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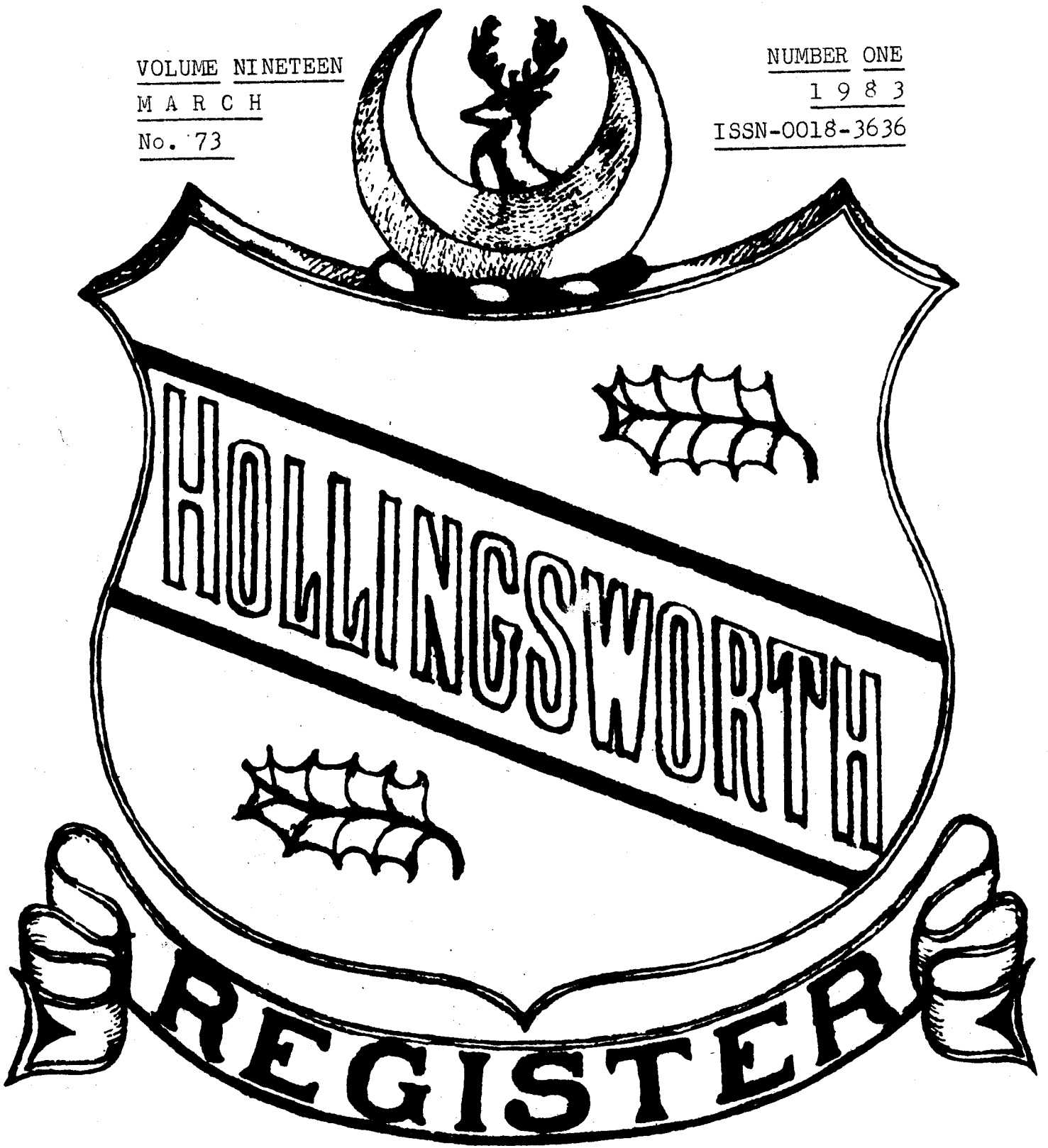

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Clark Gable and Harry Hollingsworth - Cousins!

It's my dad who is a cousin of Clark Gable, not me, but then, if he's a cousin I must be too. Third cousin, to be truthful, not at all to say I am fibbing. Dad is a third cousin to Clark Gable, and your editor is a third cousin too - once removed. I could have assembled these facts presented here twenty years ago, not long after "The King" died. Turning professional slowed me down with my own family research. Way down!

