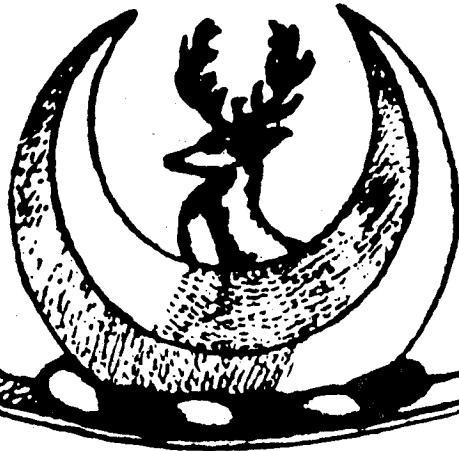

Marion County, Indiana Hollingsworth Marriages 1856-1920

From a typescript in mimeo of these records done by the Works Projects Administration during the late thirties and early forties, we Xeroxed the pages of our choice at the Indiana State Library in Indianapolis during a visit in the summer of 1978.

You may remember that that was the summer of our "content", wherein we visited so many landmarks in our Frederick Hollingsworth family history. The only drawback we experienced was the rule the State Library rigidly enforces, namely, that only so many - we think ten - exposures may be made from any given book at any time. This stencil is being re-typed to avoid publishing our original temper-tantrum on this subject. Certain library rules, you see, set us off like Mount Saint Helens. Let us drop the subject with this statement: If our true opinion about librarians' rules in general, and that 10-Xerox-and-no-more rule-at-Indianapolis S.L. in particular were here published, we would most surely offend many subscribers and feel sorry for years to come. Not that we have changed our mind! For, on Judgment Day, what paragraph in the Great Book will be devoted to any Library Rule, we ask you? Not worth gnashing our teeth about, really. But just that we do not wish to waste space.

From 1856-1904 names of groom, bride, date of marriage, book and page, are given. From 1905-1920, date of birth of Hollingsworth partner is given (which is put here right after the name), plus color. Certificates may be ordered from the Marion County Clerk.

### Marion County, Indiana Hollingsworth Births 1882 - 1920

Judging from the number of marriages of record for the same period-as can be seen above - this represents a very small percentage of the total births which Hollin(gs)worths actually experienced between 1882 and 1920. Our cursory examination of census records shows that some of the marriage partners did not live in Indianapolis or Marion County. But this still does not account for the low number of births recorded, even if we account for the fact that, in the period 1882-1904, the percentage of reported births, as compared with the actual number of births, is small indeed. Why Hollingsworth births do not leap upward in numbers beginning in 1905 is something HR cannot answer. This is an index compiled by the WPA in 1939 at the Indianapolis Board of Health. The names of infants are only sparsely entered here. Although many births do not contain names of children HR believes that if one applies for an extract of one of these records, that for the most part, the name will appear. Name of child - pardon us - initials - is given only on numbers 1-6. Thereafter, given name of father, mother's maiden name, sex and color of child and date of birth, together with book and page at the Indianapolis Board of Health, are given. (We do have a supplement, however, to be given here later, containing 50 entries, 1882-1906.)

(1) From Willwood Burial Park (address 206 W. State Street), Rockford, Illinois.

July 16, 1963

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth: I have the following information on Hosea Hollingsworth who was buried in Willwood Burial Park: He was 66 years of age when he died Sept 12, 1959. Our records give no other information than this ... Signed by G. W. Gayle, President.

(2) Note on bottom of your editor's letter he dated 10 Mar 1960, only about a month after he began canvassing for his "roots": From Resthaven Cemetery Association, office at 1720 Ashworth Rd., Des Moines, Iowa, looking for Frederick Hollingsworth.

Hollingsworth, Robert L. deceased and wife still living in Des Moines is our only interment with this name.

(3) From Jesse Hollingsworth of Hollingsworth & Co., 1138 West Mason, Green Bay, Wisconsin, memo dated April 2, 1960:

Being an accountant I have been working all hours and have not been able to answer your letter. Please believe me, I am real interested in what you are trying to do and you can probably help me. I will send you a letter after April 15, 1960 with all the details I am aware of - also I talked to Mrs Wallace in Green Bay, She has some very old pictures and I'm afraid they may get destroyed if mailed. I have talked to a photographer of mine and he assures me he can reproduce a picture from the old one which we will attempt to do before sending to you. Again thank you and I will write shortly.

