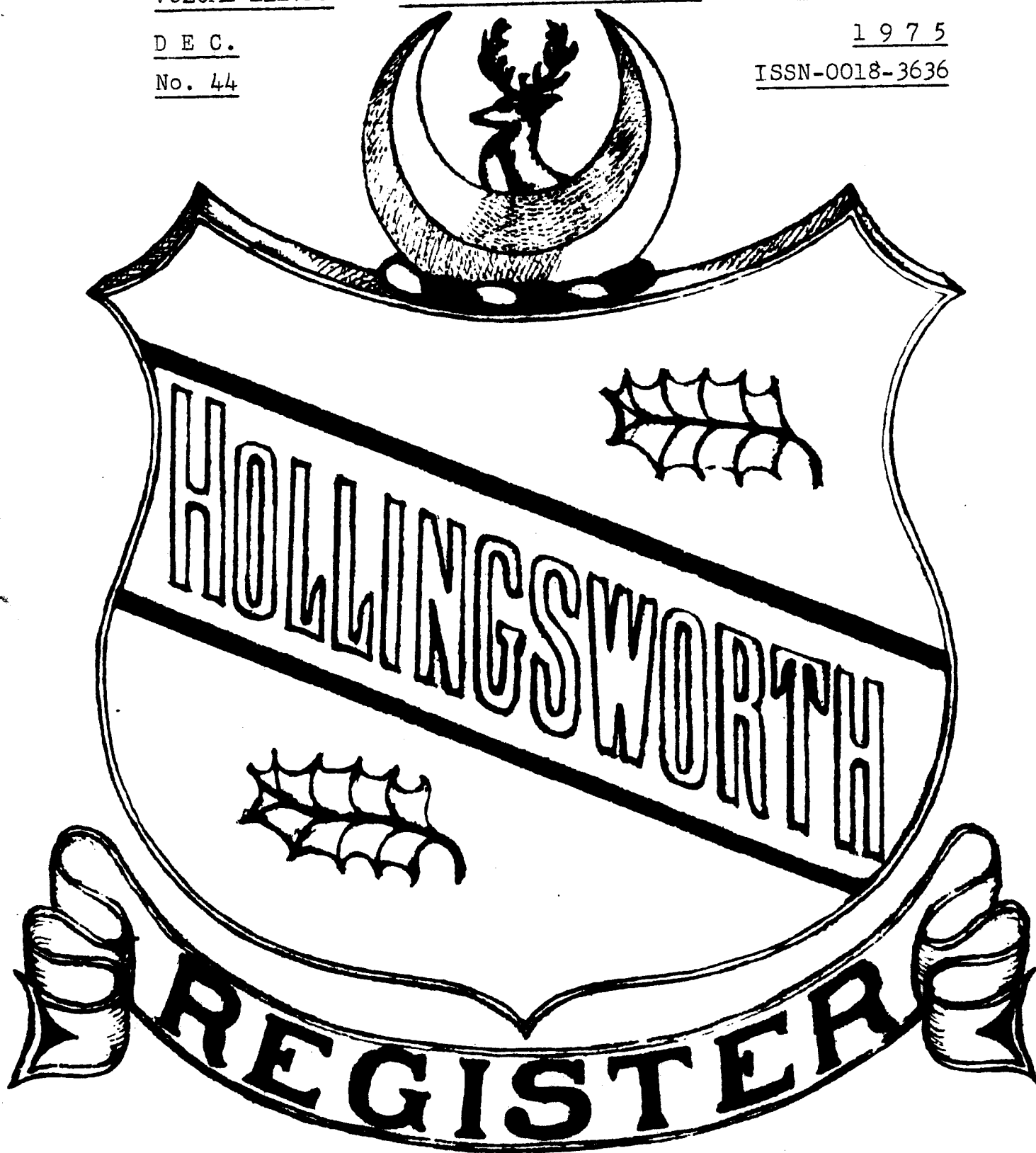
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