As reported in HR 4:48, 49, Dad was also third cousin, once removed, of John Agar, another actor, whose first wife was Shirley Temple. Remember that my Dad was an actor too. If he knew of either relationship I have no clues. Agar began his movie career in 1948, the year after my father died, with "Fort Apache," for RKO. John Wayne starred, and Shirley Temple was featured. An old friend who knew Granddad Jack Hollingsworth answered my specific question on the Agar relationship with: "Yes - Jack did talk about relatives named Agar." Jack's granddad, Frederick, was the brother of Mary (Hollingsworth) Agar, the actor's ancestor.

No such "fortunate draw" with the Gable connection. Although he started in films in 1930, Clark Gable (full name William Clark Gable) was not well known until the hit "It Happened One Night," *for Columbia Pictures, with Claudette Colbert, in 1934. Jack Hollingsworth died in 1933 - it will be fifty years on 13 June. If Jack knew of the "Gable connection," it was not important during his lifetime. He may have known of the Gables. After all, Jack's mother was a first cousin of Clark's grandmother.*He got the Academy Award for that picture.

Lest you "pooh-pooh" this line of chatter, here are the facts:

The common ancestor, my 3rd great-grandfather, is John McFadden, Jr. (styled Junior because his dad bore the same name - unusual for those times when it did not mean that), a soldier of 1812. His connection with John McFadden, a Revolutionary soldier, is not proven beyond a doubt, so the Junior appellation may not mean what I think after all!

John McFadden, Jr. was born in 1779 in Pine Creek Twp., Northumberland Co., (now Clinton Co.) Penna. The farm was near William Dunn's Island, in the region of the big bend in the Susquehanna River. (In fact, Dunn's daughter married one of my McFaddens.) Northumberland was then the largest county, forming nearly the entire northwestern sector of Pennsylvania.

The McFaddens were Wesleyan Methodists, and the farm of old John was one of the stops on the circuit rider's rounds. There is evidence that the family had formerly lived in Baltimore County, Maryland, before going into Pennsylvania, and had been Episcopal, though their

distant ancestors in northern Ireland and Scotland were probably of staunch Knox-Presbyterian stock. The older John McFadden was born in 1748 in Swatara Twp., Lancaster (now Dauphin) County, and died in 1833 in Mead Twp., Crawford County. At the end of the 18th century, the McFaddens, with the Andersons, Petersons, Kightlingers and Stainbrooks, Bairds and Dunns, Hamiltons and McKnights, Custards and others, moved to what would, in 1800, become Crawford County, to join those who had gone before them, the Meads, McMichaels and Van Horns. All are listed in the county's printed histories as pioneers of the region.

John McFadden, Junior married Catherine. Her obituary, for its time; is informative, but not enough so to give us her maiden surname:

"Died on the 17th inst. Catherine McFadden, consort of John McFadden of Mead Township, in the 70th year of her age.

"Mrs. McFadden was one of the earliest settlers of this region, having emigrated to this county in 1797. She lived the life of a Christian, and died in the hope of a blessed Immortality, and has left a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn her loss." (From The Crawford Democrat (Weekly) Nov. 24, 1846, p. 3.)

Her husband died in 1861 and both are buried in the Ewing Cemetery in East Mead Twp. His stone reads 1779-1861 and hers 1774-1846, (In the older part of the cemetery.)

John had a brother William, of Richmond Twp., and a sister Susannah, wife of Joseph Baird, of Mead, and probably others. These brothers were in Col. Andrew Christy's Regiment - the 137th Pennsylvania Militia, during the "Second War with Great Britain," and probably saw action at the Battle of Erie. John McFadden obtained two Bounty Land Warrants (# 29222 for 40 acres, Act of 1850, and #14335 for 120 acres, Act of 1855) for his military service, but assigned them rather than locate land with them. His will (Book C, p. 425, Courthouse, Meadville) was dated 12 Apr 1861. It was not proved until 9 Feb 1863, which leads me to believe his tombstone might be wrong. The document gave Daughter Rebecca Stainbrook, a mare, harness, buggy and cutter; son Andrew, rifle gun and shot pouch; son George, 5 dollars; eldest daughter Margaret Green 20 dollars; daughters Sarah Kimmy and Susan Kightlinger, the same; daughter Nancy Ann Kightlinger one horse, sons William and John, each 5 dollars. He appointed William R. Brawley executor, signing with a slightly shaky hand "John Mcfadden" and had Joseph Hamilton, an inlaw of the Stainbrooks, and Brawley, sign as witnesses.

The son William McFadden was my father's great-grandfather. He went out to Minnesota about 1856, locating government land in Dodge County with a bounty warrant he purchased from one John Strain, an 1812 vet., and died, it is said, at age 92 by mistaking the cellar stairs for the house stairs, falling down all the way. William's wife was Anna Peterson, daughter of Uriah and Sarah (Votaw) Peterson.