Notes: The first two replies were rather routine and the men listed are not known to us. Jesse Hollingsworth was not related to us, but Mrs. Olive J. Hollingsworth Wallace was the adopted child of Dr. J. S. (Samuel) Hollingsworth, son of Frederick. As for those pictures, we did not get them.

Mrs. Emily Hollingsworth

Business acumen and foresight that made her mother one of the prominent figures in Woodland as operator of the Capital Hotel from 1880 until 1927, has made Mrs. Emily Hollingsworth of Woodland an outstanding member of the community in which she has lived the greater part of her life. Since 1919 Mrs. Hollingsworth has been a member of the Plainfield Victory Club and is a member of the Eastern Star.

Mrs. Hollingsworth's parents were among California's 1850 immigrants, her father Peter Scott McCarty having come to Placer County by ox team from his native state of Pennsylvania; her mother, Esther Ragsdale, moving also to that county when her parents came west from Jefferson City, Missouri. At the age of eighteen she married Peter Scott McCarty and shared his interest in mines and mining investments.

She moved in July, 1877, to Yolo County, and in 1879 married M. H. Torrence of Indiana, and operated the old Exchange Hotel in Woodland. Jan 1, 1880, she purchased the Capital Hotel on the corner of First and Main Streets. Ownership of the hotel, built by A. S. House in 1868, remains in the family and no hotel is better known to old-timers than this one. In 1897 as the wife of M. H. Torrence of Indiana, she left for Alaska to join her husband who was in Skagway. Misfortune became hers, for she was kicked by a mule on the steamer and was forced to go to a hospital in Seattle where she was confined for a month. She then resumed her journey on crutches. Mrs. Torrance became known as a woman of great energy, determination and for her lovable character.

Mrs. Hollingsworth, only child of Peter and Esther McCarty, was born at Bear River, Nevada Co., Calif., and was educated in Los Angeles public schools and Hesperian College of Woodland. She was married Oct 10, 1883, to George Warren Hollingsworth in Woodland. Her husband was the son of John Hollingsworth who was a pioneer citizen of high standing in Yolo County, one of the organizers of the Bank of Woodland of which he remained a director until two years before his death Jan. 29, 1899. John Hollingsworth was born in Clark Co., Kentucky, Sept. 11, 1817, but moved to Missouri with his parents when he was but a boy. In 1849, John Hollingsworth traveled the long, weary ox train route to California and joined thousands of other men in mining.

Three years of a miner's life and Mr. Hollingsworth determined to settle down on a ranch so he took up a homestead one mile southwest of Woodland on what is known as the old Cole place. In 1853 he left California bound for Atchinson Co., Missouri, where he was married to Dulcena Bonee. The couple started westward in April of that year, Mr. Hollingsworth and his men driving 500 head of cattle to stock his ranch which was reached August 30. Only 18 head of cattle were lost on the trip.

Of seven children born to John Hollingsworth and his wife, George Warren is the only one left in Yolo County. He was born two miles west of Woodland, educated in county schools, Hesperian College and the San Francisco Business College, has farmed on one location all his life, just north of Plainfield district, and now lives in Woodland, where he is widely known. He is a member of F. and A. M. Lodge.

Six children were born to Mrs. Emily Hollingsworth and George Warren Hollingsworth. They are Mrs. Otto F. Wilkendorf, born in 1884, a resident of Plainfield district and mother of four children and grandmother of two children; John T. Hollingsworth, born in 1886, now a resident of Oakland. He is the father of one child. Ray W. Hollingsworth, born in 1888, farms the Hollingsworth home place. He has one son, Merett, born in Woodland. Mrs. Joseph Kergel, born in 1890, married into the old Kergel family, who were early settlers of Yolo County. They have one son, J. A., Jr., born Jan 22, 1918. George C., born in 1894, now a resident of Oklahoma, married into one of Oklahoma's pioneer families, Guy P. Cobb. Frank L., born in 1896, married Mildred Saunders, whose father has been county clerk of Yolo County for the past twenty-six years. They have a daughter, Patricia, born in June, 1921. George and Frank served their country during the World War.

George was a lieutenant and one of the first soldiers to go into Germany. Frank was a corporal in the first train division, Company E.

