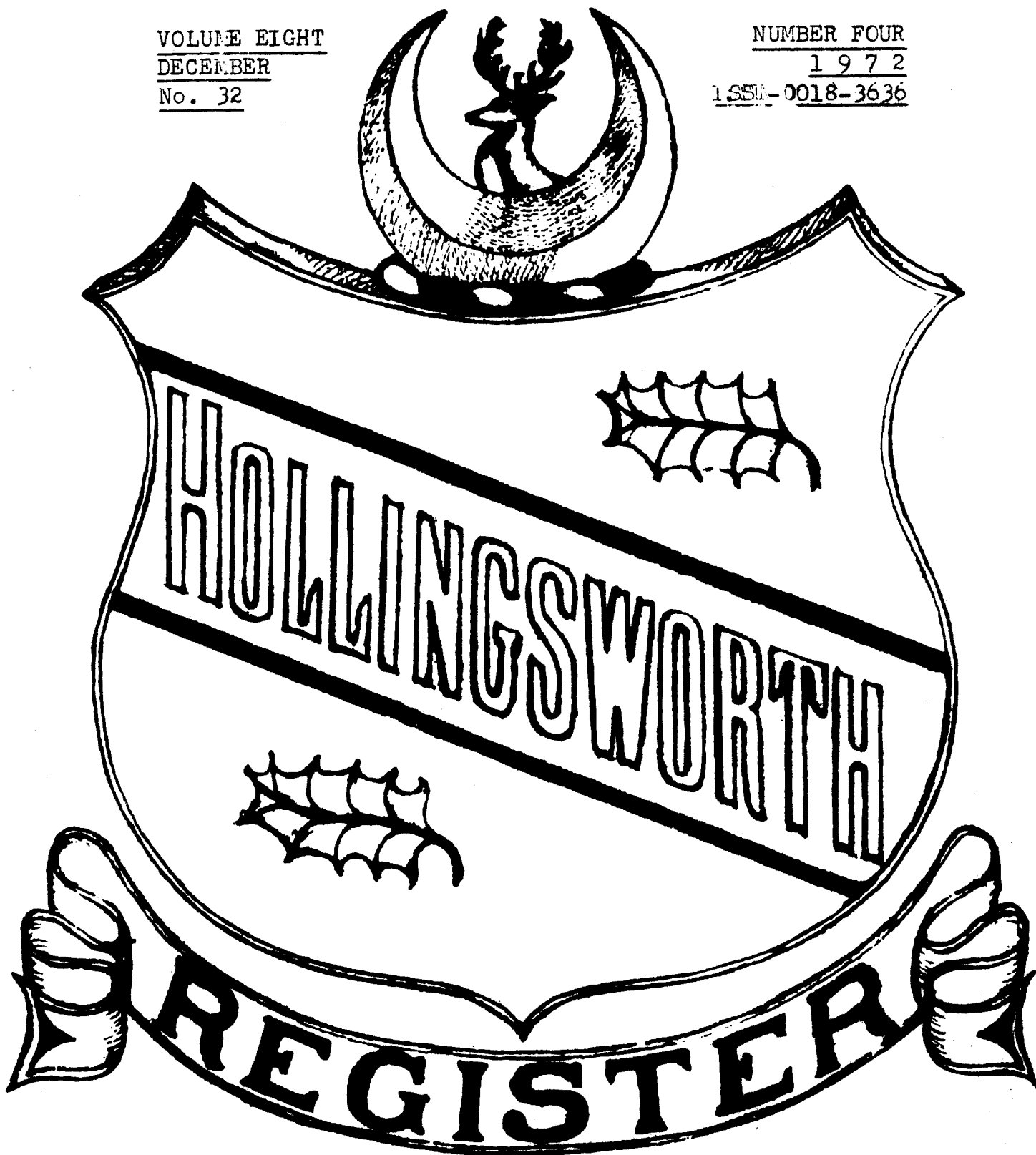

MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London. and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

The Earl Family of County Wexford, Ireland

I have documented and theorized about the Hollingsworths of Ballinakill, County Wexford. But our Frederick's mother, the wife of Samuel Hollinsworth of Ballinakill - who were her ancestors? Here is a short version of my twelve-year agony with Ann Hollinsworth's supposed antecedents, the Earl family. My initial clue was the fact that great granddad was named Edward Earl Hollingsworth. The first big breakthrough, and seeming confirmation of my suspicion was the discovery of the Betham abstract of the now lost Prerogative Will of Edward Earl, Knockduff, Co. Wexford, farmer, dated or proved 4 July 1795. In this abstract it is shown that the will named two grandchildren, among others, "Edward, son of Samuel Hollandsworth; Jane Hollandsworth." I have strong, unproved, feelings that Edward Earl was the father of Ann Hollinsworth, and, thus, grandfather also of my Frederick, who either named his eldest son "Edward Earl" after his grandfather, or after his brother Edward, who in all likelihood bore that surname too.

I now give you the facts about the Earls who probably are the immediate ancestors of Ann Hollinsworth, and follow this with some interesting discoveries about possible earlier members.

(I) JOHN EARL of Raheenagurren, Parish of Gorey, farmer. This man was the father of the above named Edward Earl. He was born c1700, probably in Ireland, and was dead by 1769 at his farm in Raheenagurren which lies just a mile or two from the town of Gorey. His wife's name was Ellenor, still alive in 1797, mentioned in her son John's will. Whether she was the mother of all the children is not known. If she was, then she was born about 1712-15, and was nearly 90 in 1797. There is longevity in this family, however, and this is not to be considered unusual. She was probably the daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth ( ? ) McDaniel, of Fortchester, Inch, Co Wexford, for Daniel McDaniel's will was memorialized in the deeds before the original and office copies were destroyed in Dublin, and in this memorial he names his "daughter Elenor Earl." His will was dated 15 Sept 1759, and proved in Ferns Diocese in 1761, but it was entered into the Registry of Deeds on 1 Oct 1759 by Edward McDaniel his only son. He (Daniel) was buried in Christ Church cemetery, Gorey, and his headstone is still legible, erected by his son.

John Earl, Sr., obtained his lease of his farm at Raheenagurren from his landlord, Viscount Stopford, ancestor of the Earls of Courtown (the title "Earl" here - not the surname in question) on 8 Sep 1756. His sons Daniel and John obtained their leases of part of the same townland a month earlier. (See below.) His younger son Edward obtained a lease on an adjacent townland - Knockduff - in 1764. These leases proved of immense value in sketching up the family group. By kindness of the present Lord Courtown, I was able to get copies of his ancestor's little rent books. In these, more clues turned up.

John Earl's residence before Raheenagurren? Probably one mile north, at Clonettin, the great demesne of the Ram family, one of the very early families of landed gentry there. A deed, 15 March 1726, from Abel Ram to Philip Coles, Gorey, is witnessed by "John Earl, then

of Clonattin, farmer." The instrument was not registered until 24 Oct 1734, the reason for this statement. Charles Frizzell, "then of Ramsfort but now of Ballymenane, farmer," was the other witness, who again witnessed the registration, eight years later. This may mean John was a steward or gamekeeper for Ram. He was probably still single. One of the other oddities of family connection here is the fact that his son Edward's farm had formerly been held by Phillip Coles, deceased, who was doubtless the same man in the 1726 transaction. Charles Frizzell's name often appears with that of members of my Earl family, too.

