter of Henry Cornish, High Sheriff of London, hanged by James II. wrongfully." This is published in the 1884 book by W. B. Hollingsworth, page 6. Albert C. Myers, in his work on Immigration of Irish Quakers, using Lurgan and other Quaker records, printed the true record, though he misspelt "Bellewickcrannell" (the Quaker clerk's spelling) calling it "Belleniskrannell". Mr. Joseph Adger Stewart copied this error but also added one by incorrectly interpreting Old Style (when the year began on Lady Day or 25 March) as being New Style. He thus got "First Month" to be January, instead of March, and so on. (In one record we saw Valentine's birthplace designated as "Bellinisk, Crannell Parish, Leroe, Co. Armagh, Ireland.") In somebody's attempts, Catherine Cornish is assigned as Valentine's mother. Since his mother's Christian name was, in fact, Katheran or Catherine, it is not impossible. One Andrew Cornish did belong to Quakers, and signed in the relatives column at the marriage in 1713, of Valentine Hollingsworth, Jr. (according to a letter we have from John V. Hollingsworth). Though the Sheriff of London might thereby be related to the Hollingsworths, we doubt if Henry was the grandfather of Valentine. Some limited research failed to show anything.

(2) Myers (op. cit. p. 342) says that the Andrews family of Delaware were some relation to the Hollingsworths. He cites a petition of Samuel (son of Valentine) Hollingsworth, for land (100 acres) "on behalf of his Kinsman Wm. Andrees (Andrews)." (Board of Property, 2 Oct. 1731.) "Kinsman" may refer to relationship by law. However, Andrews might be related to Samuel through his mother's (Calvert) or his

wife's (Harland) side. William and Miriam Andrews came from within the boundary of Lungan Quaker Meeting, Ireland, Miriam producing a certificate from the Meeting to Newark Meeting on 7 mo. (Sept.) 6, 1729.

(3) "The Jolliffe Family of Virginia" (1893) page 151, footnote, published a full copy of the Quaker Marriage Certificate at Hopewell Meeting in Virginia, of George Hollingsworth, son of Abraham, late of Cecil Co., Md., now living on North side of Opeckon, Colony of Va., to Hannah McKay, daughter of Robert McKay of same place, 19th Dec. 1734. The signers included in the list of 43 are "John Bentsro" and Lydia Hollingsworth. John Bentsro may be John "Rentfro" who may be the husband of Elizabeth, widow of Joseph Hollingsworth referred to above. Lydia Hollingsworth is almost without any doubt the widow of Henry. She quite likely accompanied her son Stephen to this area when he obtained his grant of land in Orange County, Va., for 472 acres on West side of Shenandoah River, 12 June 1734. It isn't the last record we have of her. Two Lydias sign, one being George's sister. Stewart omits one of them. Another signer was "Igt Sobt". (Just who is he?)

(4) Robert Wade of Chester, Penna., wrote his will 9 July 1698. He describes himself as "of Essex House" which lends support to our speculation that he ran a Hotel or Public House there. His widow, Lydia, (will dated 30 June 1701, proved 28 August 1701) mentions bequests to Quakers and mentions Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr., and Henry his son by name. (Philadelphia Wills, published in Vols. 1-2 of The Genealogical Magazine of Pennsylvania.)

(5) Thomas Fox (could this be "Cox"? - see page 101) of Darby, Chester Co., Penna., in his will dated 31 Aug, proved 8 Sept. 1699, names "Nephew William Cooke, sister Elizabeth Park and her daughters Grace Hollingsworth, Elizabeth Gregg and Hannah Holborn." This shows Elizabeth Fox or Cox was a widow Cook(e) and had become mother to Grace Cook and others and then married Nathaniel Park. Grace Cook married Thomas Hollingsworth as his second wife. (Ibid.)

We hope the reader appreciates this effort. The time really was not ripe because all the facts weren't properly assembled, and many still unknown at time we went to press. But we thought that all of the things we know ought to be "in one place" so that the dreadful and almost hallowed errors committed or perpetuated by Wm. B. Hollingsworth in 1884, Jolliffe Family, 1893, and J. A. Stewart Sr. in 1925, might once for all be scratched out here. Although this writer may have made some errors of his own, it is possible to correct them in the pages of Hollingsworth Register, if need be. It is still the rule however, that a printed word of long ago, will be accepted before a mimeographed word of today! (Alas!) But, nevertheless, now we end this record of the family of Henry Hollinworth of Ballyvickcrannell.

