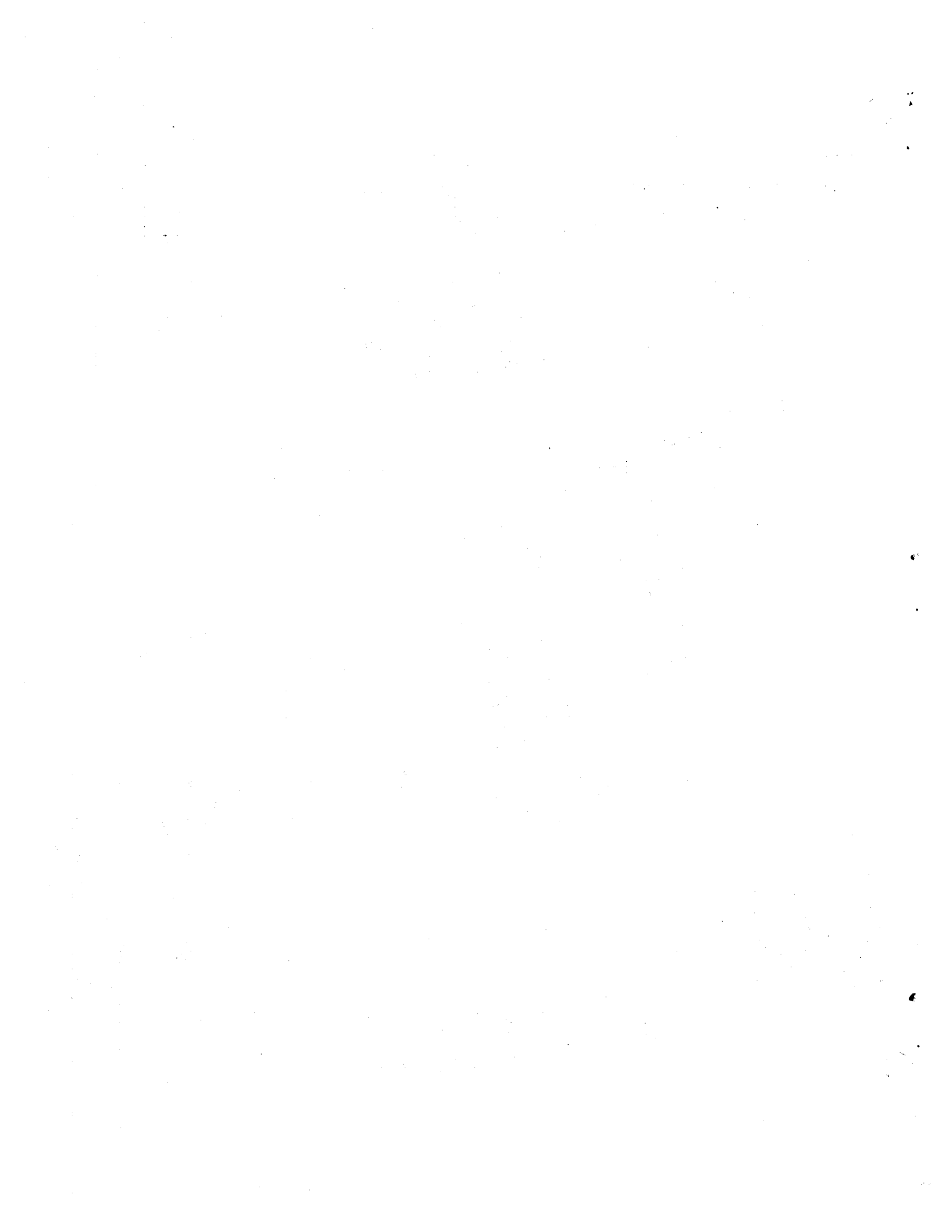

MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in north east Cheshire, of the same name, called in the Domesday Book "Holisurde," and pronounced "Hollis-worth" but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, not far from the city of Manchester. There are two other such place names, both in Lancashire, to the north-east of Manchester. It is possible that separate families sprang from the several places, bearing the same surname. The place in Cheshire was a bare waste in the time of Domesday (1086) and the first appearance of anybody using the name as a surname is in a charter of about 1215, where "Tomas De Holinewurth" is a signatory. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a holly bush or tree, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure or farmstead, are said to be the bases to the placename Hollinworth, meaning, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or "Holly Farm." In later years an "s" came to be used by some families, but that has not been found as a general rule earlier than about 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollinworth, Hollingworth, and Hollandsworth. These are to be found in the vital records indexes of Somerset House, London, from 1837, and city and telephone directories of many large cities of the world.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register began in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was then: To publish abstracts or verbatim copies of as many records of the family, world-wide, from the earliest times until the present day, as is humanly and financially possible. In the first seven volumes of 28 separate issues, about 34,000 items have appeared in this behalf, an average of about twelve hundred records or items being published in each single issue. The entire U.S. Census schedules from 1790 through 1850 for these surnames have been completed, and the 1860 census is now in progress. No other family has been thus served. About one million pages were covered in that search alone.

An Elusive Auction Catalog is Found

If all of life's ordinary goals were as difficult to attain as my genealogical goals are, life would be sheer misery. As some of you know, five out of eight of my great-grandparents were born in Ireland, and emigrated to America during the Great Famine period, four of them of the Roman Catholic religion. In twelve years' of constant research, I was able to trace none of their families in Ireland in any specific way, with some almost negligible exceptions. But my Hollingsworth's were "Protestant Irish," so-called, whose records are generally to be found in the Established Church, and whose status under British law insured them rights no Catholic or Presbyterian could own. Nevertheless, the awful destruction of the Public Records in Dublin in 1922 took care of the greater part of those fine records. Therefore, every one of the steps I have tried to take to trace them has involved great effort, zeal, stubborn determination, and money, to try to find substitute records, or those which happened to survive the fire. This Auction Catalog is one of those survivors. Here is a brief history of my difficulty in getting it into my hands:-

I first saw mention of "a printed rental" of the estates of the Earl of Mount Norris, in 1969. This was an incidental mention in a deed dated 1838. Previous research had elicited the facts that the Mount Norris estates had been put up for sale after a session of debts and mortgages, in 1836. They were sold at various times. These estates belonged to one of the most influential families in Irish history, the Barons of Altham, Earls of Anglesey, Viscounts Valentia, and Earls of Mount Norris, all being various titles held over a period of several centuries by its membership. There are still living today, a Viscount Valentia and an Earl of Anglesey, in England. I have corresponded with both of them in an attempt to obtain any records they might still hold in their private keeping.

At any rate, I deduced that if an auction took place, a printed rental catalog of necessity was used before and at the time of the sale or auction. But where to look for an extant copy? I already had purchased, in 1968, at great expense, films of the entire Anglesey collection held by the Bodleian Library at Oxford University, and, in 1969, most of the Mount Norris papers, from the National Library, Dublin. It is not among them. 'If it isn't there, it might be among the papers of the various purchasers,' I supposed.

The purchasers of the vast estates included three men of the family of Thunder, an old and respected Catholic family of Dublin, not of Irish origin, but English, who settled in the Pale before the time of Henry the Eighth. The name is derived from "Tun-ner" or "Tunder," an occupational surname for one who made wine casks, or "tuns" as they were called, or, simply, a barrel maker. Andrew Thunder had bought out the interests in the portion where my Hollingsworths lived. James Thunder had a small part intermixed there, and Michael Thunder bought some small lots farther to the south, toward Enniscorthy. Later, the Thunders, or their heirs, were also forced to sell parts of

the property. By that time, after 1849, the Incumbered Estates Court came into being, whose office was to pass the sales of such estates. The name was changed to Landed Estates Court in the fifties. When a case was closed out of this court, the records were placed in files and dockets. Until late in the nineteenth century, these were kept in the court itself, but ultimately were transferred to the Public Record Office in the Four Courts Building. They are designated "L.E.C. Deed Boxes," though the name is misleading: they contain much more than simply deeds of title to the estates in question. I started making enquiries at the Record Office. Bad news came in a landslide: The box marked "Andrew Thunder" had perished in 1922; so had boxes marked for his daughter Mary Thunder and his son in law Michael Richard O'Farrell. This seemed at first like the death knell on my efforts. But, hold: the box of Michael Thunder's papers had survived, with damage.

