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Quaint Extracts From Our Files

The editor of Hollingsworth Register has been sorting his files! It is always good to do this. You see, he now has three letter size file cabinets (full suspension, of course!) containing four drawers each. Each drawer, except one, is jammed with folders containing documents, letters, photostats, xerox copies from books, or certificates. A rough estimate gives about 24 feet of documents in all 12 drawers! Much of this material consists of reports to clients and has no value for our readers. However, there are a large number of folders marked "Hollingsworth Register." In these are numberless letters dating back twenty years. Included among those more closely related to the editor's own family is the following letter from the daughter of Frederick Hollingsworth's youngest son's (Wallace) partner in the music business in Newton, Iowa, more than seventy-five years ago.

Mrs. Marguerite Carl Holland was still living in Newton in 1978 but your editor did not contact her. Her memories of childhood were thrilling to read eighteen years ago. When sorting was in progress, coming across the following letter again thrilled us.

Newton, Iowa  
January 10, 1962

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth:

Mrs. Glenn Green phoned me one night several months ago and asked if I remembered W. W. Hollingsworth. I was about eight years old when he lived in Newton and my memory of him is slight. I remember him as a tall, rather thin and pale man. The business of Hollingsworth & Carl was located on the west side of the square in Newton. It was a large and what was called a double room. A young woman, aged 16, but an accomplished musician worked in the store for the firm. Her name was Evelyn Rogers but where she could be found I have no idea. Her father was a doctor in Newton and they lived on East 4th Street South. I can't remember if the house where they lived is still standing or not.

When the Hollingsworths lived in Newton their home was at what is now - 512 First Ave. East. It is now owned and occupied by Mrs. E. E. Graber. The place is only about two and one-half blocks from my home. (I live in the house in which I was born.) I used to go over to Hollingsworths to play with Gladys. I can remember her, also, as being very pale, always at the piano picking out a tune by ear. It seemed to me she was always coughing.

I remember the red, open top automobile which Mr. Hollingsworth bought and that one time it couldn't make a rather steep hill and Gladys and I played and skipped about on the road saying - Hippety Hop to the Barber Shop, Etc.

Mrs. Hollingsworth I remember quite well. She was a very sober person - that is, I mean, I can't recall ever having seen her smile.

One time I recall an incident that I have never forgotten. Callers came to visit at the Hollingsworths when I was there with my parents and Mrs. Hollingsworth went into a dark closet to change her blouse and skirt and came out of the closet with her face powdered very unevenly and with the company all assembled, no one could tell her. I was quite embarrassed over the incident. Queer how we remember things like that and really important ones escape us!

I used to write to Gladys and had no idea she was still at Portsmouth (New Hampshire - Ed.). Its been so long I have forgotten whether or not she has children and if her husband is still living. My husband passed on in 1955. Since then I have been a secretary at the Iowa State Commerce Commission in Des Moines. I commute 70 miles a day. Right now it is rather difficult as we are having below zero weather. I live alone in the big old house with only a cat for company. I expect to go to California to visit my niece, Mrs. Miriam Bruther, 7101 Stansbury, Van Nuys, in March or April. I was out there in 1958 and I enjoyed myself so much I hated to come back to Iowa. At my age, though, it is hard to break away from one's home and surroundings. ... I don't believe I knew anything at all about Mr. Hollingsworth's mother or the balance of his family...I wish I could help you in your compiling of information regarding W. W. Hollingsworth, but I find I really can't remember very much about him...

Best wishes for 1962.

Note: While in Newton in 1978, your editor met Mrs. Graber, who still lives in the old Hollingsworth house. The auto mentioned was a 1905 Cadillac, according to Gladys Hollingsworth Smith, the daughter mentioned. More details will be given in the following series.

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Frederick Hollingsworth Family in Iowa Newspaper Notices...Part One.

Mrs. Lida Lisle Greene, for many years librarian at the Department of Archives and History in Des Moines, copied out many notices from the papers for both Newton and Kellogg, Iowa, in the period covering 1960 and 1961. (Mrs. Holland mentions her in the above letter.) At that time Mrs. Greene lived in Newton. We now begin, after nineteen years, to publish her findings.

(1) From Newton Journal, May 28, 1902: (Special feature on Kellogg, Iowa --- ) Kellogg is located nine miles east of Newton on the Great Rock Island route...The population of Kellogg is 800 and the indications point to a 1000 town in the near future...The town is well represented by religious denominations, there being five churches, well organized and holding regular services. Last but not least the "Kellogg Cornet Band" with a membership of twenty; this band will give public concerts during the season now at hand... (there follows a number

of sketches of prominent businessmen...)

W. W. Hollingsworth and Company - Druggists. In Kellogg one would naturally be attracted by Hollingsworth and company's beautiful store. The stock carried by these gentlemen consists of drugs, druggists's sundries, perfumes, toilet articles, etc. This is also an extensive music house, being one of the oldest in Jasper County, the factory agents for the world famed Kimball pianos and other well-known brands. These goods are sold on easy payments or in exchange for horses, colts or any first class stock. These gentlemen guarantee the price as well as the quality. The main office is at Kellogg with a branch at Newton where their goods can be seen. If you want a piano or organ don't look elsewhere.

(2) Newton Journal, Dec. 10, 1902: Greatest Opportunity Ever Offered Sale Closes Saturday Dec. 13 ... The W. W. Hollingsworth Company have inaugurated the greatest piano and organ sale ever known to the residents of Newton and Jasper County ... Last year when W. W. Hollingsworth opened business in Newton they gave a special ten day sale ...