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Thomas Hollingsworth's Marriage Certificate

WHEREAS, That THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, of y<sup>e</sup> county of New Castle and Manor of Rockland, and GRACE COOK of y<sup>e</sup> county of Chester, township of Concord, having declared their intentions of marriage before several monthly meetings of y<sup>e</sup> people called Quakers, held 12, 8, and 1, 14, 1691-2, at Concord in y<sup>e</sup> County of Chester, whose proceedings were

allowed by said meetings.

NOW THESE ARE TO CERTIFY, all whom it may concern for y<sup>e</sup> full accomplishment of their said intentions, this 31 day of the first month, one thousand six hundred and ninety two.

YE SAID THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH and GRACE COOK appeared in an assembly of people, at a meeting for v<sup>e</sup> purpose, appointed at y<sup>e</sup> house of NATHANIEL PARK in Concord, and v<sup>e</sup> said THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, taking v<sup>e</sup> said GRACE COOK by v<sup>e</sup> hand, did, in a solemn manner, openly declare that he took her to be his wife, promising through y<sup>e</sup> Lord's assistance, to be to her a loving and faithful husband until death should separate them. And then and there in v<sup>e</sup> said assembly GRACE COOK did in like declare that she took said THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH to be her husband, promising through y<sup>e</sup> Lord's assistance, to be unto him a loving and faithful wife until death should separate them. And moreover, y<sup>e</sup> said THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH and GRACE COOK, (she according to v<sup>e</sup> custom of marriage assuming the name of her husband) as a further confirmation thereof did then and there to these presents set their hands, and we, whose names are hereunder written, being amongst others present at the solemnization of their said marriage, and subscription in manner aforesaid as witnesses thereunto, have hereunto set our hands the day and year above written.

(Exactly as printed in The History of Adams County, Ohio (1900) by Nelson W. Evans & Emmons B. Stivers, pp. 575, 576. It is stated by the editors to have been "preserved", but its source not shown. It possibly will be found in Concord Meeting Book. If it ever was recorded in Newark-Kennett, it is now lost. It is incorporated into a sketch of Abraham Hollingsworth of Adams County, Ohio, who, it says, was born 20 Aug. 1782 near Winchester, Virginia. His great grandfather was also Abraham, the same who lived at Opeckan (Opecuan) in Frederick County, Va. It says Abraham's son "Isaac" was this subject's grandfather. J. A. Stewart, page 36, has "this subject" fitted in thus: "Robert<sup>5</sup>, George<sup>4</sup>, Abraham<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Valentine." It lists his father and mother as Robert and Susannah (Rice) Hollingsworth. This concurs with Stewart. Who is in error? Not Stewart this time. Records show that Isaac, son of Abraham, b. 1722, didn't marry until 1748 while Robert who married Susannah Rice was born in 1744.)

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#### Another Mystery Cleared Up!

The Journal of North Carolina Genealogy by William Perry Johnson is the finest publication for the state in question. We urge our readers to see it or subscribe to it. In the latest (Fall 1969) issue, page 2401, we find hitherto unpublished Marriage records in Randolph Coun-

ty, North Carolina, 1785-1809. They are in the office of the Clerk of Courts, Asheboro in a book entitled "Fees & Fines/March Term 1788/Marriage Records, 1789/Licences Issued/Randolph Co., N.C." These enlightening entries were found:

1. 1789 - Henry Arledge & Sarah Garner.
2. 1788 - Daniel Brown & Mary Hollingsworth.
3. 1788 - Samuel Hollingsworth & Mary Garner.
4. 1790 - Isaac McCollum & Jean Porter.
5. 1790 - Stephen McCollum & Nancey Norton.