It was now a slim chance to get the elusive Auction Catalog. The portion of the estate purchased by Michael was indeed small, and none of my families except that of Abraham and Ellen (Hollingsworth) Parslow (or Paslow) of Ballyheddiack (Ballyhaddock) Ferns Parish, lived on the part he purchased. But now, I had to push ahead. I hoped frantically that papers dealing with more than Michael's portion might be included. That was in July, 1970. Upon writing again, I discovered that it was necessary, according to the officials in the Record Office, to obtain permission of the Registrar of the High Court in Dublin. I duly obeyed. The Registrar, upon reply, advised that no permission is, in fact, necessary; the records in the Public Record Office are public! But it served to waste a lot more time. By February of this year I forwarded (after having to obtain clearance here, too) a fee of eight dollars to the Genealogical Office, Dublin Castle, to examine the Box. It is numbered 835, which gives an idea of the size of the pre-1922 collection. I heard nothing until September, after I wrote asking the reason for such a delay. (Of course, I have had this happen dozens of times, but I wanted to appear "innocent" of all the epithets I was thinking privately about Socialistic Bureaucracy, etc.) Promptly - at long last - I got the report. The box contains marriage settlements and wills of the Anglesey family, and some recitals of ancient title deeds. It also contains a bundle of leases to the farms which Michael Thunder purchased. The Genealogical Office briefly described these. But they supplied a verbatim copy of the Calendar of this box, which contained one entry of an item they did not consider, namely: "Copies of Auction Catalog of Mountnorris Estates, 1836." I had asked them to look for "Rentels," which is the old term for Rent Rolls. The words "Auction Catalog" fooled them and they passed the item over! Immediately I contacted the Four Courts directly and sent one dollar for a "sample Xerox page" from the item. In a week it arrived airmail. It was, indeed, a rent roll. The page they chose did not tell me if the Hollingsworth portion was included, but the cost for a full copy was \$8.00 plus postage. In another two weeks the item arrived, the day after Thanksgiving, incidentally. Oh, yes, I had to send an additional eight dollars for the airmail postage! (It was a heavy package.)

The words "auction catalog" inspire the thought of furniture and household goods, chattels, and fixtures. Nothing of that sort is set out here, for the entire contents of these lots is to be sold. But the land and its inhabitants is set out, farm by farm, as you will see below, with good detail as to the original lessee, date of lease, and, of

the most importance, the names and ages of the persons in the lives. Yes, the Hollingsworth portion is here, and we are publishing the entire Ballycanew portion. It goes well to explain the Tithe Applotments of 1833, already published in our Volume 2, pp. 34 & 72; and the Primary Valuation completed in 1852, published in HR Vol. 4, pp. 11 & 58. In the Hollingsworth lots, I have added my comments in parentheses. Sixteen lots were sold at auction on Wednesday, 1 June 1836, at the Commercial Buildings, Dublin, commencing at noon. The annual value was set at £11,000. for 14,872 acres and 24 perches. Prospective bidders were advised to contact John Glascott, Esq., Banna Lodge, Camolin County Wexford, to view the property, or to see plans of the estates in the towns of Wexford, Camolin, Enniscorthy or Gorey, or at the Commercial Rooms, Exchange Coffee House, Dublin, under auspices of Messrs. Mahony, 48 Dame Street, or John Blennerhasset, Esq., 54 Lower Mount Street, both in Dublin. Lots were subject to prior sale by private contract, due notice to be given. I reproduce here, only Lot One in entirety, and the Paslow part of Lot 13.

Situate in the Barony of Gorey, containing together, one thousand four hundred and sixty-nine acres, three roods, and thirty-two perches, Irish Plantation Measure, or 2,381 acres, 13 perches, Statute Measure, the present annual rent, including duties, is £1,930. 7s. 2^d. Sterling, capable of very considerable improvement, comprising the following lands; Viz:-

(Note by H.F.: This lease is completely recited. Unfortunately it is one of the exceptions.)

Farm House; Offices, Out-Buildings, Gardens, and Land, in the Occupation of the Representatives of William Robinson, on Lease, dated 4th June, 1792, for Three Lives, aged about 61, 50, and 50 Years - 60-1-34 statute; 37-1-12 plantation, rent £23.... (faded out.) (Note by H.F.: This William Robinson was deceased long before 1836, probably died about 1800. His wife was Martha Hollinsworth, one of

- three daughters of John Hollingsworth of Ballinacill (1713-1791) and great great great grandaunt of me, the editor. An earlier lease dated 11 Oct. 1738, for 69½ acres here, was from the Earl of Anglesey to Richard Robinson, registered in book 203, p. 384, memorial number 155883, for the lives of Richard Robinson and Elizabeth his wife, and Hugh Bolger Jr., son of Hugh Bolger (or Bulger) of Ballinclery. From this it might be gathered that William was Richard's son; which is a quite valid assumption. This townland is standardized as Ballinclare in the Valuations of 1852.)
5. Farm House, Out-Buildings, Gardens, and Land, in the Occupation of William Fitzpatrick, on Lease, dated 10th Oct. 1818, for One Life, aged about 24 years, or a Term of Twenty-One Years, from 29th Sept. 1818. 6-2-13 statute; 4-0-10 plantation; L5-12-6d rent per annum.

Thomas was a son of Nicholas & Mary, baptised in 1804. HR 6:114. Maguire might be a relative or heir.)

NEVILLE'S COURT MANSION, situate at the east end of the village of Ballycanew, Comprising A Capital Family Residence, Recently repaired and improved, with Offices of all Descriptions, Out-Buildings, Gardens, Orchards, and Land, partly bounded by the River Ounavarragh, in the Occupation of the Reprs. of Thomas Jones, on Lease, dated 1st April 1817, for his life - since dead - and two other Lives, William Jones, aged about 38, and John Colly (since dead,) or 21 Years from 25 March 1817. 83-3-27 st. 51-3-9 pl. - TOWNLAND OF BALLYNAKILL AND PART OF MONROW

(Note by H.H.: The 1782 lease is registered in Book 378, at page 289, memorial number 252924, from Arthur Lord Viscount Valentia, to John Hollinsworth of Ballynakill, for the lives of his grandson John aged 7, his grandson William aged 6, and John, son of Nicholas Hollinsworth, aged 4. These two grandsons were practically without doubt the sons of his oldest son, Thomas Hollinsworth of Tomduff. This rental entry establishes that two are now dead, in 1836, which I had found to be true if my calculations were correct. John, son of Thomas, died at Ennis-corthy, a soap and candle maker, in 1831, aged 58. John, son of Nicholas, seems to be the same John buried at Ballycanew in 1802, aged 20 (he was more like 23). William, brother of John of Ennis-corthy, still alive in 1836, by whom this lease hung in the balance, went on living for eighteen more years, and died in 1854 at the age of 77. See HR Vol. 6, pp. 114, 117, 118. John, the 1782 lessee, died in 1791, bequeathing this farm to his youngest son Samuel Hollinsworth (1765-1815) my great great great grandfather, the one supposed to have lost his leg in the Irish Rebellion of 1798. Sam died and evidently left no will, whereby the above lot went in two equal moieties (halves) to his widow Ann and his eldest son John, the "representatives" above mentioned. The 1833 Tithe Books give this lot as to "Mrs." and John, with 40-1-34 acres plantation measure each, exactly half. This information is very satisfactory.)