A well-rounded life has been Mrs. Hollingsworth's. She reared a family of which she could well be proud and served her community with faithfulness and loyalty. (From: History of Yolo County (California); its Resources and its People, edited by William O. Russell (1940) pages 414, 415, sent to us some time ago by Doug Hollingsworth of Bangor, Maine. Doug enlightens us as to who this renowned lady was: wife of George W.<sup>8</sup> Hollingsworth, of John<sup>7</sup>, Joseph<sup>6</sup>, Robert<sup>5</sup>, George<sup>4</sup>, Abraham<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Valentin<sup>1</sup>, Henry<sup>a</sup> Hollinworth.)

Children of William and Rachel were: Patty, born 1815, Mary Ann, born 1816, Hepsabeth, born 1818, Cynthia Ann, born 1822, Elizabeth, born 1824, Thomas, born 1826, Sarah Ann, born 1828, James, born 1833, and Susan, born 1834. If you have any information on (Rachel), I would greatly appreciate it ...

HR searched and did not find. Nevertheless, the Deakins-Hollingsworth connection sounds familiar. Anyone with an answer please contact Mrs. Lehmann.

My great-great-great-grandmother was Delila Hollingsworth born 12 March 1825 in Vermillion County, Indiana (or Vermilion County) Illinois. Delila married Daniel W. At last, the tables are turned! For decades, Hollingsworths have ignored, either consciously or unconsciously, the family who use the Hollingworth spelling. (One lady in Florida confidently declaimed that "all Hollingsworths in America are descendants of Valentine!") Now, our present correspondent has given us the reverse circumstance. Frankly, long ago, your editor toyed with the idea of naming this publication "Hollingsworth-Hollingworth Register."

THE U.S. NINTH CENSUS (1870) FOR HOLLINGSWORTH - INDIANA - PART 9.

Well, excuuuuse us for such a long delay. This takes up where we left off (before many of you were born - into genealogy), in the March, 1980 issue, page 8. (Lordy! That peanut vender was still in the White House and his silly brother was wetting in parking lots!) Kosciusko, La Grange, and Lake Counties were searched in Vol. 20, pp. 1-490 plus one, and turned up no entries of our surname. That was accomplished on Apr 16, 1980. On August 28 of that year we searched Roll 84, Vol 21, with 550 pages on film, including LaPorte and Lawrence Counties with equal negative results. Our last search that year was conducted on Wed. 3rd Sep 1980 from 8:34 to 8:55 p.m. in Lawrence County. Nil. Finally, we went to the bad films again (T-8, National Archives) in 1983 and 1984. The results are published here, and will continue in later issues.

A few historical notes are warranted: It seems that the T-8 filming of the 1870 Census was done about 1938, when microfilming was indeed, in its infancy. (Those of us who grew up watching 'spy films' at the local Bijou may recall how many plots revolved round microfilm!) It seems that thousands of feet of 35 mm film were spent wastefully, on frames of census pages (2 at one exposure) which were out of focus on the left side of the frame. In the past decade the Archives has released its "new filming" of the 1870 census. But on examination, this researcher finds that there are also illegible series of pages here! This necessitates a look at both filmings, hopefully to glean a correct reading of the desired entry. Some of our readers have kindly suggested that we visit our Laguna-Niguel Regional Archives and see the new 1870 filming. Thanks. But this writer has no wheels and does not drive. It is not the policy of HR to spend funds collecting data; we donate our labor, and that is in itself a hassle.

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### HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY

(1) Correspondent Martha B. Hollingsworth, of Jamestown, Ohio, sent us this cutting out of the Xenia, Ohio, Daily Gazette, for 27 June 1983:

JAMES M. HOLLINGSWORTH, son of Randall E. Hollingsworth and step-son of Madonna Hollingsworth of 4114 Waynesville-Jamestown Road, Jamestown, has been promoted in the U.S. Army to the rank of first lieutenant. Hollingsworth is a radar platoon leader at Fort Hood, Texas, with the 2nd Armored Division.

His wife, Tina, is the daughter of Eugene D. and Margaret D. Hopfensperger of 43135 North Sierra Highway, Lancaster, California.

The lieutenant is a 1974 graduate of Symmes Valley High School, Willow Wood.