Uriah's father, James Sutton, a New Jersey Loyalist who fought for the British but for unknown reasons deserted them with his brothers and brother-in-law, Abdon Abit, fled to Pennsylvania and changed his surname to Peterson. Thus he avoided hanging because a warrant for high treason was published by the court! He died peacefully in 1837 in Greenwood Twp., Crawford County at 91 "old and full of years." He and his wife lived together seventy years. The Votaws (originally spelt Vauteau) were French Protestant refugees (Huguenots). They went to London about 1685, then in 1693, removed to Dublin, Ireland and became wealthy tradesmen. Sarah Votaw's father, Isaac (1744-1817) came to Pennsylvania, converted to the Friends to marry Anne Smith, and died in Columbiana County, Ohio.

William and Anna (Peterson) McFadden had these children: Isabel, wife of Isaac C. Johnson; Sarah, wife of Andrew Willock; Rachel, wife of Edward Earl Hollingsworth, William Wilson McFadden, and George McFadden who died young unmarried. The Hollingsworths married in 1860 in Minnesota. Of their nine, Granddad John Benjamin Hollingsworth was the first, born 10 Feb 1861, died 13 June 1933 only a few feet from where I sit typing. Dad, Henry Harrison Hollingsworth (but he really preferred Harry) was born in Los Angeles 3 Sep 1888.

Rebecca McFadden, sister of William, was born in 1806 in Mead Township, Crawford County, Pa., and died there 10 Jan 1875. She married, 1 Apr 1830, there, Jacob Stainbrook, Jr. He was born in Pa. in 1792 and died in Mead 7 Aug 1877. Both rest in Kiser Hill Cemetery in East Mead. Their marriage was reported in the Crawford Messenger on 8 Apr 1830:

"Married - On the 1st inst. by J. Brawley, Esq., Mr JACOB STEINBROOK to Miss REBECCA M'FADDEN - both of Mead Township."

Because no civil records of marriages in Pennsylvania were kept until 1885, this is the only record of this marriage I know about! Note the spelling Steinbrook. The family are said to descend from an immigrant from Germany named Jacob Steinbrüchel, who came on the bi-lander (2 masted sailing ship) Vernon, arriving at Philadelphia in 1747 (Strassburger-Hinke, Penna. German Pioneers, Vol 1, p. 363, date of oaths August, 1747, List 112 C) with Thomas Ricks the master. They had embarked at Rotterdam, Holland. Frederick Steinbruch (sic) appears in Maxatawny Twp., Berks County, in 1779-81 tax lists (Pa. Archives, 3rd Ser., Vol. 18, pp. 250, 383, 510). One Abram Steinbruch was in Penn Twp., Northumberland Co., in 1787. He wrote his will 15 Apr 1801 (Book 1, p. 245) of which I own a photostat, not the book copy but the original, courtesy Carl S. McCleery of Franklin, Pa. by letter of 11 Mar 1965. It was proved on 14 May 1801. He signed in German script "Abrah Stein bruch". Named in it were wife Eva, son Jacob, (125 acres he now lives on), son fridrig (sic), sons Aberham (sic) and Peter; daughters Barbara, Mary and Cathrina. Witnesses John Pontius and John Herman signed in German script. Jacob Steinbruch the son is accepted as the Jacob Steinbruch, who turned up in Crawford County in the 1810 census. He died in 1847, leaving, in his will (Book B

p. 283) a farm to his son Jacob, and to Jacob's children, not named; and a farm for his son Henry and Henry's children. John L. Stainbrook, his son Henry's son was named Executor. The will was proved 27 Nov 1847. In the salutation Jacob gave his age as 70, giving 1777 as year of birth. However, he is listed as 45 and up in the 1820 census.

In 1810, in Wayne Twp., Crawford County, are Adam, Christian, Frederick, Henry, Jacob and John Steinbruch (pp. 442-443). The 1820 for the same township lists Adam, Christian, Jacob and John in Wayne, and another Jacob in Mead. The total Steinbrooks in 1810 were 34, and 38 in 1820. I don't know which was the father of Jacob Jr.