(Note: This Samuel's parentage is unknown. I think he is the second son of William Hollingsworth of Cranecrower, born 1791. But when Sam died his age is omitted from the burial register in Ballycanew. See HR 6:118, number 85 of burials, buried 28 July 1851. His wife was Ann Smith, whom he married by licence in 1815. They had only one child, Mary Ann, who married George Ormsby at Ballycanew in 1841 (HR 6:117) and died before her parents. Ann the widow died in 1857, and the property went to the Ormsby grandchildren. For reasons I do not know, this townland of Bolinready, alias Ballinready, is valued with Boley townland in 1833 and also in the 1852 books. Samuel's residence, and Ann's, at their respective burials, are also designated Boley.)

55. A Farm House, Office, Garden, and Land, in the Occupation of Bartholomew Murphy, on Lease, 25 Aug. 1818, for One Life, aged about 29 years, or 21 years from 25 March 1818. 19-1-30 st., 12 acres pl. £11-10-9½ rent.
56. A Farm House, with Offices, Garden, and Land, in the Occupation of Felix Murphy, on Lease, 10 Aug. 1818, for same Life and term of years as No. 55. 16-0-32 st. 10 acres pl. £9-13-10 rent.
57. A Farm House with Offices, Garden, and Land, in the Occupation of John Murphy, on Lease, same as No. 56. 19-1-30 st., 12 acres pl., £11-10-9½ rent.
58. A Cabin, with Garden, in the Occupation of Widow Burn, at Will, 0-3-10 st., 2 roods pl., £2. rent.

TOWNLAND OF MONROW

59. A Farm House, Offices, and Land, in the Occupation of John Hollingsworth, on Lease, 1 January 1828, for one Life, aged about 16 Years, or 21 Years, from 29 Sept. 1827. 61-2-8 st., 37-3-27 pl., £49-10-0 Rent. (Note: Possibly John, of Ballinakil, born 1789, son of Samuel, as in Parcel 45. I guess at this because his son, Samuel, born in 1821, was then aged about sixteen. Notice that the rest of the occupants of this lot were holding on same lease.)
60. A Farm House, Offices, and Land, in the Occupation of Samuel Hollingsworth, on Lease same terms as No. 59. 24-1-24 st., 15-0-10 pl., £20. rent. (Note: Because there were more Samuels than even there were men named John, in this family, I cannot tell you who this Sam was, unless he was, like William of No. 61, a brother to John of Ballinakil, No. 59.)
61. A Farm House, Offices, and Land, in the Occupation of William Hollingsworth, on Lease same terms as No. 59. 11-3-23 st., 7-1-15 pl. £10. rent. (Note: This William is surely the brother of John, son of Samuel, who went to Wellington, Ontario, Canada, in the fifties. His descendants also say his father was wounded in 1798.)

The division is not in existence in 1852: Monroe (sic) is listed in three parcels at that time, Michael Dempsey with 25-3-12 statute; Edward Sinnott, with 37-2-34 ditto; and John Hollingsworth (of Ballinakill) with 96-3-20 ditto. The Tithe Books, 1833, give still two more parcels, which, in all likelihood, were already sold before this rental catalog was prepared, for the above acreage doesn't equal the total statute area of Monroe, which is 180-1-26 acres. These parcels are, "Mrs. Hollingsworth," holding 7-1-15 plantation measure (11-3-23 statute) same size as William's in No. 61, and John Hollingsworth, with 7-1-34 plantation, almost the same size as the others. The Tythe Books for Ballycanew Parish, registered in Liskenfere Vestry Minutes, (HR 6:120) list Eleanor Hollingsworth as holding in Monrow in 1817 and 1819. She was the widow of Daniel of Coolookbeg. (See The Arklow Hollingsworth Family, in these journals.) She may be the "Mrs." of 1833, for she lived until 1843.)

62. A Farm House, Offices, and Land, in the Occupation of Hugh Murray* on Lease, same terms as No. 59. 25-1-36 st., 15-2-34 pl., 121-10 rent. (Note *This name probably is Murray, which really is synonymous with Murphy, it being from McMorrogh, the old Co Wexford clan allied to the Kavenaghs. In 1746 when John Hollinsworth obtained his first sublease on the lands here, from John Colley of Ballywater, he was given the whole farm "except Mogue and Daniel Murray's holdings." In the 1833 Tithes, Elizabeth Murray holds 7-3-10 plantation acres. This is only some 11 acres statute, and again we have a puzzle.)

64. The School House and Land, (Charity) 1-(obliterated) st., 1 acre plantation measure, no rent paid. (NOTE: In 1852 the school was under auspices of the Church Education Society. This might be where my Frederick learned his singular style of penmanship. Private tutors were also in vogue, There should be more of them today, and our young ones wouldn't get into a public school full of dope and foul word users- or Evolution or Socialism bent teachers.)

TOWNLAND OF TOMAGADY

65. A Farm House, with Offices, Garden, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of the Representatives of Samuel Hollingsworth, on Lease, dated 4th June 1792, for Three Lives, then aged about Five, Three, and Eight Years, 17-2-27 st., 10-3-25 pl. 111-5-3 rent. (Note: This is most significant. The Tithes of 1833 shew this to be in the occupation of John Hollinsworth. He is the John of Ballinakill who died in 1877, my Frederick's older brother. Therefore, he was truly a representative of Samuel, being his oldest son and heir. Like all the other leases to Hollingsworths described here, except parcel 45, this lease was never registered. This John was just 3 in 1792, and perhaps he is one of the lives. But who were the others? That lease would be most valuable, if it could be found, or a fuller recital could be found.)

66. An excellent Farm House, with Offices, Garden, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of the Reprs. of Fossey Tackaberry, on Lease, 12 April 1794, for 3 lives, aged about 60, 56, and 46. 99-2-2 st., 61-1-29 pl. £55-11-7½ rent. (Lease not registered-H.) (Page 7.)
67. A good Farm House, with Offices, Garden, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of William Johnston, under a Lease, 4 June 1792, for 3 lives, aged 63, 62, and 59 years (One Life since dead), 87-0-18 st., 53-3-5 pl. £56-14-0 rent. (Note: This tells us that Rev. Fossey Tackaberry (1796-1847) the great Irish Methodist minister, was a son of Fossey Tackaberry of Tomagaddy, who died about 1799, who was a son of John Tackaberry the first lessee of 1738. (See: The Tackaberry Family, in HR Vol. 4, page 93 for full details) How? Because the above lease and acreage was granted to Fossey Tackaberry, 54 Irish acres, for lives of Fossey's sons, John, 23, George, 19, and William, 16, as of 1792. Fossey Jr. was by Jane Cranwill, wife of Fossey Sr., who probably was not the first wife. She married secondly, William Johnston, the now lessée, and he held this by right of his wife. They had a son Henry Johnston, half brother of Rev. Fossey, who married Eliza Hollingsworth of Ballinakill, John's daughter, in 1849.)
68. A Good Farm House, Offices, Gardens, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of Robert Tackaberry on Lease 4 June 1792 for 3 lives, 2 since dead, surviving life aged about 53 years. 72-8-31 st., 45-0-5 pl., at £47-2-9½ rent. (Note: Lease registered Book 468, p. 277; No. 301886, for 44-3-23 Irish acres, showing a re-survey in the interim. Lives were Benjamin, 23, Robert's son, Benjamin, son of William Tackaberry of Ballynasilloge, 12, both probably being the deceased lives, and of Robert, son of Richard Tackaberry of Ballincarageen, farmer, who probably was the survivor, the age nearly matching, he really being 56 in 1836.)
69. A Good Farm House, with Offices, Gardens, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of Samuel Tackaberry on Lease, 4 June 1792, for the Life of the Lessee, and two others, aged about 52 and 50; 61-0-32 st., 37-3-5 pl., £40-3-3 rent. (Lease not registered-H.)
70. A Good Farm House, with Offices, Gardens, Out-Buildings, and Land, in the Occupation of William Tackaberry, on Lease, 4 June 1792, for his life, and two others, one since dead, and the other aged about 47 years. 52-3-29 statute measure, 32-2-28 Irish plantation measure. £34-18s 4½d rent. (Note: Registered 477-207-301664, being given as 33-1-1 Irish acres, life of said William, Benjamin his son, 12 (this is the Ben in the life in No. 68, William held part of Ballynasilloge then) and William Bryan, son of Jacob Bryan, Ballynastud, Co Wexford, aged 4, in 1792, aged 47 in 1836. All these Tackaberrys are either sons or grandsons, of John of Tomagaddy who first leased this farm in 1738. The family evidently came from near Pillaton, Cornwall, before 1669.)

