The Last Will of Michael Harrison - 1681

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN, the Sixteenth day of September in the yeare of our Lord God one thousand six hundred eighty and one and in the three and thirtieth yeare of the Raigne of our Sovereigne Lord Charles the second by the Grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland King defender of the ffaith &c: I Michaell Harrison of Marlea in the County of Antrim Esqr. being in health of body and of good and perfect memory (thanks be to God) doe make this my last will and Testam^t. in manner and forme following (That is to say) -

ffirst I bequeath my soule and spiritt into the hands of Almighty God my heavenly ffather by whom of his meere and onely grace I trust to be saved and received into eternall rest through the death of my saviour and redeemer Jesus Christ in whose precious blood I sett the whole and onely hope of my salvation my wretched body in hope of a ioyfull resurrection I committ to the earth to be buried in the Church of Lisburne with such charges as my Executor hereafter named shall think fitt and convenient and touching the distribution of my temporall estate I dispose of the same as followeth.

IMPRIMIS - Whereas I formerly paid into the hands of Leiu^t. Thomas Conway the sume of three hundred pounds (for which I haue his receipt) now my will is that the interest thereof the said Leiu^t is to haue and receive for and towards the maintenance of his daughters my grandchildren Jane and Mary untill their respective marriages and that (fol. 446R) that either of them shall haue and receive (words crossed out and hatched illegibly - Ed.) one hundred and fifty pounds out of the said three hundred pounds.

Item. I Give and bequeath unto my Grandchild Lettice Conway one other of the daughters of the said Leiu^t. Conway the sume of two hundred pounds to be paid by my Executor Hereafter named out of my personall Estate within six months next after she Shall attaine to the eage of one and twenty yeares to be marryed she marrying wth the consent of her said ffather and my Executor or one of them And whereas I putt into the hands of the said Leiu^t. Conway about two years and A halfe since the sume of one hundred pounds to renew a Lease of certaine Lands from the Right Hon^{ble} Edward Earle of Conway my intent was y^t (that - Ed.) the same Lease when renewed and after the decease of the said Leiu^t. Conway should be to the use of my Grandchildren Michaell & William Conway And my will further is and I doe hereby give & bequeath unto the said Michaell and William the same Lease from and after the decease of their said ffather.

Item I give and bequeath unto my God child Michael Jackson the sume of forty shillings.

Item I give and bequeath unto Mr. Roger Jackson and (f. 447) and Alice his wife twenty shillings a peece to buy them Rings.

Item I give and bequeath unto M^r. Francis Brookes old M^r. Thomas Porter M^{rs}. Jane Lyndon and M^r. Thomas ffarewell twenty shillings a peece to buy them Rings.

Item I give and bequeath unto M^r. Joseph Wilkins the sume of forty shillings who I desire may preach my funerall sermon.

Item I give and bequeath unto the poore people of the parishes of Lisburne and Belfast the sume of five pounds to be distributed bymy Executor and the ministers of the said parishes for the time being.

Item I give and bequeath unto my old servant William Crow the sume of five pounds.

Item I give and bequeath unto my Servant James ffitter the sume of forty Shillings All which said Last severall mentioned Legacies is my will is Shall be paid out of a certaine debt to mee owing and Secured from John Late Lord Kingston by two Severall Statutes Staple and by deeds of Indenture bearing date on or about the Sixteenth day of November in the Seven and twentieth yeare of his Ma^{ties} Raigne that now is & if I doe not leaue att the time of my decease ready mon-eye by me sufficient to pay and discharge the Same.