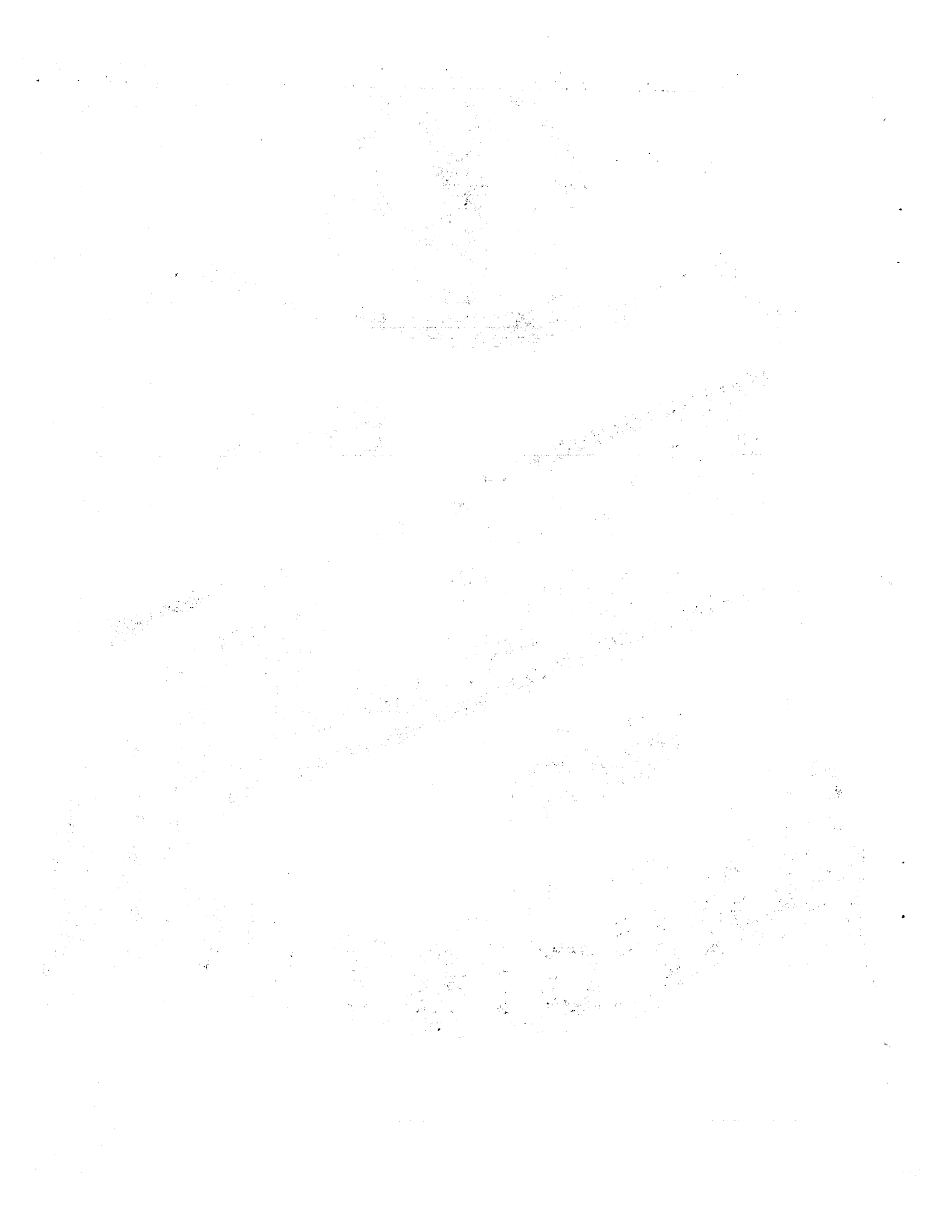