TOTAL OF LOT 1: 2,381-0-13 Statute Acres; or 1,469-3-32 Irish Plantation measure Acres; Total Rent: £1,930-7-2½d. per annum payable.

THE FOREGOING ESTATE is situate in the Manor of Nevill's Court, formerly called Ballyconnow (sic), and is bounded on the North and East, by the Rivers Ounavarragh and Brackerna, and intersected by fine Streams of Water. The Village of Ballycanew Has been materially Improved since the granting of the Leases, and many New Houses have been built.

Abraham died not long afterward, for, in a further sale rental, dated 6 July 1852, this parcel is held by "Mrs. Ellen Paslow, widow of Abraham Parslow"(sic) 55-0-15 acres statute, at £36. rent. Lease on all this property was under lease for the life of one Richard Donovan.)
- 299. Ditto, in occupation of Robert Paslow. 53-1-21 st., 32-3-32 pl. £34. rent.
- 300. Ditto, in occupation of John Howland, 40-0-29½ st., 25-1-28 pl. £22. rent.

A branch of this family came to Hoboken, New Jersey, and some of the members were well known funeral directors there. Nicholas Hollingsworth, brother of Mrs. Parslow, had a son William who lived there. The Parslows are from England, possibly Somerset. A Cromwellian soldier named Thomas Parslow settled here before 1700 and was a tenant of Baron Altham in 1713, having 203-1-0 acres by lease from 1688. (Rental, 1713-14, Ms DD Valentia a10 Bodleian Library.)

In all, a very satisfactory piece of family history, don't you think?

Wexford, which Laurence Donally, Darby Levinton (?), John Tool, Mary Connor and Anne Summers now or lately held under us, being 30 acres, with houses, gardens, at yearly rent of L1-2-9d for the lives of Michael Connoran son of Laurence Connoran of Mokele (?Macoyle- Ed.) said county tanner, now 15 years old, Thomas Hall, son of the late John Hall of Ballinacree who was killed by the rebels in the late Rebellion, aged 15, and Sarah Connoran, wife of said Laurence. Witnesses: John Conyers, Gorey, Linen weaver, and DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH, Coolookbeg, said County, farmer. Memorial witnessed by same men, Daniel Hollingsworth swore 27 March 1802, before James Lee, Commissioner, (Attorney.)
- (2) 638-402-442050. Lease, dated 24 March 1803, whereby John Robinson of Ushers Quay, Dublin, merchant, let to John Borbadge (or Borbridge) of Powerstown, Co Dublin, farmer, part of the lands of Coolook (Ed: Coolookmore) Co Wexford, in the possession of William Sparrow, being 45a 3r, in the Barony of Ballaghkeen, for the natural life and lives of this said John Robinson, and Martha Robinson, his mother, and Elizabeth Robinson, his sister, aged about 20 years, at yearly rent of L07-4-2d per annum. Witnesses, George Carroll, Gent., and William Egan, both of Dublin. (Note: Martha was the daughter of John Hollinsworth, Ballinakill, (d. 1791) and notice the witnesses' names here. Ed.)
- (3) 659-184-454282. Lease dated 9 July 1811, between Ambrose Moore, Dublin, Esqr., of one part, and John Robinson of same, merchant, of other part. Reciting that said A.M. for the considerations mentioned did demise to said J.R. all that and those that house & Concerns 24 Ushers Quay together with the large warehouse fronting the lane that runs from Ushers Street to Dog & Duck Yard, at the rere of said Concerns, now in possession of Messrs: Lynch & Bourke, bounded on the East by the said Ambrose Moore's Holding, on west by the Wool brane (sic) & the Concerns on the north by Ushers Quay aforesaid and on the South by the Lane or Street which runs from Usher St. to Dog and Duck Yard, containing from front to Rere 140 feet and in front about 162 feet... To Hold unto said J. R. his Exrs. etc. from the 1st day of May which will be in the year 1815 for and during the term of 190 years at the yearly rent of L60 payable half yearly, and reciting that said Robinson his Exors. Adors. & Assigns might Surrender the said premises every 3d year of sd. term, by giving Six months previous notice in Writing of such Intention... which said memorial etc. respectively witnessed by Edwd Hallingsworth (sic) & George Carroll, both of Dublin, Gent. JOHN ROBINSON (Seal). Signed & sealed in presence of Geo. Carroll, Edwd Hallingsworth. Above named Edwd. Hallingsworth and saith the name Edward Hollansworth is this deponent's proper name and handwriting - E. Hallingsworth. 7 April 1813.

- (4) 654-415-451466. Lease dated "1814" from Ambrose Moore, Dublin, Esq., to George Carroll, Dublin, Gent. House at No. 23, Ushers Quay, Dublin, Bounded on the West by John Robinson's Concerns, and on the North by Ushers Quay. Witnesses: Edwd. Hollingsworth and William Egan, both of Dublin, and they also acted as witnesses to the Registered Memorial, registered 18th January 1813. (sic) William Egan swore.
- (5) 654-415-451467. Mortgage dated 18 January 1813, between George Carroll, of Dublin, Gent., and John Robinson of Dublin, Merchant. Property on the south side of South King Street near St. Stephens Green, in the said city containing 176 inches (sic) bounded on the north by the King's Parliament, on the South by concerns belonging to Mr. James Blair, coach spring maker, on West by Mr. Holmeses House, on the East by a House belonging to Thomas Haydon AND ALSO: Property on Ushers Quay, in Dublin, #23 bounded on west by John Robinson's concerns, for consideration of £ 490.15s by John Robinson, for the remainder of the terms of years involved in the leases, etc. Witnesses: Edwd Hollinsworth and William Egan, both of Dublin. Memorial witnessed by W. m. Egan and Edwd. Hollinsworth. Registered and sworn 18th Jan. 1813, by E. Hollingsworth. (sic)
- (6) 670-275-461316. Assignment of () January 1814, by John Robinson, Dublin, merchant, of one part, and George Carroll of same, Attorney at law of 2nd part, and James Beatty, Ballycanew, County of Wexford, flour merchant, of the 3d part. RECITING an Indenture of Lease, 29 Sept. 1812, by Ambrose Moore, Dublin, Esquire, to said George Carroll, of a House number 23 Ushers Quay, Dublin, and RECITING ALSO a Mortgage dated 18 January 1813 by G. Carroll to said John Robinson of property on South King Street and in Ushers Quay, for £690 (sic) NO. This Indenture Witnesseth, said George Carroll and said John Robinson, did for the considerations named therein (not named here - Ed.) make over unto the said James Beatty, the concerns at # 23 Ushers Quay, bounded west by John Robinson's concerns, east by Mr. McDonnell's holdings, on South by the lane which runs from Usher Street to Dog & Duck Yard, containing 17 feet front to rere, and in front about 16 feet - TO HOLD for the residue of the term of 185 years. Witnesses: Esther Ann Norton, spinster, and John Taaffe, both of Dublin, the latter an Attorney, and the registering Memorial witness.