(3) Newton Journal, August 12, 1903 as copied from the lost files of the Kellogg Tribune: W. W. Hollingsworth, who has been in business in Kellogg for many years, and who enjoys the high esteem of our good people, has sold out his drug store to C. W. Woodward, of Monroe. Mr. Woodward was a former resident of Kellogg and has many warm friends here who wish him abundant success in his new undertaking. He will take charge of the store in a short time. R. E. Birchard, the trusted clerk, will remain with the new proprietor. Mr. Hollingsworth will devote his whole time to his musical instrument business in Newton, which is growing. He and his family will probably move there. Our good people will be sorry to lose Mr. and Mrs. Hollingsworth but our loss will be Newton's gain. All of us join in extending to Mr. and Mrs. Woodward a hearty welcome in their return to their old home.

(4) Newton Journal, Aug. 19, 1903. Since W. W. Hollingsworth and A.M. Carl formed their partnership in Dec. 1902, they have had a splendid business. Twenty years of honorable dealing with the people of Jasper County is largely the secret of their success and now that Mr. Hollingsworth has sold his drug store at Kellogg and can devote his entire time to the business here, we feel we are safe in predicting that Newton will have one of the largest and at best music stores in the state. People have found that they can save from twenty five to seventy five dollars by buying pianos at home and we can advise anyone wanting a musical instrument of any kind to get prices of Hollingsworth-Carl Company before buying.

(5) Newton Journal, Oct. 14, 1903. W. W. Hollingsworth of the Hollingsworth-Carl Company has purchased the Mrs. Jennie Blanchard property on east Main Street and will soon be permanently located.

(6) Newton Journal, Oct. 21, 1903 - Real Estate Transfer. W. W. Hollingsworth to J. F. and Dora Hackett, lots 5 and 8, Blair and Adair second addition to Kellogg, for \$1,250.

AGED RESIDENT OF NEWTON DIES Jacob Hollingsworth Passes Away at Residence Here - After an illness of more than one year of heart disease, Jake Hollingsworth, 75 years old, passed away at his home, 512 South Fourth Avenue West at 12:30 o'clock today. Mr. Hollingsworth came to Jasper county in 1888 and settled in this city where he has since made his home. He was a teamster and was the oldest member of the road gang improving the Jasper County roads. He is survived by a son, Jake, Jr., of Alma, Nebraska, two daughters, Mrs. Will Stout, of Michigan, and Mrs. Madge Sladek of this city, two step daughters, Mrs. Al Dial of California, and Mrs. O. W. Kindley of Des Moines. Besides these he leaves one brother, Sam Hollingsworth of Wisconsin. His wife died two years ago last February. No funeral arrangements have been made. (The Newton Daily News, July 23, 1917 courtesy Lida Lisle Greene.)

(3) Lucy Hollingsworth Auten - Des Moines, Iowa - 1907.

Lucy Hollingsworth-Auten was born in Kellogg thirty seven years ago, where she was educated in the public school and grew to womanhood and died in the hospital in Des Moines, Sept. 21, 1907, whither she had gone for an operation for abscess. Body was brought to Kellogg and interred in the cemetery there. (Newton Journal, Oct. 2, 1907, by kindness of Mrs. Lida L. Greene. Lucy was your editor's grand aunt, daughter of Edward E. and Rachel (McFadden) Hollingsworth, only one of two out of their nine children who did not go to California. She was born 23 Dec 1869 in Rock Creek Township, Jasper County, just east of Kellogg, only ten months after the death of her grandfather, Frederick.)

(4) John B. Hollingsworth, Inglewood, California - 1933.

John B. Hollingsworth passed away on June 13th at his residence at 10807 Lennox (sic) Avenue at the age of 73. He was a pioneer of Lennox, having lived here the past 18 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Hollingsworth, and two sons, Albert A. Hollingsworth, Lennox grocer, and Harry H. Hollingsworth, well known stage and film actor, and a granddaughter Miss Bernice Hollingsworth on the staff of the Lennox Tribune.

Funeral Services will be held at the parlors of Hammond & Mispagel tomorrow afternoon, Friday June 16th at 2 o'clock, Rev. Wilt of Lennox M.E. Church will officiate. Interment Inglewood Park. (From Inglewood Daily News, Thursday, June 15, 1933, Page 2, Column 6, found by your editor in early 1960 in the files of the paper. Lennox was and still is, an unincorporated portion of Los Angeles County. The place where the editor's grandfather, John Benjamin Hollingsworth, died, later became part of Inglewood.)

(5) Mrs. Helen Beryl (Newsome) Hollingsworth - Canada - 1969.

Entered Into Rest HOLLINGSWORTH, Helen Beryl - In the hospital at Parry Sound on Sunday, March 2, 1969, Helen Beryl Newsome, in her 47th year, beloved wife of Philip Victor Hollingsworth, and dear mother of Gary, Paul, Philip and Lisa Hollingsworth, all of Parry Sound; dear daughter of Mrs. Georgina Newsome of Plum Hollow and the late J. W. Newsome; sister of Walter B. Newsome, Plum Hollow and Mrs. Murray Seaman (Eileen) of Lyndhurst.

Resting at the Logan Funeral Home, James Street, Parry Sound, for the funeral service on Tuesday, March 4. Cremation. (From a paper, unidentified, but dated about 3 March 1969, courtesy of our cousin, Mrs. Marion Young.)