Here, then, are very brief abstracts of the main Earl leases:

a. Vol 214.107.140454. 8 Aug 1756 James Stopford, Earl of Courtown, to Daniel Earl, Raheenagurren, Co Wexford, farmer, upper part of Raheenagurren, called Fifty Acres & Ralph's Wood, 60½ acres Irish Plantation Measure, for the lives of said Daniel, and of Mary Earl and Elinor Earl his sisters. Rent L18.18s per annum.

b. 214.108.140455. Same date and Landlord, to John Earl the younger, Raheenagurren, farmer, that part of same called Sixty Acres, being actually 33 acres, PM, for the lives of said John Earl, and of Thomas Storey son of Rev. Joseph Storey, Gorey, clerk, and James Woodroffe, son of Richard Woodroffe of Gorey, Chandler. L16 per annum.

c. 214.109.140456. 8 Sept 1756, same Landlord to John Earl, of Raheenagurren, farmer, part of Raheenagurren, 84 acres P.M. for the lives of said John, and of William & Robert Earl his sons, at L26.0.9 per annum. Same witnesses. All of them registered 21 Oct 1761.

d. 229.146.149735. 26 Mar 1764. Same Landlord to Edward Earl, Knockduff, farmer, for lands of Coolnaveagh and part of Knockduff, (Coolnaveagh formerly owned by Philip Coles, dec., 130 acres) 40 acres in Barony of Gorey. Lives of said Edward, Hesther his wife, and Robert his brother. L64. per annum. Witnessed by John Earl, Raheenagurren. (Signature of John shows it is the son, John Junior.)

e. 259.457.172559. 21 Sep 1767. Arthur Hunt, Esquire, to William Earl, residence not shown, part of the lands of Milishia, Co Wicklow, lately held by Matthew Walsh, 114 acres, for 31 years at 8s 8d per acre per annum, as under Grand Lease of Marques of Rockingham. Witnessed by John Earl, Raheenagurren, Co Wexford, and Charles Frizzell, of Hughville (?) Co Wicklow. (Signature of John, again, "Junior.")

f. 343.576.237884. 29 Mar 1783, Earl of Courtown to Edward Earl, Knockduff, farmer, part of Banogue, Barony of Gorey (85-2-30 acres) for the lives of John Earl, only son of said Edward, Thomas Earl, age 15, son of Edward Earl, Garrynew, and Thomas Fitzsimons, 12, son of Christopher Fitzsimons, Banogue. L36.7.6 rent. Witnessed again by John Earl, (Jr.) of Raheenagurren, farmer. (Signature same.)

g. 490.449.315545. 10 July 1795. John Earl, Banogue, Co Wexford, farmer, to William Inman, Carrickbeg, Co Wexford, farmer. Reciting a lease of 26 March 1764 - see item "d" above, the exact recital - and further reciting that now the said Edward Earl is dead, and John is his eldest son and heir. Now this indenture, Earl assigns lease to Inman for the lives of Hester and Robert Earl for L56.17.6d.

h. 648.429.445104 Annuity 9 Apr 1812. Anne Earl, Raheenagurren, widow of Daniel Earl, late of same, with consent of his children, Catherine Coombs, alias Earl, Daniel Earl, and Winifred Earl, to Jane Royce, Gorey, widow. Recites item "a" above. Reciting that Daniel died on 9 May 1803. Assigns to Royce for lives of Mary Earl, alias

Godkin, and Elinor Earl, alias Mason, sisters of late Daniel Earl.  
i. Untranscribed Lease # 351834 25 Nov 1799, Daniel Earl, Raheenagurren, farmer, and William Godkin, Knockduffe, farmer, for 187.5.6 part of Raheenagurren with houses, etc. 19 acres, for lives of Mary Godkin, wife of Benjamin Godkin, Ballymoney, Senior, and Ellinor Mason of River Chappell, widow, for 14s by the acre.

You see the immense amount of genealogical material in this collection, and the above 9 instruments do not represent the complete series.

Here is a list of the children of John and Elenor (McDaniel) Earl of Raheenagurren, not in order of birth:

(1) John Earl, Jr. died 1797, Will dated 13 May proved June 1797. Wife Elizabeth. Children: John, William, Edward, James and Thomas. Son Thomas probably same buried in Gorey 10 Mar 1819, aged 51. Some of these and the next generation emigrated to Ontario, Canada.

(2) William Earl, of item "e" who was, in the year 1770, "steward to Lord Loftus of Ely at his house near Dublin," according to the rent books of that year. Living in 1797, as mentioned in his brother John's will.

(3) Robert Earl, still living 9 July 1795 as per item "g". I think he may have been the same "Robert Earl, murdered near Arklow, and all his property destroyed," of Affidavit 78 in the Rebellion Papers, published in Musgrave: Memoirs of the Different Rebellions in Ireland (1801) p. 102, or the Robert Earl of Gorey, Co Wexford, who on 12 Feb 1799 put in a claim for the loss of apparel, flax, linen, and carpenter's tools, as a result of the Rebellion, per p 2214 of the Indexes to Compensation Claims, Suffering Loyalists, Wexford.

(4) Edward Earl, - For this sketch, see further.

(5) Daniel Earl, born c1733; died 9 May 1803, aged 70, buried in Gorey Churchyard on 25 May 1803 (sic) according to Burial registers. Married Anne. Issue: Daniel, Jr., Catherine, (Mrs. Coombs in 1812), and Winifred, who seems not to have married. Daniel put in a compensation claim for loss of furniture and potatoes on 17 Nov 1798, and his brother John's widow, Elizabeth, did likewise on the 20th for a mare, a cow, meal and oats.

(6) Mary Earl, wife of Benjamin Godkin, Sr., Ballymoney, Kiltennell, Co Wexford. Buried at Kilgorman Churchyard in Godkin plot, 25 Nov 1814; husband buried there but no record found.

(7) Ellenor Earl, wife of William Mason, Merchant, Dublin 1770, widowed by 25 Nov 1799. (See Item "i" above.) Living 9 Apr 1812. See "h" above.

The Courtown Rent Roll of 1770-3 reveals that Robert Earle (sic) "lives under his brother John at Raheenagurrin." Under his roof, under his lease, or in the bottom story of his house - which?

(II) As for Edward Earl of Knockduff, son of John & Ellenor (McDaniel) Earl, he was born probably about 1730-31, judging from his wife's age, who was born about 1732. He was probably born at Clonatin, Gorey, if the 1726 lease is a valid piece of evidence. He may have died between 4th and 9th of July 1795, depending on whether the Betham Abstract of his will is correct as to the date, whether it is of the signing, or the probate in the Prerogative Court. It seems to expect too much that a will could be probated in such a short time. He evidently remained single until about 1764, the time he took out

his farm lease. This coincides with the approximate birth of my ancestor, Ann Earl Hollinsworth. I assume, therefore, that, about 1763, he married Hester, also called Esther. Her maiden name could easily have been Godkin. She was born c1732, and was buried in Gorey Churchyard 22 Jan. 1814, aged 82 years. The Godkins are possibly of old German stock, but settled very early around Heanor and Morley, Derbyshire, where the name Henry was their favourite choice for boys, as it was among the Wexfords. The old abandoned graveyard by the sea in the townland of Kilgorman is filled with them, and many very ancient headstones stand there to this day.

Edward Earl of Garrynew, who appears several times with this one, (see "f" above) may be his nephew, son of his brother John Earl. The lease of 1783 shows John Earl, his son, to be his only son. I have reason to challenge Sir William Betham's abstracts of wills, on good evidence. (See John Colley's will and abstract in this issue.) The assignment at item "g" from John Earl, son of Edward, to William Inman, is to me, a sign that Inman was a brother-in-law, for William Inman was married, by licence, in 1786, to Jane Earl. I think Jane was a daughter of Edward Earl, for Sam and Ann Hollinsworth had a daughter of this name, specially mentioned by Earl in his will. Note how the lease on Banogue was evidently left to John Earl the son, and that John had moved there as shown by the 1795 assignment on Knockduff. However, as Esther, the widow, died at Knockduff, Edward must have made provisions for her to remain at his dwelling house for life. After all, the leasehold hung on her existence as one of the lives!