(Comment by Editor: We forgot to mention that John Borbridge, of Item Number 2, may be a cousin of said John Robinson. While Martha Hollinsworth married William Robinson, her sister Elizabeth married Edward Borbridge, or Burbidge, residence unknown, in 1779. (HR 1:69 E 1) James Beatty, Ballycanew, miller, had figured also in a Deed of 4 Dec. 1792 (HR 1:61 item 18) as landlord to John Hollinsworth, Junior, the brother of these girls Martha and Elizabeth. John Robinson even then was in Dublin, and he signed the lease assignment, which, incidentally, was a matter in the estate of John Hollinsworth, Senior, who died in 1791. John Robinson married Lydia Carroll, dau. of George, in 1806, at St. Thomas, Dublin. Edward Hollingsworth probably was serving as Robinson's apprentice to the paper trade, for, in the twenties, he had a paper factory in St. Michael's Hill (Street) about a block from the Ushers Quay warehouse. He married Alice Cooke in 1825 and died without issue intestate before 1836. (HR 6:152 et seq.)

(etc.) ... In Consideration of the sum of £160 paid by JOHN ROBINSON, Kiltalown, Co Dublin, Esq., paid unto the Bank of Ireland to the account of said Commissioners, to the credit of the Estate of Thomas Richards and Christopher Hume Lawder his assignee, Owners, Ex parte Charles Malone Trustee of Camell Loughman, Petitioner, did grant to said Robinson, said 4 acres, 2 roods and 7 perches in Town of Killena, To Hold for life and lives of said Thomas Richards, Samuel Richards and HRH Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, with covenant of perpetual renewal, subject to rent and renewal fines. Witnesses: Michael O'Loughlin, assistant Secretary to said Commissioners, of Henrietta Street, Dublin, and of Oliver Richard Lambert of York St., ditto.

Comment: John Robinson above was Eldest son and heir to John Robinson the merchant, and grandson of William and Martha (Hollinsworth) Robinson of Ballycanew. (See page 135 item 4.) As such, John Robinson of Kiltalown was Landlord to his cousin, Daniel Hollingsworth of Coolockmore, Killena, and to his widow Catherine, for he also fell heir to the property recited above in item 2.

The Sad Case of James Annesley

Sir Walter Scott is said to have written "Guy Mannering" after hearing of this tragedy. In one of the most sensational Peerage cases of all time, the following incidents were related.

Lord Altham, heir presumptive to the earldom of Anglesey, was induced by his brother Richard, afterwards the sixth Earl of Anglesey, to allege that his son (Lord Altham's son) James Annesley, was dead, in order to borrow on the reversionary interest in the estates of Lord Anglesey. James was the only child, and was then kidnapped in Dublin, dragged on board a ship and sold virtually as a slave on a plantation in America, where he was kept for thirteen years. Meanwhile, his fa-

ther died, and his uncle succeeded to the Earldom, and entered upon the vast estates - to become the landlord of John Hollinsworth of Ballinakill - in Ireland. But James Annesley escaped from the captivity came to England; enlisted support from friends, and confronted his uncle. Richard proposed a compromise, but at that time, fate intervened. James Annesley accidentally shot and killed a man to whom he had no enmity. Richard tried to get his nephew convicted of willful murder, and even expended large amounts of money to secure that end. But James was acquitted in triumph. Then came a great Ejectment action brought against Anglesey by this unfortunate heir. It was tried in Dublin in November, 1743, and lasted a fortnight. James won, but the verdict was set aside by a writ of error. Before the new trial was brought on, James Annesley died, without issue, and so Richard the Earl of Anglesey continued on undisturbed in his possessions! His son was Arthur Lord Viscount Valentia, Lord Mount Norris, of Camolin Park, County Wexford, in whose troop of Yeomanry Militia, The Camolin Cavalry, the Hollinsworths served. The sequestration we published in HR Vol. 6, at page 155, of the whole of Richard's estate, may deal with this very case. All 240 tenants are listed in that Chancery Bill, dated 3 March 1743. (From: The Irish Law Times, March 2, 1912, page 56.)

The Arklow Hollingsworth Family

Samuel⁴ Hollingsworth, believed to be the second son of John³ & (?) Hollingsworth of Cronelusk, Arklow, Co Wicklow, Ireland, was born about 1803, probably at Cronelusk or Springfield, Arklow, and died 12 Dec. 1865, in Traverse City, Grand Traverse County, Michigan, U.S.A. aged about 62. He was buried in Oakwood Cemetery in the Hollingsworth plot, where children, and his second wife Hannah are also buried, but the books of the cemetery do not show his burial; family letters indicate the second wife was buried "next to father." He was a farmer, laborer, and lumber mill man.

He married (1) 20 Feb. 1827, in Inch Parish Church, Co. Wexford, Ireland, by Consistorial Licence, Ellenor Hempenstall, daughter of George & Catherine Hempenstall of Ashwood, Inch. She was baptised at Inch Parish 29 Oct. 1807 (Editor owns film of the registers) and was last known to be living in 1871 (Census of Canada-1871) at Escott Township, Leeds County, Ontario, Canada. Issue: eleven children.

He married (2) - marriage not located - in lifetime of his first wife, signifying either a divorce or bigamy or concubinage, location unknown, Hannah Dutton, who was born about 1821, in Ireland or Canada; died Tuesday, 30 April 1889, in Traverse City, Michigan, aged 67. She is buried in the City Cemetery, called Oakwood Cemetery, in Lot 131, Flat I, purchased by her "prior to 1878," according to a letter from City Clerk, Traverse City, dated 10 May 1968 to the editor. Issue of this marriage 3 children.

This sketch should be understood to be tentative until more proof can be found. The facts above, of course, are genuine, and documented, except in regard to the second marriage.

- 7) Daniel, b. c1841 (baptism says '1841') no other information except he lived and died in Ontario, had a son George Hollingsworth who lived at one time in Colborne, Ontario.
- 8) Catherine, age 19 in Census of 1861. No other information. (HR1:191)

(1) Sophronie before 1919, and (2) Margaret, who survived him. No issue. Ed. stood 6'2" and weighed 190 lbs.
- 13) Thomas, born about 1860; alive in 1900 living at 3751 Wallace St., Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. a licensed engineer. (He wrote to John his half brother (No. 6) in 1904 asking about an estate which was being processed in Ireland, and wondered if they were related to an Annie Gainfort, a Charlotte James, or a Lizzie Gorman. The first two are children of John Hollingsworth, Cranacrower. Apparently a notice appeared in a Chicago paper in 1904. (Letter in keeping of Nora Gray.) No other particulars, had a daughter Hazel Hollingsworth, aged 10, in 1900. His wife was Cora.
- 14) Hannah, born about 1862-3, alive in 1901. Married (1) Mr. Avery, with issue Avery, 5 children, four living 1900, (2) Delbert Hartwick, and lived at Newberry, Ince Co., Michigan (Letter of 4 April 1901) had 1 boy Emmett Hartwick, born 1899. By first marriage: Fred Avery, b. 1880; Mamie Avery, b. c1882; Della Avery, b. c1887, and Georgie Avery, born 1891, all alive 1901.

Samuel Hollingsworth, Sr., was raised in Arklow Parish. He worked, no doubt, as a common laborer and farmer, but we suspect that he worked on the Hopenstall farms at Ashwood and Scarnagh, in the par-

ish of Inch, where he met Ellen, who was a sister in law of his older brother William Hollingsworth, who had married Eliza Hempenstall. The Hempenstalls traditionally followed not only farming, but the trade of blacksmithing. There are no baptisms of Ellen, Mary or Eliza in Ireland, in the Inch registers, which suggests they were taken to Arklow for baptism, whose registers perished in 1922.