(6) Edith B. Hollingsworth, Windsor, Vermont - 1979.

HOLLINGSWORTH RITES THURSDAY. Windsor, Vt. (Special) - A memorial service for Edith B. Hollingsworth, who was born in Baltimore and authored three books on gardening, will be held here Thursday. Mrs. Hollingsworth, who was 86, died Sunday after a lengthy illness at her home in Windsor, where she lived since 1955.

The three books that she wrote are "Flower Chronicles," "Her Garden Was her Delight" and "Gardening on Main Street." The former Edith Kirk worked with the American Red Cross during World War I. She graduated from Bryn Mawr College in 1916 and married William T. Hollingsworth in 1925. Mr. Hollingsworth died in 1975.

She is survived by a sister, Mrs. Charles Cooke, of Cooperstown, N.Y.; a son, Kirk Hollingsworth of New York; a grandson, and a great-grandchild. (Baltimore Sun, May 15, 1979 (Tuesday), courtesy of our subscriber, Mr. Bryson Curry of Forest Hill, Maryland.)

(7) Same person:

Edith Hollingsworth dies at 86; wrote garden books. Windsor, Vt. (Special) - A memorial service for Edith B. Hollingsworth, a native of Baltimore who wrote several books on gardening, will be held at 4 P.M. today at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Windsor. Mrs. Hollingsworth, who was 86, died Sunday in her sleep at her home in Windsor. Known as Buckie, she was the daughter of a former head of Samuel Kirk and Son, Inc., the silver firm in Baltimore.

Before retiring in 1955, she had worked as executive secretary of the museum that is now the St. Gaudens National Historical Site and had earlier served as an editor of several magazines in New York. While working as art editor of Century Magazine, she met her husband, Will Hollingsworth, an artist who became curator of the St. Gaudens museum. He died in 1975. She was educated at Bryn Mawr School in Baltimore and at Bryn Mawr College. During World War I, she served in the Red Cross in France and lost the sight of an eye in an ambulance accident.

Following her retirement from the museum, she wrote the gardening books. She is survived by a son, Kirk Hollingsworth, of New York, a grandson and a great-granddaughter. The family suggests that memorial donations be made to the American Friends Service Committee or to Mount Ascutney Hospital in Windsor. (Baltimore Sun, Thurs. May 17, 1979, per Mr. Curry.)

(8) Dr. Egbert W. Hollingsworth, Baltimore, Md., 1980.

Dr. Egbert W. Hollingsworth, 68, husband of Reba McDowell Hollingsworth, of Bel Air, died Wednesday, Feb. 27, at Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore. Born in Greenwood, South Carolina, he was the son of the late Charles William and Annie Frances Feuchtenberger Hollingsworth.

He was a graduate of Greenwood High School and received his bachelor's degree from Clemson University in 1933, his master's degree from Louisiana State in 1935 and his doctorate degree in 1941 from Iowa State University. He served as an officer while on active duty in the U.S. Army and at the time of his departure from the armed forces, was a Lieutenant Colonel. He was employed as a civilian by the Department of the Army at Edgewood Arsenal from 1946 until his retirement in 1971.

Mr. (Sic) Hollingsworth served as chief engineer, Munitions Division, Chemical and Radiological Laboratory, was chief scientist of the Chemical Corps Board, and was deputy commander of Operations Research Group, U.S. Army Munitions Command.

He was a member of Main Street United Methodist Church, Greenwood, S.C., Phi Si, AXE and Alpha Chi Sigma fraternities, and the American Chemical Society.

Funeral services were conducted from the Blyth Funeral Home, Greenwood, S.C., Saturday, March 1, with Rev. Needham Williamson officiating. Interment was in Greenwood Memorial Gardens with military honors. (From The Aegis, Bel Air, Maryland, March 6, 1980, courtesy Mr. Curry.)

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HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY - Items of varied interest.

(1) The Yazoo Daily Herald, for Thursday, June 29, 1978, has an interesting notice under the heading IN CONCERT TONIGHT. The text, in part, reads: RUSS HOLLINGSWORTH, Christian soloist, guitarist and composer will give a special concert tonight at Parkview Church of God, starting at 7:30 p.m. Hollingsworth, a student at Anderson College at Anderson, Ind., was the feature vocalist at the 1977 Illinois Church of God music competition in Illinois. He has been a special entertainer for Anderson college and a soloist for churches of several denominations in his hometown, Decatur, Ill.

In addition to his music, Hollingsworth is a strong safety with the Anderson College football team and was nominated in 1975 to the high school prep All American team. He also played high school baseball and was elected to the all city baseball team in Decatur. He was a member of his high school student council, the National Honor Society and a member of Who's Who Among American High School Students.

(There is a nice black-and-white photo of Russ Hollingsworth, which shows an extremely handsome (sorry for an overdone description, but he is a pretty good looking fellow) young man in a full dress suit. Our long time correspondent and subscriber, Mrs. Byron W. (Lucille Bridgers) Frizzell, sent this to us on 14 August 1980 with the remarks: "Never heard of him before or since." If anybody has further details on Russ Hollingsworth, please contact.)