Item I make and ordaine my well beloved Sonn Edward Harrison, Esqr. to be my full (f. 447R) full whole and onely Executor of this my last will and Testament to whom his heires and assignes for ever I give devise and bequeath all other my estate both reall and personall whatsoever And my noble freind S^r. George Rawdon Barr^t I make Overseer of this my Last will and Testament and give to him forty Shillings to buy him a Ring desireing him to see this my last will and Testament performed accordingly and I doe utterly revoke all former wills & Testaments by mee in any wise heretofore made and declared

Wittnesse my hand and seale the day and yeare first aboue witten

Signed sealed and published after the interlineation of these words, or be marryed other in the P'sence of us and after the razure of the word two,

Mich: Harrison (S)

Roger Jackson, Tho: ffarewell Anthony Karr, James ffitter.

The Latin Probate Act is abbreviated (as always), to the effect that the will of Michael Harrison, late of Marlea, Co Antrim, was proved and approved in the Prerogative Court by Edward Harrison son of the said deceased who swore on the Holy Evangelists (i.e. the New Testament) saving the rights of others, etc., the 24th of September A.D. 1683.

From the Irish Prerogative Will Book 1664-1684, folios 446-447 reverse saved from the destruction of the Public Record Office, Four Courts, Dublin, 30 June 1922 and filmed in the 1950s by the Genealogical Society of Utah. The original will perished. An abstract made by the agents of Sir William Betham, Ulster King of Arms, is much too brief, though adequately giving the names of the heirs above.

Valentine Hollingsworth's daughter Mary married Thomas Conway of Lisburn, a Quaker (a.k.a. Conoway, Conaway). It is not known if he was a relation to the said Lieut. Thomas Conway of Lisburn who was, as you can see, there at the precise time as the other man. Mary and the other Thomas Conway were married under the auspices of Lurgan Monthly Meeting on 28th of 4th month (June) 1682. The spelling of the surname in the copy of the marriage record in the original Lurgan record book (p.94 - copy owned by your editor) is Conway throughout.

No Harrison signs the certificate which has the names of 23 men and 18 women afixed as witnesses.

We were surprised to see that Thomas Conway and Henry Hollingsworth signed side by side the marriage of Thomas Chapman and Sarah Hoope, both of Shankill Parish, in July 1686 (rest of date faded out) while Henry was back in Ireland. Conway must have gone with his brother-in-law to settle up Valentine Hollingsworth's affairs there and

perhaps to take care of some Quaker business. (In an earlier HR we showed that Henry had returned to Ireland several years before his marriage in 1688.)

Now about Harrisons. The marriage of Valentine Hollingsworth to Ann Calvert, 12th day of forth month (June) 1672 (p. 85 Lurgan Book op. cit.) was signed by Jam: Harrison and Nic: Harrison, along with John Calvert, William and Anthony Dixon, and 25 others. A careful examination of this ancient clerk's copy indicates it is "Nic:" and not "Mic:" Harrison. Mich: would be the proper abbreviation for the latter. Nevertheless, Harrisons did sign Valentine's own marriage, and a search of other marriages in this book well into the 1700s shows no other instance of that happening, which might suggest that these men were not Friends, and had come to the wedding solely as relations of one of the parties involved. They signed next under John Calvert, who was the brother of the bride. Incidentally, in Vol. 1, p.56 of HR, the late John V. Hollingsworth of Chadds Ford, Pa., published this marriage as it is found in A. C. Myers' Immigration of the Irish Quakers into Pennsylvania, p. 313. Myers erred in his transcription of the record we own in film reproduction, only in these instances: Val and bride signed "Holensworth", not Holengworth, the Harrisons signed Harison, which Myers did correctly note, and the name he gave as "Elis: Gnus" is Elis(abeth): Lynus! (It took us 20 years to get round to seeing what on earth kind of a name Gnus was - other than a herd of wildebeests! Myers took the L and the y for one letter - G. He thought the long s in Holensworth was a g as well.)

Who exactly James and Nicholas Harrison were is not yet known to your editor. This early marriage is not arranged so as to have the so-called "relatives' column" where the kinsmen of the married couple signed nearest to their own signatures.