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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Hólegn (or Hólyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingsworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London, and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

A N E D I T O R I A L

Late again! Here it is January 12, 1976 and we are just now getting round to write down the 44th issue of Hollingsworth Register, which ought to have been done at least by November 1st, 1975! Queries are not accepted for HR, but if a reader has a Hollingsworth ancestor who appears to be untraced, a letter to the editor giving known details will be considered for publication at our discretion. Some untraced ancestors are that way because the descendant has only newly found the name, when a little research on one's own may uncover the lineage easily. We are seeking letters from those whose Hollingsworth ancestors are really untraced due to hard circumstances.

Patrick County, Virginia Hollingsworth Marriage Bonds

Alphabetized and extracted from a typescript in the Los Angeles Central Library, compared with a late copy from the office of the County Clerk, on microfilm 7911 part 2 of the Genealogical Society of Utah. This Clerk's record appears to be based on the loose bonds, and is subject to errors. A letter to the Clerk at Stuart, Va., asking for copies of the original loose bonds would be suggested in doubtful cases.

Widdow now Lives, Granted Granted (sic) to her by her Son Thomas Hollingsworth by Lease and Release being Lawful heir to said tract of Land or Plantation or by his the said Thomas's Attorney Surveyed by Samuel Young, Deputy Surveyor the fourteenth day of June, one thousand seven hundred and fifty three having Such Shape and form as specified in the Plat: Joseph Hollingsworth his Plat of said Land Beginning at a Stake & Runs North 27 Deg. west 27½ Chains to a Pine thence South 63 Degr. West 35 Chns to a Red oak Thence South 27 Deg.s East 27½ Chains to a Stake from thence Direct across the said Tract of Land to the Beginning Stake, Together with all and Singular the Houses Buildings Orchards Fields Meadows water courses, Profits, Commodities, Heriditaments and appurtenances Whatsoever to the sd. From Volume 1, page 320 of Deeds, Mecklenburg County, N.C. Deeds, Film 019,288 Gen. Society of Utah. Originally this was four books, 1-4, but now rebound into one. On Page 296 is a deed, Oct. 14, 1766, from Magnus Simonson to Thomas Hollingsworth, for 150 acres in the same area, witnessed by Elias Hollingsworth, Joseph Hollingsworth and Thomas Cox. The Probate of the deed is also missing. This is a typed copy, and is also partly illegible on the film. We won't reproduce it here. The above verbatim copy is from the original book. Cain Creek is now in Union County, or District, South Carolina, and has been there since the late 1700s. This above is the original grant from Martha, (nee Houghton) widow of Joseph³ (Thomas², Valentin¹, Henry) to her son Joseph Hollingsworth, Jr. We see that as Eldest son and Heir at Law, her son Thomas had total automatic right to the land of his late father, but in his case, the kindly Quaker influences prevailing, Thomas made a deed to his mother of part of the tract, and she then granted it to Joseph. This was probably according to the wishes of Joseph Senior. Mystery surrounds the family of Joseph Hollingsworth, Jr. It is possible that he was the father of Isaac and Jacob Hollingsworth of Mississippi.

"Jesse Hollingsworth Bible"

From Collections of the Maryland Historical Society, Baltimore, now on microfilm (3321 part 3) at The Genealogical Society of Utah. It was a gift of Charles Gordon Carroll in April, 1825, and was probably kept by that family. We call it "Jesse's" bible because he is the eldest person named therein, or, really, his wife Sinai is the eldest person. Jesse is not actually in this record! But Stewart's 1925 book, Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr., pages 27 and 28, makes it clear that this is the correct family. Jesse⁴ is son of Zebulon³, Henry², Valentin¹ Henry. Jesse was a merchant of Baltimore and his name is often found in records as far west as Kentucky, where he had vast amounts of land, though not as much as Levi his brother, of Philadelphia.

More Vermillion County, Indiana Marriages

Mrs. Mercedes Mull of Westville, Indiana, found the missing Hollings-
worth marriages in the series we presented in our issue of June, 1970,

Will of Robert Hollingsworth of Frederick County, Virginia

I ROBERT HOLLINGSWORTH of Frederick County and Commonwealth of Virginia do hereby make my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say I give to my loving wife Susannah one hundred acres of the Tract of land whereon I now live so long as she Continues my Widow, and after her death the said one hundred acres of land is to be sold at the discretion of my Executors (hereafter mentioned) and the money arising from the sale of such land shall be equally divided amongst my sons Joseph, Lewis, Robert, Abraham, Isaac, John, James and Edmond, to them and their heirs forever. I also give to my wife Susannah three work horses, (Page 492) Waggon and Gears with the whole of my plantation utenceals together with all my household furniture of any Description Whatsoever and also four Milch Cows and all my stock of hogs for the Support of my family which above Mentioned personal property she is at liberty to dispose of in what way and manner she may think proper NOTWITHSTANDING I have authorized my Executors to sell my Wifes dower of land after her death it is to be clearly understood that I do not mean to prohibit my said Wife and Executors from selling her dower of land at any time they may be disposed so to do. 2. It is my desire that my Executors shall sell as soon as they may think proper, the residue of the Tract of land whereon I now live it being one hundred acres also one other Tract of Land that I bought of Capt. Rice containing eighty nine acres, and also one other Tract of land adjoining James Thompson and my son George, Containing thirty acres, and the money arising from such sales shall be equally divided amongst my sons Joseph, Lewis, Robert, Abraham, Isaac, John, James and Edmond to them & their heirs for ever - 3. I give to my sons Joseph, Lewis, Robert, Abraham, Isaac, John, James and Edmond 2666 $\frac{2}{3}$ Acres of Land on highland Creek, also 533 $\frac{1}{3}$ acres of Land on Oter Creek (it being part of a Tract Containing 2666 $\frac{2}{3}$ my part being 1333 $\frac{1}{3}$ acres) to be equally divided amongst the above mentioned sons to them & their heirs forever - 4. I give to my daughters Easter, Elizabeth, Hannah, and Susannah 800 acres of land on Oter Creek it being the residue of the above mentioned 1333 $\frac{1}{3}$ acres on Oter Creek, to be equally divided amongst my above named Daughters to them and their heirs forever. 4. (sic) It is my desire that all the remainder of my personal Estate shall be sold by my Executors, and the moneys arising from such sales (493) shall be disposed as follows that is to say, My Executors shall furnish each of my Daughters with fifty dollars a piece when they Come of full age or day of Marriage and the remaining part of said moneys to be equally divided amongst my sons, Joseph, Lewis, Robert, Abraham, Isaac, John, James and Edmond to them and their heirs forever. 5. If any of my above mentioned sons should died without Issue before they