(2) Our cousin, Marion L. Young, has sent us a lot of material, dealing with the Canadian Hollingsworths, descended from the Wexford branch, which is close in blood ties to Harry Hollingsworth, your editor, and to Frederick Hollingsworth, his twice great-grandfather. Under ENGAGEMENT, Patterson - Mr. and Mrs. Charles Patterson, Cherryhill, Tullybrannigan, Newcastle, the news is, that they have the pleasure in announcing the forthcoming marriage of their son Terence, and Janet, daughter of Mrs. M. Young and the late Mr. R. Young, Willowdale, Toronto. The wedding will take place on November 9 in Toronto (1973.)

(3) Under date of March 9, 1962, a letter from the State Library, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, signed by Saramary A. Weikel, longtime correspondent with your editor, states, among other negative findings, that Samuel Hollingsworth is living at 178 South Front Street, according to the City Directories for 1831, 1833, 1835-36 of Philadelphia, and that same person is living at the Corner of Front & Lombard, according to the 1828 City Directory for Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The same letter states that the directories for 1825, 26, 27, 30, 32, 34 were not available "for use at this time."

(4) Our correspondent, Doug Hollingsworth, 37 Sanford, Bangor, Maine 04401, sent us the complete will of Jesse Jordan of De Kalb Co., Georgia, of which we summarize the following: Dated 14 Jan. 1860; proved 23 Sep. 1863. Advanced age; to be buried at the graveyard of Wesley Chappel; wife Rachel, plantation I now live on (300 acres) originally Henry, now De Kalb County, during life; Afterward, all property including slaves to be sold at Publick outcry; "5th Item. I desire and direct that my son William J. Jordan, and Sarah A. C. Hollingsworth wife of Robert Hollingsworth, and Solomon E. Jordan, and Mary Ann E. Pritchard wife of Silas Pritchard, and Nancy A. Hornada wife of N. A. Hornada, the above named Children all to be equal in said estate" Sarah Ann Crockett, wife of Joel J. Crockett, equal part except ten dollars to be equally divided between the balance of Elijah B. Jordan's children, said deceased being married the second time and Sarah Ann Crockett receiving no part of her father's estate in Florida. Nominates beloved Son in Law Robert Hollingsworth executor and agent for widow during her life. Witnesses: James W. Crockett, Alfred S. Fowler, Paschal H. HighTower (sic). Signed by mark. (Nothing in Stewart about this man, from a look at the index - Ed.)

(5) The heading is Blue Springs Man Found Murdered in Arkansas. This appears on page 5 of the Tuesday, May 4, 1976 edition of The Kansas City Times, donor being Douglas Hollingsworth, Bangor, Maine. A photo is included. Staff writer Steve Fehr has the byline. In summary, Joe Bob Hollingsworth, 40, was found stabbed to death Sunday (2 May) about ten miles west of West Memphis, Arkansas, about 11:15 a.m. He had suffered multiple stab wounds, and had been dead about eight days. No weapon was then found. One Stanley D. Goodrich, 19, of Kennett, Missouri, was arrested and charged with first degree murder. Hollingsworth was the founder and president of Sentinel Security, Inc., of Oklahoma City, with clients in 20 states and branch offices in Blue Springs and Houston. The firm sets up security systems to monitor employee theft. The murder apparently occurred between 7 and 8 p.m. on 24 April 1976, and that Goodrich drove Hollingsworth's Cadillac convertible to Kennett in southeast Missouri that night, and set it on fire. He was arrested on the same day and charged with arson on Apr. 27.

The search for Hollingsworth's body began then. He had been on his way back from a 3 week business trip to Florida and called his wife Grace Apr. 23 saying he would be back the next day. Goodrich was hitchhiking from Mississippi on I-40 and Hollingsworth apparently gave him a ride. Chief County Investigator David E. Doyle believed he was killed where the body was found, beneath bushes about 15 feet from the county road north of I-40. Though still wearing a watch and ring, his wallet was found empty.

Hollingsworth was a native of Clayton, Oklahoma, and had lived in Blue Springs for eight years; attended Southeast State University in Durant, Okla., and was a member of the Blue Springs Jaycees. He left wife, Gracc, and father, Buddy Hollingsworth, Clayton, daughters Jennifer and Heather at home; three brothers, Tom Hollingsworth, Oklahoma City; Jerry D. Hollingsworth, Clayton, and Mike H. Hollingsworth, Fayetteville, North Carolina. Services were at 2 p.m. Thurs. 6 May 1976 and burial, both in Clayton.

(6) Cousin Clare Hollingsworth of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, wrote us on 17 January 1980 and included cuttings from the Edmonton Journal. George Ward's racing column has more about those harness drivers, Pat and Grant Hollingsworth, in a column dated about 10 January. The rule of brotherly love might be broken in the Hollingsworth family Sunday at Calgary during the Western Canada harness driving championships, says Ward. Pat Hollingsworth, a vet of the Alberta circuit will compete against his younger brother Grant, leading percentage driver at Vancouver's Cloverdale. Post time will be 1:30 p.m. with 11 races set, and it will be held, of course, and Calgary's famous Stampede Park. Fifteen points will be awarded for a win, 10 for second place, seven for third, five for fourth and on down to one for an eighth place finish. (Clare thinks these boys are sons of a Thomas Hollingsworth of Athens, Ontario, and, if so, would descend from the County Wexford, Ireland, family of Hollingsworth, of whom came your editor.

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Letters:

From Mrs. Nora Hollingsworth Gray, Gananoque, Ontario, Canada.