Little is known about Edward Earl, but in the Courtown Rent Book there is one notation to the effect he was "paid for 500 bricks," by the landlord. Below is a list of his children:

- (1) Ann Earl, born c1764/5, Knockduff; supposed to be the same who died 1 Apr. 1849, aged 85; buried Ballycanew; married, c1787, Ballycanew or Gorey (all registers in this period for both parishes destroyed) Samuel Hollinsworth of Ballinakill. Issue: John, Edward, Jane, Esther, William, ?Samuel, Ann, ?Frederick, Mary and Susannah.
- (2) Jane Earl, born c1767, Knockduff; supposed to be same who married, by licence, 1786, William Inman, Carrickbeg, Kilmahue Parish. She was living in 1799 when she administered her husband's estate. He was killed at the battle of Ballyellis, during the Rebellion, on 30 June 1798. After the death of Edward Earl, his son John assigned the Knockduff property to Inman.
- (3) John Earl, only son, born c1769, Knockduff, died 12 Nov 1855 at Banogue, in Gorey Parish, aged 86, buried in Churchyard there. Married, by licence, 1792, Mary Earl, a cousin, her parents unknown. Issue: (as per Gorey registers and Edward Earl's will) Edward, Allen, John (1), Alice, William, John (2), probably Ann, Hester, Isaac, and Thomas. (Gorey Registers have persons named Earl living or dying at Banogue: Since John was the only Earl there, I assume they are all his!)
- (4) Esther Earl, born about 31 Dec 1777, Knockduff; believed to be same who died 31 July 1863, Elizabethtown, Leeds Co., Ontario, aged 86 years, 7 months. Buried in New Dublin Cemetery, Christ Church, Lamb's Pond, with marble headstone. She married, after 1795, William Godkin, born 1766, died in Eli-

zabethtown at his farm 18 June 1836, aged 70, buried in New Dublin. (Courtesy of James Easton Godkin, Ottawa.) Large family of 11 children, as proved in his application for a land grant in the Clergy Reserve of Elizabethtown:

"Sir, About five years ago I arrived in this country and having no land I purchased a right to Lot No. 14 in the 10th Concession Elizabeth from two men called Nicholas Horton & William Pierson who said they had a right thereto. I paid them £15 for it - I have a wife and eleven children. I served His Majesty 17 Years in Lord Court Town's Cavalry and lost a considerable property in Ireland in consequence of my attachment to my King and country having had my House and other property burnt by the rebels. I wish to purchase the above Lot under the regulations which may be adopted by you Sir and the Council. I remain Sir your Humbl Servt. Wm Godkin Dated Yonge June 5th 1828."

The Compensation Claims for '98 reveal "Godkin, William, of Knockduff, farmer." Losses included his house. Names of all eleven children aren't known, but Gorey baptisms and burials in Canada reveal: Edward, William, Joseph, and Christiana, perhaps Easter or Esther, and Sarah.

Note that, at item "i" in 1799, Daniel Earl assigned part of Raheenagurren to William Godkin of Knockduff.

This will bring you up to date on Frederick Hollingsworth's maternal ancestors. Now a brief rundown on "Earlier Earls," who probably are the direct ancestors of John Earl Sr., of Raheenagurren. If only I had a few more clues!

Robert Earl, or Earle, of Coolroe, Co Wexford, wrote his will which was proved in the Dublin Court in 1699. The will perished. In 1680, one of his daughters married one John Manifold (who was born in the Manifold River valley of Staffordshire in 1655) who later became a Quaker after his first wife died, but bore him John, born 1681, at Coolroe, and Jane, born 1687, at Ballymoney, Co Wexford. (Book 1, page 85, and 12, p. 344, now unfindable, 6 Eustace St., Dublin.) This shows Robert Earl born perhaps as early as 1640, and probably in England. I assume him to be the common progenitor of all of the family in Ireland.

John Erle, according to the Rental Book of the Anglesey Estate, Co Wexford, 1713-14, had a 31 year contract taken out 25 March 1714, on 163 acres of Brews & Tingar. (MS DD. Valentia A-10, published by H. Hollingsworth 1968 from papers in Bodleian Library, Oxford, Eng.) Brews (Bruys or Bruce) lies partly in Kiltrisk Parish, which was united to Ballycanew. I assume this man is an ancestor, if not of my line, then of the Earls of Monomolin Co Wexford, just south of Ballycanew, the largest clan in the whole of Ireland.

John Earle, possibly the same as above, on 22 Oct 1718, was one of a jury of land viewers who saw William Kehoe, aged 77, pace off the Glebelands in Killcormack Parish. Ram Estate Papers. One of the other viewers was Charles Frizzell! Though the actual signature of this John Earle does not match that of John Earl of Raheenagurren, I am sure they are related, perhaps father and son.

William Earle had a daughter, Mary, baptized at Ballycanew in 1737, according to letter of 8 Dec 1969 from Canon Henry V. Boake, who found the old register, 1728-1744, for me. I assume this man to be of the same family of John of Bruce & Tingar 1714.

The family in Monamolín Parish began to expand soon after that. This lease is the first one on Cullentra:

231.398.150527 13 March 1760. Henry Bolton, Ballyrea, Co Wex., Gent., let to Thomas Earle, and his sons Robert and Allen Earle, all dwelling in Cullentra, Co Wexford, that part of same situated in Barony of Gorey, 110 acres, to hold for the lives of Henry Bolton, William his eldest son and Mary his youngest daughter. £16.10 per annum. Then:

308.34.203515 Release 18 Jan 1775, Wm. Bolton, elder, Island, Co Wexford, Esq., in consequence of surrender of former lease, leased to Robert Earl, Cullentra, Co Wexford, farmer, 58 acres, 1 rood and 4 perches of same, for the lives of said Robert Earl, and of Thomas, his eldest son and Margaret his wife, at £35 per annum. Witnessed by William Oakes, Curraghtubbin, and Fossey Tackaberry, Tomagaddy, farmers.

The above Robert was murdered, 22 June 1798, in the rebellion, according to Musgrave, op cit, deposition 622, and his widow Margaret, of Cullentra, obtained a compensation claim. One Isaac Earl of Ardamine Parish, was piked on Vinegar Hill, and a Thomas Earl of Kilmuckridge Parish was murdered 27 May, both in 1798. One Edward Earle perhaps of Monamolín, was murdered within a half mile of the house of the sworn informant, Edward Stacy of Tomgarrow, farmer, along with 22 other Protestants. (Musgrave, p 97.)

These people intermarried often. There are no less than nine "Earl to Earl" entries in the index to marriage licence bonds for the Ferns area, the diocese which covers Co Wexford, from 1792 to 1845. There were so many of the families concentrated around Monamolín in the first quarter of the last century that it must have caused a furor when their young men turned up for drill practice in the Yeomanry Corps. I have a clear example of this before me. On 25 March 1823, Edward Earl the Permanent Serjeant of the Island Yeomanry, commanded by William Bolton, as above, found it necessary to clarify the confusion of names to avoid any charges of pay fraud from the Exchequer. Here is his "List of Members names ages and residence that have occurred more than five times in the pay return ---

Yes! Year after year, quarter after quarter, the above names appeared and can you imagine the mistakes made in roll call? They all served

in the one small corps of Yeomanry called the Island Rangers, with not more than a total of 55 men enrolled. If you think that is bad, in the June 30, 1831 drill and pay list, with Edward Earl now deceased and his son Allen being the Serjeant, there are 17 Earls named: Allen, the Sgt., William, a Corporal, and privates John (1) and (2), Allen (2), (3) and (4), Thomas, William (2) and (3), Edward (1, 2, 3), Theophilus, George (1) and (2), and Charles! Don't think this applied only to the Island corps, because the Killoughram Corps for 30 June of 1831 listed Edward, Sr. and Jr., John, Robert Sr. and Jr., Thomas and William Earle, and the Ballaghkeen Infantry for March 31 1831 listed Edward, John, Robert and - yes - William Earl 2nd with no entry for a William Earl 1st! (In this unit were Frederick, Samuel & Thomas Hollinsworth.) Such a crowd!

---

### The Will of John Colley of Ballywalter

This man was the first landlord of our Hollinsworths. He obtained a lease, in 1745, on the lands of Ballynakil & Monro, in Ballycanew Parish, County Wexford, formerly in the occupation of Nicholas Tackaberry, from the head landlord, Richard, Earl of Anglesey. Early in 1746 he sublet the property for the lives in his own lease, to our John Hollinsworth, then styled "of Monro," but ever after to be styled "of Ballynakil," or, the modern spelling, Ballinakill. We publish herewith, John Colley's last will and testament. There is a twofold purpose in doing so: First, we think he may be related to the Hollinsworths; Second, an example of an office copy will and an abstract of it by Sir William Betham, then Ulster King of Arms, or his agent, can be published. The latter reason is to show how unreliable the Betham abstracts can be, although they are probably the most valuable collection of Irish material now extant, except parish registers.