Number 3 is the most important to us. This Samuel was the son of Jacob<sup>4</sup> (of Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Valentine) and Mary (Brooks) Hollingsworth. Hitherto nobody had any record of Mary's maiden surname. Nor did we have any idea that he married before 1790. Stewart's 1925 book, as well as the 1884 book, give his birthdate at 1770, died 1817, with "name of wife unknown". If he married, as we now see, in 1788, he probably was born a year or two before 1770 ... let's say 1767. His father Jacob was born in early 1740s, perhaps in 1740 itself, so there is every reason to believe this possibility. Assuming this, we pass now to the 1790 Census and find two Samuels and one Jacob in Burke County, North Carolina. One of the Samuels is irrelevant here. The other - near Jacob - is our subject. He is there listed (page 109 original printed census - HR Vol. 1, page 17) with 1 male over 16 (himself) 3 females and 1 slave. Jacob (same page) has 1 male over 16 (himself) and 5 males under 16, 1 female. Our records Stewart, the 1884 book and the will of Jacob and the various Franklin County, Georgia, court records, seem to show Jacob had only 5 sons - Samuel, Jacob, Jr., Benjamin, James and Thomas. It is possible of course, that one of the 5 boys was not Jacob's, but it seems, if that were so, he would be in the "other persons" column. It is possible, too, that one small son died after 1790. Jacob named a daughter "Hannah Brown" not Mary Brown. He also named daughter Mary Wofford, who might have been the Mary above, having married (1) Daniel Brown, then Mr. Wofford. Jacob named daughters Hannah Brown, Mary Wofford and Sarah Garner - 3 - and only "1 female" is listed in 1790. One of his daughters may be one of the 3 females in Samuel's house, the idea of Sam having two children in less than 2 years being hard to swallow. But it seems to show at least two of Jacob's daughters and maybe all three were married before 1790. (For more, See Vol. 2, page 103.)

NOTE: We included McCollums because one Cassandra or Cassie Ann McCullen (sic) married Addison Hollingsworth, son of Isaac of Mississippi.

Martha Hess of Los Angeles visited Franklin County, Indiana, recently, trying to trace her lineage back to Valentine Hollingsworth through Valentine Jr. She visited Sims Family Cemetery, a half mile north of (old) Fairfield, in Franklin County, Indiana, and had the courtesy of copying all the Hollingsworth entries from the headstones she found. NOTE: Further reference to this family may be made in HR Vol. 1, p. 34. They resided in Harmony Township, Union County, Indiana, in 1850 and the father is Enoch, born in Indiana, wife Margaret, Tennessee, and children Susannah, George, Joseph and Joel, born before 1850. HR, Vol. 2, p. 142, + our index to Hollingsworths in Civil War Pensions, shows a Joel Hollingsworth, Co. G., 89th Indiana Infantry, Number 51, 953 Application Number only. He obviously didn't apply for the pension: therefore this may not be for the same man.

He names sons JOHN & JOSEPH executors. To them all his property, to provide for his wife (not named) lodging and clothing. If she depart, sons to then provide sum of 10 shillings per week during her life. Dated 29 October 1909. Witnessed by FRANCIS CLINCH, Solicitor and his assistant WILLIAM J. NORMAN, both of 44 Fleet St., Dublin.
- (62) SARAH HOLLINGSWORTH, late of Rock Big, Parish of Arklow, County Wicklow, widow. Proved 13 Sept. 1909. Ex. DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH, same place. She died 10 June 1908. Sworn under £116. Will written 7 Nov. 1898. Devised all her farm of Rock Big which she held under a lease from the Earl of Carysfort to her son DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH for his own absolute use and benefit. However, she stipulated that he must charge the farm with sum of fifty pounds for each of her daughters, JANE and BESSIE, to be paid on the day of their respective marriages. They must have right to live at Rock Big farm until they marry. She did not bequeath anything to her "other children" because they were otherwise provided for. Residuary Legatee, son DANIEL. Signed by name. Witnesses: Rev. RICHARD C. HALLOWES, J. W. HARRISON. Original will shows "referred to us and sworn 3 Sept. 1910."
- (63) DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH, late of Rock Big, Co. Wicklow, farmer. Will in Principal Registry. Died 8 August 1914. Will dated 23 Feb. 1914. Appointed sister BESSIE HOLLINGSWORTH sole Executrix, and to her his stock and farm of Rock Big, and also she was to be Residuary Legatee, to look after sister JANE "who is de-



- (b) AGREEMENT dated 25 January 1889. ELLEN O'FARRELL, (Landlord), and ABRAHAM HOLLINGSWORTH (Tenant), Ballinakill, Co Wexford, farmer, for the sale of the holding at Monroe and Ballinakill, RECITING that the said lands were formerly held by JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH (father of this said ABRAHAM) under a lease dated the 10th August 1839 \* for 31 years or for lives (lives not named here) from ANDREW THUNDER, deceased. (Sum and substance of letter of 18 July 1969 from the Land Commission, Upper Merrion St., Dublin, to your editor, from Records Branch P M 81/342 Estate of Ellen O'Farrell. Co. Wexford. Rec. No. L.C. 475.) See notes below.