April 25, 1968

Dear Henry:

Sorry for not having answered your interesting letter of a couple of months ago. I don't know whether I mentioned that my grandfather came down here from Lion's Head, Ontario. You mentioned not having heard from the Hollingsworth's at Mallorytown (Ont.). My three brothers live there as well as two older Hollingsworth brothers (in their late 70s). Whatever information I am able to give you comes from old letters or from my brothers. I'm sorry that the Mrs. Hollingsworth in Brockville does not see fit to give you any help. Older people are funny, they figure there's some ulterior motive behind what you're trying to do.

I'm going to type out an old letter which I found down home and you can maybe gain some information from it. It's so old it's brown and torn. It must be written to my grandfather Western John Hollingsworth.

W. J. Hollingsworth.

Newberry, Luce County, Michigan  
April 4th. 1901

Dear Brother:

I received your letter and was surprised and pleased to hear from you, as I thought you were dead, as we saw an account onee in a paper where a man of your name was lost off a boat. I am glad to hear you are thinking of coming to see us all and hope you will come soon. I will be pleased to get your picture. I can hardly remember what you look like. I just have a very dim recollection of how you look as I was quite small when you saw me last. I have some bad news for you. I received a letter yesterday from Traverse City telling me that Uncle George (Dutton - Editor) was dead, he died on April 1st. and was to be buried on Ma's lot in the cemetary (sic) without asking our permission. Auntie is not expected to live and I suppose they will just put her there too. Now John I don't like that, as I always intended to be laid beside my mother myself and I was always intending to have the lot fixed up but as my brothers promised to do that I had neglected it but I

want you to let me know if you come back and I am willing to pay my share and if they will not help I will pay what I can, as I intend having it fixed up just as soon as possible and I will tell you I don't like the idea of them being buried there. There is no need of it, as they are wealthy and own a house a lot worth over fifteen hundred dollars besides a farm and Janey is married and owns a home in Grand Rapids with some thousands of dollars and to think of them sliding them in there it does not seem right. I wish you would see about it or else let me know and I will see about it. Ma's been dead twelve years the 25th of this month (died 25 Apr 1889 - Ed.). The same minister that preached my father's funeral, Pernci, preached my mother's funeral sermon, also and now has preached Uncle George's too. There was a long piece in the Traverse City paper about my mother at the time of her death she having seen Traverse City built up from that (?) houses. There will likely be a piece about Uncle George and I will be sure to send you the paper. I have been married twice and had five children by my first husband, four are living two boys and two girls and one boy dead. I have one little boy by my second husband two years old. Now their names. This little Boy's name is Emmett, (Hartwick - Ed.) and I have Fred, Mamie, Della and Georgie Avery. Fred is 21, Mamie is 19, Della is 14 and Georgia is 10 years old. I am just about my mother's height. Fred and Mamie are quite a bit taller than I am. I will have out pictures taken as I would like you to see what pretty children I have. I will send my picture in the next letter and I know you will be pleased to know we always had the name of being regular Hollingsworths. My brother Ed had one boy and he's named after you and people always said he was just like you in actions and all. My oldest boy and girl have been with me quite a while, but as Mr. Asery's (Avery? Ed.) wife just died, Mamie went down to keep house for a while and it was through her writing I happened to hear all about Uncle George's death. Now I must tell you about your letter. There is another family by the name of Hartwick here (not any relation) they got your letter as you did not put my first name on it they kept it two weeks, before returning it to the post office so you see that is why I did not answer sooner. I think I have told you all for this time. I hope you will write soon and I will tell you more the next time. You did not tell me if you had any children, or if you are married again, as I heard your wife had died. I am sure Traverse City will surprise you when you see it. I have not been there myself in seven years. I think it has grown quite a lot since I saw it. Mr. Hartwick is a brick mason by trade and came up here to work at the hospital for insane. I will close now with my love and be sure and write right away and address your letter to Mrs. D. E. Hartwick, box 262, Newbury, Mich.

Did you forget I was named after my mother.

I trust this may be of some help to you. I am truly interested in your letters and if you thought you could get more information by talking to some of the people you have written to personally, feel free to come over to Canada and I'm sure we could make room for you here and perhaps take you around to some of the places. I must close for now and hope to hear from you in the future.

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth:

At the Maryland Historical Society I saw a card indicating your interest in Hollingsworth family history. I share this interest because one of my great-great grandmothers was Sarah Hollingsworth, who married Daniel Wilcox in 1807.

An old reference in a Tustin Bible does not name Sarah's parents but lists her brothers and sisters as follows:

Enoch Hollingsworth, born January 20, 1776  
Elizabeth Hollingsworth, born October 26, 1778  
John Hollingsworth, born May 9, 1781  
Nancy Hollingsworth, born March 1784.  
Sarah Hollingsworth, born March 19, 1789 (Also called Sally)  
Vincent Hollingsworth, born May 13, (year ?)

The children of Daniel and Sarah Hollingsworth Wilcox were as follows:

Ann Elizabeth Wilcox, born August 30, 1808  
Henry Wilcox, born December 24, 1810  
Ann Maria Wilcox, born January 11, 1814  
Mary Jane Wilcox, born June 6, 1816  
John H. Wilcox, born July 14, 1818 (John Hollingsworth? Editor.)  
Rachel Emily Wilcox, born January 3, 1821  
Margaret Julia Wilcox, born December 13, 1822

Sarah Hollingsworth evidently died before 1837 because her husband remarried in that year. Mary Jane Wilcox (1816-1890) became the second wife of Joseph Tustin, son of Septimus and Elizabeth Tustin, in 1845. Their only child, Septimus Paul Tustin (1847-1921) was my maternal grandfather.