(2) Cousin June Virginia (Sladek) Farrell of Homewood, Alabama, sent us a circular announcing the candidacy of hubby Cliff Farrell for Homewood City Council, Ward 4 Place 2. It is a paid political advertisement by Friends to elect Cliff Farrell, Mrs. Jo Echols, Chairman. Cliff ran on a ticket which held election on 10 July, this year, at the Homewood Public Library. Some of Cliff's personal notes include ... 35 years experience in sales, business management and administration; resident of Homewood for 22 years; married, 2 daughters, one son and 3 grandchildren; semi-retired and able to devote full time to the job; member of Our Lady of Sorrows Parish ... has served for 7 years as a member of the Board of Zoning Adjustment and is presently chairman ... was member of the original board and is now serving a third term. Cliff won! It was in a run-off, by 3 votes. So, as June says, 'he's a busy man again.'

(3) Under the headline "Alert man saves driver from pool," by-line Kevin Allen, the Fort Lauderdale News/Sun-Sentinel for Sat. 24 Nov. 1984, Correspondent Chapman Sullivan of Margate, Florida, communicates the harrowing news about Corinne Hollingsworth, 54, and her narrow escape from drowning. It seems she was driving on Cleary Blvd. in the early afternoon when her 1978 AMC station wagon was struck from the rear by a 1980 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by Thome Wolfgang-Thompson, 22, of Fort Lauderdale. She apparently lost control of her car, which then made a U-turn and began going east on Cleary.

The car then **Went** off the road and out of control, hitting a sign, trees and a wire fence, and finally a concrete wall at University Drive and then plunging into the swimming pool at Longwood Village townhouse complex. Robert Cuddihy saw the accident from across the street. He reported his eyewitness account to the News/Sun-Sentinel. He told his wife to call the emergency 911 number on the telephone and ran over to the accident site. By that time the car was going under the water.

Dropping into the pool, Cuddihy was unable to open the car door, even with the help of Hollingsworth.

"My God," thought Cuddihy, "I'm going to watch this woman drown."

Fortunately, no such unhappy ending. Corinne Hollingsworth managed to open a window, and, with Cuddihy's help, crawl to safety. She was examined at the scene, but was in such good condition that she was not taken to hospital. The other driver, Wolfgang-Thompson, was not injured either.

(4) TV GUIDE for 24 Nov 1984, p. A 3, had an editorial "As We See It" devoted to the preposterous allegation that the Procter and Gamble Company's man-in-the-moon-with-stars logo was representative of Satan. Somehow this insidious rumor spread widely, and its intensiveness finally necessitated such disclaimers as the TV GUIDE editorial. According to some, the president of P & G appeared on the Phil Donahue and Merv Griffin shows, and also on 60 Minutes, declaring that a percentage of the profits of his gigantic corporation was being given to the so-called 'Church of Satan.' P & G went to work and obtained statements from the TV shows in question, denying any such visitations, and testimonials from Jerry Falwell and Billy Graham, no less, as to the Christianity of P & G. (You see, certain church groups believed the stupid rumors and began bombarding the company with mail.) Although the furor died down, it now has boiled up again. As TV GUIDE states the case: "Some people will believe anything, no matter how ridiculous, so long as it is supposed to have been on television."

Why should Hollingsworth Register get upset about this event? If you have followed us down through the years, you know that your editor's venerable great-great-grandfather, Frederick Hollingsworth, landed in New York in the summer of 1829, and proceeded immediately to Cincinnati, Ohio. There, he lived with his relation (we do not know to this day if he was a cousin or brother, due to loss of Irish records), Thomas Hollingsworth, soap-boiler and tallow-chandler (candle-maker). At that precise time, Tom had an apprentice named James Gamble. Some seven years later, Gamble and his brother-in-law, William Procter, formed the company known as Procter and Gamble, featuring the soap known then as The Ivory. Yes: if it weren't for our Wexford-born Hollingsworths, Jimmy Gamble could scarcely have produced his world-renowned soap! Well, whether that is so, or not, HR hastens to say that the P & G logo has been a symbol of the company, in various designs, for over a century, and the Gamble and Procter families, like the Hollingsworths, were staunch Wesleyan Methodists, devoted to their God and to charity, and never to the likes of Satan ... bad luck to him! (See HR June, 1968, page 45.)