The fact that the above testator, Michael Harrison of Magheralave (pronounced like Marlea), a very prominent settler in Ireland, had a son-in-law named Thomas Conway of Lisburn, Co Antrim, exactly as did Valentine Hollingsworth of Ballyvickcrannell, Co Armagh, another prominent citizen before his Quaker affiliations, is very intriguing to say the least. Beside all that is the fact that Harrison was the man who had sold the farm of Ballyvickcrannell to Hollingsworth in 1664, before the Quaker conversion. Was this simply a business deal, or was it a family favor?

In Burke's old "The General Armory" of a century ago, pp.460-461, there are 39 entries under the name Harrison for coats of arms! Many bear similar achievements of course. Only the last 3 seem to refer to the Irish Harrisons, to wit: (No. 38 our numbering) Harrison (Registered Ulster's Office). Vert a lion rampant and a chief or; (39) Harrison (confirmed by Roberts, Ulster, 1648, to William Harrison of Dublin, Gent., descended from an ancient family in England). Argent two bends gules on a chief sable an eagle displayed or. Crest - a demi eagle displayed murally gorged or. These both bear some similarity to some of the English grants. (See page 60 for details of No. 37.)

As mentioned in our June issue, the other Michael Harrison of Ballydargan, Co Down, father-in-law of Valentine Blacker, lived in the parish of Bright, where only one tombstone now is legible erected to this family, being a raised horizontal stone forming a box tomb, "Sacred to the memory of Nicholas Harrison of Ballydargan." He died 9 Feb 1788. His wife Elizabeth and two daughters are also there, all memori-

alized on one slab (Gravestone Inscriptions, Co Down, 8:40 Bright Graveyard, Barony of Lecale, R.S.J. Clarke, Editor). The church registers were destroyed, so no chance to get data that way.

Sir William Betham, first Deputy, then Ulster King of Arms, on 16 Feb 1809 completed his *Collectanea Genealogica*, now Genealogical Manuscripts under the control of the National Library, Dublin (in the now closed Genealogical Office). MS No. 225 contains a pedigree sketched from the Michael Harrison original will "with sketches of the seals affixed to each" of them - provided they were armigerous - bore coats of arms or a crest. Michael's coat is impaled (divided) with that of a Sandford arms! It is assumed his wife, who died before he wrote the will, was the Sandford, as is likely. Using Betham's crude and hasty sketch, we deduced that the Harrison arms is: Argent, on a chevron engrailed gules between three hares salient, proper, as many bezants. The Sandford coat is Per chevron azure and ermine, in chief two boars' heads erased or.

The Harrison coat matches that (in Burke, op.cit.) of a Peter Harrison, cursitor and a Six Clerk in Chancery, per a funeral entry of 1630, except Peter's has a mullet (5 pointed star) as a difference sign of a 3rd son. We think that this is an Irish coat, since the Six-Clerks of Chancery were in Dublin, John Newell being one. You will remember that his daughter Elizabeth married Henry Hollinsworth (fl. 1693-1711) of King Hill, Co Down.

Translating the heraldry for the Harrison coat of arms: Shield silver, on a chevron whose edges are cut with indented arcs, colored red, three golden discs. On the shield, three leaping hares in natural color. Note the pun on the name Harrison - Hares. (MS 225:145, also to be found in the Phillips MSS., originally Betham's genealogical abstracts, Vol. 31, p. 93 but the drawing of the coat is lousy there!)

Michael's brother, Matthew Harrison, also used an unimpaled seal (not divided with another coat) exactly as above, on his will dated 2 Aug 1666, proved 1667 (Betham, op. cit. 225:130 and 31:68). In the abstract and pedigree, only the brother Michael is named. The recorded copy will be seen later. He is styled Matthew Harrison, Dublin, Esquire.

By the way, Betham's reading of Michael's will indicates Michael Jackson is called "grand" child, not "god" child as the office copy states, but he leaves out Lettice Conway and of the 20 names in the will as registered, Betham mentions only 9!