\*Note: A thorough examination of the Indexes to Lands, Co. Wexford, from 1836-1844, under "Ballinakill, Monro" and variants, and of Grantors, 1833-1839, under "Thunder," fails to reveal that John Hollingsworth of Ballinakill (1789-1877) ever registered his 1839 lease. Three deeds on this property were found, however, in the 1889-90 period. When we get them they will be published here.

(NOTE: Here we find MARGARET HOLLINWORTH holding property at Kinkell in 1756. It is probable she was a widow of Henry Hollin(s)worth, of same place, and a daughter-in-law of Henry and Elizabeth (Newell) Hollin(s)worth of Kinkell. The next mention before this is 1733, and the next after is 1764. See THE RATHFRYLAND FAMILY articles in HR for details.)

THE RATHFRYLAND FAMILY - ADDITIONAL

Here is a full copy of the last will of Margaret Hamilton, as received from the Public Record Office, May St., Law Courts Building, Belfast, Northern Ireland, 6 August 1969. It may be considered as a continuation both of the history of this particular family, and of the wills just published here.

The Last Will and Testament of MARGARET HAMILTON, late of Drumlough, Co. Down, Ireland, widow, deceased, who died there 20 Feb. 1903. (See Page 67, Item 53.)

THIS IS THE LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF ME, Margaret Hamilton, of Drumlough in the County of Down. I hereby revoke all wills and testamentary instruments heretofore by me made. I appoint my daughter ANN JANE HOLLINGSWORTH nee HAMILTON (married woman) of Drumlough, Co. Down, and HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH of Cavan, Co. Down, farmer, to be the Executors of this my Will. I direct my Executors to pay my just debts and Funeral and Testamentary Expenses.

I GIVE AND BEQUESTH to my daughter ANN JANE HOLLINGSWORTH The farm of land & Dwelling houses and offices in Drumlough held under Captain JOHN PERCY MEADE and all my Stock, Crop, Chattles, furniture &c., that may be on the place at the time of my Death or that I may be possessed of ----- Subject to the following conditions and bequests (1) To pay to my Daughter PRUDENCE the sum of £ 70. Seventy Pounds Sterling, PRUDENCE to lend the said sum to JANE at five per Cent Interest if ANN JANE so requires her. (2) To pay my son ROBERT in Australia Fifteen pounds (£15.) To my Daughter ELIZA Also in Australia Ten pounds (£10.) To my Daughter SARA one Pound (£1.) And to her Daughter MAGGIE (One Pound (£1.) And I appoint my said Daughter ANN JANE My sole residuary Legatee.

DUBLIN FREEMEN

Manuscript Number 491, Genealogical Office, Dublin Castle, is a detailed abstract of the Corporation Calendars of Dublin, listing the names of men who were made Freemen of the City. The following men

interest us.

James Hellinworth (sic), weaver, Xrmas (Christmas) 1679.

Joseph Hollingsworth, cutler, Michaelmas 1703.

Following is from G.O. Manuscript 442, Freeman of Tipperary, 1776.

Thomas Hollonwood, Ballvgowan, page 12. (This might be Hollywood, which is an old Irish surname not related to our Hollin(gs)worth.)

We know nothing about the James or Thomas, but Joseph appears in some deeds, already published here, in Volume 1, on pages 59 & 60, dated 1726, 1728 and 1731, describing him as a merchant, residing on the north side of Pill Lane in the county. He appears to have had at least one child, Elizabeth Hollinsworth (sic) who married, 2 Dec. 1725 in St. Michan's Church, Dublin, William Hugon, brasier. (HR 1:69) Though it is presently dangerous to speculate farther, the last will of one Thomas Tolemin, Dublin, brewer, dated 3 Sept. 1708, proved 3 August 1723, (G.O. Ms. 250, p. 102; HR 2:71 item 29) names "daughter Elizabeth Hollinsworth, and granddaughter Elizabeth Hollinsworth." Seemingly, Tolemin's son-in-law was the above Joseph Hollinsworth, or Hollingsworth, and the grandchild referred to is the same who married William Hugon. (No Freeholders lists for Wexford or Wicklow survive.)