From Prerogative Will Book 1761-1777, folios 22-24, Entry Number 33:  
IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN, I, John Colley of Ballywalter in the County of Wexford Gent., being of sound mind and understanding do make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say I give and bequeath unto my dearly beloved Wife Frances Colley the sum of forty pounds str. to be issuing and payable and paid to the said Frances Colley or her assigns out of that part of the Lands of Ballywalter now in the Possession of William Bradley and the part of the sd: Lands of Ballywalter now in the possession of John Shaw Yearly and every Year during her natural Life in full Demand and satisfaction of all thirds or Dower by two equal Fortions in the Year on every Twentyninth day of September and Twenty fifth day of March the first payment thereof to be made on the Twentyninth day of September or Twentyfifth day of March next after my decease and if the sd: sum of forty pounds or any part thereof shall be behind or unpaid for twenty one Days next after Either of the Days of payment that then and so often as it shall so happen it shall be lawfull for the sd Frances Colley and her assigns into the sd Lands of Ballywalter to Enter and Distrain and the Distress & Distresses then and there found to take lead drive and carry away and thereof to dispose untill the sd: Sum of forty pounds and all arrears thereof shall be fully paid I likewise give and bequeath to my sd: Wife Frances Colley during her

Widowhood the South Parlour in my dwelling House of Ballywalter and the Room over the sd: South Parlour with the Closet adjoining the sd: Room with the use of the Kitchen and Furniture thereof and use of the Furniture of the sd: Parlour and Room and also the Closet under the Stairs in sd House and the Park or piece of land called the Calf Park adjoining the Haggard (i.e. place to store grain sheaves to dry-Ed) and the Use of the stable jowne (sic) Horses and also the Garden at the North End of my sd: House I also leave to my sd: Wife the Horse she rides with the saddle and Briddle I give & bequeath to my Sister Mary Bennet the Sum of Twenty pounds I give and bequeath to my Nephew Thomas Smith the sum of five pounds I give and bequeath to my Nephew Wm. Smith the sum of twenty pounds I give and bequeath to my Nephew William Clifford the sum of twenty pounds I give and bequeath unto my Niece Elizabeth Clifford the sum of thirty pounds I give and bequeath to my Niece Mary Buckley the sum of twenty pounds I give & bequeath to the children of my late Nephew Edward Jones the sum of twenty pounds I give and bequeath to my Niece Alice Jones twenty pounds I give the above Legacies hereby bequeathed to the Children of the sd Edward Jones Mary Buckley Thos: Jones and Alice Jones upon Condition that they and Each of them do and shall discharge my Heirs Exrs: from any Demand they may claim to have against me as Executor to Isaac Jones deceased I leave to Ann Walsh Wife of James Walsh of Killegowan forty pounds I leave to my good friend the reverend Edward Tottenham and his Wife in Token for the Esteem I have for them Twenty two pounds fifteen shillings I give devise and bequeath all my real Estate of and in the Town and Lands of Ballywalter Monycliff Cullintra Clonark Dranagh Ballynakill & Monroe all situate in the County of Wexford and the rest Residue & remainder of all my personal Estate unto my Daur Alice Colley & her Heirs For ever I order Will and direct that the Yearly profit Rents of all my Lands (save as hereinbefore devised) shall during the Minority of my sd: Daur be received by my Exors herein named and put to Interest for the Use of my said Daughter and if my sd: Daur shall dye before she shall attain her Age of Twenty one years or be marryed then my Will is that the sd: Money shall be divided among the sd: Thomas Smith Edward Jones's sd: Children Thomas Jones my Nephew Mary Buckley Alice Gill and Susanna Parker my Nieces share and share alike and if my sd: Daur shall dye without issue then I leave devise & bequeath to my Nephew William Clifford the Lands of Coolintra (sic) and that part of Monycliff formerly held by Mathew Hazlewood and Murtagh Fortune containing sixty three Acres during his life & after his decease to his Son John Clifford they pay the yearly Rent of thirteen pounds thirteen shillings and four pence to the Landlord and six pounds as a Fine for Renewells to the Children of the said Thomas Jones begotten on the Body of his Wife my sd: Niece all that part of the sd: Lands of Ballywalter now in my possession containing about one hundred & thirty one Acres and the Lands of Newtown now set to Wm: Bradley and Roger Bennets Parks containing about four Acres the paying to the Head Landlord Yearly twenty five pounds Rent and ten pounds fine for Renewals and unto my Nephew the said Wm: Smith all that part of the Lands of Ballywalter now in the Tenure of John Shaw and his Tenants and likewise that part of Ballywalter in the possession of Michael Bryan he paying twelve pounds Rent Yearly and four pounds fine and to their respective Heirs for ever and unto the sd: Ann Walsh all my Interest & Title in the Towns and Lands of Dronagh monroe and Ballynekill I order and direct

that a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds a year shall be laid out and expended yearly on the Maintenance and (24) And Education of my said Daughter untill she shall arrive at the Age of ten years and afterward untill she shall attain her Age of twenty one years a sum not exceeding thirty pounds yearly for her Maintenance and Education my Will is that my sd: Lands of Ballywalter shall not to be set but kept in the Hands of my Exrs: for feeding during the Minority of my Daur and do recommend the care of my sd: Daur to my said Wife unless my Exors shall see good cause to the contrary I also order and direct that my Heirs shall keep the Gallery in the West End of the Church of Donaghmore in repair for the Use of the poor so long as the Protestant Religion shall be professed there and I do hereby nominate and appoint my Nephew the said William Clifford and Thomas Jones of Ross Merchant Exrs: of this my Will IN WITNESS whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and seal the 26th Day of November 1775 Jno: Colley (Seal) Signed sealed published & declared by the above named John Colley to be his last Will & Testament in the presence of us who have hereunto subscribed our Names as Witnesses in the presence of the Testator and of each other and at his Request John Greene Matt Heazlewood John Bennett

The last Will and Testament of John Colley late of Ballywalter in the County of Wexford Gentleman deceased (having & soforth) was proved in Common form of Law and Probate thereof granted to Thomas Jones one of the Executors named in the said Will he being first personally sworn saving the Right of William Clifford the other Executor Dated the 10th: day of July 1777

NOTE: There are no punctuations in this copy will. We have copied it as found.

Now here is a verbatim transcript of the original extract or abstract of the above will, made by, or for, Sir William Betham for his Ulster Herald's Office Collections, in the early nineteenth century: This is the abstract, not the pedigree chart, which is a copy of it.

Can you beat that? (Yes, H.H. I have seen worse! Right in Betham.) There are seven different relatives, besides the testator, named in the abstract. In the registered office copy, above, there are twenty-five persons named, fourteen of whom are clearly called as relatives, besides the testator, John Colley! Ye gods...and little fishes. If Sir W. Betham did such a bad job on this one, how about the other 38,000? This is a poor ratio of completeness: 7 to 25, less than one third or 33 and 1/3 percent coverage. Of course, the vast majority of the wills thus abstracted are totally lost forever in all forms, and thus, the abstract, any at all, is better than none. But it makes one wonder about one's crucial wills - like that of Edward Earl of Knockduff, above, or that of John Hollinsworth of Ballinakill, 1791. The abstract above also leaves out the fact that Edward Jones was now deceased, or that he had children.

It will be seen that Jones figures here, as does Smith. Both of these families married into the Hollinsworths, at least, families of

these names. Patrick Cranwill, many times churchwarden with John Hollinsworth of Ballinekill, married, 1769, Jane Smith. She was undoubtedly a daughter of said Thomas Smith and wife Dorothy Colley. They were licenced to marry in 1746. They were parents also of Captain John Colley Smith of the Camolin Cavalry. The tombs of these Colleys in Millenagh Churchyard, are reproduced in the first volume of the Society for the Preservation of the Memorials of the Dead, as follows:

"Here lyeth the body of JOHN COLLEY, of Ballywalter, in County of Wexford, Esq. He died 6th day of April, 1777, in ye 76th year of his age. He was a pattern of Virtue, Religion, and good Conduct. His friends were the wise, the virtuous, and the learned. His Enemies-None. His mourners-All who knew him." "Here also lyeth the body of Mrs. ALICE, wife of said JOHN COLLEY, who died the 23rd May, 1770." An adjoining tomb: "THOMAS SMITH died 2nd April, 1777, aged 55 years. DOROTHY COLLEY, otherwise SMITH, died Novr. 28th, 1809, aged 95. Beneath this tomb lies also the remains of Capt. JOHN COLLEY SMITH, Captain in Command of the Camolin Cavalry in 1798, Departed this life at Camolin 20th March, 1837, aged 90 years. He won his way thro' life by integrity of principle and consistency of conduct, and being justified by faith he found peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Camolin Cavalry was the yeomanry unit in which the Hollinsworths served, during and after '98. Lord Valentia was the commander.