Come of age then the survivors shall have the Estate of them or they so deceased equally divided amongst them and their heirs forever. 6. If any of my daughters should die without Issue before they come of age then the survivors shall have the Estate of them or they so deceased equally divided amongst them and their heirs for ever - 7. I give to my son George that tract or parcel of Land that I purchased of George Rice on highland Creek containing two hundred acres to him and his heirs forever. 8. It is my desire that my Executors do make Titles to the heirs of Capt. George Rice, decd. of a Certain Tract or parcel of land on Uter Creek Containing 1333 1/3 acres willed by him to the said George Rice to his heirs - 9. It is also my desire that if any of my sons should be disirous of living bound to any good Trade they may be allowed that liberty 10. If any of my Executors should Chuse to settle on anv part of my Military land so as not to exceed four hundred acres in each lot, they shall not be inturrupted by any of the rest of my children and the said four hundred acres of Land so settled on they shall hold as their portion and quota - AND LASTIY I do hereby Consti-tute and appoint my sons, Joseph Hollingsworth, Lewis Hollingsworth, and Robert Hollingsworth Jr. Executors of this my last will and Testa-ment hereby revoking all other or former wills or Testaments by me here-tofore made IN WITNESS whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 15th day of July in the year 1792.

The Last will and Testament of Robert Hollingsworth decd was proved by the oaths of John Nelson and Michael Smith two of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of Joseph Hollingsworth and Lewis Hollingsworth two of the Executors therein nam-ed who made oath thereto according to Law Certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate thereof in due form giving security, whereupon, they with security Entered into and acknowledged Bond Conditioned for their due and faithful administration of the said Decedent's Estate

Note: See Stewart's book, page 36. Robert was son of George⁴ and Hannah (McKay or McCoy) Hollingsworth (Abraham³, Thomas², Valentine¹, Henry.) and was born c1744; died in 1799. His wife was Susannah Rice, probably daughter of above said Capt. George Rice. The tracts he mentions on Highland and Otter Creeks were Military Land tracts in Kentucky. His widow and some of the children removed to Shelby County, Kentucky. His son Abraham moved to West Union, Adams County, Ohio and became identi-fied with the "Underground Railroad" helping slaves escape to Canada after the British Dominions abolished slavery.

Nicholass Ree of Tanderagee - Found?

Our reader, Mr. Albert W. Twaddell, of Phoenixville, Pennsylvania, recently commissioned research on the ancestors of Ann Ree, first wife of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr. Your editor is a "specialist" in Irish research, learned purely from sixteen years' experience, mind you, and although some research was spent on this line years ago, it had come to nought. Men like William B. Hollingsworth and Joseph Aldger Stewart probably did no research on any of the Irish ancestors in Irish civil records, certainly not on the Hollingsworths, much the less on the Rees. Both conducted their genealogical surveys prior to June 30, 1922, when the Public Record Office in Dublin was bombed and burned to ashes. I would say that this was one of the most singular sins of omission in genealogy I have yet seen. Before that infamous day, the reply from one letter to either that office, or the office of the Ulster King of Arms in the Castle, might have contained more answers than we shall ever be able to glean from decades of sifting those ashes now. With all of their ambitious plans to publish the genealogy of Valentine Hollingsworth, they wrote up a tree but forgot to dig for its roots! This, our journal, since April, 1965, has, at least, tried to reverse, and with this article, a little more proof of the claim can be published.