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T H O M A S   H O L L I N G S W O R T H   O F   T O M D U F F

Of the Parish called Killenagh (or, Killena) County Wexford, Ireland, gentleman farmer, he was born about 1740, (possibly, but we have no proof) in County Wexford, eldest child of John and Elizabeth Hollinsworth. He died 7 June 1822 at Tomduff, aged 82, and was buried 9 June in the old churchyard of the adjoining parish of Ballycanew and rests there along with his parents, one uncle, and all of his brothers.

He married, 1769, by Consistorial Licence, Diocese of Ferns, and probably at Ballycanew or Monomolin Church, ALICE OAKES, believed to be a daughter of William Oakes, Currachtubbin, Monomolin, County Wexford. She was born c1752, in Co. Wexford, died 18 July 1834, at Tomduff, aged 82; buried beside her husband. The great slab marking their resting place (about 6 feet by 3 feet and 6 inches thick) bears the following shallow-cut inscription:-

Beneath this stone lieth the remains of  
Thomas Hollingsworth of Tomduff, who departed  
this life 7 June 1822 aged 82.  
Also his wife Alice, departed this life  
18 July 1834 aged 82 years.

The first mention of this man is found in a deed of lease which his father executed to secure a farm at Tomduff adjoining his own home at Ballinakill. (Registered at Book 217, p. 80, No. 142770.)

JOHN LYNDON, Tomduffe in the County of Wexford, Esquire, of the one part, and JOHN HOLLINSWORTH, Ballynekill, said county, farmer, of the other part, dated in the year 1761 (no month or day given - Ed.) WHEREBY said JOHN LYNDON for the consideration therein mentioned, did

Demise grant set and to Farm lett unto the said JOHN HOLLINSWORTH, all that and those, that part of the Town and Lands of Tomduffe commonly called or known by the name of the Coppice and that part of the said lands called the Seven acres adjoining the town of Killenagh and the said Coppice, all bounded on the east by Killenagh, on the West by the River Ounevarra, on the north by the Road leading from Killenagh to Ballycanew, and on the south by that part of Tomduffe now in the possession of the said JOHN LYNDON, containing by Estimation Fifty Six acres, Situated in the Barony of Ballaghkeen aforesaid, To hold to the said JOHN HOLLINSWORTH his heirs and assigns from the Twenty fifth day of March next for and during the Lives of THOMAS HOLLINSWORTH and WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH both Sons of the said JOHN HOLLINSWORTH, and THOMAS TACKABERRY Son of EDWARD TACKABERRY of Kilnew in the said County, Farmer, under the yearly rent of nine shillings by the acre for each and every acre, the said to be paid on every 29 Sept. and 25th March. WITNESSED by LEONARD BENNETT, Ballycanew, saddler, and JAMES WHYTE, Cranecrower, Gent., both in County Wexford. Signed by JOHN HOLLINSWORTH (Seal). Registered 27 May 1762 at One half hour after 11: o'clock in the forenoon by said JAMES WHYTE. (NOTE: The additional life of Edward Tackaberry's son may signify that the Tackaberrys were related to John Hollinsworth. See HR 4:93.)

Thomas Hollinsworth took possession of this farm. A further lease dated 22 Feb. 1770 (Book 282 p. 388 No. 184224) between Thomas Sterne, Ballyfoley, farmer, and John Hollinsworth, is witnessed by "Thomas Hollinsworth of Tomduff, County Wexford, farmer." By this, we assume that all of his children were born there.

John Hollinsworth died at Ballinakill 12 May 1791. In his Last Will and Testament dated 30 Jan. 1786, proved 24 May 1791, he mentioned seven children, according to an abstract made before the original and copies perished. Though bequests were not abstracted, it is obvious that the 56 acre farm of Tomduff was left to the oldest son Thomas Hollinsworth. This holding would continue in possession of himself or his heirs until the fall of the three lives. His brother William, the last of the family, died 19 March 1827. Unfortunately we do not know when Thomas Tackaberry died. The family farmed at Tomduff and paid tithe under the Tithe Act, in the 1830s, but the name does not appear in the 1853 Valuation Book.