John Colley was a son of William Colley and Alice Lyndon. Betham does not agree (MS. 230) but the leases registered in Dublin prove us correct. William died c1720 and his widow (they married in 1685) Alice and sons William and John (the testator above) administered the estate. Here are several Betham abstracts of wills in Prerogative Court:

(a) Vol 225 page 340, Thomas Newburgh, Lifford, Co Donegal, Esq. Dated 12 Aug 1657; Proved 1660. Children: Thomas, Arthur, Charles, Anne, Dorothy and Jane. Seal has crest: Savage's head; Wife Anne (nee Coach not clear-Ed.)

(b) P. 349: Anne Newburgh, Dundalk, Co Louth, wid. Dated Oct. 12, 1693 proved 1693. Brother Captain John Ferrer, Children Thomas and his dau. Anne; Charles and Dorothy, wife of Roger Lyndon and her children Newburgh Lyndon and Dorothy Lyndon.

(c) Page 350: Thomas Newburgh, Castlefin, Co Donegal, Esq. Dated May 2, 1693; proved Jan. 9, 1693/4. Lands at Kilworth, Wiltshire, England. Ch: Thomas, Brockhill (d 1741, then of Ballyhaise, Co Cavan) Henry, later of Raheck, Co Cavan; Obediah, and Kingsmill.

Pasted into Manuscript 230 is a letter stating some early history of this Colley family. It says "The father of said John Colley lived at Oulard Castle and died at Bellcarrig, but at what period is not known...Roger Colley married Jane, dau of William Jones, Nevils Court (Ballycanew-Ed.)..." The father of John died at Ballywalter!

Anyway, the said John Colley, after his wife Alice died, married (1771) Frances Boyland. His brother William (of Curraghduff) married Henrietta Sharpe (1739); Thomas, Ellenor Elliott (1746) and Dorothy to Thomas Smith, the above described memorial, in 1746. Mary married a Mr. Bennett. James Walsh married by license, in 1753, Ann Colley. (See above will.)

The Memorials of the Dead, Vol 1, pp. 248-9, states that this is a line from Sir Henry Colley (Cowley) of Castle Carbery, Co Kildare, called to the Privy Council in 1576. His descendants also include the Duke of Wellington (Arthur Wellesley, real name Colley), and John and

Charles Wesley, the founders of the Methodist Church! Also came Walter Colley, Seneschal of Wexford, the stated great-grandfather to John Colley the above testator.

In the Rent Roll (1713-14) of Lord Altham (later Earls of Anglesey) Ballyduff, Ballyfin and Ballynemona are held by Captain Roger Lyndon. All of Ballycanew (Ballyconow) was held by Charles Newburgh. He held 1212:2 acres from Michaelmas 1685 for 31 years. The Cranwill family held Lyndon's land from mid 1700s until early in this century. Of course, Hollinsworths held portions of Ballycanew from the same period, until recently. Charles Newburgh was the brother-in-law to Roger Lyndon (Item b above.)

The will of Ann Newburgh names as her brother, Capt. John Ferrer. Can this be "Captain John Farrer," who commanded a company in the Parliamentary army, mustered in Dublin in 1644? If so, then this man had a private soldier under him named John Hollinworth! (HR 3:93) Oddly, Adam Loftus, Archbishop of Dublin, (died 1605) named in his will, "Elizabeth Hollingworth, grandchild of Thomas Lancaster, late Archbishop of Armagh, Lord Primate of Ireland, and Anne Colley, his own daughter." The linkage between Colley and Hollingsworth is endless! (James Hilton, in his classic "Goodbye, Mr. Chips," chose the name of Colley for the perpetual student!)

Not to give way to wild speculation, but it is possible that this Charles Newburgh brought the first Hollinsworth from England to his farm in Ballycanew, through acquaintance from his uncle, John Ferrer. But we have no further evidence that Capt. John Farrer of 1644 was the same as Capt. John Ferrer of 1693. It sounds virtually impossible.

Roger Colley, "younger brother of John of Ballywalter" - Memorials of the Dead, 1:249, of Belcarrig, Ballycanew, married Jane Jones. They had one son, who became the Rev. Arthur Colley, for several decades Curate of Ballycanew - the man who baptized our Hollinsworths and married most of them. (If Frederick's baptism was accidentally omitted from the registers, we must blame Colley!) Even after he took up a new cure at Nurney Parish, Co Carlow, in 1823, he participated with Hollinsworths in land transactions. John Colley of Ballywalter had but one child, Alice, who married John Pouden. Pouden was killed in 1798. Their son, John Colley Pouden, Esq., was prominent in the affairs of the county in the early 19th century and even today, two descendants, John Colley Pouden, Jr. and 3rd, are living in the city of Denver, Colorado, USA. The above Pat and Jane (Smith) Cranwill's daughter, Jane, was the mother of Henry Johnston who married our Eliza Hollingsworth of Ballinakill, the daughter of Frederick's brother. Thus, if not before, the Colley-Newburgh-Lyndon-Ferrer blood line joined ours!

Ogle R. Gowan's Letter

The editor found the following very interesting item among the papers of the British Colonial Office, (C.O. 384) on microfilm at Ottawa, Ontario, in the series of correspondence on Emigration from Ireland to British North America.

Carnew (Ireland)  
22 April 1829

Sir,

The Father of the writer hereof was the late John Hunter Gowan of Mount Nebo, in the County of Wexford, Captain of the Wingfield Yeoman Cavalry, and one of the oldest Magistrates in Ireland, my elder Brother (the late Lieut. John Gowan, of the 30th Regiment) fought the battles of his Country in the Peninsula, Egypt, and subsequently at Waterloo, and another of my Brothers is at present on the halfpay of the second Somerset Militia.

Recent circumstances having determined many hundreds of the most loyal, industrious, and intelligent class of my fellow Protestants in the Counties of Wexford and Wicklow, to emigrate from this Country to America, and being one of that number myself, I hope you will not deem it intrusive on my part, to solicit the favor of your giving me some information upon the following subject - my object being, if possible, still to remain under the Government of Great Britain, to the King of which I have sworn Allegiance, and should therefore prefer it Ohio, (sic) which otherwise offer many inducements

I have three sons, my Wife and myself who contemplate emigrating. I can command £500. and should feel obliged by knowing under these circumstances, whether I could obtain from Government, a grant of any and what portion (sic) of land, and upon what terms, in our North American Colonies?

Your early reply, (as I have been making preparations for the last fortnight) will oblige many respectable persons, and confer a favor which will not be forgotten by,

Cover addressed to General Sir George Murray, Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, Downing Street or Elsewhere - London. C.O. 384 Volume 21, folio 180 reverse, 181; Film Roll B-945, Public Archives, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. The letter was received 27 April.

There are two things about the above letter which interest the editor of Hollingsworth Register, along with other interesting side-lights. First, John Hunter Gowan, father of this man, was an uncle to the Hollingsworths of Gorey, which included three named "John Hunter Hollingsworth!" Hunter Gowan's sister Mary, married to Peter Roe of Ballinclare, in the Parish of Toome, Co Wexford, was the mother of Elizabeth Roe, who was the wife of John Hollingsworth, Jr., of Ballinacill. John H. Gowan outlived them all. He died at Mount Nebo and was buried on May 28, 1824, at the great age of 97! Many diatribes were leveled at this noble and loyal Englishman of Irish birth. The rebels in 1798 had a warrant out on him, dead or alive! He was the "Archie Bunker" or "Joseph McCarthy" of his day, a rabid Orangeman. The letter writer himself was the founder of the first Loyal Orange Lodge of British North America, not long after his settlement near Brockville. It is said he was a very bigoted man, especially in his remarks made during speeches he often was called upon to deliver.