With the kind urging of Mr. Twaddell, in late 1975, I started out once more to try and find the mysterious "Nicholass Ree of Tanderagee." You all will be startled by what I found. It had lain in a film on my own shelves for nearly five years, waiting to be searched, and had probably been seen by me before, but unrecognized.

Background:

Page 203 of Lurgan Monthly Meeting Book of births, deaths and marriages (another of my own films, courtesy of the Northern Ireland Society of Friends, via the Public Record Office, Belfast) has Valentine Hollingsworth's family record, in part quoted:

"...and upon the seaventh day of the fowerth month (June-Ed.) Anno Domini 1655 he tooke to wife Ann the daughter of Nicholass Ree of Tanderagee in the County of Ardmagh aforesd and of Ann his wife, who was born in Tanragee aforesaid about the year 1628...

"And it came to pass that on the first Day of the second month Anno Domi. 1671 the aforesaid Ann (Wife of y^e said Vallantine Hollingsworth) Died..."

The Burial entries indicate she was laid in the Friends' graveyard in the townland of Moyraverty, Seagoe Parish, County Armagh. The burial ground is still intact, surrounded by a high stone wall with a locked iron gate. (No memorial stones are there. Although in George Fox's time (died 1691) they were allowed, later Friends shunned them, and when the

original stones (including Fox's own!) had fallen into decay, they refused to erect new ones, allowing only unmarked fieldstones for head or foot markers. (Another sin of omission, I think!))

But now, what of more records of this Ann's father, are extant? What beside the above meagre Quaker entry alludes to Nicholass Ree? I thought for a time that this job would prove impossible, the question would remain unanswered.

The spelling of the Quaker entry (Ree) could vary with spellings in other records. It might be in reality a Scots surname like McRay, McRea, McCrea, McCree, or even the "Machree" as in "Mother Machree," the old song of Ernest R. Ball. Or it might be the Anglicized form without the Mac, as, Ray, Rea, or Ree. As will be seen, I overlooked one spelling! That spelling would remove it from this part of the alphabet.

How about Tanderagee? I examined its history during the period of the Plantation, the Rebellion, the Parliamentary Wars, the Commonwealth and the Restoration of Charles II., a period of only fifty years, from 1610-1660. A clearer knowledge of the history of the place often gives a better idea of what individuals might have done.

The current spelling is Tanderagee. The Poll Tax of 1659 has it spelt that way, with an alternate name Taunatelee. Samuel Lewis, in his Topographical Dictionary of Ireland, (1837) Volume 2, says it is a town in the parish of Ballymore, Barony of Orier, County of Armagh. The Ecclesiastical parish, therefore, is Ballymore, in the jurisdictions of the Established (Protestant) Church of Ireland. In the deposition of Elizabeth Rolleston quoted below, it (Ballymore) is equated with Tanderagee.

All that remains of the Hearth Tax Roll for Armagh, 1664 (typed copy made before 1922, film 14448 part 79 GS) shows no such name in the twelve pages covering the Barony of Orier, though one David Rea has one chimney taxed in Derrykeighan (p. 7).

Another village in the same parish is Clare. It was granted by King James I. to Michael Harrison, and passed to "Henry Boucher" according to Lewis (op. cit.) by 1619. (The 1630 Muster Roll of Armagh shows this surname to be Booker.) He erected a bawn, or fortified castle in that year, which was destroyed in the outbreak of the Rebellion of 1641. Boucher, or Booker, had planted his estate with Scots and English tenants.

We have discussed in this journal the possibility that Henry Hollinworth of Ballyvickcrannell, Seagoe Parish, father to Valentine, was murdered or died fighting during the same rebellion. Film 33836 part 48 GS contains most of the sworn depositions taken after the rebellion, from manuscripts in Trinity College, Dublin, copied by Tenison Groves, genealogist. Elizabeth Rolleston's deposition would almost have us believe Nicholass Ree suffered a similar fate:

The Deposition of Elizabeth Rolleston, of Magherecow, in the County

of Ardmagh, widdow... deposition taken 21 August 1642...at Ballymore, alias Tandaragee...that Edmund o Hanlon with his Rebels of Orier burned the church of Ballymore with Capt. St. John's Castle and the whole brought and hanged James Brombley, Richard Wigson and others in Ballymore, als Tandaragee..and at the Clare, Patrick oge mcRoorey o Hanlon with his rebels hanged Thomas Tatton, William Clay, John Thompson and killed Thomas Smith, John Grantham, John Parker, John Greear, Matthew german, John Willimot, and burned the Earl of Bath's Castle ... with many more others killed." As you will see later, "many more others" could include Ree. Ann was only a thirteen year old when this terror was wrought in her parish. Many of the planters escaped to England. Of course, The O Hanlon of Tandroagee, Chief of the sept, who committed these atrocities, had the "excuse" that King James had divested him of some of his lands prior to 1610.