As the Napoleonic War period ended, the economy of Britain slumped, and a wave of emigration began. The Hollingsworths, like others, had no land under lease, and were forced to seek employment, if it could be got. Or, emigrate! Therefore, Samuel Hollingsworth and his brothers Thomas and Dan, went out, as they say, about 1835, and settled where so many Protestant Irish already were, in the Johnstown District of Upper Canada. The 1851 Census returns supply ages and places of birth which establish that 1835 or 1836 was the time of the arrival. The early census rolls for Escott Township for 1841 list the family:

Samuel Hollingsworth, 2 males over 16; 2 males under; 2 females over 16; 5 females under. All members of Church of England.

This fits well. The 2 males over 16 were Samuel and his unmarried brother Daniel, who lived with him. Their first deed shows that. The two under 16 are probably the sons William John, and Daniel. The five females under 16 are the daughters Ellen, Mary, Eliza, Jane & Esther. One of the older females is Ellenor, Sam's wife. The "extra" female is unaccounted for.

Samuel and Daniel Hollingsworth bought 235 acres, 175 uncultivated and 60 under cultivation, for £548.6s, on 29 May 1843, from John Shuter of Middlesex, England. (HR 6:40, items 1 & 6.) The land is in Concession 1, Lot 15, Escott Front. Sam's brother Thomas had a farm in the same Concession and Lot. On 8 Feb. 1848, Dan sold (quit-claimed) his moiety or half to Samuel, for £270, or half the cost. He about that time married the widow Ellen Hyde, nee Manning, a Roman Catholic. We will speak of this later.

It is a great puzzle why Sam does not appear in the 1851 census. (HR 1: 189) Deeds as late as 1856 show him selling land with his wife Ellen as co-signer, part of this very lot, in fact. Again, he is absent in the 1861 enumeration. That is why we cannot fix his exact year of birth or age. He does not appear anywhere in Michigan in 1850 or 1860, according to our search of the U.S. Census, either! He may have visited the gold fields in California, leaving his wife a "California Widow," as they were called. Ellen is listed both times as "widowed." This, too, doesn't make sense. We suspect either a divorce, or a polygamous marriage. Sam was to die intestate, and his Administrator was his son William John (simply called John), in File 45, Calendar 51, Probate Court, Traverse City, Ledger p. 22, 1866. Heirs were listed as John, Edward, Thomas, and Hannah Hollingsworth, and Perry Hannah. None of the other children by the first wife except John, were listed! John probably represented them. Harry Hannah was a wealthy pioneer, and banker, in the Grand Traverse Region. Samuel had worked for him in his lumber mills until his death. He was in debt to Mr. Hannah, apparently. Since both his wives survived him, we must assume that he either divorced Ellen, or deserted her.

It is to be noted that Samuel was more prolific than his father John Hollingsworth. John had 9 sons and a daughter. There were no evident ill feelings between the siblings from the two marriages. Mrs. Gray extracted letters exchanged between W. J. Hollingsworth in Canada and his half-sister Hannah Hartwick, very cordial and loving.

One rather mystical note will end this treatise. There was, in Civil War days, at Plum Hollow, in Ontario, a famous soothsayer called "The Witch of Plum Hollow," and for a note about her, see Leavitt's History of Leeds & Grenville. Mrs. Gray recounted this story about her and the Hollingsworths:

"I have a story that my grandfather, John, and his brother Dan came over from Traverse City, Michigan, by horse, to Plum Hollow, to buy more horses, and stopped off at the "Witch of Plum Hollow," a fortune teller, and had their cups read. She told them of a death in their family which concerned the both of them. They returned home to Michigan where they learned that their father, Samuel, had taken ill with a hernia attack. His own good doctor couldn't be located, and so he died within three or four days."

Stranger things have happened!

BANKRUPT. -- MANDATE -- A creditor is not bound to accept of a composition in consequence of his traveling-agent having acceded to it.

ALEXANDER GRAY, the rider, or travelling-agent, in Scotland, of Samuel Hollinworth, Manufacturer at Stayley, near Manchester (in England - Ed.) was persuaded by Hutchison Dunbar, merchant in Edinburgh, to lend him L. 150 of the cash which he had recovered in Scotland, for behoof of his constituent. For this sum Mr Dunbar granted a bill, payable to Gray, at three months from 1st February 1809.

Dunbar having become insolvent, Alexander Gray attended the meeting of his creditors, and, for himself and Mr Hollinworth, agreed to a composition on the debt.

Mr Hollinworth, nevertheless, soon after brought an action for the full amount of the debt. Dunbar opposed the claim, on the ground, that the accredited agent of the pursuer had agreed, at a meeting of creditors, to accept of a composition on the part of his constituent.

The Lord Ordinary repelled the defences, and the Court adhered to his Lordship's interlocutor, on the ground, that the powers of a travelling-agent, of the description to which Gray belonged, do not extend the length of binding his constituent to accede to a composition.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN, the first day of Aprill, Anno Dni 1573: and in the xvth yeare of the Raigne of our most dread Sovereigne Lady Elizabeth, by the grace of god of England ffrance and Ireland Quene defender of the faith (etc.) I, REIGNOLD HOLLINGWORTH of Stondon in the Countie of Essex gent whole of mind and perfect remembrance thanks be to god, do ordaine make and declare this my Last will and testament for and concerning my goodes cattells Lands and moveables in manner and forme following ffirst I bequeth my soule to almightie god my maker and redeemer thereof and my bodie to be buried when it shall please god me to depart this present life. Also I giue and bequeth vnto Elene my wiffe Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth my cosins all my goodes cattells and moveables saving to Elene

my sayd wife I do giue and bequeth all her Jewells and linnen and rayment, and one carpet of nedleworke of her owne making yf it may be borne leving to my sayd two cosins some reasonable portion of my goods and cattells. Also I giue and bequeth to my sayd Cosins Lawrence Hollingworthe and William Hollingworth all that my free chappell in Stanford le Hope in the Countie of Essex which I bought of Sr Thomas Golding by the name of of (sic) Thomas Goldinge esquire and of Walter Cely esquire with the appurtenances. To have and to hold to the sayd Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth and to the heires for ever after the death of Elene my sayd wife. Also I do giue and bequeth to the sayd Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth my cosins my tenements with the appurtenances lying and being in Stanford le Hope aforesayd which I bought of M^r Richmond the Herald at armes, To haue and to hold to the sayd Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth and to the heirs for ever after the decease of Ellene my sayd wiffe. Also I giue and bequeth to the sayd Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth my sayd cosins all those my houses and tenements lying and being in Barking with the appurtenances which I bought of Adam Purvey to have and to hold to the sayd Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth my sayd cosins and to their heires for ever after the death of Ellene my sayd wiffe. And of this my present testament and last will I do ordaine and make my executors Ellin my wiffe my cosin Henry Maykes als Pope my sayd cosins Laurence Hollingworth and William Hollingworth. And I do giue and bequeth to my sayd cosin Henry Maykes als Pope my damaske gowne furred with Jennetts and all his costs about the travell and paines of this my testament and last will. PROBATUM fuit hmoi (huius modi - Ed) Testamentum coram Mgro Johanne Hamond legum Doctore Reverendi pris Dni Edwini London Exi. Vicario in spualibus generali et nono die mensis Maij Anno Dni 1575 Juramento Laurentij Hollingworth vnus executoris et Cui commissa fuit Admio et de bene et Jurat et Saluo iure cuiuscues et salua et reservata potestate alter Executor cum venerint et. (Proved 9 May 1575 by Laurence Hollingworth, one of the Executors, saving the right of the other...)

(From Wills, Bishop of London, Volume 5, p. 214. This will fills a gap which seemingly occurred while searching the records at Chelmsford Record Office (via film and publication, of course) where other members of the family have their testaments stored. See HR Vol. 3, p. 130. Those are all of much later periods.)