Alice (Oakes) Hollinsworth's parentage and earlier ancestry is tentatively plotted out. Here is a brief explanation of it.

William Oakes of Curraghtubbin, Monomolin, Co. Wexford, married Mary Rawson or Rowsome, by licence, in 1747. These are probably her parents. Marriage licences also appear for George, Robert, Samuel, Thomas, and two other Williams, among the Oakes family, after 1747. Surnames of brides include Dalton, Earl, Frayne, Goff and Rath. William Oakes was the brother of Theophilus Oakes, Brown St., Dublin, handkerchief stamper, whose will was proved in May 1763 in Prerogative Court. A sister was (according to the same will) Elizabeth, wife to Andrew Cummins. This couple marriage licence dated 1749, Dublin Diocese. Theophilus Oakes also mentioned his mother "Sarah, otherwise Burket or Burkit." A deed dated 2 Dec 1723, (38-433-24899 Registry at Henrietta Street) is from Daniel Oakes, Kilmechell, Co Wexford, to Robert Burkett, Dublin, Gentleman, lands in vicinity of Ballycanew. We therefore assume that Daniel Oakes was the husband of Sarah Burket,

these being the grandparents of Alice Hollinsworth. As for Alice's mother, Mary Rowsome, we cannot place her parentage, but we know the correct family. Samuel Rowsome and Margaret Hatton were married in 1680. This is the oldest Rowsome record we can find. The Hatton family was long associated in this part of Ireland, and with the Hollingsworths. Samuel Rowsome lived at Ballyart, Co. Wexford, and died before 1717, but was alive as of 10 January 1698, according to records of property leases. His Last Will is recited therein, but we have not found any record of a probate of same. (Some of the earliest books of Ferns Diocese were incomplete even before they were sent to Dublin. The portion before 1720 is included.) The deeds luckily recited the names of his sons, to wit: Samuel, Henry, James and William. Margaret, his Executrix, was related to Henry Hatton of Wexford town, Gent. a rather prominent official there. It is reasonable to assume that Mary Rowsome, wife of William Oakes, was a granddaughter of Samuel & Margaret (Hatton) Rowsome.

William Oakes died at Curraghtubbin in 1777, his will proved in Ferns Diocesan Registry that year (perished). In 1798, after the Rebellion, thirteen persons named Oakes applied for compensations for losses. (Commissioners Indexes, Vol. 10, p. 2248, P.R.O. Dublin.) They included Theophilus, Curraghtubbin, for "provisions", William, of same for corn etc., and Thomas of Coolook, Killena, for tools. Note that Thomas Oakes dwelt at Coolook. This townland joins directly to Tomduff townland. Now to return to the Thomas Hollinsworth family.

Thomas Hollinsworth obtained another lease of farmlands, 1 Feb. 1794, from Samuel Taylor, Dublin, silk manufacturer. The farm was at Ballywaltermore, in Killenagh Parish, being forty acres, three roods and nine perches. This lies near to Tomduff, bounded on east by the highroad, south by Lakeen river, west by Ownavarrá river, and on north and north-east by Ballywalterbeg, and the thorditches. The term of lives was for those of JOHN, WILLIAM and SAMUEL HOLLINSWORTH, all sons of Thomas, our subject, or for 31 years, rent £59.3.3d annually. The lease was registered by John Hollinsworth, Ballvcanew, shopkeeper, the brother of Thomas. (No date of registration. Book 504, page 9, number 324918.) This very fortunate record supplies us with names of three of his sons. Two of these are also named as lives in the lease dated 30 Sep. 1782, wherein Thomas' father renewed his lease on the lands of Ballinakill & Monroe, for the "lives of John Hollinsworth, Grand son of said John... then of age of 7 years... William Hollinsworth, another Grandson... then of age of 6 years..." (HR 4:87 et seq) This gives us age and approximate year of birth for two of them.