Jacob and Rebecca (McFadden) Stainbrook had David, Jacob, Nancy Ann, Esther, Ann, Mary Jane and Ambrosia. Nancy Ann (named after her aunt Nancy Ann McFadden, wife of Abraham Kightlinger) was born 10 Sep 1837 (1838 in 1900 census) in Mead Township and died in Meadville on Apr 13, 1927 at the age of 89. She lived at 284 Center St., Meadville, a widow, in 1900. On 27 Apr 1857 in Crawford County, she married Charles Gable, the son of John G. Gable and Sarah Frankfield his wife. They had come to Woodcock Twp. about 1825 from Lehigh County, Pa. John and Sarah and children Rebecca, Sophiah, Thomas and Francis (f), lived in South Vernon Township (p. 181 R) in 1850, the father aged 60. Charles Gable was born 3 Nov 1830 in Woodcock Township, and died in Meadville 29 Jan 1898. Like the Stainbrooks, the Gables were so-called "Pennsylvania Dutch." The surname is said to have originally been spelt Goebel. Charles was buried 30 Jan 1898 in Greendale Cemetery, Meadville (p. 82, # 2600 s.w. div., w half Lot 113 Sec. 5). This contradicts the tale in Clark Gable's biographical notes that he lived with his "grandparents, Charles and Nancy Gable." Grandpa Gable was dead 3 years before he was born! He had a hotel at 985 Water Street.

Charles and Nancy had issue: Arthur E., Charles E., Emmett E., Carrie B., Georgia A., William Henry, Burton G., Harriet M., Frank P., and one which died in infancy. Nine were listed as living in 1900.

William Henry Gable was born 26 June 1870 in Meadville (cert. of death 13487-1948 Los Angeles Co Recorder). A bio of his brother Burton in Bates' "Our County and its People," (1899) p. 923 refers to himself as Charles Gable's only son! (Family feelings?) He renovated the hotel his father had run for 35 years as The Gable House, and re-named it, astutely, The New Gable House (originally The Crawford House).

William H. Gable was a maverick. He didn't care to run either a hotel or a farm. He was a character out of "Boom Town," one of his son's fine movies (1940 - MGM) with Spencer Tracy. He was a wildcat oil driller. A real live one. First he moved to Cadiz, Ohio, at the turn of the century but later pushed on to Texas and Oklahoma. His bride was Adelia J. Hershelman, daughter of John J. and Rosetta (Clark) Hershelman. Rosetta's dad was Timothy Clark. Now we see where the actor got his middle name, which became his professional first name. Adelia was born 3 Jan 1870 in Vernon Twp., Crawford Co., Pa. and died there (or at Cadiz, Ohio) 14 Nov 1901. Her father, John J. Hershelman, was born 17 Oct 1833 in New York City. He died in 1921 in Crawford Co., Pa. He was the son of Jacob Hershelman and his wife Elizabeth Hill,

Charles Gable, Bill's father, by the way, once hauled oil from Pit Hole, Venango County, to Scott's Landing in Warren County by flat boat. (Brown's Hist. of Crawford Co., 1885, p. 740-741.)

and Jacob was a son of Adam Hershelman, the immigrant from Germany. Adelia Gable lies next to her parents in Immaculate Conception Catholic Cemetery in Vernon Township. Rosetta Clark Hershelman died 20 Oct 1886 aged 39 years, 8 months and 24 days. Adelia was only thirty. On the typescript of this cemetery held at the Crawford County Historical Society, someone has written beside her name "Clark Gable's mother." The inscription gives 1869-1900. Both dates are wrong, for Clark Gable was clearly born in 1901 and the 1900 census shows Adelia born 1870 living with her parents.

"Gable, Clark, born 1901, Feb. 1, son of Wm. and Adelia..." That is the entry on page 107, Number 254, at the Cadiz, Ohio Probate Court, in their book of Births. It is said that Clark's father was angered by his son's birth entry being marked "female" and he went and registered it again at Meadville. That is the biography story. But in 1900, Adelia Gable lived with her parents, marked married within the year but with no children, and William H. Gable is listed the same way over in Cadiz, Ohio. That was June 1, 1900. Did she journey over to Cadiz to give birth? Most of the details in the biographies seem to say yes.

According to these sketches, Adelia Gable never had a well day after Clark was born, and she died when he was only 9 months old. William Gable married Jennie Dunlap his second wife, on 16 Apr 1903 (another version: "1906") who became "Mother" to Clark. He always said she had the most and the best influence upon him. (Reminds one of Abe Lincoln and his remark about his "angel mother.") Bill Gable's last wife was Edna Anna Affantranger, born 13 Jan 1877 in Meadville, daughter of William and () McGill Affantranger. She died 19 June 1948 and is entombed at Hollywood Mausoleum. Bill Gable himself died at the family home in Los Angeles at 4021 Ethel Avenue, on 4 Aug 1948 at the age of 78. (Deaths 1948 City of L.A. # 10639 for Edna, and 13487 for William.) Clark Gable was the informant on his father's death record but marked "unknown" on the genealogical data for his grandparents! And so it goes. Bill Gable was cremated and is inurned at the Chapel of the Pines. He never really sanctioned, nor opposed, Clark's wish to be an actor. But apparently he lived long enough to satisfy himself that his boy had earned the fame and wealth justifiably, to suit his old Pennsylvania Dutch principles.