The Victoria History of Essex, Vol. IV (1956) p. 242 explains: (Under Ongar Hundred, Stondon Massey) "Rainold Hollingsworth (sic) (d. 1573) a wealthy resident of Stondon, was one of the royal commissioners for dealing with church goods under Edward VI. His brass is in the parish church. (Citing Reeve's Stondon Massey, p. 186.) He may have held a lease on the Manor of Stondon Massey. (ibidem, p. 243) The monuments in the church include ... notable sets of brasses ... The second, now on the north wall of the nave, was formerly in the chancel: it is to

Rainold Hollingworth, 1573, and shows him in armour with his wife beside him. This is a palimpsest*on earlier Flemish brasses, the patterns of which survive on the backs of the figures. This cites an illustration on p. 106 of Stondon, by Reeve. *A Palimpsest is a re-written parchment roll, over an older text; or, in this case, an old brass (statue) figure has been reformed into images of Rainold (or Reignold) Hollingworth and his wife Ellen, of Stondon Massey.

7 Sept. 1668, Andrew Hollinsworth & Jane Barton, both of Warrington, married. (Vol. 106, p. 22, Parish Register Society of Lancashire, being a parish about five miles from the centre of Liverpool. See further for this family's records in Warrington Parish Registers, HR Vol. 1, pp. 88, 89. It seems poor Jane died in the next year, buried 14th Sept.1669 at Warrington.)

Talbot County, Georgia - Marriages

Examined in January of this year on microfilm, 32433 part 1, Salt Lake Genealogical Society films. These are Marriage licenses and returns, covering the period 1828-1867, beginning of the county to end of book C, or, books A, B, C, in entirety. Book A is from 1828-1843, indexed only by surname of Groom. Had to be read page by page to get Hollingsworth brides. Book B, 1844-1852, has printed forms for each page; in large scroll design, wasting a lot of space. Complete direct and reverse (i.e. groom and bride) indexes. Book C, 1852-1867, is like the first book. Mr. William B. Hollingsworth, Route 5, Box 48, Gordo, Alabama, 35466, is the guiding spirit behind research into this family, an interesting one which served the country well, including the ministry, and in the Civil War. These marriages had not been seen before. Perhaps they will help many others. If any reader knows the names of the parents of Israel, James, George and Jonathan, named below, please write to Mr. Hollingsworth immediately. Thank you.

Concluded. Comments: "Arnold" Hollingsworth is doubtless James of number 3, in his second marriage. He appears in the census as "James A. Hollingsworth." See 7:63. He moved into Alabama not long after 1850. Jonathan and Israel did likewise. George appears to be a 4th member of the same family, and perhaps Mary J. Glanton is their sister. George appears in the 1860 Census in our present volume, page 66, residing in Randolph County, Alabama. We missed him in 1850, or the census taker did. In the above marriage books we also found entries for William Story and Sarah Carter, 13 Dec. 1840 by Nathan Bessey, "S.G.C." (?) and for Mary Story and William Bond, 26 Oct. 1834 by Hiram Powell, Minister of the Gospel. These are relations of Diana L. Story.

Other Georgia Marriages

These have been collected from several sources, films of marriage books of Georgia Counties, and the main body of them is from "Georgia Pioneers," a most outstanding quarterly of Georgia sources, wills, marriages (thousands and thousands of them) and deeds, tax digests & census, in an unending flow. Calhoun County

Byron Wood, of Anniston, Alabama, collected these Hollingsworth records and sent them to Mr. Douglas R. Hollingsworth of New York City, to whom we owe thanks. So little is published for either Alabama or Mississippi that when and if films are made, as in Georgia, we feel a great many questions will be answered.

The name of this county is Calhoun, but it was named Benton from the beginning to 1857 or 1858. The Union army was on its way to burn the

countryside, as it is told, the records at the Jacksonville courthouse were loaded on a train which was headed for Talladega, and, when it arrived, it was burned! But some marriage books and wills were found to have been left behind in safety in Jacksonville. Here are some of "our kin" in them.

Levi Henry Hollingsworth

Of Derry Church, was born Dec. 12, 1858, in Union Deposit, Dauphin Co., Pennsylvania, and is a son of Henry Hollingsworth, and a grandson of Levi Hollingsworth, who came from Philadelphia and settled near Derry Church. He was thrice married, and by his first wife he

was the father of six sons and two daughters who all moved to the west. His second wife bore him three children: Henry, of whom later, Elizabeth, born December 2, 1819, wife of Samuel Henry, no issue. Susan, born Oct. 24, 1821, died single.

Henry Hollingsworth, son of Levi Hollingsworth, was born in 1817, and received a common school education. For a number of years he engaged in boating on the canal, and for some time was a merchant and grain-dealer at Union Deposit. He built the large brick warehouse now owned by George Focker. During the civil war and after he served as postmaster of Union Deposit. His political affiliations were with the Republicans, and he took a prominent part in community affairs. He was a member of the Lutheran church.

Mr. Hollingsworth was twice married; his first wife bore him one daughter, Elizabeth, wife of Jacob Honnafijs, of Lebanon. His second wife, Catharine (Warner) Hollingsworth, who became the mother of the following children: 1. Emma Jane, deceased, buried in Penbrook cemetery, was wife of Evans Geary, had seven children: Evans, Anna, Edward, Clara, Jane, Mabel and James. 2. Levi Henry, of whom later. 3. Christian Ellsworth, engineer of the Pennsylvania & Reading Railroad Company at Rutherford's yards; married (first) Anna Kunkel, (second) Nettie — ; children by first marriage: Le Roy, Harry, deceased; and twins who died in infancy; by second marriage, three children. 4. Clara, wife of Elwood McClure, of Harrisburg, had four children: Maud, Ralph, Edna and Gertrude, the third and fourth deceased. The second wife of Mr. Hollingsworth died at the early age of thirty-six.

Levi Henry Hollingsworth, son of Henry and Catharine (Warner) Hollingsworth, was educated in the schools of Dauphin county. He was but a child at the time of the death of his father, and was brought up in the hospitable home of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Henry. Mr. Henry served twenty-five years as justice of the peace. At the age of twenty-one Mr. Hollingsworth became a teacher, and has made educational work his chief occupation, teaching in all about twenty-three terms; three terms in the Landis school, one term in the Centerville school, Lower Swatara township, one term in the Highspire school, four terms in the Rockbridge school, four terms in the Clevner school, two terms in the Gingrich school, two terms in the Knowledge Hill school, two terms in the Gravel Hill school, two terms in the Derry school, one term in the Vian school, and one term each in the Palmyra school and the secondary school at Derry Church. He also served in the stock room of the shoe factory of William L. Kreider & Sons. In the spring of 1903 he was elected justice of the peace of Derry Church for a term of five years. He belongs to Lodge No. 1132, Independent Order Odd Fellows, of Palmyra, and is a charter member of Lodge No. 705, Patricitic Order Sons of America of Hershey. He also belongs to the Old Derry literary Society. He is a member of the United Brethren church, in which he has served as steward, class leader and superintendent of the Sunday school.

Mr. Hollingsworth married, March 31, 1878, Susan, born Sept. 26, 1855, in Lancaster county, daughter of Jacob and Rossetta Dowhower, and they are the parents of the following children: 1. Elva Virginia, born Feb. 10, 1879, wife of Simon Brinser, of East Hanover, has four children: Le Roy, Golden, Gertrude and Charles. 2. Hiram G., born Dec. 12, 1880, of Palmyra, married Florence Lutz, has three children: Edna, Esther and Ammon. 3. Edith Elizabeth, born July 19, 1883, wife of John Shaffer, of North Londonderry township, Lebanon county, has three children: James, William and Elizabeth. 4. Curtin E., born Dec. 12,

1887. 5. Blaine Harrison, born March 11, 1890. 6. Clara Olivia, born November 23, 1891.