Since I have found no public record of the Hollingsworths listed above and their Wilcox relatives, I hope this information may fill a gap in your records. On the other hand, if you can provide any clues regarding the parents of Sarah Hollingsworth Wilcox, I shall certainly appreciate your cooperation. I do not know where she was born, or where her children were born, but I do know that the Wilcox and Tustin families lived in Baltimore. On the basis of some of their first names, I believe that the Hollingsworths named in the Tustin Bible were probably descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr., but that is merely a guess. I shall be extremely grateful for any information that you may supply.

NOTE: This letter came during the horrible hiatus (hereafter forever referred to as HH) in the LDS Temple Genealogical Library in Los Angeles. Hence, it was never answered. The name Vincent indicates the family is not from Valentine, but from John Hollingsworth of Maryland.

According to the Encyclopedia of American Biography, New Series, Volume XVI., page 154 et seq, (1943), Sarah or Sally Hollingsworth, "daughter of Allen and Mary Hollingsworth, was born in Maryland, March 9 (sic), 1789, died Dec. 1, 1825 and married Daniel Wilcox."

The above would be pretty satisfying. But read on! The book lists the children "all of the first marriage (of Allen Hollingsworth to Mary, maiden surname unknown): 1. John. 2. Ruth, married a Mr. Coleman. 3. Sarah or Sally, of whom further (above - Ed.). 4. Henrietta, married a Mr. James. 5. Abel. None of these names except John matches the bible sent us by Pauline Hobbs! Your editor inclines toward accepting family bibles over printed books any day, even if the printed book is HR! The will of Allen Hollingsworth is of record in Queen Annes County Probate Records, Maryland, dated 9 Nov. 1814 proved 11 Feb 1815. He names his son John, daughter Ruth Coleman, wife Margaret, daughter Sally Wilcocks (sic), daughter Ruth, daughter Henrietta, and Samuel Walls and Harricott (sic) his wife. In the final bequest, he mentions Betsy and Charles Wilcocks "daughter and son of my daughter Sally Wilcocks."

There is no Charles and no Betsy Wilcox listed in Ms Hobbs' bible! What's going on here????? Any help?

Allen Hollingsworth is identified as a son of Vincent and Mary (Herbert) Hollingsworth of Queen Anne's County, Maryland. Vincent was the son of William and Sarah (Boulton) Hollingsworth, same county, and William was the son of John and Jane Hollingsworth of Talbot and later of Queen Anne's County, John being the 1650 immigrant.

Could two different Sally Hollingsworths have married two different Daniel Wilcoxes? Could one Sally be born on 19 March 1789 and the other on 9 March same year? What do you think?

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### A Clay County, Kentucky Collection

Mr. Jesse C. L. Hollingsworth, 314 Elm Street, Franklin, Ohio 45005, has the authorship of this segment, and well deserved it is. Years ago in Hollingsworth Register, December, 1967, p. 145, we published marriages in Clay County from the late Annie Walker Burns Bell collection. Her work, though very helpful (and very voluminous!), suffered because she was known to hire college or high school students to type her work, who knew or cared little about genealogy and scarcely could read the material or understand the terms. Mr. J. C. L. Hollingsworth has, however, visited the courthouse at Manchester, Kentucky, and been kind enough to provide HR with a great pile of data which we begin to publish here.

In this issue, we present the marriages. Mr. Hollingsworth has sent us copies of the actual bonds in most of the marriages. A summary will accompany each entry. We follow the chronological lead of Mr. Hollingsworth. We take up the male marriages first.

- (1) 16 Nov. 1809 James Hollingsworth to Polly Smith. Bond shows that Beezley Hollingsworth was a witness with James x Hollingsworth. Date is date of bond.
- (2) 12 Nov 1819 Johnathon Hollingsworth to Mary Powel. Consent: above date, signed by Wm. Hollandworth and Elijah (x his mark) Powel, with Thomas Pierce and Nancy (x her mark) Hollandsworth. Bond same date: Jonathan (signed Johnathan) Hollandsworth and John Reed.
- (3) 4 Feb. 1822 James Hollingsworth to Patsey Read. Bond of above date has James Hollandsworth with William Hollandsworth as witness.
- (4) 3 Apr 1837 John Hollinsworth to Elizabeth Lunsford. Bond of that date is by John Hollensworth or Hollinsworth and John Morriss. John Hollensworth signs by x mark with George Stevers clerk.
- (5) 21 Dec 1837 Riley Hollandsworth to Lydia Hubbard. Bond of above date, signed by Riley Hollandsworth with Eli Hubbard, both by their x marks. Two documents, second shows "Consent by certificate," but not defined. George Stevers, Clerk.
- (6) 30 Mar 1838 Perry Hollensworth to Patsy Powel. Bond same date. Perry Hollandsworth (sic) and John J. Pullins. Attest: George Stivers, clerk.
- (7) 1 Jun 1847 Wiseman Hollinsworth to Patsy Reid. Bond of above date, with Wiseman Hollinsworth and Barney Roark, signed by William ---- ock, clerk - a printed form filled in.
- (8) 30 Jun 1849 John Hollinsworth to Polly Reid. Bond of above date (printed form) with John Hollinsworth and Jesse Lunsford, of whom, both sign. Date of marriage from index: 4 July 1849.
- (9) 15 Mar 1850 John Hollingsworth to Sally Hornsby. No copies.
- (10) 11 Oct 1850 Beasley Hollingsworth to Martha Cobina or Cottrell.
- (11) 17 Jul 1854 Elijah Hollinsworth to Elizabeth Silcox. Bond of that date, showing couple "of said County." W. Woodcock, Clerk. This couple was married on 20 July 1854 according to the civil marriage book, extracted by A. W. Burns Bell. It also shows Elijah Hollinsworth to be 22, and Elizabeth Silcox, Wilcox or Cox, to be aged 17.
- (12) 24 Jun 1856 Isaac Hollinsworth to Rebecca Robinson. Bond of said date (printed form) with Isaac Hollinsworth and James F. Givins. Couple shown to be of Clay County.