Our Frederick Hollingsworth of Ballinacill was, himself, preparing to emigrate at the very moment the letter was written, and did depart on 31 May 1829. He landed in New York and made a beeline for Ohio. This is what puzzles us about the 'Ohio' remark in the letter.

#### Quite a Criticism!

HOLLINGSWORTH REGISTER, Vol. 6, No. 3, Sept. 1970. ... Those interested in the name Hollingsworth may wish to know of this rather expensive periodical, and of the work of its editor, compiler, mimeographer and publisher.

Of Irish interest in this number are the copious entries of the name Hollingsworth from the parish registers of Ballycanew and Lis-kinfere, Co. Wexford, extracted for the Editor by the daughters of the Archbishop of Armagh! From the article I gather that the last three Rectors, the vestrymen, the parishioners of Ballycanew and the Archdeacon have all been harrassed for some years by Mr Hollingsworth: only the intervention of the Primate's daughters saved the day. The pedigree of the Hollingsworths of Arklow is continued from the previous number.

There are many newsy contemporary American obituaries, entries from Indiana Quaker registers, and the Pennyback (sic) Baptist Church in New Jersey, extracts of the name from printed sources and a good deal of family chit-chat. (Critic reviewer's monogram: G.F.M.) (The Irish Ancestor, 1971, page 66. Rosemary ffelliott, Editor. We cannot tell if the above is a damning or praising criticism, or just simply damning by faint praise! The Register cost \$6.50 at that time and the Irish Ancestor cost \$6.00! The Irish Ancestor is on much better (art) paper, but has only two issues per year. HR has nearly 200 pages per year, about twice as much as the other, and has four issues a year. Note, too, that it was Mr Hollingsworth who had harrassed the clergy. Why, until this review came out, we had thought it was just the reverse, namely, uncooperative and possessive rectors and big old granddaddy Archdeacons who think public records are their own private revenue source. Glad that we are straight now.)

Lucy Banker Hollingsworth

"The Bancker Genealogy," by Howard J. Banker, (1909) mentions one member of our Wexford Hollingsworth family. Page 178:

Lucy married, Jan. 9, 1867, John Hunter Hollingsworth, who was born June 6, 1836. Mr. Hollingsworth was a merchant of New York City and lived in Paterson, N.J., where his wife died Sept. 21, 1872. Mr. Hollingsworth died Oct 11, 1897, having married a second time. Lucy had four children: Lucy Banker Hollingsworth, born Nov. 10, 1867, and is living unmarried with her step-mother in New York City; John Hunter Hollingsworth, born June 26, 1871, and died August 28, 1871; and twin infants born Sept. 21, 1872, and died with the mother.

NOTE: This John Hunter Hollingsworth was born in Gorey, son of John Hunter & Sarah (Pierce) Hollingsworth. Above John Hunter Gowan was this subject's granduncle. This old genealogy gave us a bit more information than we had before. Lucy Banker was the daughter of Hiram Banker, by his second wife, Ophelia Valteau, of a very well known Huguenot family of New Rochelle, N.Y., whom we confused with our Votaws (when we were told it was spelled "Vattau" or "Vatteau") at one time. Hiram Banker was the son of William Banker, born in Rensselaer Co., N.Y. May 5, 1783, and Hiram was his eldest son, born in Schaghticoke, N.Y. Nov 9, 1807. William married, Feb. 1, 1807, Mary Adams, who was born March 10, 1782. Interesting families. William was the son of Adolph, of Nathaniel, of Adolph Bancker, who was baptized at Sleepy Hollow in 1701, son of Laurens Mattysen, a Dutchman, who first appeared at Harlem, Nov. 7, 1673. He variously appears in the old records as Lowrens Banckert, (1711) and as Leuwrens Mattysse Banckert. It is unfortunate that these Dutch people of old have no descendants through John Hunter Hollingsworth's wife Lucy Hedding Banker, (born in Rochester, N.Y. June 4, 1842) as they all died without issue. Actually, John H. Hollingsworth had four marriages. His first was to Susan Sterling Turner, by whom he had (1860) William Turner Pierce Hollingsworth, the man who is responsible for introducing the invention we know as Neon Light to America.

"ENVIABLE IMMORTALITY"

The following Memorial was published, at this writer's request, in the Friday, Nov. 3, 1972 issue of VARIETY, the Show Business daily, as well as in the big weekly issue.

IN MEMORIAM-HARRY HOLLINGSWORTH-25th ANNIVERSARY

Writer, director, actor, stage, screen and radio. Born Sept 3, 1888, Los Angeles died here Nov. 4, 1947. Suped for Oliver Morosco at the old Burbank, 1904; Leading Man in own stock company here, 1909; at Poli's, Hartford, Conn., 1912, and for Morosco, 1916, among others. With wife, Nan, as Hollingsworth & Crawford, in Vaudeville Act, "Bobbed," 1926-1930 for Keith-Orpheum. Legitimate stage for Henry Duffy and E. Leslie Thomas in thirties. Pioneer dramatic radio broadcasts on WGY, Schenectady, 1922-23; silent "The Tarantula," with the late Antonio Moreno, for Vitagraph, 1916. Many films from 1930 to 1945 for Columbia, Fox & Warners. After a quarter century, in our hearts his name is still in lights. Beloved husband and father. Nan, John and Harry Hollingsworth Jr. (etc.)

The editor received only two responses to that notice. One was by telephone, from a man whose mother remembered Harry Hollingsworth, very well. The other was from Mr. Albert Duffy, of Hollywood, no relation to the Henry Duffy mentioned above:

Nov. 8, 1972.

To the Hollingsworth Family:

I, too, knew Harry Hollingsworth. He was a warm, friendly man - a good man - as evidenced by the fact that you, his family, remember him with such affection. I was about ten years old when he was leading man for the Poli Players in Hartford. That was sixty years ago! He and my father became friends during his stay in Hartford and that's how I met him -- the first real, live actor I had ever known. My parents went to Poli's one night each week but I was too young to stay up that late so Harry left a ticket for me at each Saturday matinee.

In my Sunday best I'd strut up to the box office and ask (as loudly as I could) for the ticket Mr Hollingsworth had left for me. After the play I'd wait for him at the stage door. He always had a smile and a friendly greeting for me and then we would walk together up Main street to the trolley terminal talking about the play I'd just seen. It was a very heady experience for me and I've never forgotten it. I even remember the name of his leading lady - Marguerite Skirvin!

At any rate, Harry Hollingsworth's friendliness to a young boy probably had a lot to do with my choice of show business as a career. Not as an actor (though I tried!) but as a writer. Reading your memorial in Variety last week brought his face and his smile back to me vividly.

I believe that if a man's family and some of the people he met along the way remember him warmly and with love he has achieved an enviable sort of immortality.

1850 CENSUS ADDITION

This will graphically demonstrate the fallibility of census takers. We found more families in Queen Anne's County, Maryland (above) than we found, apparently, in the 1850. After a re-check, we found the following people, all listed clearly as "Holsworth." A second re-check, of the 1860, shows that they are listed as Hollingsworth. To identify which spelling is actually correct, we checked Stewart, who, on page 168, says: "Collin F. Hollingsworth. Of Queen Anne's County, Md., Issue: L. John A., II. A daughter, married Thomas H. Hammond, of Frederick County, Md." This family descends from John, of Kent Co., Md., who arrived from England in 1650. In HR 4:63 and 64, you can see how some of the Clay County, Kentucky Hollingsworths were listed as Hollands and Hollans. Ironically, they, too, are descendants of John Hollingsworth of Kent County! (Not from Valentine.)

Bush River Errata & Addenda

When Hinshaw's Quaker Encyclopedia was reprinted in 1948, some more data was added. Here are a few references to Hollingsworths. See our article on Elias Hollingsworth in our March issue. These entries prove that he and his sons did join the services of the American Revolution.

- a. (Page 1031) 1776-3-30. Elias Hollingsworth, of Cane Creek, disowned for taking up arms.
- b. ditto. 1776-7-27. Equille (Aquila) Hollingsworth, of Cane Creek, disowned for taking up arms & going forth in a warlike manner.
- c. Ditto. 1780-2-26. Benjamin Hollingsworth, son of Elias; disowned for taking up arms in a warlike manner; paper ordered to be read at Cane Creek.