Both Clark Gable and Harry Hollingsworth were big, tall men. Clark was like his dad in that way. Gable and Harry were both quite handsome. Both were self taught actors, and began their lifelong careers in stock companies, Dad in 1904 at fifteen, Gable at the same age in a high school play. Harry was owner of his Hollingsworth Stock Company at 20, a Leading Man in Hartford, Conn., when 25, and came to Hollywood to start in movies in 1930. Gable came the same year. One of Dad's last big roles was in "Operator 13" in 1933 at MGM. It starred Gary Cooper, Richard Dix and Marion Davies. He also was a day player for Warners, Columbia and 20th Century-Fox. Like Clark Gable, Harry Hollingsworth was neither opposed, nor approved, by his father in his aspirations to become an actor. But Jack made his son apprentice with him as a carpenter, painter and paperhanger, just to be sure he would never starve.

Clark Gable was baptized a Roman Catholic to please the devout Hershelmans, but his father raised him as a Protestant, and, it is said,

remarried quickly to get the boy away from the "Catholic influence." My dad was baptized Roman Catholic because his mother Mary McGovern and all her ancestors for a thousand years were of that faith. But she turned away from it later to suit Jack Hollingsworth, whose ancestors were of the "Old Ascendancy" in County Wexford, Ireland - as Orange as the sun setting over Vinegar Hill in 1798. So Dad was raised as a Protestant, which meant, Hollingsworth style, never going to church!

Those are some similarities between these actor cousins of the third degree. I have really not studied the matter carefully enough for further comment. But for differences, Clark had raven black hair like his mother and grey-green eyes like his father. Harry had blond hair in youth which darkened in maturity. His eyes were blue, but not that "piercing" kind which his father and grandfather had.

William Clark Gable died of a coronary thrombosis (blood clot) on Wednesday 16 November 1960 at 10:50 in the evening at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital. He had been an actor for 30 years according to the certificate (22428 Los Angeles City 1960) but that meant only his movie career. He is entombed at Forest Lawn Memorial Park Mausoleum in Glendale, California. His regular residence, where he suffered the attack, was at 4525 Petit Avenue, Encino, California. Harry Hollingsworth died at 6 a.m. on Tuesday the 4th of November 1947 at St. Vincent's Hospital in Los Angeles and is buried at Inglewood Park Cemetery about 2 miles from my house. He died of cirrhosis of the liver. Both men died at 59. That is an all too sad similarity.

By his last wife, Kathleen "Kay" Williams (Spreckles) Gable, Clark had a posthumous son, John Clark Gable, born 20 Mar 1961 - my fourth cousin. Clark had really wanted a son, but he was deprived of the joy of seeing him. John now lives in Malibu, California.

It's a pleasure to find a kinship like this one, not to boast about it, but to observe the parallel lives and ambitions of persons who descend from a close common progenitor. Incidentally, from those hardy old settlers of Crawford County, Pennsylvania came two other men famous in our time, Sherwood Anderson and Maxwell Anderson. More of that later. I wonder if Harry Hollingsworth ever worked in a picture with Clark Gable. Did he by chance meet "The King" one day on the MGM lot?

The anguish of all this is that Dad, an actor for life, never knew he was a cousin of Clark Gable. He would have been thrilled. He loved Clark's work. I didn't even get to tell Mother, because I could not prove the connection in her lifetime. As an actress (Nan Crawford) she admired him, but as a woman she adored him! Both were fine actors.