- (13) 19 Mar 1857 Jeremiah Hollingsworth to Sara(h) Reed. Bell's record states he is 27; she 27, but gives either March 4, 1853 or March 18, 1852 as the actual date of marriage!
- (14) 12 May 1858 William Hollinsworth to Elizabeth Henson. Bond of that date, with William Hollinsworth and L. W. Bates. Couple of Clay County. (Apparently married same date.)
- (15) 14 Feb 1859 Squire Hollingsworth to Elizabeth Lunsford.
- (16) 2 Sep 1859 Isaac Hollingsworth to Margaret Greer or Greely.
- (17) 7 Apr 1861 Jeremiah Hollingsworth to Louisa Griffen. Burns-Bell's record, probably from the civil entry, shows a date of 3 Apr 1861 for marriage, and Jerry (sic) is 24 and L. is 15. Shame on you Jerry!
- (18) 25 Feb 1897 Daniel Boone Hollingsworth to Emily Lunsford. The license is the same date as the marriage. J. C. L. Hollingsworth sent xerox of both the license and the certificate. This couple are close to him. Daniel Boone Hollingsworth was his father. The marriage took place at H. L. Morgan's in Clay County, with Elbert Hubbard and Elisha Hubbard as witnesses. H. L. Morgan, minister, performed the ceremony.

(Note: One Elbert Hubbard wrote "The Message to Garcia," and was a founder of the National Geographic Society. No relation.)

Now the female marriages:

- (19) 9 Mar 1819 Nancy Hollingsworth to John Read. William Hollonds-worth (sic) and John Read sign bond for Fifty pounds current money on this date.
- (20) 4 Sep 1822 Polly Hollingsworth to Edward Applegate. Burns-Bell shows that the bondsman was Jesse Barret. J. C. L. Hollingsworth gives his source for those without bond data as "Pioneer Families," by Kelley Morgan, 1 Apr 1807 to 1830.
- (21) 27 Mar 1823 Becky Hollingsworth to Joseph Hubbard. Bond dated 24 March 1823 with Joseph Hubbard, William Hubbard and William Hollandworth, bondsmen. Minister was J. Bowman who married them on 27 March and signed the certificate same date.
- (22) 17 Feb 1825 Rhoda Hollingsworth to Randolf Reid. (Burns-Bell gives date of marriage of "Rody" to Randolph Reid as 5 Feb, with John Hollingsworth as bondsman.)
- (23) 18 Jan 1826 Rebecca Hollingsworth to William William Piercefield. (Burns-Bell has same date, but "Purcefield," and the bondsman was Beezly Hollinsworth.)
- (24) 16 Apr 1827 Patsy Hollingsworth to Abraham Potter. (Burns-Bell says 10 Feb. and has Beezly Hollinsworth as bondsman.)

- (25) 2 Feb 1828 Ledy Hollingsworth to Hiram Lunceford. Abner Baker, Clerk of the Circuit Court signs the license. (Burns-Bell: 12 Feb; and she was daughter of William Hollingsworth; name there is Lunsford.)
- (26) 11 May 1828 Charity Hollingsworth to James Henson. Abner Baker, Clerk, signs license. (Burns-Bell said she is daughter of William Hollingsworth - Mrs. Bell must have had access to records now lost or mislaid - Ed.)
- (27) 27 Nov 1828 Nancy Holling- (sic) to Silance recte Silas Lunce- (probably Lunceford - Ed.). License signed by Abner Baker. spells names Silance Lunce & Nancy Holling- Bond is to Silas Lunce & Joseph Hubbard in 50. current money same date as license. Silas signs by x mark, but the surname looks more like Baird than Lunce! (Or Rand.) (Annie Burns Bell's material, copied in HR 4:145 item 20 gives the name as Lunceford.)
- (28) 3 Apr 1837 Nancy Hollinsworth to Barney Roark. Bond by Barney (x mark) Roark and William E. Walker on above date.
- (29) 7 Feb 1838 Nancy Hollensworth to William B. Silcox. License by George Stivers, Clerk of the County Court, same date. Bond by William B. Silcox (who signs his name Cilcox) and Johnathan Hollandsworth (sic) same date in fifty pounds current money.
- (30) 3 Sep 1851 Minerva Hollensworth to Dabney Maupin. License not at hand. Bond of above date signed by Dabney Maupin & Jonathan Hollensworth (seems to sign Johnathan).
- (31) 18 Jun 1855 Elizabeth Hollinsworth to John Reid. Bond by John Reid and John Hollinsworth on above date, all of Clay County. License by H. L. White, Clerk. (Burns-Bell missed this.)
- (32) 16 Feb 1856 Mary Hollinsworth to Joseph Philpot. License by H. L. White, Clerk, on above date. All of said county. (Burns-Bell, from the Civil entry, shows Polly Hollinsworth is aged 50 and Joseph Philpot 57. Date of marriage 17 Feb.)
- (33) 13 Apr 1858 Susannah Hollandsworth to John Allen. License same date L.A. Byron, Deputy Clerk for Hugh L. White, Clerk. Bond same date by John Allen Junior and John Allen Sr. in sum of \$100.00. Both sign by mark and L. A. Byron is the witness. (Burns-Bell did not see this marriage, either.)