On 23 May 1798 the Rebellion broke out in County Wexford. A few days after, Ballvcanew village was taken by the rebels under the guidance of Michael Murphy, Roman Catholic priest who had served that village and used his chapel for seditious meetings for years. (At the battle of Arklow on 9 June, it is said that his head was taken off by an English cannon ball.) The shops, houses and farm properties of most of the Protestants in the parish were looted or destroyed. Some of the more helpless residents were shot or otherwise murdered in a most fiendish manner. Luckily, Thomas Hollinsworth escaped, though it is not known how, exactly, unless he fled to Dublin as did many. He applied for compensation on 22 Dec. 1798 for loss amounting to Two hundred and eighty four pounds, Sterling, for crops, farming utensils, and other items. The six-page file, including sworn attestations by

clergyman or J.P. to its veracity, perished. Until the record of the burial, this is the last record we have of Thomas Hollinsworth. Now we present a sketch of his children and grandchildren.

\*This child is not established by recorded proof. Some of the others are not completely sure. Note that the first two sons were named after their two grandfathers. This was a very old Irish custom.

Second Generation. Here are sketches of the families traced.

(1) JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, oldest son of Thomas & Alice. Born at Tomduff about 1772 or 1773; died 28 Dec. 1831, at Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford, aged 58. Buried at Ballycanew. Married, by Consistorial Licence, at Christ Church, Gorey, Co. Wexford, in 1804, SARAH MARIA BERNEY, (believed to be daughter of John Berney, Gorey, shopkeeper) who was born about 1788, Gorey; died 8 May 1849 at 14 Vauxhall Road, Liverpool, Lancashire, England, aged about sixty. John Hollingsworth was a soap boiler and tallow chandler. He lived a few years at Camolin, in Toome Parish, then, before 1808, the family moved to Enniscorthy. His widow proved his Will and on Dec. 8, 1836, assigned the house in Market Street, Enniscorthy (obtained for 33 years in 1818) to Patrick Doble. She moved to England to live with her son John Berney Hollingsworth.

He married, about 1812, a (?second) cousin, ESTHER HOLLINGSWORTH, (possibly a) daughter of Daniel and Ellenor (Graham) Hollingsworth, which Daniel was a first cousin of our subject, Thomas. Es-ther was born about 1788 (probably in Coolookbeg, Parish of Killenagh, County Wexford,) Ireland: Died 1 July 1863, Eaton, N.Y. aged 75. Buried beside husband. Marker.

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ADDITIONAL JONES FAMILY DATA

In our June issue, on pages 50 and 51, in the article, "The Jones Family Tragedy", we were without proof that Eliza Hollingsworth Varney was actually a grandchild of the murdered Samuel Jones of County Wexford. On August 26, 1969, we received in the mail, courtesy of the Toronto Yearly Meeting of Friends, in Canada, a small 8-page booklet, "Memorial of the Life of Eliza H. Varney," printed in 1917. Page 2 fortunately proves our speculations to be true:

"Eliza Hollingsworth Jones was born 9th month 30th, 1829, in the County of Prince Edward, Ontario. Her parents were John and Abigail (Cunningham) Jones.

"At the time of the Irish rebellion, it is stated that Eliza's grandfather, Samuel Jones, (our underscoring - Ed.) with his wife and brother, when returning from meeting were taken prisoners and the two brothers were shot, the wife standing between the two at the time. She was allowed to take the bodies home, and drove the conveyance. This account may be found in Irish history. When a young man her father came to Canada and settled in Prince Edward County." (Indeed a most satisfactory conclusion to a hard search!)

Death of Dr. Agar

We much regret to record the death, which occurred on Monday last, at his residence in High-street, of Dr. Frederick Agar. The deceased gentleman had not enjoyed the best of health for some time, but his relatives had no serious forebodings. He had been able to get about. At the end of last week, however, he was seized with a complicated attack of influenza, bronchitis and pneumonia, and despite the attentions of Dr. Morley Agar, his son, and Dr. Johnson, of Bush Hill Park, he passed away, after four days' illness, on Monday.