In Betham, 225, p. 117, is a sketch pedigree of the Prerogative will or settlement of one Peter Harrison of Dublin, Gent. or Esquire, dated 6 Aug 1630, who possibly is the man mentioned in The General Armory. It names wife Elizabeth and daughter Katherine. (Now don't jump to a conclusion that this Katherine could be Valentine Hollingsworth's mother!) An unusual note beside the entry reads "He made a settlement of his estate by deed dated 6 Aug 1630 Wm. Croston & Pierce Morre (?) Esq. Trustees remainder to the heirs of his body, to Elizabeth, daughter of John Kennedy of Dublin, Esqr., provided she married one of the sons of William Harrison of Boyle, County Roscommon, Gent. remainder to her sister Jane on same condition, remainder to his right heirs."

The Parish Registers of Lisburn (alias Lisnegarvy, or Blaris) begin, surprisingly, in 1639 for baptisms, but there are gaps, and the marriages begin much later. We have not had them searched for Michael.

"Napoleon Bonaparte," 45, male, black, born Maryland, is inmate of the Baltimore alms house, p. 160R, line 38, Volume 2 3rd District. He is marked "insane." "Frederick Delius" (if you are an aficionado of music)-NOT the British composer, is found on p. 370 of Ward 9, Baltimore. This one is 48, a boot repairer, born Prussia. The Home of the Friendless (Lord, how negative!) is on page 260 of Ward 12. Finally, on p. 181R, Ward 12, is Elizabeth Wolf, age blank. The harried census taker wrote this footnote "Elizabeth Wolf, wife of Alexr. Wolf, does not know her age, nor has she the slightest idea what it is!" (Oh yeah?) There was a George Washington, all black, in almost every county, and a Georgiana Washington, 15, female, black, on p.214R of, yes: Washington Co.!

We are now working on Massachusetts and have finished 8 rolls of old T-8 through Roll 155. Mostly good filming. Almost no Hollingsworths. By March, 1987, we should be finished with several more states at this rate.

The 1783 Tax List of Harford County, Spesutia Lower Hundred, returned by Richard Ruff, assessor, has only James Hollingsworth, with 5 white inhabitants.

(Mary Ludwig, wife of soldier John Casper Hays, who is known to history as "Molly Pitcher," and who was pensioned by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1822 for her services at the Battle of Monmouth, New Jersey, is not in the Patriot Index. Of course, HR is not aware if Molly had children. If so, it would be interesting to observe if a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution (or a similar organisation) might claim both John C. Hays and his wife!)

ANNOUNCEMENT: The Hollingsworth Family Collection of the late Joseph Adger Stewart, has been received by your editor, in an exchange with the Filson Club, Louisville, Kentucky, for a complete set of Hollingsworth Register down to December, 1986. In later issues of HR we will be pleased to present a calendar of the documents and letters contained therein, and to spotlight certain records in full or in part. This is by special permission of the Filson Club. Your editor is not authorised to disseminate this collection in any other way, it being under the control of the club. There are 623 sheets of Xerox in this file! We have only had a cursory look at the contents. There is nothing at all, please note, which clues us to Valentine's ancestry in England. There is a correction to our assertion that Henry Cornish, Sheriff of London, had no wife or children. He did. We had hoped something about our own non-Valentine family would appear. It did: one item we already had! There may, however, appear other data in the descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr., not covered in the 1925 book, because most of the correspondence is of a later date, or because of that book. Your editor's own correspondence with Mr. Stewart's son is included, in 1966. The temptation to publish some items is herewith suppressed until a better examination of this material can be completed.

HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY

(1) An article: John Bezer, A Commissioner of William Penn, in the Pennsylvania Genealogical Magazine, Vol. 32, # 4 (1982), pp. 283-296 is of interest. You should be able to see a copy at any large library. John Bezer was a malster from Bishops Canning, Wiltshire, England, and of course, a Quaker in religion. In fact, he merits the distinction of being one of the "First Publishers of Truth" in his native land, having begun his preaching at least in 1656, for which he was persecuted. Your editor worked on this Bezer line before Hollingsworth Register was a gleam. The lineage which interests us is: Thomas³ Hollingsworth, son of Thomas² and Grace (Cook) Hollingsworth, married Judith Lamplugh, a.k.a. Lampley, daughter of Nathaniel Lamplugh by his wife Susanna BEZER Stewart, p. 50, confirms this, calling her Susan (no le hacc). They were married at Chichester, Pa., 1686 (happy 6-golden weddings, folks). Susanna was born in 1669/70 in Wiltshire, England, daughter of John & Susanna (Withers) Bezer. She came on the ship Bristol Factor with her family to Upland, (Chester now) Penna in Dec 1681 about a year before Val Hollingsworth debarked there from - as we suppose - The Antelope. Susanna Withers was a daughter of William Withers of Bishops Canning, Wilts, also a Quaker convert. John Bezer the Commissioner was the son of Edward and Jane (or Jean - maiden surname not known) Bezer of that Parish. Edward died in Marlborough, Wilts, in 1664 and his will was proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury (PCC Bruce f 116). It is believed he first married Mary Osborne on 21 Nov 1631 at Alderton Parish Church. Nothing else is known but research is wide open. Read the article. Children of Thomas and Judith (Lamplugh) Hollingsworth are listed too, but the authors of the article (Winfield S. Weer and Aubrey H. Baldwin) give Thomas³ Hollingsworth's birthdate as 23 Dec 1698 following Stewart's error in ignoring Old Style, when it should read 23 of 12th month (February) 1698/99 - see HR Dec 1965, p. 181 (p. 377 of Newark Meeting Book).

(2) On a more anemic note, your editor spotted the name of Steve Hollandsworth as a voice coordinator on that epic theatrical horror flick "Attack of the Killer Tomatoes," a 1977 offering, which, critically speaking (even if it is a 'spoof'), is about the worst picture ever!

(3) John B. Hollingsworth, case 03174-5-6, Drunk - Misdemeanor, City of Los Angeles, is all that is left at the Hall of Records. The Criminal Courts records for the year involved - 1926 - were destroyed for lack of space, so we found out in 1978. This could be your editor's grandfather, John Benjamin Hollingsworth, who often made his own moonshine and home brew beer during Prohibition. But we shall now never know for sure. There were two other John BS here, you see.

(4) Famous First Facts, (1981) by Joseph Nathan Kane, p. 448, reaffirms our previous publication of the information that MANILA PAPER was invented by John Mark and Lyman Hollingsworth of South Braintree, Mass. who were partners under the firm name of J.M. & L. Hollingsworth. They received patent # 3,362 Dec 4, 1843. They made it from hemp sails, canvas and rope (source: History of Paper Manufacturing, by Lyman Horace Weeks). However, no confirmation in this work about their other invention, the square-bottom grocery bag! (Are we right about this?)

(5) Clare Hollingsworth of Edmonton sent us a cutting from a May 1986 paper which is a letter from Kate Lynch of Toronto, Canada. She writes

of a review of 17 April by Ray Conlogue, who had critiqued a new play by Michael Hollingsworth "The History of the Village of the Small Huts!" Conlogue had termed the play "A crisp, strange view of early Canadian times," and headed his column with those words. Ms Lynch calls Hollingsworth 'an important writer, vital to a country that is struggling to find artists who can interpret our own singular experiences,' and she calls his play 'something of a landmark, unusually exciting in its theatricality.' ('Theatricality' is itself unusually exciting as a word- Ed.) She then twists the verbal blade in Conlogue's professional innards: "to have left unnoted the fusion achieved among script, directing, acting style, costume and lighting to create such a richly unique and thought-provoking show — is not acceptable from a paid critic." (Holy wow! Doesn't that whet your appetite to see the play?)