Search of extant army musters, 1642, shows no Ree, though some men named Rea served. But no companies or regiments raised in Ardmagh are among these lists, they being from Antrim, Downe, Donegal & Londonderry.

The spelling Rea, in Ireland, and in America, is usually pronounced like Ray, or ... Wray, not "Ree^lah," or "Ree." I searched one other source which found our man: (Editor's own microfilm collection.)

The above is from British Museum Additional MS 4770, the muster roll of the Ulster Plantation, dating circa 1630/31. It may not be clear to the reader just how certain I am that Nicholas Wray (name may be duplicate as also Charles Watkin may) above is Nicholass Ree of Tan-

deragee. The following will enlighten you:

The servitor, Lord Grandison (sic) landlord of Nicholas Wray, was Sir Oliver St. John, Knight, 2nd son of Nicholas St. John of Lydiard Tregorze, Wiltshire, by Elizabeth Blount (dau of Richard Blount of Maplederem, Oxfordshire) according to Wiltshire Visitation Pedigrees, Harleian Record Society, Volume 105. Sent to Ireland by Queen Elizabeth I. in 1601, he held many important offices there. Rev. George Hill in his monumental An Historical Account of the Plantation in Ulster (1877) pp. 310, 557-8, 570 has more to say about his grants.

Grant to Sir Oliver St. John, master of the Ordnance, the castle & town of Tonregie (Tanderagee) otherwise Ballymore, Mullabedy, Tullagh-Hugh, Darrowgallen, & Lisbane, 1 balliboe each; Cargines, 2 balliboes; Mullaghglasse, Tawnereogh, Tawnatee, Coronaght and Creenaghbegg, one each; Lisray, 1/3 balliboe; in all, 1,500 acres. Rent £12. English; created the manor of Ballymore, with 600 acres in demesne, and a court baron. To hold forever, as of the castle of Dublin, in common socage & subject to the conditions of the plantation of Ulster. 28 Decr 1610. (Editor reviewed original grant James I., Vol 2, p. 31, Lodge's Records of the Rolls, Film 14462 part 2, GS Utah.)

The said Lord Viscounte Grandison of Lymericke hath erected upon the said towne and lands called Ballymore al' Tonreege, one faire stronge castle and bawne of lyme and stone, a town thereunto adjoining, consisting of 35 English-lyke houses, and a parke enclosed with a pale of 8 foote in height, conteyninge 300 acres of lande; and also one water mylle upon the river Cowsher runeing upon the south side of Ballymore. (P. 570) He died in Feb. 1630/31, will proved Prerogative Court of Armagh, and the above Ballymore, or Tanderagee, descended to his nephew Capt. John St. John, who held it at the time of the Rebellion of 1641. Pynnar's Plantation Survey of 1620 indicates the town had increased in buildings being all inhabited with English tenants, with 9 Irish families in the town who came to Church (Protestant) and had taken the Oath of Supremacy to King James.

Deposition of Mrs. Frances St. John, aged 30, at Lisnegarvy (Lis* burn) 21 Apr. 1653. She lived in Clanbrassell at outbreak of rebellion (23 Oct.) 1641. "being prisoner (of) the Irish when she heard Capt. St. John's wife was to be released and sent with convoy to Lisnegarvy, she came along with her and many other English prisoners about the latter end of January (1642)." She relates murder of many prisoners, including one Thomas Calvert of Clanbrassell, her neighbour, by Owen Roe McCameall who boasted he had hanged Calvert shortly after the outbreak. Clanbrassell was a section of County Armagh next to Onealand at that time, and where the Hollingsworths lived. The above shows the St. John's were taken prisoner and their castle and church at Tanderagee destroyed. Did Nicholas Wray die at that time? More later.