There are few, if any, better known in Ponders End than was the late Dr. Agar. He came to the village 44 years ago, and commenced to practice in a surgery in South-street, nearly opposite St. Matthew's Church. Ponders End was then only a rural village, with a population of under 1,000 souls, so that the deceased gentleman has witnessed very great changes. At that time there were many influential personages occupying the larger residences in the place. Trams, horse or electric were not in being; smiling fields existed where roads and houses are to-day, and Ponders End was a pleasant, quiet, residential place. Forty years ago Dr. Agar married Miss Sophia Dennison (error: Dennis - see p. 70, no. 5 - Ed.), of West Meath, Ireland, and he then removed to the house at the northern end of High-street, which he occupied right up to his death.

He was an excellent type of the family doctor. Outwardly, perhaps, stern looking, yet he had a most kindly heart, and the poorer members of the community in the neighbourhood have to thank the deceased gentleman for many generous actions. He was a clever surgeon, and many there are who owe their ability to get about and to earn their daily bread to Dr. Agar's skill.

The deceased gentleman leaves a widow, three sons - one of whom, Dr. Morley Agar, is a well-known throat specialist in London, and one daughter, with whom great sympathy is expressed in the village. Dr. Agar was 74 years of age. He held the diplomas of M.R.C.S. and M.R.C.P., and prior to coming to Ponders End he was associated with the late Dr. Hall, of Tottenham. He had held several public offices. He was for many years public vaccinator for Ponder End; he was certifying factory

surgeon for the district; and he was surgeon to the local Lodge of Oddfellows and the local Court of Foresters. His was a strenuous and a useful life, and his personality will indeed be greatly missed by the people at Ponders End.

The funeral will take place on Saturday at Enfield Highway Cemetery.

Family Note: The Brig "William" which brought Frederick Hollingsworth to New York from Dublin, manifest signed 20 July 1829, was not an Irish vessel, but an American one. National Archives Record Group Number 26 contains a "List of Crew" of this ship, dated 27 March 1829, which shows the ship was built and operated out of Thomaston, Maine, all but one of the seven members of the crew being Thomaston natives.

The ship was in America as of 27 March, 1829, and was in Dublin on 27th of May, when Thomas Wilson, U.S. Consul, certified that "all the American Seamen he brought into this Port, as pr. Certified list thereof, still continue to serve on Board said Vessel,--" On 16 July 1829, the crew list was again examined by Ben Wood, Inspector, at Staten Island. This means the ship did not land on 20th July as the manifest seems to indicate, but at least four days earlier. For a complete list of the passengers, see HR Vol. 2, pages 131, 132. To complete our knowledge of the people on board, here is the crew list.

He married (1) 19 June 1905, Green Bay, LINA WIGHT, daughter of Albert & Eliza (Baxter) Wight. She was born in Greenleaf, Wis., died about 1960 in Green Bay. Divorced. 1 child by this marriage.

He married (2) 6 Feb. 1916, Green Bay, MABEL NEWTON, daughter of W. H. and Lavina (Ham) Newton, No statistics known. Divorced. No ch.

He married (3) 22 Jan. 1942, Green Bay, MABEL STRECKENBACH, daughter of William and Minnie (Lindsay) Streckenbach, natives of Wisconsin. She was born (?) about 1901 in Green Bay, Wis., and was living at the time this information was obtained, in 1962. No children.

William R. Hollingsworth was found by Dr. Sam Hollingsworth in a railroad car full of orphan waifs, which was passing through Green Bay, and he went in and got him and took him home. That was about 1884. His real name is lost to our records. In adult life he was a food salesman. According to hearsay evidence, he cared little for his adoptive parents, or their history. His third wife certainly did not care to help us in our requests for information.

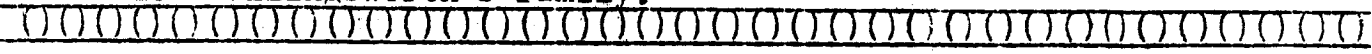

She married, 10 June 1910, Green Bay, FRANKLIN WALLACE, (parents names unknown) who was born 26 May 1885 in Germany; died 19 May 1939, in Green Bay, aged 53 years, 11 months, 23 days. Buried in Green Bay. Painter. By their four children, Mrs. Wallace is 11 times a grandmother, and once a great-grandmother, according to our 1962 record. She worked as a cook in hotels in Green Bay until retirement. Mrs. Wallace gave us most of our information about her adoptive parents, which we printed in our December, 1965, Hollingsworth Register.