Similar charges against Edward Hooker, James Parnel, William, Lawrence Enoch and John Pearson, Thomas Perkins, James, William and John Jr. Townsend. Their living descendants are eligible for membership in various patriotic organisations, provided they can prove descent, in each generation down from these proved soldiers, step by step. It may also be necessary to provide some non-Quaker documentation on the service of the soldiers.

Bell-Hollingsworth Family Bible

Thanks to Mrs. Dudley W. Day of Ozark, Missouri. She enclosed the following entries found in a bible now in the possession of one of the Bell-Thomas descendants in Wyman, Iowa, in her letter to us dated 5th Oct. 1972.

- (1) Mary Bell, born April 18th 1791.
- (2) William F. Hollingsworth, born July 30, 1833.
- (3) John M. Hollingsworth born July 21, 1835.

Mrs Day relates to us additionally, that Mary 'Polly' Bell was first married to one Henry Bell. They were divorced in 1832. She documents this by quoting the 1913 History of Clinton County, Indiana, (Claybaugh) at page 195 "Polly Bell was given a divorce (or one of the first) in October of 1832." She subsequently married John Hollingsworth the same year. Mrs Day relates that "John Hollingsworth and Polly Bell were married October 25, 1832 by Abner Baker, J.P., as per Clinton County Marriage Record 1, number 44." The above cited history on page 80, states that he came there to the town of Jefferson in 1830-1834 and had a section of land. She states that she believes page 82 of Stewart's "Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr.," (1925) (Hereinafter called Stewart) the statement "VII John, b. 1791, m. Abigail Broderick. He then married Mary Bell," refers to this same John Hollingsworth. This John<sup>6</sup> Hollingsworth was listed there as the 7th child of George and Jane (Henry) Hollingsworth, (of George and second wife Jane Elwell Hollingsworth) from Abraham, Thomas, Valentine. At the present time this looks alright to us, subject to a closer inspection. The census of 1850 for Washington Township, Clinton County, Indiana, page 659, lists:

William F. " " 17, farmer Indiana

If anybody has any further information about Mary Bell - her maiden name is not presently known - or John her husband, please advise.

OBITUARIES:

(1) Dr. J. B. Hollingsworth, of Ottawa, Canada. (1941)

Dr. J. B. Hollingsworth, Chief Inspector of Foods for Ottawa 33 years, dies in his 69th year.

Widely known in public health circles over a period of years, Dr. John Burton Hollingsworth, for many years chief inspector of foods for the city of Ottawa health department, died at noon on Sunday following an illness of a month's duration. He was 68 years of age and had spent his entire life in Ottawa and vicinity.

For 33 years Dr Hollingsworth occupied the position of chief food inspector for the city during which he gained wide distinction in this particular field of work. On July 30, 1940, he was superannuated on which occasion he was honored by the Central Canada Veterinary Association, of which he was past president, when he was presented with a beautiful mantle clock.

Dr Hollingsworth was born at Buckingham in 1873 and made his home in Ottawa since 1898. He received his early education at Buckingham, then attended McGill University, from which he graduated in the Faculty of Comparative Medicine in 1898 with the degree of D.V.Sc.

For a number of years he carried on a private practice in the Capital but was always a keen student of public health problems. This interest attracted the attention of the civic authorities and when in 1907 a food inspection division of the civic health department was created, he was appointed its chief.

Immediately following his appointment he took a post-graduate course in Chicago to better equip himself for his new duties and then during his long career in municipal service he made for Ottawa an enviable reputation for the sanitary quality of its food supply. He was a Canadian pioneer in this type of work.

Dr Hollingsworth was honored in 1923 by the International Association of Dairy and Milk Inspectors when he was elected its president.

He was the first Canadian to receive this honor. In 1911 he was elected to the Royal Society of Arts and Commerce and the Royal Sanitary Institute of London, England. In addition he was a charter member of the Central Canada Veterinary Association.

For years he belonged to the Ottawa Board of Trade, the Central Canada Exhibition Association and the Ottawa Canadian Club, and fraternally was a member of Builder's Lodge, AF & AM; Success Chapter No. 30 of the order of the Eastern Star, a life member of Carleton Chapter No. 16 of the Royal Arch Masons, and a member of Rameses Temple of the Mystic Shrine, Toronto.

In 1928 the Veterinary Medical Association of the United States particularly honored Dr Hollingsworth in appointing him a member of a committee of six to conduct a revision of the Standard Milk Control Code of the United States Public Health Service. Early in his career, the Ontario government honored him in embodying several of his recommendations in legislation for the sanitation of milk.

St. Luke's Anglican parish will particularly miss Dr Hollingsworth as one of its oldest and most active members. He was a member of the parish for over 40 years, during which time he served in various responsible offices, and played a leading part in the work leading to the erection of the present church in 1923.

Right up to the time of his passing, after a period of many years he was a member of the synod of the diocese of Ottawa as delegate from St Luke's parish, and was also a member of the executive of the synod. In parish activities he had served as rector's warden and peoples' warden on different occasions and several times was president of the men's association. In addition he was a member of the Anglican Fellowship Club. One of his roles in connection with the erection of the present St Luke's church was the chairmanship of the church interest fund.

Impressive tribute was paid to Dr Hollingsworth's memory by the church he served so faithfully, at his funeral on Tuesday afternoon. The service, which was under the direction of Rev Cecil Steen, present rector of St Luke's, took place in the church at Two o'clock. Rev J. W. Lindsay, rector of St George's church and formerly of St Luke's delivered the address and His Lordship Bishop Jefferson pronounced benediction. Interment took place in St Stephen's cemetery at Buckingham. Prior to the church service, a private service was held for members of the family at the Hulse and Playfair Limited parlors, 314 McLeod st., Members of Builders' Lodge AF & AM also held a service.

In addition to his wife, the former Mary Ann Elizabeth Smith whom he married 46 years ago, Dr Hollingsworth leaves three sons, Charles Carson of Lakewood, Ohio; H. Lee of Batavia, Java, and Alton B., of Ottawa; one daughter, Marjorie, wife of Capt. C. D. Smart, serving overseas with the Canadian Dental Corps; Four sisters, Mrs. William Dole of Arkansas City, USA; Mrs. George Edgerton of Kenosha, Wis.; Mrs. William Holman of Ladner, B.C.; and Mrs. Joseph Gilchrist, of Ottawa; and three brothers, Thomas, of Meckling, South Dakota, Dr. James E., of Avon, S.D. and Alfred of Pasadena, California. He also leaves six grandchildren. (From The Ottawa Citizen, some time in 1941; courtesy of Mrs. John V. Raper, Sr., of Kissimmee, Florida.)

(2) Henry Lee Hollingsworth, Buckingham, Quebec, 1889.

Buckingham, Que. The death of an old inhabitant, May 2, 1889. An old inhabitant has just passed away, is that of the death (sic) of Mr Henry Lee Hollingsworth, who resided on a farm a few miles from

the village, and singularly enough he has just returned home after seeking medical advice in Montreal. For some time past Mr Hollingsworth has had charge of the boarding house at the Emerald Mines and up to within a few weeks of his death was in fairly good health. Last week he went to Montreal Hospital from whence he returned Wednesday evening very much the worse for the journey. His family being all at Emerald he was conveyed thither and died yesterday morning May 2, 1889.

Deceased was about 59 years of age, an Englishman by birth but has resided here about most of his life. He leaves a large family to mourn their loss of a kind and good parent and also a name for sobriety and uprightness of which they may well be proud of. (3) Mrs. Ann Maria (Carson) Hollingsworth. (1898)

Ann Maria Carson was born near Thurso, Quebec, June 20, 1832. She was married, June 13, 1852, to Henry Lee Hollingsworth, and died Sept. 14, 1898. There were eleven children born to them, all of whom survive her. Besides bringing up her own large family she took to her heart and home a little orphan boy, Alfie Stewart, whom we all know as Alfie Hollingsworth, and brought him up with the same motherly love that she did her own children. At the age of fourteen she united with the Episcopal Church of which she lived a constant member till she died; her last words being 'I am going home.'