Daniel Trammel's Will

The abstract of the last will of Daniel Trammel, of Craven County, South Carolina, dated 10 Sept. 1777, reads: Wife, Elizabeth Trammel, all my estate during her widowhood. Sons, John, Daniel, Thomas, Garrard, Philip and Sampson Trammel, William and Isaac Trammel, the plantation where I now live on the Wateree River; To Benjamin and Jesse Trammel, land on Wateree River. To daughters, Betty Hollingsworth, wife of Jacob Hollingsworth, Frances, Ann and Elizabeth (sic). Residue of estate to seven children, Frances, Ann, Elizabeth, William, Isaac, Jesse and Benjamin. Executors, wife, and William Farr and Thomas Trammell. Witnesses John Sartol (sic), John Peter Sartor, and Garrard Trammell. No date of probate. Registered at p. 571 of Will Book TT (1774-1778) of Charleston, S.C. This is a published abstract. Your editor has not seen the full registered will. It is not possible to say if "Betty" is identical with "Elizabeth." That seems likely. Craven County later became, in part, Old 96 District, which, still later, became divided and included Newberry and Union Districts, where these Hollingsworths, Trammells and the Sartors lived. It is probable that Jacob and Betty (Trammell) Hollingsworth represent the same Jacob who died in Union District in 1816, wife not named in his will, children Daniel, Amos, Hannah Ashford, Martha McC Carson, Jacob, Abraham, which Jacob was a probable son of Joseph & Martha (Houghton) Hollingsworth. See HR 1:114; 2:43, & 3:149.)

- #95. James Hollingsworth, 2-3-5. Private.

For details see HR Vol. 7, pp. 91, 93. William Thomas was father to Elizabeth, wife of James Hollingsworth, and Zebulon and Henry were his brothers, all sons of Stephen and Ann (Robinson) Hollingsworth, of Henry², of Valentinel, of Henry^a.

(B) Do. p. 330, A list of the Duplin County Troop... no date, but probably 1754:

Zebulon Hollinsworth, in Capt. Frederick Gregg's Company.

In HR 6: p. 17 read some about them. Recently the delving editor noticed these very ancient mentions: Warin the Calfhirde, plaintiff in a 30 acre dispute, 16 June 1269 (Yorks. Arch. Edgefield, South Carolina. John Hampton Hollingsworth III., 79, mortician and former coroner of Edgefield County, died Monday. Graveside services will be at 11 a.m. Wed. in Willowbrook Cemetery with the Rev. James F. Burris officiating.

Mr. Hollingsworth, a graduate of Cincinnati College of Embalming, was the first licensed mortician to come to Edgefield County, where he founded Hollingsworth Funeral Home in 1937. He was a lifelong resident of the county. He was coroner of Edgefield County from 1938 through 1970. He was a member of the American Legion, State Guard, and a Mason at large. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Edgefield.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Margaret F. Hollingsworth, of Edgefield; a sister, Mrs. W. S. Anderson of Tallahassee, Fla.; and several nieces and nephews. The body is at the Hollingsworth Funeral Home.

JEPHTHA GIDEON HOLLINGSWORTH

Feb. 16th, 1856 - Nov. 24th, 1931

He was born in Platte City, Missouri, the son of Benjamin F. and Mary Mimms Hollingsworth. His parents were both natives of Kentucky and his father was a graduate of The Louisville Medical College and a practicing physician for many years. In 1853, he moved with his family to Missouri. While still a young man, Jephtha chose the dental profession as his life work and obtained a thorough training under Doctor J. K. Stark of Kansas City, Missouri (founder of Kansas City Dental College - Ed.). Beginning his practice in Platte City in 1880, he later moved in 1890 to Kansas City, where he continued active practice. In addition, he taught dentistry in the Kansas City Dental College for many years.

He became distinguished in his profession as an inventor of devices used in operative dentistry and was frequently called upon to hold clinics before state and national dental associations. His many contributions to the science gave him recognition among the profession.

He was a member of the Kansas City Dental Society and also of our State Association and a member of Delta Sigma Delta. He was a member of three Masonic bodies, Platte City Lodge No. 504, The Scottish Rite and Ararat Shrine in Kansas City.

For many years he has been a member of the Linwood Boulevard Christian (Community) Church.

He is survived by his widow, Eliza Bush Hollingsworth, a son T. Park Hollingsworth, a daughter Kathleen Hollingsworth Smith, and four grandchildren, Jephtha and Helen Hollingsworth, Kathleen Hollingsworth Davis and Gail Park Smith. (Bulletin of the Missouri State Dental

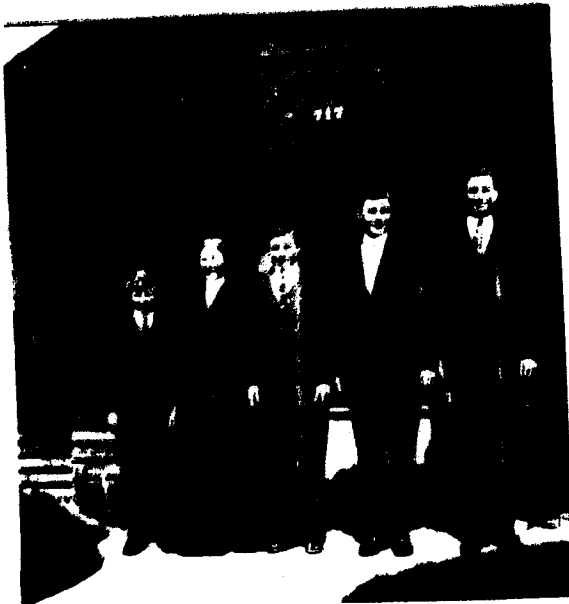
F.A. Hollingsworth earned a nickname "String" while playing baseball, on account of his lankiness. He stands over six feet tall and his position as a pitcher on several teams made the name stick. Technically, he was described as a hard thrower. He played on the U.S. Navy team during the First World War at Pelham Bay, New York. He also played for Blake, Moffitt & Towne Paper Company (now a division of Saxon Industries, Inc.) on their semi-pro team, with brother Mike, and worked for the company as salesman. Page 4 William Lester⁴ Hollingsworth's second wife Gertrude Leona Snyder had first married Nelson L. Must, a native of Dayton, Ohio, and she also was a native of that city. He was the father of the children. Geraldine Mildred Must, born June 23, 1917, in Ohio, died 22 July 1958, in Burbank, California, married 5 Oct. 1942, in Los Angeles, Isaac Corbin Newell, as her 2nd marriage. She was 25, he was 23, a soldier, son of Isaac C. Newell and Nancy Wilson, natives resp. of Connecticut and North Carolina. She worked for Thrifty Drug Stores at that time. Her first husband was Mr. Ryan. At the time she died she was a waitress at The Carriage House.

Page 24 Jane Prestage, as noted, did marry (1) 2 Nov. 1842, at Inch Church, William Curtis. She married (2) 24 Apr. 1855, at Arklow Established Church, George Willoughby, shopkeeper, widower, son of John Willoughby, farmer. Jane Curtis was residing at Park, the old Prestage farm since at least 1720, was a widow, daughter of Ralph Prestage, farmer. John Prestage and Henry Morris were witnesses; they were married by licence by Rev. Richard Edward Eaton, Rector of Arklow. By 1880, the date of the "Spottiswoode Letter," she had probably moved away, and was most likely in her sixties at least. (Arklow Marriages.)

P. 119 The cemetery where Fred J. Hollingsworth is buried is Elsinore Valley. He died about 7:30-35 a.m. in his home 22 Aug. 1971. His son in law is Frank Darwin Hudson, and he was survived by four grandchildren, not three, the son Joel Hudson, born Nov. 30, 1967, is the youngest. "Brion" should read Brian.