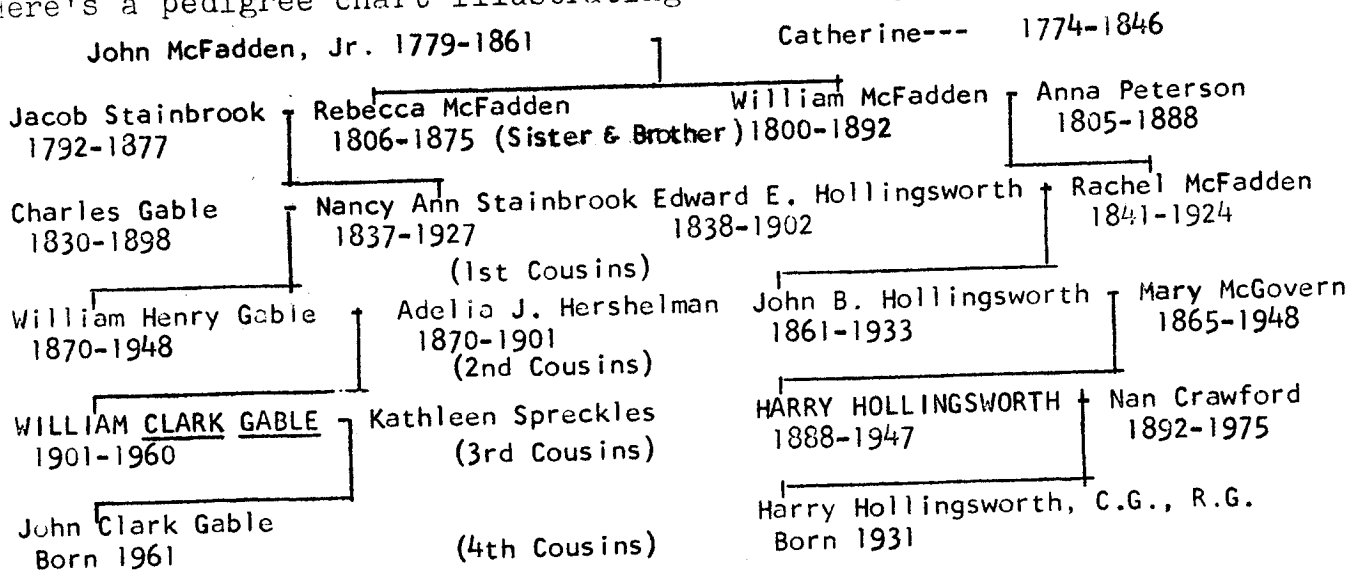
I guess it's a little late to tell any of them now.

Hollingsworth Deeds in Franklin County, Georgia, Part One

It's about time. These should have been published in the sixties. Your editor copied out all the abstracts from films on loan from Salt Lake over fifteen years ago. Now, a printed book is available in two volumes Deeds of Franklin County, Georgia, 1784-1826 (1976) Vol. 1, by Martha Walters Acker, (vi and 559 pp.). A well done work. Years ago, the Georgia Genealogical Magazine (then edited by Judge Folks Huxford) gave a series of these land records. But your editor was shocked to see that nearly all Hollingsworth items were skipped by the contributor Sue Snead Grantham, but Huxford failed to mark his articles as a partial abstract! Well, HR to the rescue! Here is the whole set omitted by GGM. But we must warn our readers that there is not one reference apparently to our "Mystery Sam" Hollingsworth here, or to his supposed sons, Jacob and Isaac. We knew this sad fact back then, and a twice or thrice over perusal this time confirms it. But maybe you might find a clue your myopic editor missed, or find data about another line of Hollingsworth.

HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY

(1) History of Gallatin, Saline, Hamilton, Franklin and Williamson Counties, Illinois (1887) by Goodspeed Co. (reprint 1967 by Unigraphic) pp. 192-3; 196-7, confides that At the March term of the Saline County Illinois Circuit Court, 1853 ... George Hollingsworth was sentenced to the penitentiary for killing James Hollingsworth, his father. Under Important Trials ... "George Hollingsworth killed his father, James Hollingsworth in 1854 (sic). He was tried in Saline County, John S. Robinson being States Attorney. Hollingsworth was defended by Jedidiah Jack, Hugh B. Montgomery and William H. Parish and was convicted of Manslaughter and sentenced to the penitentiary for one year." (No Hollingsworths found in Saline County in either 1850 or 1860 in our census reports in old HR's! Who were these Hollingsworths?)

(2) The Wofford Volume, by Zelma Wells Price, Box 766, ^{Miss.} Greenville, Volume VIII., parts 1 and 2 of her series, (mimeo) p. 29, gives:

"6. 4. Benjamin Wofford (son of William Wofford) born 1758 in Frederick Co., Maryland, died 2 Mar 1836, Bartow Co., Georgia (HR note: In 1836 it was Cass County, changed to Bartow in 1861); buried on Stamp Creek in same place. Married MARY HOLLINGSWORTH (daughter of Jacob Hollingsworth of Franklin County, Georgia)." This helps to clear up some of the mystery in that family. (Above items noted 24 Jan 1967)

(3) Film 558,030 of the Genealogical Society of Utah contains the first volume of the Orphans Court records for Chester County, Penna. Your editor took notes on 22 Sep 1978 while on his research trip. A note at the beginning states "The only fragment of Quarter Sessions between 1710 - 1714 that can be found was filed among the road papers on account of a road record in it Feb. 24, 1712/13. 1714-1723 is indexed."