The funeral services were held in the M.E. Church at Meckling, South Dakota, Sept. 15, 1898, conducted by Rev. W. C. Cleworth, after which the remains were taken for interment back to Buckingham, Canada, in charge of her youngest son, James, who will remain there to attend McGill College. Grandma Hollingsworth leaves a host of friends here to mourn her loss, for all who knew her loved her. (From a South Dakota paper, 1898, courtesy of Mrs. Raper, as above.)

(4) Thos J. Hollingsworth, Marshallton, Delaware. (1945)

Thos J. Hollingsworth, president and founder of the E. J. Hollingsworth Company, of Marshallton, Del., passed away early yesterday morning in the Wilmington General Hospital, in the 84th year of his age. He had been stricken at his home, 4010 Main road, Roselle, last Monday morning. A native of Landenberg, Mr. Hollingsworth located in Delaware thirty-three years ago, when he established the coal and lumber business in Marshallton, which later expanded and now operates yards in Newport and Newark, as well as in Marshallton.

Although Mr Hollingsworth retained the presidency of the company in recent years the management has been with his three sons, Charles W., of Roselle; Herbert T., of Faulkland, and Howard J., of near Hockessin. He is also survived by seven grandchildren. Mr Hollingsworth was the organiser and treasurer of the Marshallton Building and Loan Association, and was a member of the Fourth and West Street Meeting of the Society of Friends. (From Daily Local News, March 26, 1945, West Chester, Penna. From files of Chester County Historical Society, West Chester, by kindness of our friend, John V. Hollingsworth, Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania.) On Mar 25, 1945, Thos J. Hollingsworth, in his 84th year. (5) Elijah F. Hollingsworth, Wilmington, Delaware (1866).

Deceased - Elijah F. Hollingsworth, of Wilmington, Del., died on the 9th instant (November 9, 1866 - Ed.) aged 60 years. He was of the firm of Harlan, Hollingsworth & Co., one of the largest business firms in the city, and one of the largest iron boat building concerns in the United States. (From Village Record, *ibid.*, Nov. 13, 1866.)

It is said that the estate of Elijah Hollingsworth of Wilmington, Delaware, recently deceased, exceeds \$700,000 in value. The United States stamps necessary to the validity of the will cost over \$300. It is said he bequeathed to each of his two daughters \$100,000, and the balance to his wife. Mr Hollingsworth was a well-known steamboat and car builder. (Feb. 9, 1867 issue of the Jeffersonian - *ibid.*)

(6) Edward Price Hollingsworth, West Chester, Penna. (1965)

Edward P. Hollingsworth, Sr., 64, husband of Isabel Malin Hollingsworth, of 25 Reservoir Rd., West Chester, died yesterday at the Chester County Hospital, West Chester. Mr. Hollingsworth was born in Ambler, a son of the late Robert Amos and Elizabeth Atkinson Hollingsworth. He had lived in West Chester since 1964. He was graduated from Ambler High School and attended Drexel Institute of Technology. He lived most of his life in Haverford Township.

He taught at Friends Select School, Philadelphia, for 14 years also serving as coach of soccer, wrestling and baseball. He was a member of the Goshen Friends Meeting and was an active member and past president of the Landsowne Stamp Club.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a daughter, Marion, wife of Smith E. Doane, of Moorestown, N.J.; a son Edward Price Hollingsworth, Jr. of Philadelphia; a brother, Albert of Horsham; three sisters, Marie, wife of Jordan Jungkurth and Phoebe, wife of Israel Hough, both of Ambler and Hannah, widow of Lawrence Bartholomew, of Willow Grove, and six grandchildren.

Aaron Monroe Hollingsworth, known to his friends as "Roe," was born in Rockdale County, Near Smyrna (Georgia), November 25, 1856, and died at his home in Atlanta, Feb. 23, 1941, at the age of 84. His father was George W. Hollingsworth, born Nov. 12, 1829. His mother's maiden name was Theresa Malinda Knight, born Dec. 10, 1830. There were eight children in this family and Aaron Monroe was the third child. His brothers and sisters are as follows: Joseph S., Henry W., Mrs. Louisa Clotfelter (dead), Mrs. Bridget Beam, Mrs. Susanna Carr (dead), and Miss Ruth Jane, who died when 16 years of age. His paternal grandfather's name was Aaron, son of Joseph and Rosannah (Nichols) Hollingsworth. He was born in Laurens County, South Carolina on

Feb. 23, 1803 and died Jan. 29, 1887. His grandfather Aaron was married on Feb. 10, 1829 to Ruth Rogers, who was born August 6, 1809 and died August 31, 1886.

Aaron Monroe Hollingsworth left his father's farm when a young man and went into the grocery business in Atlanta. Here he married Lelia V. Floyd on Oct. 24, 1883. His wife lived to the age of 75, dying May 30, 1939. A large family of children survive this couple. The children are: Lois, Nell, Anne Zahn, Mildred Scott, Fred Law, Aaron Monroe, Jr., Mary Frances and Ruth Green. The following children died: Edna A., Joseph T., both in infancy, and Charles C., a World War (I) veteran, died as a result of an illness contracted during the war.

One of the outstanding characteristics of Aaron Monroe Hollingsworth was his love for the Church and its work. He was a member of the Fourth Presbyterian Church in Atlanta as long as it existed and he then became a charter member of the Westminister Presbyterian Church. Here he served as a deacon until the destruction of the church by fire. He then became a member of the Decatur Presbyterian Church. During his boyhood he attended the old Smyrna Church. Regular attendance at church services was one of his rules of life.

He was a devoted husband and father and he was very proud of his large family of children and grandchildren. When he retired from business, he became interested in his flower garden and made rose growing his hobby. These he gave to his friends and neighbors. (From the minutes of the Hollingsworth Family Association of Rockdale County, Georgia, which existed from 1934 to 1941, and most thoughtfully transmitted to us by Mr. Douglas Hollingsworth of Bangor, Maine.)

According to Mrs. Jaine Bachtold, a great-granddaughter of Perry, indicated that Perry and 2 other children besides Archer - Pearl and Dale Raymond, Some time after 1903, Perry moved to California (Sacramento?) where he was associated with another bank. Perry S. Hollingsworth died in 1936 in Guerneville, California.

You asked where W. P. Hollingsworth of Benton County, Iowa, was in (the census of) 1850. My working hypothesis is as follows:

I believe that both of these entries describe William P. Hollingsworth, of Pierce<sup>6</sup>, of Benjamin<sup>5</sup>, of Elias<sup>4</sup>, of Jacob<sup>3</sup>, of Thomas<sup>2</sup> of Valentine. That William was born in 1819 and died in 1863, when he hanged himself in Louisiana, possibly in a prison camp for Northern soldiers. Miss Dorothy Lewis of Williamsburg, Indiana, believes that this William married Jane Lacy, which would certainly tie in with these census entries. The Lacy family were very strong abolitionists during this period and Miss Lewis mentioned that they were part of the event that became immortalized in Uncle Tom's Cabin.

If you can add anything that will help to prove or disprove this hypothesis, I hope you will let me know.

As for Perry Hollingsworth, we will publish it in a forthcoming issue. Perry himself appears in HR 8:98 as "Percy Hollingsworth, age 7" in the home of Richard Hollingsworth in Cedar County, Iowa.

Iowa, and today resides in the city of Arcadia, in Los Angeles County, California, aged 79 years and six months.

He married (1) Oct. 9, 1915, at Indianola, Warren Co., Iowa, Gladys Isabel Lambert, daughter of Ira Grant Lambert and his wife Dora Alma Thralls, natives respectively of Iowa and Indiana. Gladys was born May 2, 1895, at Adel, Dallas Co., Iowa, and died in August, 1944, at Sacramento, California, aged 49. She is buried there.

He married (2) Jan. 9, 1926, at Detroit, Wayne Co., Michigan, Emma Wunsch, daughter of Otto Paul and Amelia (Schorning) Wunsch, who were both born in Germany. Emma was born Dec. 29, 1896, in Germany, and lives today in Arcadia, California, aged 75.

And this concludes the eighth year of Hollingsworth Register. About back issues: It is increasingly difficult to get these reprinted.