CONCLUDED: Thus you have a total of 358 wills and/or administrations on Hollandsworth, Hollingsworth, Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth and Hollinworth granted or proved between 1858 and 1900 inclusive. As we explained at the start of this series in December, 1970 (!) the original wills and other papers are probably on file either in Somerset House, at the Principal Probate Registry (London Registry) Offices, or at the various District Registries as noted. The bombing of the Exeter District by Nazi action during World War Two may have destroyed everything up to that time including the originals and copies, similar to the problem in Ireland. However, your editor has made no inquiries about this. It is very doubtful if any H. entries were proved in that district. The above calendar gives the full name, address and rank or occupation of the decedent, the date of the grant and the estimated value of the estate in parentheses; Date of death and place, insofar as the calendar showed it, the administrators or executors, and relationships and/or rank or occupation thereof. Upon inquiry at the offices cited, one would expect to get not only the wills or administration bonds, but all the other papers which usually go with such estates. The cost to us to buy them all would obviously be prohibitive. If any of our readers obtains the papers of any decedent in the above list, why not loan a copy, or send a xerox copy of the file on and we will try to schedule it for publication.

The calendar continues after 1900, and onward to our own day; it is a matter of public record of the British Government. But we decided to conclude it at 1900. If enough readers demand a continuation, we will be glad to continue, provided the costs to us are not beyond reach.

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth:

I read with interest your article in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram concerning the Hollingsworth lineage. Since I recently learned of a gr-gr grandmother whose maiden name was Hollingsworth, I wondered if my ancestor was of this same lineage.

This little information I have was given an aunt of mine some years ago and is, as far as I know, an accurate copy of Bible records from an old Spence family Bible. However, I do not know who has the Bible or if it is still in existence. But in checking U.S. Census microfilm for 1850 and 1860 of Fayette County, Alabama, it seems to support the record of the Ford family. The 1850 census is unreadable in some portions and probably Daniel Ford family is listed along with the same Hollingsworth families as the 1860 census. It seems a good guess that some of these Hollingsworth families listed almost consecutively on both censuses would be related to Jane Hollingsworth Ford. At any rate, I'm enclosing the information with the hope it will be useful to you. If by some chance my ancestor is in your lineage and you have more information on her family, I would appreciate hearing from you. Thank you...

Daniel Newton Ford was born in Fayette County, Alabama on May 26, 1826. He married Jane Hollingsworth Jan. 17, 1848. She too was born there on Dec. 24, 1829. According to this record, Daniel N. Ford was killed at Fort Donaldson, Tenn. Jan. 15, 1862. Sometime before 1879 the widow moved with some of the children to Milam Co., Texas. A younger daughter, Hanna E., is recorded as married at her mother's home near Rockdale in Milam Co. in Sept. 1879. Jane Hollingsworth Ford died near Cameron, Milam Co., Texas, August 5, 1880.

Hanna Elizabeth Ford was born Nov. 24, 1855 in Fayette Co., Ala. Her marriage to James I. Spence was Sept. 18, 1879, Milam Co., Texas. James Spence was born March 30, 1855, Pulaski Co., Illinois. The four children of this marriage are: Gertrude, b. Aug. 2, 1882, Albany, Texas, died May 27, 1886, same; Joseph Edward, Sept. 19, 1884, same; Ina Lea, July 19, 1886, same; died Malakoff, Texas, Jan. 7, 1919. Enoch, Aug. 25, 1889; James I. Spence died June 6, 1892 at Albany. Mrs. Spence married a second time in Coryell Co., Texas to E. L. Courtney on June 22, 1893. One child from this marriage, Hilton W. b. Aug. 16, 1895 Gatesville, Texas. Parents of James I. Spence: James I. Spence Sr. b. Jan. 28, 1827 in New York; Amanda Orman, Oct. 18, 1833, Tennessee, m. Oct. 19, 1850.

Editor's comments: The 1830 Federal Census of Alabama shows John Hollonsworth in Fayette County, the only one listed at the time. If Jane Hollingsworth was truly born in that county in 1829, she probably was the daughter of John. If he was the John Hollingsworth who lived there in 1850, and we see no reason to question it, her parents would be John and Zilpha (Galloway) Hollingsworth. John was an orphan of Samuel and Mary Hollingsworth of Franklin County, Georgia. Samuel was the son of Jacob⁴ and Mary (Brooks) Hollingsworth (of Samuel³, Samuel², Valentin¹, Henry). Any comments from readers?