Constables for Kennett Township 1720-1721: Valentine Hollingsworth. 30 Nov 1720, Valentine Hollingsworth, constable for Kennett 23 Feb 1719/20. (This would be Valentine² Hollingsworth, son of Valentine¹ and Anne (Calvert) Hollingsworth, who died in 1757. Stewart, p. 31, covering this man very skimpily, does not mention this office.)

(4) Loyalists in the American Revolution (1864) by Lorenzo Sabine, Little Brown & Co., Boston, in Volume 1 (of 2) p. 583, has this biography:

HOLLINGSWORTH, _____. Of Georgia, Captain in the corps of the infamous McGirth (see HR comment below). In 1780, while on an expedition to South Carolina his party murdered seventeen men on their farms, in one or two days; and, for miles, the country was a scene of ruin. Disappointed at not finding a particular Whig, of whom they were in quest, they took the flint out of the lock of a musket, and put his wife's thumb in its place, and applied the screw, in order to compel her to disclose the place of his concealment. Two loyalists of this surname, Timothy and Valentine Hollingsworth, were attainted of treason in Georgia and lost their estates by confiscation. The above was probably one of them. (NOTE: Vol. 2, p. 64, shows Col. Daniel McGirth, of Georgia,

born in South Carolina. McGirth stole property and put it near Saint Augustine (Florida) and continued his depredations in Florida after 1789. Noting this fact, we hark back to our knowledge that Timothy⁴ Hollingsworth (of Stephen³, Henry², Valentin¹, Henry^a) did settle after the war on St. John's River in Florida, baptised his children in a Roman Catholic (Spanish) Church there, and probably was the man mentioned above. In fact, other sources refer to him as Captain Timothy Hollingsworth. In Vol. 1, p. 153, the very first bio is that of Benjamin Abbott, born 1732 in Long Island, N.Y. who died in 1796 in Salem, New Jersey, a Methodist Episcopal Minister and Loyalist. He was about to be taken by some Whigs (rebels) while giving a sermon. His eloquence so enthralled them, we are told, that they did not take him! He was (though the book does not say so) the child of Benjamin Abbott, or Abbett (sometimes Abit) Sr., and grandchild of James Abit of Long Island, another ancestor of your editor. (See Sutton story p. 2-3 above.)

(5) SUE HOLLINGSWORTH RETIRES FROM POST OFFICE is the headline in the Gatlinburg Press, Gatlinburg, Tennessee issue of Thu 6 Nov 1969. Our donor is Martha B. Hollingsworth of Jamestown, Ohio. Mrs. Sue G. Hollingsworth, postal clerk in Gatlinburg for 30 years and 7 months, is shown in the photo making her last sale of stamps to Mrs. Ethel Shulz, and in another photo Postmaster Earl W. Ogle is shown presenting Sue with a Certificate of Merit. She was formerly Sue George, and came to Gatlinburg on 27 March 1935 as an employe of Southern Bell Telephone Co. She began her postal clerking soon afterward, working nights as telephone operator. She is (1969) married to A. G. Hollingsworth and lives at 254 Cedar Av., Knoxville, Tenn. (Abridged for HR)

(6) Martha B. Hollingsworth has generously sent HR a nice collection of items, and here is another. The Journal Herald of Dayton, Ohio, 7 Nov 1965 (we were going to press with HR # 3 then!) has a 3-column piece (with photo) about Arnold Borden Hollingsworth, then mayor of Clayton, Montgomery County, Ohio. The catchy title is Astute Government Leader Behind Clayton Mayor's Rustic Language. By the time this piece was printed, A. B. had been in office nine years. "Things are as quiet as a bunch of old maids at a quilting bee. No problems, old issues - roads and commodes." They called him Holly. (Him too?) Clayton, Ohio's then (and probably now) population was 650! He had just won another election. How? He had no opponents. So he went into his fifth consecutive 2-year term. He had been mayor since August 1956.