(5) The Beach Reporter for Oct 25, 1984, p. 26, in reporting on the Manhattan Beach, California, 10-K Run of 13 October, lists JOEL HOLLINGSWORTH as a contestant, as he was last year. He qualified in the male run, ages 35-39 (age 39), had Division 340, race 1892, and ran the race in 57:18 minutes. (As we remember it, more members of his family participated last year.)

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### Alabama Records

Pauline Jones Gandrud produced a monumental manuscript collection of Alabama material. From her work, Rev. Silas E. Lucas published a couple of hundred volumes of printed matter. Here are brief squibs of our surname.

(1) Vol. 152, pp. 37, 38. Benton - now Calhoun County, Alabama Circuit Court Book 21, part 1, p. 251 - June Term 1851. Hollingsworth vs Martin. Assumpsit by Wm. B. Martin for use of John Y. Young ag. Stephen P. Hollingsworth. Includes receipt dated 11 Feb 1836 by S. P. Hollingsworth on account of William B. Martin for \$100.

"Sometime in 1846 or 1847 S. P. Hollingsworth and William B. Martin came to my office on the evening of Hollingsworth's leaving for Texas. Col. Martin, the plaintiff, claimed of Hollingsworth a certain amount for professional services in settling up the estate of W. B. Hollingsworth, or Benjamin Hollingsworth, or both, not now distinctly recollected. S.P. Hollingsworth was one of the firm engaged in mercantile business in Jacksonville. (He) acted as agent for his mother, who was administratrix of the estate of Benjamin Hollingsworth, deceased. He removed to Texas in 1836 and has not since resided in Alabama (a witness's testimony). (Note: This is the family of Benjamin and Joicy (Jones) Hollingsworth. Benjamin was the son of Jacob and Mary (Brooks) Hollingsworth of Franklin County, Georgia.)

(2) Vol. 220, pp 14. Dallas County Estates. Final settlement of the estate of Jacob Hollingsworth, deceased. Hosea Hollingsworth was administrator. "The legal heirs are eleven (11) in number." Lydia the widow; Saul Davis (see further) in right of his wife Nancy, formerly Hollingsworth, Riley Moody in right of his wife Sarah, ditto; William Davis, in right of his wife Catherine, ditto; William Edwards, in right of his wife Elizabeth, as above; Joshua F. Hollingsworth, Stephen Hollinsworth, Zebulon Hollingsworth, Hosea Hollingsworth. (The note says: 'That is all this entry listed; Mrs. Gandrud has a note of a son JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, who must be omitted Number 11.') page 96.

HR June, 1968, p. 79, presented this case before. Re-statement is deliberate. Our 1968 source gives date of case as 1836. Sam'l Davis was the husband of Nancy Hollingsworth, which we tend to believe, except we had Mary - not Nancy. In fact, we had better reprint what we published way back there 16 years ago: Hollingsworth, Jacob, dec.

Hosea Hollingsworth, Administrator; widow Lydia Hollingsworth; children: Mary, wife of Sam'l Davis; Sarah, wife of Riley Moody; Elizabeth, wife of William Edwards; Catherine Hollingsworth; Hosea Hollingsworth; John F. Hollingsworth; Joshua Hollingsworth, Stephen Hollingsworth, Zebulon Hollingsworth and William Davis, husband of Ruth Hollingsworth, dec.

(It is possible that Mrs. Gandrud telescoped Joshua with John F. Hollingsworth to produce Joshua F. Hollingsworth, isn't it?)

(3) Deed Book H, p. 184, Dallas Co., Ala. 9 Apr 1838. Wiley J. Sorell & John Dudley to Hosea Hollingsworth (sic). Makes title to Hollingsworth ... all right, etc. ... which Jacob Hollingsworth, late of Dallas Co., deceased, had at the time of his death, to the North-east quarter of Section 25; Township 14; Range 11, etc. 435.25 acres.

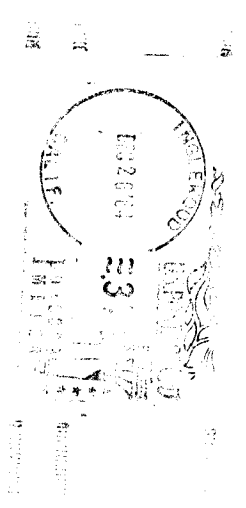