There are 33 items above. Mrs. Bell found 31. But not 31 of the above for she caught the following:

- (34) 8 Sep 1836 Charity Hollingsworth & William Johnson, she a daughter of Dalis? Hollinsworth.

- (35) 2 Jun 1861 David Hollingsworth, aged 21, to Elizabeth Hensley, aged 21.
- (36) 1 Dec 1851 Malinda Hollingsworth to Joseph Forman. Bond has Harry Lunsford.
- (37) 23 Jul 1844 Mary Hollingsworth, dau of Beasley Hollingsworth, to Solomon Collins.
- (38) 7 Nov 1861 Rhoda Hollingsworth, 25, to John Lunsford, age 16.

Mrs. Bell's work was done over forty years ago. With the increase in genealogical interest, and the increase of business, and the increase of years (!) since then, one can only be thankful that more of the precious records are not lost forever.

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### Some Alabama Marriages

Your editor recently purchased a number of books from Alabama sources. Several counties are represented. Most are by Elizabeth Wood Thomas, for the Willo Institute of Genealogy. They are: Baldwin, 1810-1836; Blount, 1820-44; Chambers 1834-48; Dallas 1818-45; Greene\*, 1836-48; Madison, 1809-11; Marengo, 1818-28; Mobile 1813-21; Washington, 1826-1856. Mrs. Thomas states that many researchers are not aware that the state was a part of Mississippi Territory until 1817, and overlook their Mississippi searches in these records. \*To the above Greene County we have added a search in a larger work by Pauline Jones Gandrud (1969) covering 1823-1860. We found our surname as follows:

Whitten and Allied Families

This volume, by Virginia Wood Alexander, (1966) 304pp., indexed, has on page 39:

(65.) John Finney Bell (child of James and Mary Boyce (Jacks) Bell, who in 1850 lived in Laurens Co., South Carolina) born about 1841, married ELMIRA HOLLINGSWORTH. Their son, Dr. James L. Bell, moved to Howard County, Arkansas. Dr. Bell was the father of Mary (Mrs. John) Robertson, now living in Nashville, Arkansas. Likely other descendants in Arkansas. (Contributed by Mack McIntosh of Corona, California.)

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More on the Robert Hollingsworth Family.

In the September, 1979 issue of HR, pp. 41-47, we did a large article on Robert and Susannah (Rice) Hollingsworth of Kentucky, formerly of Virginia. The following very interesting item sheds more light on the genealogy of the Rices, giving a different date (year) of birth for Susannah Rice, and suggests an error in the name of Sarah Rice given here, for Caroline C. Hollingsworth's grandmother would be Rebecca Rice Connell, according to known authentic records given in our article.

From Historical Collections of Brown County, Ohio (1969) compiled by Carl N. Thompson, p. 315:

SINGING BOOK: "Susanah Hollinsworth, born the \_\_\_ of August, 1749" is an inscription, in an antique-blocked letter of a little hand-made book, now in the keeping of John Clifton, of Jefferson Township. The book is a family heirloom, which originally belonged to Sarah Rice, who lived in Fayette County, Virginia, and who was the grandmother of Mrs. Caroline Hollingsworth, who left many valuable papers about her home after her death at West Union. Upon the following page is another inscription which says, "Her music Book, Made by Me, James Trimble." Then follows what certainly must have been a comprehensive and neatly formulated treatise of vocal music as it existed in those days. Treble, bass, counter and tenor clefs are taken up, with the voice articulations and modulations showing their position upon the staff, which to the present day musicians would certainly appear crude, yet leaving enough to see how much forward the study of music has advanced. Notes do not appear in the booklet until farther along and when brought into use they are square. These were often called "buck-wheat." When Mr. Trimble reached the point of transcribing songs of those times the words were written on one page, while on the opposite page were the notes. "Calvary," "St. George," "St. Gilas," "Londonburgh," and several other songs not known today are contained among the collection. In fact, the book must be seen to be appreciated. Although 160 years since it was transcribed, the writing is easily readable, while the colored ruling and headings still stand out prominently. With this booklet is kept several other mementoes of former days, one a sheep skin parchment which raised Richard Ferguson to the degree of a Master Mason, while another sheep skin was an indenture for Zacharius Connell, transferring 100 acres to him in Bullskin Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. The instrument had been drawn up in the year 1815. (News Democrat, May 27, 1909)

Green County, Alabama, Family Bible of Andrew Hollingsworth

The marriages on page 58 will help in this matter. Mr. W. B. Hollingsworth, Route 5, Box 56, Gordo, Alabama 35466 found the following bible record in Green County, Alabama in May of this year. Present owner: Mrs. Frances K. Baird, P.O. Box 100, Clinton, Ala 35448. She is a granddaughter of McDuffie Hollingsworth mentioned herein.