"I'm getting to the point now where I know what I'm doing." (Modest.) Although he talks as if he just got up from the front porch of the general store, he's hardly the white socks and wide tie sort. Actually he prefers silk shirts. His home is quite modern, too. It was built to his specifications. He was 42 in 1965. While his features resemble then President Lyndon B. Johnson, Hollingsworth was a registered Republican and conservative in philosophy. He was a medical service representative for Ayerst Laboratories, and his house is his office. What surprised your editor the most (the name Arnold Borden Hollingsworth at first struck a familiar tone) is that he was born near Mallorytown, Ontario, Canada! Well - how de doo, Cousin! Yes Sir. He is one of ours, from the Wexford's. Usually, we only get squibs about this family from our cousins in Canada, Evelyn Purvis Earle or ~~Clara~~

Hollingsworth to name two. Quickly searching back issues of this journal we found his birth entry: Arnold Borden Hollingsworth, son of James Edward Hollingsworth and wife Rhea M., farmer, Mallorvtown, Leeds County, born 1 Oct 1923, baptised 14 Nov 1924, Diocese of Ontario, Anglican Church etc. HR 4 p. 84 entry no. 27 (June 1968 HR). There is a current telephone listing for Arnold B. Hollingsworth at Clayton.

Arnold and his wife Alice did the decorating and landscaping for their home. He had a 150-gun collection, mainly of historical firearms, most from Civil War days. He is a public speaker. (Shouldn't all mayors be?) He gives talks on guns. Of Mallorytown, he says, wryly, "It used to be a whistle stop. They don't even whistle any more." His parents came to Cleveland, Ohio in 1925. He came to Clayton in 1950, and was appointed to the council two years later.

Aside from the problem in 1965 of finding a place for sewer and water facilities which they didn't have, there "aren't any cliques" in the community. "I don't think the Peyton Place people could do much with it."

(7) Hollingsworth Solderless Terminal Co. of Fort Lauderdale has delayed filing a reorganization plan with bankruptcy court. Declining order rates due to economic conditions were the cause. The company filed in November (1981). (From Chapman Sullivan of Margate, Florida, cut from the F. L. Sun-Sentinel, Apr 7, 1982, p. 20 C, who says that Hollingsworth S.T. Co. was cited as one of the ten worst toxic chemical violators in the country!)

(8) Four columns and a photo were given to a good article in the Dayton Journal-Herald issue of Mon. 2 Oct 1978, p. 3, and thanks once more to donor Martha B. Hollingsworth of Jamestown, Ohio. Scott Heron's by-line tells us of Jake Hollingsworth who, after 45 years of work, with no days missed, is retiring from his job at Standard Register Company. He started work on 25 Sep 1933! He was a printer at that time and that when he retired. At 63, he had a frank way about him, answering his boss Roy Linton's question about what he would do the last two days of his career with the company with "NOT A DAMN THING," with a smile on his face, of course. And true to his statement, Jake Hollingsworth just reminisced with pals and toured the plant for the next two days.

He grew up in Dayton's east end and went to Wilbur Wright Junior High School. Now, he wants to get back to coaching softball etc. He's a member of the Dayton Amateur Baseball Commission and Amateur Softball Commission. But he likes the printing business.

Actually, he served in World War Two, but he doesn't count that as missing work! Anyway, he never was on sick call - even when there were deaths in the family they seemed to be buried on his off days, except his wife, and then he got a funeral leave. He gave up cigarettes 27 years ago (1951) and turned to chewing tobacco. (Lots of baseball players do.) Way back in the 20s he gave up playing to coach. Like some of our Los Angeles Hollingsworths, Jake played semi pro for Herman Franks for the Nick Thomas Brewery. He quit playing as promised: the first time he hit a blooper to right field where the fielder put him out at first. He took off his shoes and threw them and his glove into the dugout, and, over the coach's protests, walked out.

Until her retirement, she was employed for a number of years with the Canadian Red Cross. Her first husband, Cyril Daykin, died in 1939. Her second husband, Clifford Roscoe, died in 1968. Survivors include a daughter, Barbara A. Falls, wife of Dr. Richard A. Falls, of Xenia; a sister, Mrs. Grace Harquall of New Jersey; two brothers, Arthur Hollinsworth of Toronto, Canada, and Ted Hollinsworth of Florida; and three grandchildren, Mrs. Gregory (Deborah) Lockhart of St. Louis, Mo., Mark David Falls, a student at San Diego State University and Kathleen Jane Falls, a student at the College of Wooster (Ohio). 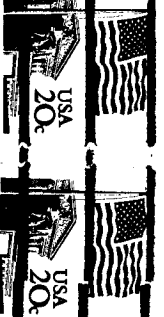
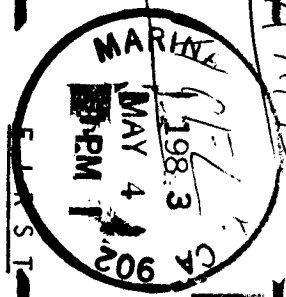
